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## REPORT

OF THE

## BOARD OF CAPITOL MANAGERS

OF THE

## STATE OF COLORADO.

Denver. Colo.. December 1, 1894.

To the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

In accordance with the provisions of an act of the General Assembly of the State of Colorado, entitled "An act to provide for the erection and completion of a State Capitol building, at the City of Denver, and creating a Board of Managers and Supervision," approved April 1, 1889, the Board of Capitol Managers hereby respectfully present the report of their transactions since December 1, 1892, the date of the last report.

May 1st, 1892, the chairman notified the board that Job A. Cooper had tendered his resignation as manager, and that John L. Routt had been appointed to fill the vacancy.

Since the completion of the contracts of Geddis & Seerie (stone and brick work), Lane Bridge and Iron Works (steel beams and girders), The Colorado Iron Works (iron columns), and Fred Stapp (slate and slate work and sky-light in roof), in 1893, the board directed its attention to the interior and other work.

#### MARBLE.

Section 1 of the act approved April 7th, 1893, relating to State Capitol (pages 71–72, Session Laws 1893) authorized the Board to change the material to be used in the construction of the interior of the building from hardwood to marble and iron.

Referring to marble work, the Board, November 27, 1893, instructed the Secretary to advertise for sixty days for proposals, as follows:

Sealed proposals will be received by the Secretary of the Board of Capitol Managers until 12 o'clock noon, mountain time, February 1st, 1894, for marble and tile work,

Drawings, specifications and details can be seen in the office of the Superintendent, Peter Gumry, at the Capitol building, Denver, Colorado.

Proposals must be submitted on blanks furnished by the Superintendent, the Board of Capitol Managers reserving the right to accept such proposals as they may deem for the best interest of the State, or to reject any and all propositions.

All bidders will be required to furnish a certified check, payable to the order of the Board of Capitol Managers, equal in amount to two and one-half (2½) per cent. of the bids submitted, which amount will be forfeited to the Board in the event of the failure or refusal of any successful bidder to enter into contract with sufficient sureties.

Payments for material furnished and labor performed will be made in cash, providing there are funds in the treasury to the credit of the Capitol building fund, otherwise in certificates of indebtedness, bearing interest at the rate of six (6) per cent. (See Session Laws of 1893, pages 71 to 74.)

All bids must be sealed and endorsed "Proposals for State Capitol Building, Class——," and addressed to the Secretary of the Board of Capitol Managers, Postoffice Box 1242, or Room 252 Equitable Building, Denver, Colorado.

Colorado Marble (Yule Creek).

This bid subject to guarantee that owners of quarry will furnish marble as specified, to the satisfaction of the Board of Capitol Managers.

After reading the bids, the Board adjourned until February 15th, in order to have an opportunity to thoroughly examine the samples of marble and tile work accompanying the proposals.

At this meeting the Board agreed that Colorado marble only should be used, not from one quarry alone, but as many as would be able to furnish suitable material should be represented, in order to give that important industry of our State the greatest possible opportunity.

Among the proposals received, it will be noticed that only four were for Colorado marble, namely:

Proposal No. VII.—Davidson & Sons, Chicago, Ill. (No quarry mentioned, and not known as owning any in the State;

Proposal No. XI.—Wm. J. Grant, Denver. Supposed to be "Yule Creek" marble;

Proposal No. XIV.—The Denver Onyx and Marble Manufacturing Company. Marble from quarry at Beulah, Pueblo County; and

Proposal No. XX.—Same company. Yule Creek marble, subject to guarantee that owner of said quarry would furnish marble, as specified, to the satisfaction of the Board.

