LIVESTOCK SLAUGHTER NOVEMBER 2005

Production of red meat in **Colorado** during November 2005 totaled 143.2 million pounds, 4 percent below the same month last year but 3 percent above October 2005. **Beef** slaughter was down 6 percent from a year ago to 164,700 head but the average live weight increased 23 pounds to 1,307. **Hog** slaughter increased 22 percent to 1,100 head and the average live weight increased 9 pounds to 267. **Accumulated production** of all red meat for the January-November 2005 period totaled 1.62 billion pounds, down 12 percent from the 1.83 billion pounds produced during the same period in 2004.

Commercial red meat production for the United States totaled 3.94 billion pounds in November, up 5 percent from the 3.77 billion pounds produced in November 2004.

Beef production, at 2.07 billion pounds, was 7 percent above the previous year. Cattle slaughter totaled 2.67 million head, up 5 percent from November 2004. The average live weight was up 16 pounds from the previous year, at 1,284 pounds.

Veal production totaled 12.4 million pounds, 10 percent below November a year ago. Calf slaughter totaled 56,300 head, down 17 percent from November 2004. The average live weight was 29 pounds above last year, at 365 pounds.

Pork production totaled 1.84 billion pounds, up 2 percent from the previous year. Hog kill totaled 9.13 million head, 2 percent above November 2004. The average live weight was 2 pounds above the previous year, at 272 pounds.

Lamb and mutton production, at 15.8 million pounds, was down 4 percent from November 2004. Sheep slaughter totaled 224,500 head, 7 percent below last year. The average live weight was 141 pounds, up 5 pounds from November a year ago.

January to November 2005 commercial red meat production was 41.8 billion pounds, up 1 percent from 2004.

Accumulated beef production was up 1 percent from last year, veal was down 6 percent, pork was up 1 percent from last year, and lamb and mutton production was down 4 percent.

CATTLE ON FEED DECEMBER 1, 2005

The number of cattle and calves on feed for the slaughter market in Colorado feedlots with a capacity of 1,000 head or larger was estimated at 1,070,000 head as of December 1, 2005 The latest inventory was up 4 percent from November 1, 2005 but down 3 percent from the 1,100,000 on feed on December 1, 2004. Cattle feeders with 1,000 head or larger capacity marketed an estimated 115,000 head of fed cattle during November 2006. This was 23 percent below a revised October 2006 marketings of 150,000 head and 26 percent below a year ago. An estimated 165,000 cattle and calves were placed on feed during November, 6 percent below a year ago and 42 percent below a revised October 2005 placements of 285,000. Of the number placed in November, 27 percent weighed less than 600 pounds, 36 percent weighed from 600 to 699 pounds, 21 percent weighed from 700 to 799 pounds, and 15 percent weighed 800 pounds and greater. Other disappearance for November, at 10,000 head, is up 5,000 head from last month but unchanged from a year ago.

Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in the United States for feedlots with capacity of 1,000 or more head totaled 11.7 million head on December 1, 2005. The inventory was 3 percent above December 1, 2004 and 3 percent above December 1, 2003. Placements in feedlots during November totaled 2.05 million, 17 percent above 2004 and 6 percent above 2003. Net placements were 1.95 million. During November, placements of cattle and calves weighing less than 600 pounds were 660,000, 600-699 pounds were 650,000, 700-799 pounds were 420,000, and 800 pounds and greater were 315,000.

Marketings of fed cattle during November totaled 1.70 million, 4 percent above 2004 and 11 percent above 2003. Other disappearance totaled 91,000 during November, 16 percent below 2004 and 6 percent below 2003.

HOG AND PIG INVENTORY DECEMBER 1, 2005

Colorado's December 1, 2005 inventory of all hogs and pigs, at 840,000 head, increased 5 percent from a year ago but was down 1 percent from the September 2005 total. The **breeding hog** inventory of 145,000 head increased 4 percent from December 1, 2004 and September 2005. The **market hog** inventory for December 1, 2005 was 695,000 head, up 5 percent from a year earlier but down 2 percent from September 1, 2005.

Colorado's 2005 **pig crop** of 2.71 million head was 13 percent above 2004. There were 310,000 sows farrowed during the December 2004 through November 2005 time period compared with 288,000 sows farrowed during the comparable period a year earlier. The 2005 average litter size was 8.74 pigs this year, up from 8.31 pigs per litter in 2004.

U.S. inventory of all hogs and pigs on December 1, 2005 was 61.2 million head. This was up slightly from December 1, 2004, but down 1 percent from September 1, 2005. **Breeding inventory**, at 6.01 million head, was up 1 percent from last year and last quarter. **Market hog inventory**, at 55.2 million head, was up slightly from last year but down 1 percent from last quarter.

The September-November 2005 U.S. pig crop, at 26.1 million head, was up 1 percent from 2004 and up 2 percent from 2003. Sows farrowing during this period totaled 2.89 million head, unchanged from last year. The sows farrowed during this quarter represented 48 percent of the breeding herd. The average pigs saved per litter was 9.03 for the September-November 2005 period, compared to 8.96 last year. Pigs saved per litter by size of operation ranged from 7.50 for operations with 1-99 hogs and pigs to 9.10 for operations with more than 5,000 hogs and pigs.

U.S. hog producers intend to have 2.88 million sows farrow during the December 2005-February 2006 quarter, up 1 percent from the actual farrowings during the same period in both 2005 and 2004. Intended farrowings for March-May 2006, at 2.89 million sows, are up slightly from 2005 and up 1 percent from 2004. The total number of hogs under contract, owned by operations with over 5,000 head, but raised by contractees, accounted for 39 percent of the total U.S. hog inventory, up from 38 percent from last year.

