

His door was always open, and he enjoyed inviting students in for a chat and a chance to sit in the president's chair, encouraging them to aspire to lives of excellence and service to others.

In honor of Dr. Everette Freeman's outstanding leadership and service as President of Community College of Denver (CCD) from 2013 to 2020, the Board of Community College of Denver Foundation has established The Dr. Everette Freeman Presidential Scholarship Endowment. CCD has designed many of our programs to be "stackable," meaning that students earn a series of certificates that lead to a degree. This also allows them to start working in their field while completing their education.


CCD offers 17 stackable certificates that extend the opportunity for students to earn while they learn.

PTK 5-STAR RATING



When the role of faculty advisor to the college's national honor society Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) opened, Brian Weaver, assistant communication professor at Community College of Denver jumped at the opportunity.

Together with PTK's robust student leadership, Weaver helped channel members toward the goal of earning five-star status. PTK membership, in general, is prestigious, but the more stars a chapter has, the more pres-

tigious it becomes — and thus is more valuable in helping students earn scholarships.

"It's rigorous and includes objectives to earn each star according to a standardized metric provided by international headquarters," Weaver says. "The hardest to meet are the fourth and fifth stars that require a large service and research project."

To secure the fourth star "college project," they partnered with Mile High United Way to focus on local issues related to education, health and financial stability. This led

to the creation of "Students for Collaborative Change," enabling students to volunteer through the Mile High United Way website and have their service hours tracked.

For its 5th star, "Honors in Action," PTK partnered with Community Resources, Inc.

(CRI), an organization that works directly with Denver Public Schools. PTK students judged a science fair, volunteered for family nights and other events, and conducted research on the impact of such interactions.

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DEVELOPMENT OF OUR PATHWAYS



Strength in Pathways:Start Here. *Go Anywhere!*

CCD offers seven pathways for students to seamlessly transfer to four-year colleges and universities both in-state and out-of-state to continue their education in a specific degree of study and then complete a bachelor's degree. They transfer as juniors and save thousands of dollars.

In 2019–2020, new and updated transfer agreements included:

- Graphic Design transfer articulations with MSUD and UCD
- Environmental Science transfer articulation with MSUD
- Health Exercise Science transfer articulation with MSUD
- Engineering articulations to MSUD and UCD (civil, mechanical, electrical)

Auraria Institutions Collaborate to Create Engineering Transfer Pathway

Community College of Denver (CCD), Metropolitan State University (MSU), and the University of Colorado Denver (CU Denver) signed six articulation agreements to officially form the Auraria Engineering Pathway that centers on student success and development.

Within their first semester at CCD, students are exposed to robotics design classes and the three-degree options — civil, electrical, and mechanical engineering. By closely aligning the coursework of the three degrees, the pathway allows for students to explore each type of engineering before making a final degree and career decision.

Once a student successfully completes the associate degree at CCD, they are guaranteed admittance as juniors to either MSU Denver or CU Denver's engineering programs.

CARVING A PATH TO IVY LEAGUE AT CCD

Despite excelling at Morey Middle School in the highly gifted program, Denver native Sarah Frazier's grades slipped at East High. "I fell into a bad crowd outside school," she says. Although she barely graduated in 2011, she did not connect it to drinking.

As Sarah's life spiraled down, she finally hit rock bottom and entered a recovery program. Her boyfriend encouraged her to take classes at CCD and that is when she started to take off. She put all her energy into school and began to excel. She joined Phi Theta Kappa, the national community college honor society, and began to connect with other students and understand how they overcame their obstacles.


Upon graduation from CCD in 2020, Sarah was thrilled to receive a full-ride scholarship to Cornell University, where she plans to earn her bachelor's degree and apply to Cornell's Juris Doctor and Master of Business Administration dual degree program.

"Before CCD I didn't even think I could succeed in a couple of classes," she says. "It gives you an opportunity to get better and better without throwing money away. There's so much support for people who might be out of step with society because of drinking or because they're single parents or just did not have the right privileges. They help you stay on track and find avenues to achieve your dreams."

Community College of Denver Opens New Veterans Center

CCD dedicated its new Veterans Service Center on November 4, 2019 for its 200 veteran students. The center, located in CCD's Cherry Creek Building, was opened in response to a request from CCD veteran students to have a dedicated space where they could receive one-on-one advising, connect with other veterans, and have access to campus resources. The center offers benefits counseling, access to computers, and a place for veteran students to print homework and other documents.

Community College of Denver Named Military Friendly School

The Military Friendly Schools designation is awarded to the top colleges, universities, community colleges, and trade schools in the country that do the most to embrace military students, and to those schools that dedicate resources to ensure their veterans' success both in the classroom and after graduation.