This left but a small field for the Board to make selections from, as far as Colorado marble was concerned. It is true, several owners of other quarries had sent samples, with the information that they were, or soon would be, ready to furnish material, but none had complied with the terms of the advertisement or specifications in submitting proposals. In fact, their communications showed plainly that their quarries were not sufficiently opened to allow them to put in a bid as required. On the other hand, the Board was compelled to make immediate arrangements, at least, to provide

marble for certain purposes, the most important of which was wainscoting and stalls for water closets throughout the entire building, in order not to delay the plumbers. The contract for this work was, therefore, let February 15th, 1894, to the Denver Onyx and Marble Manufacturing Company, as per section XII. of their Proposal No. 14, at \$6,914.84, quality and color of marble subject to the approval of the Board.

Owing to the failure of the company to deliver any of the material contracted for, the Board, on August 31st, 1894, entered into an agreement with said company to temporarily furnish Tennessee instead of Colorado marble, the Board retaining the difference in price, with the nuderstanding that, as soon as the contractors could furnish Colorado marble of sufficient size, the Tennessee marble should be removed and Colorado marble substituted. The Tennessee marble not having arrived in October, the work on the lavatories could no longer be delayed, and temporary wooden stalls had to be used. Since this was done, part of the Eastern material has arrived.

In order to complete the Governor's reception room with a marble base, the Board, April 10th, 1894, accepted the Denver Onyx and Marble Manufacturing Company's bid, as per Proposal No. 14, Section XIII., amounting to \$953.94, and for border added, which had not been called for in original specifications, the sum agreed upon was \$495, in all \$1,448.94, the material to be exclusively Colorado marble, quality and color to be selected by the Superintendent. This work was completed to the satisfaction of the Board during October, 1894.

Another part of the marble work considered absolutely necessary was the tiling of the entire first floor, which, besides the corridors, included dome, vaults, lavatories and certain space in business offices of Secretary of State, Treasurer and Auditor. This work was also awarded to the Denver Onyx and Marble Manufacturing Company, April 10th, 1894, at \$19,010.43, as per Proposal No. 14, Section II., of their bid, opened February 1, 1894, the material used to be all Colorado marble.

The Board regrets to state that the progress of this latter work has been most disappointing, the company up to this date having only covered space in the offices of the State officials mentioned, and is now at work on the lavatories.

When it became evident that the tiling of the first floor could not be completed in time for occupancy of the building by the Legislature and State officers, the Board, September 5th, 1894, instructed the Superintendent to proceed to cover all of the first floor corridors temporarily with cement, in the same manner as previously ordered for basement, second and third floors, as well as for all walls throughout the building, where marble wainscoting was intended to be used.

To say that the Board has been greatly disappointed with the progress of the marble work contracted for, expresses it but mildly. Considering the proposals received, in order to commence marble work and use exclusively Colorado material, there was no other alternative than to accept the proposition of the Denver Onyx and Marble Manufacturing Company, or reject all bids and delay the work longer than necessary. The quarries of this company had been more developed than any other, and it alone possessed machinery, at that time, for cutting and dressing the material, after being delivered in Denver in its crude state.

From investigation, reports and samples received and examined, the Board is fully convinced that there are many quarries in our State capable of furnishing an inexhaustable supply of marble of the finest quality, both as to texture and color, for any purpose, but the fact is demonstrated that only a few are sufficiently developed at present to contract for the delivery of material in large quantities, which is proven by the small number of bids received. On the other hand, the Board has received many advices during the summer, from different owners, that they were now ready to furnish marble, which shows that in some cases owners had commenced to open quarries. Of course, such propositions could not be considered after the time for receiving and opening bids had expired, as the law requires the Board to advertise for all material and labor exceeding the amount of \$500.

#### DOME.

The exterior of the dome is completed, with the exception of the statuary to crown the same, for which the model has not as yet been selected. The bell of the dome is left uncovered, as the Board is yet undecided what material to use. The plastering in the interior is almost finished, and as soon as the stairs and balnstrades are received they can be placed in position. All material for this work, as well as railings and bronze balustrades for north and south corridors, was contracted for with Lane Bridge and Iron Works, July 3d, 1894. To conceal the interior of the bell of the dome, a metal diaphragm will have to be placed over the well-hole.

