Research Brief

There is a wealth of current literature that supports early intervention service delivery in natural environments. To help you keep in touch with emerging literature each issue of *Resources and Connections* will present an abstract of a published article. This first article was abstracted by Ann Grady, OTR, Ph. D. at JFK Partners.

The Children's Learning Opportunities Early Childhood Research Institute is a 5year initiative funded by the U.S. Department of Education, Office of Special Education Programs. Institute staff are identifying, developing, and evaluating ways of using family and community life as sources of learning opportunities for infants, toddlers, and preschoolers with or at-risk for delays in their development. The Institute evaluates ways of using family and community life as learning opportunities for infants, toddlers, and preschoolers with or at-risk for delays in their development. Learning happens as part of family and community life: daily living, family rituals, and community events and celebrations. Family life consists of 11 different categories of learning opportunities, such as parenting and child routines (e.g. mealtime and bathing), and literary, socialization, and play activities. Community life provides at least 11 categories of learning opportunities, including running errands, shopping, and visiting playgrounds, recreation centers, and other entertainment settings.

Research Design: Authors conducted two national surveys of nearly 3300 parents in 48 states, Puerto Rico, and Yap. Surveys were followed by in-depth descriptive studies with 200 hundred families with children at risk for developmental delays and children not known to be at risk in seven states. For the descriptive studies, families were visited up to 12 times over a 6-month period for interviews and observations of the variety their family and community learning experiences. The authors also conducted intervention studies with nearly 75 children with disabilities or delays and their families.

Findings: Preliminary findings from the study of children with disabilities or delays indicate that parents prefer interventions that are easy to do, fit into their daily lives, and emphasize children doing and learning things that help them be part of family and community life. The studies also found that "Children, on average, participate in some 150 different kinds of social and physical settings as part of family and community life. These settings in turn provide more than 200 different kinds of learning opportunities."

Editorial Commentary: Given the findings that parents prefer interventions that fit into their daily lives and that children regularly participate in a large number of learning opportunities, therapists and providers have many possible ways to use their expertise to facilitate children's functional participation in their daily lives.
