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THE COLORADO DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS RECIEVES \$2,137,747 FOR FISCAL YEAR 2003 SCAAP PAYMENT



The Colorado Department of Corrections received notification on October 2, 2003 that the department was awarded \$2.1 million for the fiscal year 2003 SCAAP payment. The State Criminal Alien Assistance Program (SCAAP) is a payment program designed to provide federal assistance to states and localities for the costs of incarcerating certain criminal aliens who are being held as a result of state and/or local charges or convictions. The Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) distributes payments to many jurisdictions including county jails, city jails and state prisons. BJA recently automated their processing of applications for SCAAP due to the increase of applications. In fiscal year 2003, more than 140 new jurisdictions applied for payments. The new applications represent an increase of more than 21% above the fiscal year 2002 level. A total of 805 applicants compared to 665 applicants from last year were eligible for payments during the current fiscal year with a total expenditure of \$239,999,996. The available funding for fiscal year 2003 was decreased by 56% from fiscal year 2002 due to federal funding cuts of the program. The Colorado Department of Corrections has participated and benefited from the SCAAP since 1995 and has received a total of \$33,446,564 in funds over the nine year period.

*** GENERAL RESEARCH AND STATISTICS ***


In order to participate in the SCAAP Program, the Office of Planning and Analysis has established databases and criteria needed to submit all required information to BJA for payment. Each month the General Statistics and Research Evaluation Office (GSRE) reviews, updates and corrects information such as inmate birthplace, citizenship, aliases and birth dates. In addition, the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) numbers and Immigration and Naturalization (INS) detainer numbers are updated, by working with INS and NCIC (National Crime Information Center) to ensure the Colorado inmates have current INS detainer numbers and FBI numbers. This allows BJA to match federal databases for accuracy and verification of foreign-born inmate payments. The Office of Planning and Analysis also reports aggregate correctional salary and employment numbers obtained from the business office and calculated incarceration statistics. The following graph and chart show how many inmates were submitted by the Department of Corrections by year and the total SCAAP payment awarded.

* STATE PAYMENT COMPARISONS *

BJA is continually enhancing and updating their review and verification process. When comparing the SCAAP payments to other states, the Colorado Department of Corrections ranks 11th overall. Due to the decrease in payments for fiscal year 2003, a total of 48 states had a decrease in payments from the previous fiscal year. Two states, Wisconsin and Kentucky, did not receive funds in 2002. The following chart shows the top 12 state jurisdictions ranked by SCAAP payment, and prison population.

The Colorado Department of Corrections has had a 29.9% increase in foreign born inmates since Fiscal Year 1999. This increase has allowed the department to stay as one of the top eligible recipients of the SCAAP payment.