#### LIGHTING.

The entire building is provided with gas, in addition to electric wiring, so that either may be used in any portion of the building. The installation of the electric light plant is what is known as the two multiple arc system, based on a pressure of one hundred volts, with a two per cent. loss. Every wire is placed in a separate brass tube throughout the building, and is so arranged that the wire can be readily drawn from the outlets through the junction boxes.

No provision having been made for dynamos and engine for providing light, arrangements have been made with The Denver Consolidated Electric Company to furnish same at meter rates.

#### HEATING AND VENTILATING.

This plant is practically completed and in running order. The powerful fans and air ducts have been thoroughly tested and found satisfactory.

#### PLUMBING.

This is nearly completed.

#### ELEVATORS.

July 20th, 1893, the Board, by advertisement, called for proposals for elevators, pumps and pressure tanks, which were opened August 31st, 1893, and read as follows:

Both of which were rejected.

After re-advertising, the Board, November 28th, 1894, received the following bids:

The Monntain Electric Company, Denver, bid on Spragne-Pratt electric elevator, \$21,500.

Crane Elevator Company, Chicago, Ill., nine proposals, averaging from \$14,311 to \$16,436.

Winslow Bros.' Elevator Company, Chicago, Ill., five proposals, averaging from \$18,437 to \$20,264.

The Board not having sufficient time to examine the different propositions, has not awarded the contract at the close of this report.

#### SEWER CONNECTION.

It has always been claimed by the Board of Public Works that the Capitol grounds were included by Ordinance 117 in the Twentieth street sanitary sewer district, and therefore were assessed for its proportion of the cost of sewers in said district, which tax on one hundred and twenty (120) lots, the area of the grounds, the Board contended was illegal, as to the whole of the grounds, or any part thereof. Owing to this difference of opinion, the connection with the city sewer has been delayed until a stipulation between the Board of Public Works and this Board was effected in September, 1894, whereby it was mutually agreed that upon payment of \$1,650, covering an area equal to thirty (30) lots, and embracing all the grounds upon which the Capitol and buildings pertinent thereto are situate, the Board of Public Works would issue a permit to the Board of Capitol Managers to connect the building with the sewer, the same to be used for drainage and other proper sewer purposes.

The question as to whether the Capitol grounds, or any part thereof, is subject to a sewer tax or not, is by this agreement left wholly unaffected and undetermined, and is to be referred to a court of competent jurisdiction for final determination.

A copy of the stipulation is on file in the office of the Board of Capitol Managers.

#### CAPITOL BUILDING GROUNDS.

The work performed during the last two years has been principally grading, excavating and filling, where necessary,

on the west front, and about the building where the grounds are no longer occupied by contractors.

The time has now arrived for laying out, ornamenting and beautifying the grounds.

As stated in the Fourth Biennial Report, the Board has four plans, obtained by advertisement, no one of which has been selected, as there was no competition, only one party responding to the call. Combining the suggestions presented by the several plans referred to, the Board has instructed the Superintendent to prepare a plan of walks, drives, water pipe system and drainage, which is now completed, and forms the basis for further improvements.

The first thing after finishing the grading, of which but little remains to be done, and laying out of walks and drives, is the locating of water and drainage pipes, for sprinklers and fountains, after which sodding and seeding can commence and trees and shrubbery be planted.

All walks and drives should be macadamized; also, the necessary stone steps for terraces built, together with a foundation for the bronze group, "The Closing Era," donated by the women of Denver to adorn the grounds, and now in charge of the Board.

In order to keep the walls of the water table course clean, and for the working of lawn mowers, a walk of suitable material, not less than four feet wide, should run entirely around the building, following all angles.

There should be provided, for special occasions, a system of lighting the drives and walks in the grounds.

#### FURNISHING.

For the purpose of furnishing the building, the last General Assembly appropriated the sum of one hundred thousand (\$100,000) dollars, of which the following has been expended:

Although the principal State offices, Supreme Court and Court of Appeals are located, and the Tenth General Assembly will meet in the Capitol, considerable work remains to be done in order to complete the building.

