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LIVESTOCK SLAUGHTER OCTOBER 2010

Red meat production in **Colorado** during September 2010 totaled 182.2 million pounds, up 5 percent from 173.3 million pounds a year earlier and slightly lower than August 2010 production. Cattle kill during September was up 7 percent from a year earlier to 209,600 head and the average live weight decreased 13 pounds to 1,334 per head. Hog slaughter, at 1,000 head, was down 300 head from a year earlier but the average live weight of 261 pounds was 7 pound above the previous year. Accumulated red meat production for the January-September period this year, now totals 1.60 billion pounds, 4 percent above last year.

Commercial red meat production for the **United States** totaled 4.16 billion pounds in September, down 2 percent from the 4.26 billion pounds produced in September 2009. Beef production, at 2.25 billion pounds, was 1 percent above the previous year. Cattle slaughter totaled 2.90 million head, up 3 percent from September 2009. The average live weight was down 21 pounds from the previous year, at 1,289 pounds.

Veal production totaled 11.3 million pounds, 4 percent below September a year ago. Calf slaughter totaled 71,200 head, down 12 percent from September 2009. The average live weight was up 28 pounds from last year, at 273 pounds. Pork production totaled 1.88 billion pounds, down 6 percent from the previous year. Hog kill totaled 9.34 million head, down 6 percent from September 2009. The average live weight was unchanged from the previous year, at 270 pounds.

Lamb and mutton production, at 13.1 million pounds, was down 12 percent from September 2009. Sheep slaughter totaled 204,000 head, 9 percent below last year. The average live weight was 129 pounds, down 1 pound from September a year ago.

January to September 2009 commercial red meat production was 36.1 billion pounds, down 2 percent from 2009. Accumulated beef production was up slightly from last year, veal was down 1 percent, pork was down 4 percent from last year, and lamb and mutton production was down 4 percent.

CATTLE ON FEED OCTOBER 1, 2010

COLORADO

The number of cattle and calves on feed for the slaughter market in Colorado feedlots with a capacity of 1,000 head or larger was estimated at 1,000,000 head as of October 1, 2010. The latest inventory was up 12 percent from September 1, 2010 and up 4 percent from the 960,000 on feed on October 1, 2009. The inventory included 705,000 steers and steer calves, up 8 percent from the previous year. The number of heifers and heifer calves, at 290,000 head, was down 5 percent from last year while cows and bulls were unchanged at 5,000 head. Cattle feeders with 1,000 head or larger capacity marketed an estimated 180,000 head of fed cattle during September 2010. This was 3 percent below August 2010 marketings of 185,000 head but 16 percent above a year ago. An estimated 295,000 cattle and calves were placed on feed during September, up 13 percent from a year ago and up 55 percent above the August 2010 placements of 190,000. Of the number placed in September, 12 percent weighed less than 600 pounds, 12 percent weighed from 600 to 699 pounds, 22 percent weighed from 700 to 799 pounds, and 54 percent weighed 800 pounds and greater. Other disappearance for September, at 5,000 head, was unchanged from September 2009 and August 2010.

Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in the **United States** for feedlots with capacity of 1,000 or more head totaled 10.8 million head on October 1, 2010. The inventory was 3 percent above October 1, 2009. The inventory included 6.60 million steers and steer calves, up 3 percent from the previous year. This group accounted for 61 percent of the total inventory. Heifers and heifer calves accounted for 4.12 million head, also up 3 percent from 2009. Placements in feedlots during September totaled 2.46 million, 3 percent above 2009. Net placements were 2.41 million head. During September, placements of cattle and calves weighing less than 600 pounds were 510,000, 600-699 pounds were 455,000, 700-799 pounds were 602,000, and 800 pounds and greater were 895,000. Marketings of fed cattle during September totaled 1.80 million, 2 percent above 2009. Other disappearance totaled 54,000 during September, 15 percent above 2009.

MILK PRODUCTION SEPTEMBER 2010

COLORADO HIGHLIGHTS

Colorado dairy herds produced 237 million pounds of milk during September 2010, up 17 million pounds from last September's production, and down 6 million pounds from August's production. The average number of cows, at 122,000 head, increased 2,000 head from last month, and up 5,000 cows from the previous year. The average milk per cow for the month of September in Colorado was 1,945 pounds per cow, down from 2,025 pounds per cow in August but 65 pounds per cow higher than 2009. Colorado is seventh in the nation in milk production per cow.

