

AG UPDATE

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LIVESTOCK SLAUGHTER OCTOBER 2011

Red meat production in **Colorado** during September 2011 totaled 187 million pounds, up 3 percent from 182.2 million pounds a year earlier but 9 percent lower than August 2011 production. Cattle kill during September was up 1 percent from a year earlier to 211,100 head and the average live weight increased 3 pounds to 1,337 per head. Hog slaughter, at 1,000 head, remained unchanged from a year earlier but the average live weight of 258 pounds was 3 pounds below the previous year. Sheep and lamb slaughter, at 84,300 head, increased 13,600 head from a year earlier, and the average live weight of 152 pounds was 8 pounds above the previous year. Accumulated red meat production for the January-September period this year, now totals 1.62 billion pounds, 1 percent above last year.

Commercial red meat production for the **United States** totaled 4.19 billion pounds in September, up 1 percent from the 4.16 billion pounds produced in September 2010. Beef production, at 2.22 billion pounds, was 2 percent below the previous year. Cattle slaughter totaled 2.88 million head, down 1 percent from September 2010. The average live weight was down 11 pounds from the previous year, at 1,278 pounds.

Veal production totaled 10.7 million pounds, 5 percent below September a year ago. Calf slaughter totaled 73,800 head, up 4 percent from September 2010. The average live weight was down 22 pounds from last year, at 252 pounds. Pork production totaled 1.95 billion pounds, up 4 percent from the previous year. Hog slaughter totaled 9.69 million head, up 4 percent from September 2010. The average live weight was unchanged from the previous year, at 270 pounds.

Lamb and mutton production, at 11.8 million pounds, was down 10 percent from September 2010. Sheep slaughter totaled 177,000 head, 14 percent below last year. The average live weight was 134 pounds, up 5 pounds from September a year ago.

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January to September 2011 commercial red meat production

was 36.5 billion pounds, up 1 percent from 2010. Accumulated beef production was up 1 percent from last year, veal was down 3 percent, pork was up 2 percent from last year, and lamb and mutton production was down 8 percent.

CATTLE ON FEED OCTOBER 1, 2011

The number of cattle and calves on feed for the slaughter market in Colorado feedlots with a capacity of 1,000 head or larger was estimated at 1,070,000 head as of October 1, 2011. The latest inventory was 8 percent above last month's inventory and 7 percent above the October 1, 2010 inventory. The inventory included 730,000 steers and steer calves, up 4 percent from the previous year. The number of heifers and heifer calves, at 335,000 head, are up 16 percent from a year ago. The number of cows and bulls totaled 5,000, no change from last year's number. Cattle feeders with 1,000 head or larger capacity marketed an estimated 185,000 head of fed cattle during September 2011. This was 10 percent below the previous month's marketings but 3 percent above marketings one year earlier. An estimated 275,000 cattle and calves were placed on feed during September 2011, down 7 percent from a year ago, but up 20 percent from the August 2011 placements. Of the number placed in September, 15 percent weighed less than 600 pounds, 9 percent weighed from 600 to 699 pounds, 22 percent weighed from 700 to 799 pounds, and 55 percent weighed 800 pounds and greater. Other disappearance for September, at 10,000 head, was up 5,000 head from last month and last year.

Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in the **United States** for feedlots with capacity of 1,000 or more head totaled 11.3 million head on October 1, 2011. The inventory was 5 percent above October 1, 2010. This is the second highest October 1 inventory since the series began in 1996. The inventory included 6.95 million steers and steer calves, up 5 percent from the previous year. This group accounted for 61 percent of the total inventory. Heifers and heifer calves accounted for 4.32 million head, up 5 percent from 2010. Placements in feedlots during September totaled 2.47 million, slightly above 2010. Net placements were 2.40 million head. During September, placements of cattle and calves weighing less than 600 pounds were 685,000, 600-699 pounds were 415,000, 700-799 pounds were 504,000, and 800 pounds and greater were 865,000. Marketings of fed cattle during September totaled 1.81 million, 1 percent above 2010. Other disappearance totaled 74,000 during September, 37 percent above 2010.

MILK PRODUCTION SEPTEMBER 2011

COLORADO HIGHLIGHTS

Colorado dairy herds produced 252 million pounds of milk during September 2011, up 15 million pounds from last September's production, but down 6 million pounds from August's production. The average number of cows, at 130,000 head, increased 1,000 head from last month, and up 8,000 cows from the previous year. The average milk per cow for the month of September in Colorado was 1,935 pounds per cow, down from 2,000 pounds per cow in August and 10 pounds per cow lower than 2010. Colorado is fifteenth in the nation in milk production per cow.

