

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### Welcome Letter

Dear Friends,

We are excited to share our 2021-22 year-in-review for the Colorado Charter School Institute.

Our annual report theme – **"Reimagining"** – illustrates how CSI and our schools leaned into innovation and embraced the challenge of meeting the needs of the students in our communities throughout Colorado. We partnered with our schools to be as imaginative and creative as possible as we adapted to many new and unique challenges.



Our 42 schools reimagined how to expand access and programming to the 20,000+ students in the 2021-22 school year.

So, too, did CSI. Despite the need to think differently to address challenges, at the core of our work has remained our mission – to foster high-quality charter public school choices that serve **all** students.

We, too, have *reimagined* facets of our work over the 2021-22 school year, which this report highlights:

#### **Reimagining How We Expand Access**

We continued to reimagine ways to expand access to high-quality education and programming. With universal preschool on the horizon, CSI established the Early Childhood & School Support Specialist position to help schools implement Pre-K programming. We also continued to lean into postsecondary college and career opportunities for students. This past year, two CSI schools were accepted into the Path4Ward Program, a grant initiative providing scholarships to low-income students to access postsecondary education and careers.

Strides were made to expand access to food services in the CSI School Food Authority (SFA), which served 22 charter schools this past school year. The SFA supported the development of unique partnerships to offer local and healthy food options for students across the state.

#### **Reimagining Advocacy**

Once again, CSI was relentless in advocating for funding equity through mill levy override equalization. While modest gains in funding had been achieved in the last few years, funding nearly doubled in 2021-22. We still have a long way to go to reach full parity, but we are proud of this tremendous step towards equity for CSI schools.

#### **Reimagining Pathways**

CSI worked to reimagine pathways for prospective school applicants seeking authorization with CSI, prioritizing access and equity throughout the charter application process for new, transfer, and expansion applications. Additionally, we continued to partner with CSI schools to consider innovative pathways for serving their communities in online formats, including blended learning flexibilities, single district online programs, and multi-district online schools.

#### **Reimagining School Supports**

In response to the significant need for mental health supports nationwide and echoed by CSI schools, CSI established the Mental Health Specialist position in 2021-22. Mental health supports were developed and accessed by schools across the portfolio. CSI also implemented its updated Equity Screener to support schools in understanding and improving outcomes for all students.

#### **Reimagining Our Role**

CSI continued to evolve and adapt to the ever-changing public education landscape. As an organization, we were faced with rethinking our role to better align with the needs of our schools, their students, and their communities as schools worked to transition to a new normal.

This past year, CSI partnered with the Colorado League of Charter Schools to pass legislation that would increase pathways for charter schools to better serve students with special needs. Included in this legislation was the opportunity for district charter schools to join CSI's Administrative Unit for the provision of special education. We are excited to embark on this journey as we continue to expand opportunities for Colorado charter school students.

We hope you enjoy this annual report and look forward to your partnership as we continue to *reimagine* how to expand the frontiers of public education.

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### Who We Are

**OUR MISSION** is to foster high-quality charter public school choices for all students.

**OUR VISION** is to be recognized as the nation's most effective charter school authorizer by building a portfolio of high-performing charter public schools that use innovative educational designs to serve all students.

#### The CSI approach to authorizing charter schools balances autonomy and accountability.

CSI offers its schools the flexibility to choose the educational models and methods that best meet the unique needs of their students and communities and holds them accountable to clear expectations for performance.

#### WHAT IS AN AUTHORIZER?

An authorizer is an entity approved by the state legislature to 1) open new charter schools 2) monitor existing charter schools and 3) close failing schools.

Charter schools are accountable to their charter authorizer for meeting local, state, and federal requirements.

**AUTHORIZATION UPDATES** 

CSI's portfolio of schools is dynamic. Schools can be added to the CSI portfolio through the approval of new schools, the expansion of existing CSI schools, or from the approval of an existing charter school to transfer from a district authorizer to CSI. Schools can also transfer out of CSI or be closed due to poor academic, financial, or operational performance.

The CSI portfolio saw several changes in the 2021-22 school year:



Two new schools will open in the fall of 2022: Prospect Academy and Colorado Early Colleges Online Campus.



Two schools left the CSI portfolio at the end of the 2021-22 school year: Colorado Early Colleges West closed and Two Rivers Community School transferred to its geographic district.