Milk production in the **23 major States** during September totaled 14.5 billion pounds, up 3.6 percent from September 2009. August revised production at 15.0 billion pounds, was up 2.7 percent from August 2009. The August revision represented a decrease of 18 million pounds or 0.1 percent from last month's preliminary production estimate. Production per cow in the 23 major States averaged 1,729 pounds for September, 54 pounds above September 2009. The number of milk cows on farms in the 23 major States was 8.37 million head, 31,000 head more than September 2009, and 4,000 head more than August 2010.

Milk production in the U.S. during the July - September quarter totaled 48.1 billion pounds, up 2.7 percent from the July - September quarter last year. The average number of milk cows in the U.S. during the quarter was 9.12 million head, 32,000 head less than the same period last year.

AGRICULTURAL PRICES OCTOBER 2010

The preliminary All Farm Product Index of Prices Received by Farmers in October, at 160 percent, based on 1990-1992=100, increased 12 points (8.1 percent) from September. The Crop Index is up 17 points (11 percent) but the Livestock Index decreased 1 point (0.7 percent). Producers received higher prices for corn, soybeans, eggs, and milk and lower prices for hogs, broilers, cattle, and potatoes. In addition to prices, the overall index is also affected by the seasonal change based on a 3-year average mix of commodities producers sell. Increased monthly marketings of soybeans, corn, grain sorghum, and cotton offset decreased marketings of wheat, milk, sweet corn, and grapes.

The October All Crops Index is up 17 points (11 percent) from September and 25 points (17 percent) above October 2009. The October all wheat price, at \$6.08 per bushel, is up 25 cents from September and \$1.61 above October 2009. The corn price, at \$4.78 per bushel, is up 70 cents from last month and \$1.17 above October 2009. Grain sorghum, at \$8.47 per cwt, is \$1.21 above September and \$2.93 above October last year. The soybean price, at \$10.70 per bushel, increased 72 cents from September and \$1.27 above October 2009. The all potato price, at \$6.97 per hundredweight, is down 38 cents from September but down 14 cents from last October. The all dry bean price, at \$24.90 per hundredweight, is down \$1.60 from the previous month and \$5.00 below October last year.

The October Livestock & Products Index at 134, is 0.7 percent below last month but up 22 percent from October 2009. The October hog price, at \$57.00 per hundredweight, is down \$4.20 from September but \$19.20 higher than a year ago. The October beef cattle price of \$92.40 per hundredweight is down \$1.80 from last month but \$13.20 higher than October 2009. The October all milk price of \$18.30 per hundredweight increased 60 cents from last month and is \$4.00 higher than October 2009.

Colorado's mid-October prices for crop items averaged higher than a year ago except dry beans and hay. Wheat, at \$5.83 per bushel, averaged \$1.68 above October 2009 and 16 cents above September of this year. Corn averaged \$4.94 per bushel in mid-October this year, up \$1.12 from the previous year and up 97 cents from last month. Potato prices increased 20 cents

per hundredweight from last month to \$11.30 per cwt and averaged \$4.90 above the October 2009 average of \$6.40 per Alfalfa hay prices at \$125.00 per ton hundredweight. remained unchanged from last month but decreased \$10.00 from a year ago. Other hay prices at \$105.00 per ton decreased \$5.00 per ton from September 2010, and were down \$10.00 from October 2009. Steer and heifer prices at \$105.00 per hundredweight remained unchanged from last month and \$15.00 above a year ago. Cows, at \$57.50 per hundredweight, were down \$4.00 from last month and averaged \$12.50 above October 2009. Calves averaged \$117.00 for mid-October and remained unchanged from last month but up \$17.00 per hundredweight from a year ago. The October all milk price of \$18.40 was 70 cents above last month and \$4.40 above a year ago.

COLD STORAGE SEPTEMBER 30, 2010

Frozen food stocks in refrigerated warehouses on September 30, 2010 were greater than year earlier levels for eggs, chicken and cheese. Butter stocks were down 16 percent from last month and down 43 percent from a year ago.

Total red meat supplies in freezers were up 5 percent from the previous month but down 14 percent from last year. Frozen pork supplies were up 10 percent from the previous month but down 20 percent from last year. Stocks of pork bellies were down 34 percent from last month and down 88 percent from last year.

Total frozen poultry supplies on September 30, 2010 were down 2 percent from the previous month and down 5 percent from a year ago. Total stocks of chicken were up 1 percent from the previous month and up 12 percent from last year. Total pounds of turkey in freezers were down 6 percent from last month and down 23 percent from September 30, 2009.
