"A community college to be known and designated as the "Community College of Denver" is hereby established within the five county area of Adams, Arapahoe, Boulder, Jefferson, and the city and county of Denver, which community college shall be a state educational institution and shall be under the control of the state board for community colleges and occupational education."

HOUSE BILL 1449

May 27, 1967 / House Bill 1449 is signed into law, creating Community College of Denver (CCD).

August 1968 / CCD opens its first campus at 62nd Ave. & Downing St. with an enrollment of 1,861 students.

**1969** / Higher education in Colorado experiences rapid growth. State-wide enrollment jumps 9 percent, while CCD's enrollment grows by 52 percent with 3,580 students.

**1969** / CCD offers 173 different classes in the schedule of courses for the winter quarter.



1974 / House Bill 1163 passes creating the Auraria Higher Education Center, a 171-acre campus bordering downtown Denver. The campus is named both for the site of the 1850's frontier town of Auraria, and for the community, which the campus displaced.

February 1970 / CCD's Denver Manpower Skill Center gains national recognition. The U.S. Department of Labor, as well as the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare recognizes CCD's program as the only skill center totally integrated within an existing educational institution.

May 1971 / President Richard M. Nixon sends a letter to the graduating class of 1971.

August 1970 / A downtown campus, named the Denver Auraria Community College, opens in a renovated auto showroom at 12th Ave. & Acoma St. with 793 students enrolled. By the fall of 1973, enrollment triples.

**Fall, 1971** / Two additional buildings open. One is a former automotive dealership at 12<sup>th</sup> Ave. & Broadway St. and the other, at 12<sup>th</sup> Ave. & Bannock St., becomes faculty offices.

**December 1975** / CCD moves to Auraria Campus. CCD occupies the first completed building on Auraria, South Classroom, now known as the Cherry Creek Building.

**January 21, 1976** / The Auraria Campus is formally dedicated by Governor Richard D. Lamm.

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#### CCD CELEBRATES 50 YEARS OF CHANGING LIVES & SHAPING FUTURES

Founded in 1967, CCD began as the first community college in the city and county of Denver. Originally located in a renovated auto showroom in downtown Denver. CCD is now the only community college in the nation to share a campus with two four-year universities. Through progressive leaders and a dedicated faculty and staff, CCD is a nationally recognized community college.

To celebrate our 50th year of meeting the higher-education needs of Denver, CCD hosted 18 events during the 2017-18 academic year. Our goals were to celebrate our successes, to increase college pride, and to increase our support of the community.

Our keystone birthday celebration held in October welcomed more than 300 guests, including Mayor Michael Hancock, City Council Members Mary Beth Susman and Albus Brooks, numerous alumni, and past and current employees. Later in the year, CCD's theater department wrote and produced a play based on our 50-year history, entitled Our History Shapes Our Future. Its premiere, with more than 100 guests, donated a portion of the ticket sales to support CCD scholarships.

To give back to the community, CCD marched in several local parades and partnered with Mile High United Way and the Linus Project on community service projects.

To close the celebrations, we hosted a reception after our commencement ceremony, where more than 1,000 graduates and their families mingled and took photos with faculty and staff. CCD's 50th year fittingly graduated the largest number of students ever.



1983 / CCD starts the fast-track training program called the Technical Education Center (TEC) located at the North Campus.

1987 / The Computer Training for the Handicapped Program is awarded a Presidential Citation for Private Sector Initiatives by President Ronald Reagan.

1988 / The Technical Education Center is designated by the Colorado Commission on Higher Education as a Program of Excellence.

December 1988 / Auraria Parkway Opens. The new Auraria Parkway reroutes traffic and enables Lawrence and Larimer Streets to be replaced by parks, landscaping and an attractive pedestrian mall lined by 3,000 trees.

1991 / TEC East, located at Colorado Blvd. & Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd., opens its doors, providing fast-track career training.

January 1991 / CCD runs the Cheltingham Project. CCD develops an ESL and citizenship training program for undocumented students as part of an amnesty bill signed by President Ronald Reagan.



25th Anniversary Logo Circa 1992 1993 / TEC West opens at the begins. CCD partners with the Diamond Hill site at 2420 W. 26th Ave., and the Phillips Center also opens at 3532 Franklin St. All four TEC sites begin offering traditional general education college courses as well as vocational courses.

1998 / Campus of Learners Project at North Lincoln Homes

1999 / CCD East provides leadership for the Second Annual Northeast Denver African American literature community event.

October 1999 / CCD develops and hosts a national developmental education conference at the Adam's Mark Hotel in downtown Denver.

## FROM THE **PRESIDENT'S DESK**

The most satisfying thing about being president when an institution turns 50 is that one knows that they are standing on the shoulders of others. I'm feeling that sense of satisfaction now.