Eight charter schools were renewed for varying contract term lengths.




Six charter schools expanded to offer single district online programs.


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### Who We Serve


### **Portfolio Performance**

CSI schools' performance in the 2021-22 school year earned CSI a Performance rating from the Colorado Department of Education.

#### **GRADUATION & DROPOUT RATES**

CSI's graduation rate continues to increase. CSI's portfolio-wide graduation rate has increased to 81% and all reported subgroups have seen steady increases as well.

CSI's dropout rate continues to decrease. CSI had a 1.1% dropout rate at the end of the 2020-21 school year with all reported subgroups also seeing decreases in dropout rates from the prior year.



#### **ASSESSMENT RESULTS**

Of 119+ districts with reportable data for the percentage of students meeting or exceeding state expectations in 2021-22, CSI high schools ranked:



### **Operational & Financial Performance**



**OPERATIONS** 

While statutorily required to withhold 3% of per pupil revenue for operations, CSI **operated at a lean 1.9%** in 2021-22.



#### **REBATE TO SCHOOLS**

CSI was able to provide its schools a rebate of **\$82 per pupil** at the end of the 2021-22 school year, for a **total of \$1.6M**.



#### **GRANTS**

CSI schools earned **86** competitive grants totaling over \$10.2M. Awards included funding for computer science, early literacy, school bullying prevention, and more.

#### **LEGISLATIVE WINS**

CSI had notable wins in the 2022 legislative session:



Mill Levy Override Equalization funding was brought a step closer to equity with an additional \$8 million added to the Fund.



\$375,000 was allocated to support Prospect Academy, a new school offering an innovative model for students who learn differently.





## REIMAGINING

In the 2021-22 school year, CSI and CSI schools reimagined ways to best serve all students.

We reimagined how to: expand access, advocate effectively, create pathways, support our schools, and rethink our role.

### REIMAGINING How We Expand Access



#### UNIVERSAL PRE-K

When legislation for universal, voluntary preschool (UPK) for all 4 year olds passed, CSI responded. CSI staff actively participated in stakeholder groups during the development of the Colorado Department of Early Childhood. During the summer and fall of 2021, CSI staff contributed to setting recommendations for Universal Preschool to ensure the inclusion of CSI schools.

Additionally, CSI secured a position on the Advisory Board for the National Alliance for Public Charter Schools' Early Childhood Education Community of Practice to bring national level best practices into support efforts.

CSI staff are working closely with existing CSI preschools to ensure they are included in their community plans and are leading a cohort of CSI schools planning to open preschools in the future.



FOOD SERVICES

Charter schools face many challenges when working to provide nutritional, affordable meals to students. Despite these challenges, the CSI School Food Authority (SFA) and its schools continue to find innovative ways to make healthy meals available for students.

In its second year of operation, the CSI SFA worked with 22 charter school buildings. CSI's School Nutrition Program Manager supports schools in determining the options available based on the resources they have (staffing, facilities, local vendors) and their specific goals (local sourcing, culturally relevant menus, scratch cooking).

For example, Kwiyagat Community Academy in Towaoc worked with community partners to develop culturally relevant menu items, and Community Leadership Academy in Commerce City participated in a "Harvest of the Month" program.



#### POSTSECONDARY EDUCATION

The 2021 passage of the Successful High School Transitions bill expanded flexibility for high school students to access postsecondary education and careers by introducing the Path4Ward grant. Path4Ward allows learners from low-income backgrounds who complete high school graduation requirements early to continue their education by providing those students a scholarship. This can be used for postsecondary education or workforce training in what would have been their fourth year of high school.

The Colorado Early Colleges Network and The Academy of Charter Schools have joined the Path4ward program. Students on track to graduate early will receive enhanced college and career exploration services, scholarship money to help pay for postsecondary training and education, and access to funding for transportation to these postsecondary opportunities.

### REIMAGINING Advocacy


#### **CSI MILL LEVY EQUALIZATION FUND**

In recognition that districts should allocate resources equitably to all students, regardless of the type of public school the student is enrolled in, the General Assembly passed HB17-1375. The law requires school districts to distribute at least 95% of funding received from local property taxes generated by Mill Levy Overrides (MLO) on an equal per pupil basis to all of its public schools, including district charter schools.

Recognizing that CSI schools have no access to local tax revenue, HB17-1375 created the Mill Levy Equalization Fund. It is at the legislature's discretion to allocate money to the Fund each year.