Revisions: All inventory and pig crop estimates for March 2004 through September 2005 were reviewed using final pig crop, official slaughter, death loss, and updated import and export data. Based on the findings of this review, small adjustments of less than one-half of one percent were made to the June 2005 total inventory, September 2005 total inventory and to the March-May 2005 pig crop.

CHICKENS AND EGGS NOVEMBER 2005

Colorado laying flocks produced 89 million eggs during November 2005, down 1 percent from a month earlier but 1 percent above 88 million eggs produced during November 2004. The number of layers during November 2005 totaled 3.81 million, down 5 percent from a year earlier but up 2 percent from the previous month. The average rate of lay for November 2005, at 2,338 eggs per 100 layers, compares with 2,201 eggs per 100 layers during November 2004 and 2,411 for October 2005.

U.S. egg production totaled 7.54 billion during November 2005, up 1 percent from last year. Production included 6.48 billion table eggs, and 1.06 billion hatching eggs, of which 996 million were broiler-type and 60 million were egg-type. The number of layers during November 2005 averaged 347 million, up 1 percent from a year earlier. November egg production per 100 layers was 2,175 eggs, up slightly from November 2004.

AGRICULTURAL PRICES DECEMBER 15, 2005

The preliminary **All Farm Products Index of Prices Received by Farmers** in December, at 114, based on 1990-92=100, increased 1 point (0.9 percent) from November. The Crop Index is up 4 points (3.8 percent) but the Livestock Index decreased 2 points (1.7 percent). Producers received higher commodity prices for tomatoes, corn, strawberries, and lettuce.

Lower prices were received for oranges, broilers, dairy, and grapes.

The **December All Crops Index** is 109, up 3.8 percent from November and 4.8 percent above December 2004. The all wheat price, at \$3.47 per bushel, is unchanged from November but up 7 cents from December 2004. The corn price, at \$1.88 per bushel, is up 11 cents from last month but 16 cents below December 2004. The all hay price, at \$92.00 per ton, is 30 cents above November and up \$6.00 from last December. The soybean price, at \$5.71 per bushel, increased 9 cents from November and is 26 cents above December 2004. The all potato price, at \$6.60 per cwt, is up 29 cents from November and up \$1.24 from last December. The all dry bean price, at \$18.60 per cwt, is up 30 cents from the previous month but \$8.40 below December 2004.

The December **Livestock and Products Index**, at 119, is 1.7 percent below last month and down 0.8 percent from December 2004. The December hog price, at \$45.50 per cwt, is up \$1.90 from November but \$6.90 lower than a year ago. The December beef cattle price of \$92.70 is up \$1.40 from last month and \$5.90 higher than December 2004. The December all milk price of \$14.70 is down 40 cents from last month and down \$1.70 from December 2004.

Colorado's December 2005 crop prices averaged higher than a year earlier for all items except corn, all barley and dry edible beans. All livestock prices averaged above a year ago except cows. Mid-December 2005 wheat, at \$3.33 per bushel, increased 4 cents from the previous month and was 2 cents above December a year ago. Corn prices decreased 14 cents from November to \$2.05 per bushel and averaged 17 cents below December 2004. Potatoes were 15 cents above November at \$8.30 per cwt and averaged \$3.70 per cwt above the \$4.60 per cwt received in December 2004. Dry bean prices averaged \$18.20 per cwt in December, up 10 cents from the previous month but \$12.00 below the same month in 2004. Mid-December 2005 alfalfa hay prices decreased \$1.00 from the previous month at \$100.00 but increased 14.00 per ton from a year ago. Other hay prices were \$1.00 below the previous month at \$99.00 but increased \$18.00 from December 2004. Steer and heifer prices, at \$119.00 per cwt, were unchanged from November but were \$13.00 per cwt above December 2004. December 2005 cow prices, at \$46.80 per cwt, averaged \$1.40 per cwt below November and \$2.20 below December a year ago. Calves, at \$137.00 per cwt, were unchanged from the previous month but \$11.00 per cwt above December 2004. The December all milk price of \$14.10 is down 70 cents from last month.

All layers in the U.S. on December 1, 2005, totaled 348 million, up 1 percent from a year ago. The 348 million layers consisted of 291 million layers producing table-type eggs, 54.9 million layers producing broiler-type hatching eggs, and 2.61 million layers producing egg-type hatching eggs. Rate of lay per day on December 1, 2005, averaged 72.4 eggs per 100 layers, down 1 percent from December 1, 2004.

Laying flocks in the 30 major egg producing States produced 7.08 billion eggs during November 2005, up 1 percent from a year ago. The average number of layers during November, at 326 million, was also up 1 percent from a year ago.

COLD STORAGE NOVEMBER 30, 2005

Frozen food stocks in refrigerated warehouses on November 30, 2005 were greater than year earlier levels for chicken, frozen vegetables and eggs. Butter stocks were down 37 percent from last month, but up 7 percent from a year ago.

Total red meat supplies in freezers were down 2 percent from last month and down 3 percent from last year. Frozen pork supplies were down 3 percent from last month and down 1 percent from the previous year. Stocks of pork bellies were up 89 percent from last month, but down 16 percent from last year.

Total frozen poultry supplies on November 30, 2005 were down 12 percent from the previous month, but up 1 percent from a year ago. Total stocks of chicken were up 8 percent from the previous month and up 13 percent from last year. Total pounds of turkey in freezers were down 52 percent from last month and down 32 percent from November 30, 2004.

Public cooler occupancy on November 30, 2005, was at 52 percent of capacity, up 2 points from last year. Public freezer occupancy, was at 65 percent, up 4 points from last year.