Over the course of the past year, I watched and celebrated the successes made possible by the hard work and dedication of the CCD community. In September 1967, Colorado House Bill 1449 was signed into law, creating CCD. Today, CCD is the only community college in the city and county of Denver; it is surrounded by history, arts, sports and culture. People here, including faculty, staff and coworkers, have believed in me more than I believed in myself. This supportive and encouraging environment makes CCD unique. Everyone helps each other succeed because we know that we all do better when we help each other."

Curtis Redmond, a spring 2018 CCD graduate, thought he would never attend college.

"After successfully graduating, I do see I have a future and I am about to put my degree to use and start a whole new life," he said.

Damon Deschamp came to CCD to reinvent himself and learn a new set of skills and a trade.

"I really found a lot more than that," he said. "Going from a CCD student to a graduate to a business owner, to now an employer of other Community College of Denver students and graduates, has been a life-changing experience ... because who knew? I certainly didn't."

It is these stories — as well as the thousands that came before — that convey CCD's rich history. Whether a student walks through our doors to earn a certificate, learn a trade or achieve an associate degree to either transfer or start work right away, CCD is committed to serving our community as we have for the past five decades.

October 2015 / The CCD Advanced Manufacturing Center (AMC) opens at 2570 31st St., offering more than 33,000 square feet of state-of-the-art training facilities for machining and welding. Vice President Joe Biden visited the AMC on July 21, 2015, before the grand opening. #### FIGHTING THE GOOD FIGHT | PAUL CHAVEZ | CIVIL RIGHTS ATTORNEY

ASSOCIATE OF APPLIED SCIENCE | PARALEGAL | 1997-1999


Twenty years ago, while CCD celebrated its 30-year anniversary, Paul Chavez found himself on the Auraria Campus, with a thirst for knowledge, but no exact idea of his career goals. Like many young adults, Paul's quest for an education began when he recognized that his goals in life were limited by his current knowledge. For Paul Chavez, this awareness happened after his discharge from the Navy at the age of 23.

With the help of the Veterans Support Services and his GI Bill College Fund, he registered for a variety of coursework at CCD in different departments with the hopes of discovering a calling.

It was Professor Stacey L. Beckman, current chair of the paralegal program, who saw something very special in Chavez's work and attitude. During that year, she made a bold recommendation that the American Civil Liberties Union bring him in for one of their highly coveted and prestigious internship positions. Thus began Paul's career as a civil rights attorney.

"It was Professor Beckman's incredible encouragement that helped guide my decision to complete my degree," said Chavez. After CCD, he completed his bachelor's degree at University of Colorado Denver on the Auraria Campus and was then accepted at one of the nation's premier law schools, University of California, Berkeley, School of Law.

Since then, Chavez has worked to protect civil rights in roles such as senior attorney and executive director with Centro Legal de la Raza in San Francisco, and as a civil litigation associate with Donahue Fitzgerald, LLP in northern California. In 2015, he received the highly prestigious Attorney of the Year Award from *California Lawyer Magazine* in recognition of his work protecting the rights of immigrants and the dignity of the poor, working with Hispanic families of northern and central California.



# FACULTY SUCCESS

FLEUR FERRO I CCD BIOLOGY
PROFESSOR EXPLORES THE PACIFIC
WITH ROBERT BALLARD, PH.D.

In the name of scientific exploration, Fleur Ferro, professor of biology, set sail November 8, 2017 aboard the 211-foot exploration vessel (EV) Nautilus to explore the Revillagigedo Archipelago off Mexico in the Pacific Ocean.

Ferro, selected from a highly competitive pool of applicants from other colleges and universities around the country, including middle and high school teachers, joined a diverse crew of 38 fellow scientists and educators to conduct expeditions to uncharted parts of the ocean to collect marine data and specimens. The EV Nautilus is operated by the Ocean Exploration Trust (OET), a nonprofit founded by Dr. Robert Ballard in 2008, with a mission of oceanic study and exploration.

"Dr. Ballard is a mega celebrity in marine biology circles, probably best known for his discovery of RMS Titanic's final resting place and as a National Geographic Explorer in Residence," says Ferro. "Being a marine biologist in landlocked Colorado might not seem logical, but my passion is to bring this important part of our ecosystem to our students who are disconnected to it by virtue of geography."

For her first expedition, Ferro interacted with audiences from all over the world on the ship's international live video, audio and data feed, and posted content to OET's website in both English and Spanish.

Working alongside scientists from Harvard University and the University of Rhode Island as they collected data about the geology and inhabitants of the sea floor, Ferro's job on board provided a crucial role in OET's joint goal of sharing the knowledge gained from their expeditions with scientists all over the world and bringing the excitement, knowledge and wonder of the ocean to wider audiences.

"The ocean is so mysterious," she says. "I hosted multiple 20-minute ship-to-shore live interactions with students, scientists and educators." After she returned, Ferro created learning sessions based on the data collected to share with CCD and the Denver community.