The following is a list of items unlet and unfinished:

First—Marble floors for basement, second and third floors.

Second—Marble wainscoting for basement, first, second and third floors, dome, Supreme Court, Senate chamber and gallery and House of Representatives and gallery.

Third—Marble steps and risers, two flights in basement and two flights on first floor; also, all steps and risers from second floor up to elevated floors of Supreme Court room, Senate chamber and House of Representatives.

Fourth—Marble work in niches and drinking fountains.

Fifth—Marble rail surmounting balustrades in grand corridors, hand rail on dome balustrades and stairs of basement and first floor.

Sixth—Marble base in dome for colonnade floor.

Seventh-Marble bulletins.

Eighth—Bronze and ornamental iron work of stairs in basement and on first floor; also, second floor staircases.

Ninth—Bronze finish for outside entrances on first floor.

Tenth—Metal floor and diaphragm for bell of dome.

Eleventh—Metal and glass floor in rotunda of dome in basement.

Twelfth—Gilding of dome.

Thirteenth—Bronze statue on dome.

Fourteenth—Interior decoration.

Fiftcenth—Cleaning all granite work.

# SECRETARY'S REPORT.

To the Board of Capitol Managers:

Gentlemen:—I present herewith a statement of the receipts and disbursements on account of the Capitol building for the fiscal years 1893 and 1894, covering all financial transactions from December 1st. 1892, to November 30th, 1894, inclusive.

All estimates and bills were duly allowed by the Board, and certified to the State Auditor, who drew a warrant on the State Treasurer for the amount of each voucher, and in favor of the owner thereof.

Your attention is respectfully called to the act of 1891, appropriating out of Capitol building fund five thousand (\$5,000) dollars, or as much thereof as may be necessary, for the relief of certain laborers, who had performed work upon the Capitol building under W. D. Richardson, late contractor, and who had not been paid for their labor.

The Auditor, not having charged the amount as an additional appropriation, I would suggest that the next General Assembly be requested to authorize him to do so.

The Treasurer has not been able to restore the first year's interest paid on Capitol building bonds, and taken from Capitol building fund. The amount is \$13,875, of which \$2,625 was paid by Treasurer Brisbane upon a warrant issued by Auditor Schwanbeck, and which has been charged by Auditor to appropriation account.

#### APPENDIX.

## ACTS

OF THE

# NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY

OF THE STATE OF COLORADO.

#### AN ACT

MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE STATE CAPITOL BUILDING, FIXING THE TOTAL AMOUNT THAT MAY BE EXPENDED IN THE CONSTRUCTION THEREOF, LIMITING THE TIME WITHIN WHICH THE SAME SHALL BE COMPLETED, PROVIDING FOR A CHANGE OF MATERIAL IN THE CONSTRUCTION THEREOF, AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF CERTIFICATES OF INDEBTEDNESS IN CERTAIN CASES.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

SECTION 1. There is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the treasury, being funds created by levy or otherwise, for the constructed [construction] of the State Capitol building, and from such other funds as make part of what is known and styled as the Capitol Building Fund, and not otherwise appropriated, the sum of three hundred thousand dollars, which said amount added to moneys heretofore appropriated for said Capitol building brings said appropriations to the total sum of two million dollars; that for the purpose of changing the material to be used in the construction of the interior of the State Capitol building from hardwood to marble and iron, and to finish the same in a suitable manner, in order that the interior thereof may correspond with the architectural design of the exterior, and with the character of the material used in the construction thereof, and to more thoroughly and completely finish said building, there is also appropriated in addition to the moneys herein and hereby and heretofore appropriated, the further sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars out of any moneys in the treasury, being funds created by levy or otherwise for the construction of the State Capitol building; which said sums so herein and hereby appropriated are to be used and expended in the completion of the erection of the State Capitol building; and such appropriations are to be in addition to the unexpended appropriations heretofore made for said purpose, and the limit of the total cost of the construction of said Capitol building is hereby increased, so as to permit said additional sums herein appropriated to be thus expended and applied. And it appearing that from the changes in the material employed in the construction of said building, and the changes of material heretofore made by acts of the Legislature, and rendered necessary, in order that said structure may be uniform in its character and of fitting material, that the increase above provided for in the amount to be expended in the erection of said building has become necessary; and it also appearing that, owing to the failure to realize the funds contemplated by former acts of the Legislature, that the time for completing said building, named in former acts, was insufficient, it is hereby further provided that the Board of Capitol Managers shall complete the said building by the first day of January, A. D. 1895, and as much sooner than such time as the character of work and their ability to realize the appropriations made therefor renders it possible for them to do.

