

Adult Role Model Team (CDE Set Aside Funds flowed through CSDB) Article by Roger Harwell: The Adult Blind and Visually Impaired Role Model Team's purpose is to provide students who are blind or visually impaired, their parents and teachers the opportunity to meet accomplished and motivated blind and visually impaired adult role models. To openly and frankly discuss, from personal experience topics related to low vision, vision loss and blindness. Team members share their experiences, triumphant and otherwise, on topics ranging from low vision aids and high-tech devices to overcoming denial and when and how to seek support. We also discuss careers, social interaction, drivers' license, organizations, resources, orientation/mobility, daily living skills and all sorts of other frenzied topics that can and do come up. We certainly don't have all the answers, however many questions can be answered, "Been there done that," let me tell you what worked and didn't work for me. For over a decade this diverse group of accomplished blind and visually impaired adults and college students have volunteered to mentor Colorado's blind and V/I elementary, high school and transition students. We celebrate those teachers, students, and role models who have participated and supported this effort. We have all grown richer in spirit and understanding as a result. As a member of the Role Model Team since 1990, I have seen the positive impact role models can and do make. **Braille Competency** (CDE Set Aside Funds): Funds have been reserved for four braille proctors (Lucia Hasty, Brenda Shepard, Sarah Sonnier, and Julie Wetzstein) to provide opportunities to TVIs / Braillists to take the Colorado Braille Mastery Test and/or the 15 clock-hours of renewal modules. For information about braille competency testing and renewal requirements, please contact Tanni Anthony.

Braille-Format Colorado Student Assessment Program (CSAP) Test Review (CDE Set Aside Funds): TVIs had the opportunity to meet with the CDE Assessment Unit and the CSAP publisher to review the large print and braille CSAP tests each year since June 2004. Thanks to the feedback of many of you, we had helpful data to draft "theme recommendations" for improvement to future CSAP tests. Funds have been reserved to review the 2007 braille tests BEFORE they are sent to Colorado. Sarah Sonnier, Nancy Cozart, and Tanni Anthony will return to Boston's National Braille Press in early December for a second year of onsite test review. They will meet with the tactile graphics experts and the test publisher over a two day period.

**Braille Transcriber Project** (Set Aside Funds flowed through CSDB) Details provided by Ann Hicks. The Braille Transcribers Mentor Project is for experienced Library of Congress certified braillists to mentor new braillists who are working on their LOC certification. Ann Hicks, who is in charge of this project, needs to know who is interested in being mentored. She will then link the new braillist with a veteran braillist. <u>Close Up:</u> Close up involves a 7 day learning adventure in Washington, D.C. for high school students and educators. Experience the excitement of Close Up's flagship program! This 7-day, 6-night program develops students' knowledge of basic concepts of government and citizenship. Students will gain greater understanding of the rights and responsibilities of citizens in a participatory democracy; learn how constituents, interest groups and party politics affect the legislative process; understand the impact of the Framers' views of limited government on

the structure of government outlined in the Constitution; and explore diverse viewpoints concerning domestic and international policy questions facing Congress, the executive branch and the courts. Through onsite study-visits, students will also see the city's monuments and memorials, explore the Smithsonian museums, and enjoy the cultural diversity of D.C.'s historic neighborhoods. On Friday, students have independent time to visit colleges, and explore sites not covered during the program. The pinnacle of the week is Capitol Hill Day where students have the opportunity to spend time with their Senator(s), Representative(s), and/or staff. CSDB & Outreach Services will be attending CLOSE UP for a week in February 2007. It is the hope of CSDB to send one student from the state of Colorado as an Outreach student and one student from CSDB. <u>Colorado Center for the Blind Summer Activities:</u> Each summer, the CCB offers programs to students who are blind/visually impaired. Colorado Instructional Materials Center (CIMC) (Set Aside Funds flowed through CSDB, district-assessment fees of \$200 per identified child with visual impairment): The role of the CIMC is to provide braille and large print textbooks and materials for all students who are visually impaired in Colorado. The CIMC is housed on the campus of the CSDB. CDE funding of the CIMC has been supplemented by district fees (\$200 per student with visual impairment). <u>CIMC Braillist Scholarships</u> (Sponsored by the CIMC) Details provided by Ann Hicks: The CIMC is again able to offer scholarships to help three certified Library of Congress braillists attend the National Braille Association conference this fall. Persons who are selected to receive a scholarship will be required to share the information gained with other braillists in Colorado. <u>CSDB Lending Library</u> (Sponsored by CSDB): The library provides materials and information in a variety of formats for students who are Deaf/Hard of Hearing and/or blind/visually impaired, as well as their parents and those who work with them. Most items may be borrowed by anyone with a Colorado Library Card (available at public and academic libraries throughout CO) or through interlibrary loan from any library. The libraries are open Monday through Friday during the school year from 8:00 AM to 3:00 PM. Because school activities sometimes interrupt this schedule, it is recommended that persons call before coming in person to either library. <u>CSDB Short Term Placements</u> (Sponsored by CSDB): CSDB will offer short term placements to focus on the expanded core curriculum during this school year. <u>CSDB Touch Museum</u> (housed on the campus of CSDB in Colorado Springs): The CSDB Touch Museum is closed for the 2006-2007 School Year. <u>Colorado O&M Workshop</u> (CDE Set Aside Funds): This training is co-sponsored by CDE, CAER, CSDB, and Insights Inc. A planning committee is currently working to determine the theme, presenters, dates, and location. Be watching future newsletters for more details on the dates. This training is reserved for Orientation and Mobility Specialists.

