<p>End-of-Month Population:</p> <p><i>State prisons</i> – on- & off-grounds inmates housed in state owned and operated prison.</p> <p><i>Private prisons</i> – on- & off-grounds inmates housed in privately owned and operated prison.</p> <p><i>Jail backlog</i> – newly sentenced offender awaiting intake into DOC and parole returns awaiting intake.</p> <p><i>Jail contracts</i> – DOC offender housed in a contracted bed at a county jail.</p> <p><i>Escapes/walkaways</i> – offender who escapes or walks away from a state or private prison, community center, or any facility in which they are under the custody of CDOC without authorization and whose whereabouts are unknown.</p> <p><i>Community on grounds</i> – inmates actively participating in residential or ISP programs</p> <p><i>Community off grounds</i> – inmates not actively participating in residential or ISP programs due to jail, hospital, or court appearance.</p> <p><i>Domestic Parole</i> – includes CO & other state parolees supervised in CO.</p> <p><i>Parolees out of CO</i> – CO parolees supervised in another state but who remain under Colorado’s jurisdiction.</p> <p><i>Parole Absconders</i> – A parolee who has changed his/her place of residence without prior notification and approval of his/her community parole officer, has failed to report as directed, and whose whereabouts are unknown.</p> <p><i>YOS total population</i> – Includes YOS inmates housed at Pueblo facility, community phase III, jail backlog, and other facilities (i.e., infirmary).</p>	<p>Administrative Segregation:</p> <p># inmates classified as administrative segregation on the last day of the month.</p> <p># Incidents:</p> <p><i>Assault</i> – An offender commits an assault when s/he intentionally, or through negligence or recklessness, causes injury to another person, or applies physical force, offensive substance, or any other item or hazardous substance against any person, regardless of whether or not injury occurs.</p> <p><i>Fight</i> - A fight occurs when an offender engages in a physical altercation including exchange of blows, shoves, kicks, or any physical contact without authorization</p> <p>% Positive Drug Test:</p> <p>Includes random drug test conducted through urinalysis or oral swab. Approximately 5% of the inmate populations is randomly tested each month.</p> <p># Enrolled in Program:</p> <p>Includes offenders actively enrolled in a program on the last day of the month. Does not include YOS offenders.</p> <p># Employed:</p> <p>Includes full-time and part-time employment including facility work assignments and Correctional Industries (includes Canteen) assignments. This is a snapshot that includes offenders who actively were employed on the last day of the month. Does not include YOS offenders.</p>	<p>Transition Placements:</p> <p># inmates transferred to community corrections during the current month.</p> <p>% Positive Drug Test:</p> <p>Includes all drug tests conducted with ISP inmates and parolees by various methods such as urinalysis, swab, and Passpoint. The number of tests is determined by supervision levels, offender behavior, and probable cause.</p> <p>% Parolees Employed Full-Time or Part-Time:</p> <p>% of domestic parole caseload employed full or part-time. This does not include parolees who are pending parole revocation.</p> <p>Parole Officer Responses to Parole Violations Per CVDMP:</p> <p>Using the CVDMP, a presumptive matrix determines a recommended sanction response based on the parolee’s risk level and seriousness of the violation. Parole officers may request an over- or under-ride from their supervisor. The data reported here represent the parole officer’s most serious response to the violation, taking into account the factors on the CVDMP. When the sanction is jail/parole revocation, the Parole Board then has a hearing to determine whether parole will be revoked.</p> <p>Parole Completions:</p> <p><i>Successful completions</i> - Completion of sentence while on parole.</p> <p><i>Early parole discharges</i> - Completion of sentence prior to sentence discharge date under Parole Board authority.</p> <p><i>Technical Returns</i> - Technical parole violator revoked to a community return to custody facility (CRCF) or revoked to a facility.</p> <p><i>Returns with a New Crime</i> - New crime conviction while serving parole, returned to a facility.</p>
<p># Releases from Inmate Status:</p> <p><i>Discretionary paroles</i> – Release to parole through Parole Board discretion prior to mandatory release or sentence discharge date.</p> <p><i>Mandatory paroles</i> – Release to parole on mandatory release date or a few days early under Parole Board authority if release date is on a weekend. Also includes parole releases subject to HB 09-1351 earn time provisions.</p> <p><i>Reparoles</i> – Reparoled on specific date set by Parole Board, including reparoles from a return to custody facility.</p> <p><i>Sentence discharges</i> – Completion of sentence with no further discharge.</p> <p><i>Other</i> – Releases to probation, court ordered discharges, deceased, appeal bond, and dual commit to ICC/new crime.</p>
