VOLUNTEER OFFICERS

The great area of the State—almost 104,000 square miles, whereas all of New England is only about 60,000 square miles—and the small number of state officers, three in all, has developed a system of volunteer officers which now numbers around seventeen hundred, part of them in Denver and more than half scattered over the State.

They have the same great and discretionary powers in protecting children and dumb animals that the regular state officers have, but receive no compensation. Whatever pay they get is in the satisfaction they feel in protecting the helpless. In doing so they antagonize the cruel and cowardly class, which is guilty of abuse and neglect of children and dumb animals, and they also run the risk of making enemies of friends and neighbors, of business and political associates, of church and social brethren—for the ramifications of resentment at law enforcement in the individual case are well known. All good citizens are strong for enforcing law and for protecting the helpless—until so doing touches unpleasantly ourselves and our friends. In all such cases any wise and just officer of the law ought to make exceptions—of course. If he does not take that view he is neither wise nor just nor fit for his office—everybody knows that.

Some of this army of volunteer officers do very little but most of them do a great deal and many do all there is for them to do. The State in general, and abused and helpless dumb animals and children in particular, owe them an incalculable debt of appreciation and gratitude. Their good and humanizing influence in their respective communities is very great and the amount of actual case work probably exceeds several times over the work of the three state officers. It is not possible to get statistics of their work—partly because the Bureau has not postage enough to obtain them.

LIST OF VOLUNTEER OFFICERS

List of volunteer officers appointed since the publication of the preceding Biennial Report. Previous to that time a complete list of the volunteer officers, as far as it was possible to locate them, was compiled and brought down to date in the Year Book of 1925. Since a sufficient number of copies of the Year Book remain for the present it does not seem necessary to re-publish any of its contents in the Biennial Report. In addition to the statistical report for the past two years we accordingly publish only the list of volunteer officers appointed since the last Biennial Report. The two lists and the Year Book, taken together, give all the volunteer officers who, as we have any reason to think, may still be active even if they cannot be located.