Colorado Services for Children with Combined Vision and Hearing Loss Project — (Funded by the federal office of Special Education Projects, housed at CDE): The project will soon be in its fourth year of a federally funded five-year-cycle. There are currently 125 children and youth, age birth through 21 years, who have combined vision and hearing loss (deafblindness) in Colorado. Free technical assistance is provided the families and service providers of these children. The project has a newsletter, *Vibrations*, which is disseminated three times over the course of a school year. The project website has over 60 fact sheets (in English and Spanish) on information specific to deafblindness. The library is open to parents and professionals and is stocked with great resources, including about 50 items specific to visual impairment. The library's inventory is listed on the website, where there also is a downloaded book-loan order form. <u>Family Learning Retreat 2007</u> (CDE Set Aside Funds flowed through CSDB and CSDB funds): The Family Learning Retreat will take place at the Colorado School for the Deaf and the Blind on **June 1-3, 2007.** The weekend retreat is for any family who has a child who is deaf/ hard of hearing, blind/visually impaired, or deafblind. There was a very positive turn out of families of kids from all three strands this past summer. This retreat allows families to come together and learn ways of coping with the hardships of raising a child with a disability.

This is a great opportunity for families to meet other families and share their stories, have fun, make friends, and learn something new. Louise Gettman, who works as a TVI at CSDB, and Stefanie Morgan, a parent, represent the blindness/visual impairment on the retreat planning committee. Gina Quintana and Shannon Cannizzaro will represent deafblindness. More information about the Family Learning Retreat will be posted in future *WHOT* newsletters.

<u>Family Literacy Packs</u> (CSDB supported, housed at the CIMC): Each Family Literacy Pack contains several books (braille and print) along with a Video or DVD of all the stories and several Activity Kits placed in a colorful child's back pack. Students keep the items they make and return the extra materials to the pack. These activities may be a game, a song or an activity. These are well thought out and well put together activi-

<u>Low Vision Device Training</u> (CDE Set Aside): A two-day training will be offered to CO teachers of students with visual impairments and certified Orientation and Mobility Specialists on low vision devices. Chrissy Cowan will be the key presenter. The participants will learn how to train students on these tools and will have hands-on learning practice with a multitude of devices. The date of the training has been set for **November 10-11, 2006.** Registration information will be emailed to TVIs in late September.



Low Vision Evaluation Clinics (CDE Set Aside): The Low Vision Evaluation Team was once again funded for four regional clinics. The clinic team consists of Dr. Tom Theune (optometrist), Jim Olson (certified low vision therapist and TVI) and Donice Fennimore (clinic coordinator). Donice will continue to be responsible for clinic paperwork, including getting the reports out the door, and will be the contact person for setting up each clinic. Donice's low vision clinic duties have been built into her job as an Administrative Assistant with the CIMC. The dates of the 2006-07 clinics are posted within this newsletter, as are the local site coordinators for each clinic.