While the Fund saw modest gains in the last few years, it nearly doubled in 2021-22. Though undoubtedly a victory, the intent of HB17-1375 will not be achieved until the students attending CSI public charter schools have the same access to public funding as their district peers. Full funding parity requires \$41M.

CSI was also able to distribute interest accrued in the Mill Levy Equalization Fund, which was \$209,000 or about \$10.82 per pupil for each school.



#### STATE MATCH FOR MILL LEVY OVERRIDE

SB22-202 provided a state matching fund to address inequities created by Colorado's uneven mill levy override. This bill requires distribution of state funds to match local money raised through mill levy overrides raised by eligible school districts. Importantly, this bill includes the distribution of funds to CSI schools located in eligible districts.

### "A SCHOOL FOR EVERY KID"

CSI partnered with Ready Colorado to tell the story of four CSI schools and the importance of funding equity through film. In the fall of 2021, the film "A School for Every Kid" was shared with a community of CSI school representatives, education reform partners, and state decision makers. The Commissioner of Education gave a keynote highlighting the importance of school choice.

Following the film screening was a panel facilitated by Colorado League of Charter Schools President Dan Schaller, joined by CSI Executive Director Dr. Terry Croy Lewis and leadership from each of the four schools represented in the video: New Legacy Charter School (Aurora), New America School – Aurora, Thomas MacLaren School (Colorado Springs), and Kwiyagat Community Academy (Towaoc). They each shared why families choose their school, what makes their school unique, and the importance of having access to equitable resources.



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#### ALIGNMENT OF CHARTER APPLICATIONS

CSI staff embarked on a project to rethink, revise, and align the application process for new, transfer, and expansion schools. CSI also updated its homeschool application. Through this project, CSI has worked to prioritize access and equity and reduce the administrative burden by streamlining content and processes.

#### **EXPANDING ONLINE OPPORTUNITIES**

This school year, CSI and CSI schools accessed additional pathways for serving their communities in online formats.

#### **Blended Learning and Online Course Flexibilities**

CDE updated its guidance on blended learning and online courses in 2021-22. CDE offered additional flexibility for schools with learning models that didn't fit within the state's new parameters. Several CSI schools took advantage of this opportunity to continue providing and piloting innovative offerings for over 1,000 students in their school communities while also supporting the state in better understanding the variety of learning models that are being implemented.

#### **Single District Online Programs**

Several CSI schools operated single-district online programs to serve students in a fully-online format. In 2021-22, 110 students accessed full online programming through CSI single-district online programs.

#### **Multi-District Online School**

CSI reviewed an expansion application for a multi-district online school. This was unanimously approved by the State Board of Education to begin operation in the 2022-23 school year.

### REIMAGINING School Supports

#### MENTAL HEALTH

In response to the significant and growing needs identified by schools, CSI created the Mental Health Specialist position in 2021-22. Over this year, the following mental health supports have been developed for CSI schools:

Additionally, through partnerships with graduate programs across the state and SparkHealthCorps, CSI placed 7 mental health interns at schools in 2021-22, and is looking to place at least 20 in 2022-23.

#### **EQUITY SCREENER**

CSI developed its Equity Screener and Tiers of Support to both assess and support schools in providing equal access and quality programs to students qualifying for specialized supports. Schools can use this tool to identify and prioritize initiatives that are aligned with their mission, values, and improvement planning efforts.

The rollout of the updated CSI Equity Screener during the 2021-22 school year included numerous meetings with school leadership teams as well as personalized action planning, on-site professional development offerings, crosswalk documents to aid in the identification and support of dual-identified students, and 1:1 coaching. ### REIMAGINING Our Role

#### SPECIAL EDUCATION IN CHARTER SCHOOLS

CSI has prioritized programming and supports for special education for a good part of the last decade.

This past year, CSI partnered with the Colorado League of Charter Schools and other education reform partners to support legislation that would increase pathways for charter schools to better serve students with special needs.

Included in this legislation was the opportunity for district charter schools to join CSI's Administrative Unit for the provision of special education.

This legislation also included \$375,000 of Year 1 funding for Prospect Academy, the first charter school in the state that has a particular focus on supporting all learners, including those with diagnosed learning differences such as autism, ADHD, and dyslexia.

This historic legislation was passed unanimously out of the Senate.