TAKING A CHANCE ON CCD

Colin Jandt completed basic training at Fort Benning, attended airborne school, and in March 2014, was deployed as a paratrooper with the 82nd Airborne Division. In November 2014, he lost his best friend Joseph Riley, who was killed by a suicide bomber in Afghanistan.

After undergoing therapy and doing his best to cope, Jandt eventually re-enlisted and was deployed again. During his second deployment, he suffered a traumatic brain injury, eventually returning to the U.S. to find himself medically "separated" from active duty and battling PTSD and depression.

Colin's therapist told him, "You need to go to school, man! But I was like, 'I can't; I have a traumatic brain injury.' But he kept saying, 'Your brain injury team is working so hard to retrain your cognitive skills and your brain won't be fully developed until you're twenty-nine, so you have time.'"

With help from the Veterans Services Center, Jandt enrolled at Community College of Denver (CCD). He took an introduction to business class with instructor Jamal Bowen who helped him adjust to the challenges of campus life.

"I learned a lot from his class. He started talking to me about his life and I started talking about mine. He kept trying to get me out of the house." Colin soon made a small circle of friends and is on track to complete his associate of science degree with plans to go to a four-year college to study neuroscience.

"The brain hasn't been studied very long, so a lot of my doctors don't have the answers," he says. "I want to learn about how the brain functions and what they're learning."

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FINDING A SECOND CHANCE AT CCD

Community College of Denver (CCD) alumnus Emanuel Walker does not recall much about emigrating with his mother from a refugee camp in Liberia in 2004. After barely graduating high school with a 1.8 GPA, he still wanted to go to a four-year college but knew nothing about financial aid or scholarships.

With the help of a friend, he enrolled at CCD and quickly connected with professors and students. Emanuel went from a 1.8 GPA in high school to graduating from CCD with a 3.58 GPA.

"CCD felt very welcoming," he says. "I could go to any staff member on campus with questions."

Exploring business classes allowed Emanuel to discover his true calling: "I was always good with computers and saw my goal in Computer Information Systems (CIS)." He earned his associate degree in CIS with an emphasis on information security and plans to apply to a variety of public and private four-year institutions to further his education.

His dream is to bring solar panels to every village in Liberia. Connecting panels to a grid could empower the whole community where he was born.

"Coming from where I was in high school to where I am now," he muses, "seriously, all of it came from CCD." Emanuel transferred to Metropolitan State University of Denver where he is studying computer information systems.

WELCOME, DR. MARIELENA **DESANCTIS**

Following a nationwide search, Colorado Community College System (CCCS) Chancellor Joe Garcia announced Marielena DeSanctis, Ph.D., as the next president of Community College of Denver (CCD). Dr. DeSanctis, a distinguished scholar who has led academic, equity, and innovation programs in various roles, brings demonstrated leadership and commitment to advancing access to higher education, increasing student success, and closing equity gaps. Dr. DeSanctis began her term as president of CCD on January 15, 2021. She succeeds Dr. Everette Freeman, who retired December 31, 2020 after seven years of service.



STRENGTH IN COMMUNITY, CCD FOUNDATION

In the 2019–2020 school year, the Community College of Denver (CCD) Foundation awarded more than \$753,000 in scholarships, an increase of 26 percent over the previous year.

Earlier this year, CCD students' worlds crashed down when the COVID-19 pandemic struck. Jobs disappeared over night, classes went remote, and students were left wondering how to feed themselves and their families while struggling to remain in school.

In early April, the CCD Foundation immediately launched the COVID-19 Student Emergency Relief Fund and hundreds of students received "just in time" assistance to support their families and stay enrolled in spring classes. A total of \$70,000 was raised in 10 weeks, and while the fund came close to being depleted more than once, it never ran out thanks to the generous support of the community.

The Foundation also received a twoyear grant for \$150,000 from the Colorado Opportunity Scholarship Initiative (COSI) to support Denver workers dislocated by COVID-19. This program includes scholarships that ensure these workers can attend CCD tuition-free to gain the skills and knowledge they need to re-enter the workforce.

As the impacts of the pandemic continue to take a toll on students and the local economy, the CCD Foundation will continue to focus its work on supporting students and college programs that open new doors of opportunity for individuals in the Denver community.

by scholarships. The theme for the event was drawn from the comments of a student who said, "Donors are oxygen for education. Without donors, I would not have my education."

Three students, Joseph Foster, Hilary Alkire and Emanuel Walker, shared how they found their way to CCD and how scholarships have helped them in their education journey. They each encouraged donors to continue their support so that students like them can afford college. "I am grateful for each and every scholarship I received," explained Foster. "Everybody here at CCD has been so supportive of me that it just gives me strength to continue on."

During the event, the college awarded its 2020 Elevation Award to the Gary Community Investment Company / Piton Foundation in recognition of their leadership and investment exceeding \$2 million in the Work-Now Partners program, a consortium housed on the CCD campus that