National Braille Challenge (Sponsored by CSDB, information provided by Randy Witte): This regional contest will again be held at CSDB on Friday, January 26<sup>th</sup>, 2007. Students compete at our preliminary contest in various categories such as spelling, reading comprehension, speed and accuracy, proofreading, and charts and graphs. The top 12 students from each age group in the US are then invited to the final round in Los Angeles on June 23, 2007, where they can win prizes including a Braille notetaker valued at over \$5000. We hope to score the tests at CSDB this year and award some prizes, but CO has yet to place a student in the finals. Last year, 27 students competed, and we would like to see more come and celebrate Braille. The weakest area for our students was not reading comprehension or spelling or charts and graphs; it was PROOFREADING! Our Braille students need to brush up on grammar and punctuation rules! New Teacher Mentor Project (CDE Set Aside Funds): This will be the third year of the mentor project! The goal is to provide mentoring assistance to students enrolled in the UNC Visual Impairment Program, as well as new teachers in Colorado school districts. Each participant will be paired with a mentor teacher currently working in Colorado. Mentors are required to provide services for two years, and will receive a \$500 annual stipend for their time and commitment. Regional Technology Consultation (CDE Set Aside Funds): Thanks to the input of TVIs to their Vision Coalition teacher reps, funds were built into this year's budget to sponsor a pilot project for technology consulting in each region. Bonnie Snyder has been hired to provide 20 days of consultation across the state. Each region will have five days of Bennie's consult time. Information will be sent to each Regional Meeting Coordinator (Carol Love – northern, Nancy Cozart- metro, Chloann Woolley – southern, and Kevin O'Brien –northern) about how to access Bonnie's time.

**Snow Shoe Weekend** (sponsored by hardworking teachers!): Details provided by Elaine Karns The 5th Annual Snowshoe Weekend is tentatively booked for **February 17-19, 2007** at the YMCA of the Rockies in Estes Park. One semester hour will be available for those interested in attending the full conference (Thursday night and all day Friday and Saturday). #### **BITS FROM BONNIE**

#### She's BAAACCCKKK!

Editor's Note: We are happy to report that Bonnie Snyder will once again be offering regional technical assistance on assistive technology. For more information, please read about this project in the article on What's Happening and What's Funded. Thank you to Bonnie for the following article.

After five years, it looks like, for all practical purposes, I have flunked retirement. Retirement was really great. I enjoyed it immensely. I got to play on my computer twenty four/ seven ... and there were many days when I did just that! But then, Tanni called me and the flunking process began. And, you know what? I'm really excited to be able to work with you all again! There's a lot of really great technology out there for you and for your students. And, there's some not so great stuff that you should steer away from. I'm thinking, too, that you have had some really interesting experiences with technology that you would like to share so we all can become better consumers and users.

This particular column is going to address, what I call "You Too Can Love Your Students' MP3 Players." Honest! I know they can be a bit annoying, playing all that stuff they call music (uh, oh, I think I'm sounding like my parents). However, that MP3 player can also be used as an educational tool. Perhaps several of you are already doing this. If so, I'd love to hear about what programs you are using to make use of the MP3 player.

I have been surfing the Net looking for programs that convert text to MP3s. Using Google, I put in "text to MP3" and received back some really neat choices. Those that I found up front, were shareware and VERY reasonably priced, I might add. The two that stood out for me were Universal Audio Recorder and TextAloud. The first one is \$14.95 and the second is \$29.95. I found that both of them were very easy to install and figure out how to use. There's no reason why most of your students, themselves, couldn't use the programs, as well as their teachers. They both have a large variety of voices. They both have options to change the pitch and speed of the voices (with numeric indicators so that we can make a note of each student's preferences in those areas). U A R seemed a bit limited on its ability to work on large text files, but that may be because I was using their downloadable demo version rather than the full purchased version.

One thing that I particularly liked about TextAloud was that it put a tool bar in my browser and I could use it to select anything I wished to hear spoken AND, if I needed the text size increased, I could do that, too (which should add to the browsing pleasure of some of our low vision students). Also, when the text size increased, it was reformatted so that you didn't have to scroll all the time to read text past the right or left display margins. Also, with TextAloud, a student can be browsing the Web and find a page that looks interesting but, perhaps too long to read at that point in time. With TextAloud, you can save the file as a TextAloud "article" which then allows you to save it as an MP3 file right then, or after your Web session is completed. Both programs have other things that they can do. With UAR, for instance, it has another module that allows you to directly record from a microphone, so you could read the text to the student if you wished. Or you could record instructions.

I know that with the advent of networking in the schools, that getting shareware programs installed may be akin to pulling teeth. IT people, with good reason, are a bit paranoid about what they install on "their" computers. However, it's always a good idea to create a good relationship with the IT folks and talk to them with kindness and respect. If you can clearly explain to them what these programs will do for your students, you just might be able to convince them to do the installation. Also, it probably wouldn't be a bad idea to run the programs through every virus checker you can think of, and let the IT people know you have done so.

The programs mentioned above are for the PC. I don't presently have access to a Mac, but will try to find some stuff for it, too, as time goes by.

Also, please let me know if there is a subject you would like me to address in this column in the future, and I will make every effort to do so.

#### What's New This Year with Short Term Placements

TVIs have asked for it and CSDB has tried to design a program to try to meet those needs. The most frequent request was for a Short Term Placement that will not interrupt the entire week of school. CSDB will offer beginning this year three-day placements that will begin on a Thursday afternoon and run through Saturday afternoon. Your students will only miss 1 ½ days of school.