SEC. 2. In view of the unavoidable delays that have necessarily resulted in delaying the completion of said building, owing to the changes in the character of material employed, and the failure to obtain the moneys necessary for the completion thereof within the times contemplated by former acts of the Legislature upon the subject, and in view of the necessity for the speedy completion of said building, and in order that the Board of Capitol Managers may be provided from time to time with the means necessary for the early completion of the State Capitol building for occupancy by the State officers, the Auditor of State is hereby authorized and directed to issue certificates of indebtedness for all claims duly andited and certified by the said Board of Capitol Managers for material furnished and labor performed in and about the erection of said building, and for the construction thereof, where there are no funds in the treasury at the time of the issuance thereof to meet the same; said certificates to be payable out of the Capitol building fund and the moneys appropriated for the erection and completion of said Capitol building. The faith and credit of the State of Colorado is hereby pledged for the payment of interest and principal of this indebtedness; and that the said certificates shall be presented to the State Treasurer, who shall thereupon countersign and endorse the same as bearing interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum from the date of the presentation to the date of the payment thereof; but in no event shall the certificates be in excess of the probable revenues accruing to the said Capitol building fund from the tax levied for the years 1892, 1893, 1894, 1895 and 1896, or in excess of the appropriations made for the completion of said building.

SEC. 3. On the tenth day of each and every month, if there be funds in the treasury to pay any certificates of indebtedness provided for in the foregoing section, the Auditor of State is hereby required and directed to give notice by advertisement in a newspaper, printed in the City of Denver, designating the certificates by number in the order of their presentation to the State Treasurer, and endorsed thereon, which the funds in the Treasury will pay. At the expiration of thirty days from the date of the last insertion, interest on the certificates of indebtedness so named as being payable shall cease.

Sec. 4. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions hereof are hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. In the opinion of the General Assembly, an emergency exists with regard to the matters provided for in this bill; and, therefore, this act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

#### ANACT

MAKING AN APPROPRIATION OF ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS FOR THE PURPOSE OF FURNISHING THE STATE CAPITOL BUILDING.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

Section 1. There is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the treasury, being funds created by levy or otherwise, and from such other funds as may be made part of what is known and styled as the Capitol Bnilding Fund, and not otherwise appropriated, the sum of one hundred thousand dollars for the purpose of furnishing the State Capitol building of Colorado. And it is hereby provided that said sum, or so much thereof as may be necessary therefor, shall be expended by the Board of Capitol Managers of the State of Colorado for the purpose of furnishing said State Capitol building.

SEC. 2. Whereas, in the opinion of the General Assembly, an emergency exists; therefore, this act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

Approved April 7, 1893.

#### AN ACT

TO AUTHORIZE THE BOARD OF CAPITOL MANAGERS TO DESIGNATE AND SET APART A ROOM IN THE NEW CAPITOL BUILDING FOR PERMANENT HEADQUARTERS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF COLORADO AND WYOMING GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

Be it-enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

SECTION 1. The Board of Capitol Managers are authorized and directed to set apart for the use of the headquarters of the Department of Colorado and Wyoming Grand Army of the Republic a suitable room for the safe keeping of books, papers, records and relics belonging to the Department of Colorado and Wyoming Grand Army of the Republic.