#### **OLA ALSAADI** I CCD'S COMMENCEMENT SPEAKER AND VALEDICTORIAN

Ola AlSaadi and her husband, Ali Alalwia, left Iraq in 2012, in search of a safer life and better future. They immigrated to the United States, eventually settling in Denver.

"When we moved, we literally started from zero," Ola remembers. "No money, no jobs. We came with nothing."

The first year was hard on her. Ali, who had a job with the U.S. National Guard Reserves and also worked as a security guard, adapted to the culture faster than Ola. For almost a year, she stayed home alone every day, which was difficult for someone accustomed to having her large family around. Afraid to speak the minimal English she knew, she talked to no one but Ali during that first year.

Eventually, Ola was connected to Imane Benjelloun, the project director for the TRIO Student Support Services, who helped Ola get started at CCD.

"I had been lost and didn't know what to do," Ola says. "Imane gave me her phone number and told me to text or call whenever I needed help."

This spring, Ola graduated with an Associate of Science degree and was the first person in her family to graduate from college. She also recently became

Ola started at CCD in fall 2015 with the Francie Anhut Scholarship, the Excellence Scholarship, and the Denver Foundation Scholarship, as well as a workstudy position with TRIO Student Support Services.

Now Ola had the chance to pursue her dream of helping victims of war. Her goals were to earn a degree at CCD, which would propel her into the bioengineering program. There, she could learn the latest advances in prosthetics and 3-D printing and bring them to people who'd lost limbs in wars.

Never losing sight of this mission, Ola grew more confident every day.

"CCD feels like home," she said. "As a Muslim woman who wears a hijab, no one will judge. Here, I never had a bad experience being a Muslim. You can find a lot of people who really care about you."

This spring, Ola graduated with an Associate of Science degree and was the first person in her family to graduate from college. She also recently became a U.S. citizen. She is on track to complete the rest of her educational and career goals by studying bioengineering at a four-year Colorado institution.

CICCD is part of an international network of Confucius Institutes headquartered in Beijing, China whose purpose is to promote the understanding of Chinese language and culture and to enhance intercultural exchange. With support from the Colorado Community College System, CCD is currently collaborating with the University of Jinan in running the Confucius Institute. Among its many accomplishments, CICCD has provided services to more than 6,500 students in learning Chinese language and culture, has sent more than 20 students to study in China through scholarships, and sponsored more than 100 students to attend summer camps in China. CCD is the only community college in the world with a Confucius Institute.

#### **DENVER SCHOLARSHIP FOUNDATION**

The Denver Scholarship Foundation (DSF) named CCD their 2017 College Partner of the Year for its increased success and retention of DSF scholars. CCD was recognized for creating innovative programs to support DSF scholars, which was evidenced by the college's 6 percent increase in DSF scholar retention and completion this past academic year.

#### **TAX HELP COLORADO**

Finally, this year marked CCD's 10-year partnership with The Piton Foundation. With this collaboration, CCD students provide free tax preparation to the Denver community and in turn receive college credit and gain professional skills that will help them in their future careers. Since its inception, the tax site operated at CCD has helped families file 4,345 returns and claim more than \$9.2 million in refunds.




# CCD MEETS NATIONAL STANDARDS FOR **HIGH-QUALITY**CONCURRENT ENROLLMENT PROGRAM

In May 2018, CCD earned National Alliance of Concurrent Enrollment Partnerships (NACEP) accreditation. This serves as a guarantee that concurrent enrollment at CCD meets rigorous national standards of high-quality programming. It is the first college or university in Colorado to receive this prestigious distinction.

To earn the NACEP stamp of approval, CCD underwent a rigorous three-year application process. Dozens of faculty and staff from across the college evaluated and made improvements to institutional practices and

policies, including onboarding faculty, course syllabi, student handbooks and the standards of achievement.

Through concurrent enrollment, which enables high school students to enroll in college-level courses at their high schools, students do not have to pay for tuition; each year, students and families save more than \$2 million by accessing the program. CCD serves students in the Denver metro area and has partnerships with many Denver Public Schools high schools.

#### **DOUBLE YOUR IMPACT**

Scholarship contributions to support CCD students are currently eligible to receive 1:1 matching dollars from:

#### Colorado Opportunity Scholarship Initiative (COSI)

COSI addresses the challenge of postsecondary credential attainment by providing tuition support via matching funds for scholarships so that tuition costs are not a barrier to entry and student loan debt can be mitigated.

#### **Hispanic-Serving Institution Challenge Grant**

Awarded by the U.S. Department of Postsecondary Education, this challenge grant provides matching funds for the HSI Endowment, a long-term source of revenue to support Hispanic and other low-income students at CCD. Since 2001, CCD has been designated as a Hispanic-Serving Institution — a designation awarded because more than 25 percent of CCD students identify themselves as Hispanic.

The match for both of these programs is simple: for every dollar donated to support COSI Scholars or the HSI Endowment, the CCD Foundation receives a matching dollar.