Milk production in the **23 major States** during September totaled 14.8 billion pounds, up 1.9 percent from September 2010. August revised production at 15.3 billion pounds, was up 2.3 percent from August 2010. The August revision represented an increase of 17 million pounds or 0.1 percent from last month's preliminary production estimate. Production per cow in the 23 major States averaged 1,742 pounds for September, 12 pounds above September 2010. The number of milk cows on farms in the 23 major States was 8.47 million head, 101,000 head more than September 2010, and 1,000 head more than August 2011.

Milk production in the U.S. during the July - September quarter totaled 48.7 billion pounds, up 1.4 percent from the

July - September quarter last year. The average number of milk cows in the United States during the quarter was 9.21 million head, 83,000 head more than the same period last year.

AGRICULTURAL PRICES OCTOBER 2011

The preliminary All Farm Products Index of Prices Received by Farmers in October, at 185 percent, based on 1990-1992=100, increased 6 points (3.4 percent) from September. The Crop Index is up 3 points (1.5 percent) and the Livestock Index increased 1 point (0.7 percent). Producers received higher prices for cattle, eggs, hogs, and sweet corn and lower prices for corn, milk, wheat, and soybeans. In addition to prices, the overall index is also affected by the seasonal change based on a 3-year average mix of commodities producers sell. Increased monthly movement of soybeans, corn, grain sorghum, and sunflowers offset the decreased marketing of wheat, milk, hogs, and hay.

The October All Crops Index at 206, increased 1.5 percent from September and 26 percent above October 2010. Index increases for oilseeds more than offset the index decreases for feed grains & hay, food grains, and commercial vegetables. The October all wheat price, at \$6.94 per bushel, is down 61 cents from September but \$1.06 above October 2010. The corn price, at \$5.92 per bushel, is down 45 cents from last month but \$1.60 above October 2010. Grain sorghum, at \$11.10 per cwt, is 60 cents higher than September and \$3.30 above October last year. The soybean price, at \$11.90 per bushel, decreased 30 cents from September but is \$1.70 above October 2010. The all potato price, at \$7.48 per cwt, is down 82 cents from September but 45 cents higher than last October. The all dry bean price, at \$43.90 per cwt, is up \$3.70 from the previous month and \$18.20 above October 2010.

The October Livestock & Products Index at 153, is 0.7 percent above last month and 14 percent higher than October 2010. Compared with a year ago, prices are higher for cattle, hogs, milk, eggs, calves, and turkeys. Prices for broilers are down from last year. The October hog price, at \$68.80 per cwt, is up \$1.70 from September and up \$15.50 from a year ago. The October beef cattle price of \$116 per cwt is up \$4.00 from last month and is \$22.90 higher than October 2010. The October all milk price of \$19.90 per cwt decreased \$1.20 from last month but is up \$1.40 from October 2010.

Colorado's mid-October prices for crop items averaged higher than a year ago. Wheat, at \$6.03 per bushel, averaged 20 cents above October 2010 but 81 cents below September of this year. Corn averaged \$5.95 per bushel in mid-October this year, up \$1.72 from the previous year but down 66 cents from last month. Potato prices decreased \$1.00 per hundredweight from last month to \$11.30 per cwt but averaged 50 cents above the October 2010 average of \$10.80 per hundredweight. Alfalfa hay prices, at \$220.00 per ton, increased \$20.00 per ton from last month and were \$95.00 above a year ago. Other hay prices at \$160.00 per ton remained unchanged from last month, but increased \$55.00 from a year ago. The October all milk price of \$20.30 was \$1.00 below last month but \$1.80 above a year ago.

COLD STORAGE SEPTEMBER 30, 2011

Total natural cheese stocks in refrigerated warehouses on September 30, 2011 were down 2 percent from the previous month and down 2 percent from September 30, 2010. Butter stocks were down 9 percent from last month but up 16 percent from a year ago.

Total frozen poultry supplies on September 30, 2011 were down 3 percent from the previous month but up slightly from a year ago. Total stocks of chicken were down 3 percent from the previous month and down 5 percent from last year. Total pounds of turkey in freezers were down 2 percent from last month but up 9 percent from September 30, 2010.

Total frozen fruit stocks were up slightly from last month but down 5 percent from a year ago. Total frozen vegetable stocks were up 19 percent from last month but down 6 percent from a year ago.

Total red meat supplies in freezers were up 5 percent from the previous month and up 12 percent from last year. Total pounds of beef in freezers were down slightly from the previous month but up 8 percent from last year. Frozen pork supplies were up 11 percent from the previous month and up 16 percent from last year. Stocks of pork bellies were down 39 percent from last month but up 92 percent from last year.