Our first Short Term Placement of three days will be October 26, 27, & 28<sup>th</sup> and is designed for young students who are in need of Orientation and Mobility: An Introduction to Bus Travel. At this time this is reserved for students in rural areas or who have limited exposure to bus travel. We must have a minimum of 2 students to offer the program. We are also opening up Short Term Placements to grades 2-12 and we will design the program accordingly to meet the age group that applies.

For those not familiar with the Short Term Program concept, it was designed 10-12 years ago in Texas to help meet the needs of students who attended public school, but needed additional instruction in the Expanded Core Curriculum areas. # Survey Says!

In February 2006, the Colorado School for the Deaf and the Blind (CSDB) in conjunction with the Colorado Department of Education (CDE), conducted a survey of service providers of students who are blind and visually impaired. The survey was designed to gather information regarding the utilization and effectiveness of outreach programs. Forms were distributed through CDE's

email distribution list, CSDB's website and to Colorado Special Education Directors. CSDB accepted surveys through April.

Eighteen service providers from thirteen school districts responded. Overwhelmingly, respondents ranked What's Happening Out There newsletter, the Colorado Instructional Materials Center, and the Colorado Low Vision Evaluation Clinic very high for their rate of use. Likewise, survey results showed the prior programs, as well as the Colorado Sports Education Camp, Family Learning Retreat, Snowshoe Weekend, Adult Role Model Team, Braille Challenge, CSDB Library, CSDB School for the Blind Short-term Placements and Summer Enrichment programs as highly effective and readily accessible. CSDB and CDE will use these results, as well as the survey comments to continually improve outreach programming. Thanks to all of the respondents!

### A LETTER FROM DR. THEUNE

Dear Colorado Teachers of Students with Visual Impairments,

It is with great excitement and anticipation that we, your Low Vision Evaluation Clinic Team, prepare for the 2006-07 school year. We continue to strive to bring the latest and best technical and optical devices to you, your visually impaired students and their guardians.

#### Additions to the clinic inventory for this year include:

**Enhanced Vision "Amigo" portable electronic magnifier:** This desk top portable CCTV has a larger viewing screen than the other hand held CCTVs and may be plugged into a TV at home to increase screen size and magnification. It may also be worn around the neck for easy portability. The Amigo will join Telesensory's "Olympia" as an intermediate CCTV option.

**Eschenbach "Max Detail" & "Max TV":** These lightweight, 2X spectacle binoculars allow a student to extend their working distance from a computer screen or a television set which will improve posture and lessen fatigue.

**Lighthouse Powermag High Plus reading glasses:** Lighthouse has taken their popular, metal frame style and provided us with powers up to 48 diopters. This style will be more "user friendly" for students and the price will be more user friendly for parents and guardians.

#### The importance of re-evaluations of your students

Many teachers have told us that they "have sent all of their students to previous clinics and have no more to send." In our experience, students who return to a clinic after one to three years become much more interested and involved with the clinic's "tools". The students and their guardians have a better understanding of the use of low vision aids and are much more excited about the clinic experience.

Please remember that low vision devices have specific uses to access ever-changing visual information in ever-changing settings. The initial assessment is to determine the potentials of low vision devices. As your student matures and progresses through school, their low vision needs will change as well.

As teachers, you are the only professionals who can make the low vision clinic available to your students. Your continued training and teaching with the low vision devices remains the key to success or failure with the new "tools" your students are using in their everyday life.

- ▲ BrailleInk—BrailleInk is a new nonprofit organization dedicated to enhancing the experience of reading by providing materials with both print and Braille in a unique, easy-to-use format that encourages shared reading and promoted Braille awareness. The BrailleInk format maintains the original print and illustration in the top portion of the page and adds Braille in the bottom portion. Corresponding print characters are places directly above each Braille cell so the Braille reader's hand don't block what their sighted reading partner is trying to see. - A Online Braille Textbook Transcriber Certificate Program—The National Center on Low—Incident Disabilities has announced that the Northwest Vista College (NVC) is the first community college in the nation to offer an online program to certify Braille textbook transcribers. NVC and its partners pioneered a college curriculum to develop "Braille Textbook Transcribers," professionally trained individuals to meet a critical and growing need for transcribers so Braille readers have equal access to textbooks and other written information. The NVC coursework for Braille Textbook Transcriber is completed in an online environment over a three semester period. The first semester begins August, 2006 and students completing the program will receive their certificate the following August. # MORE DOTS OF INTEREST

- ▲ On July 27th, 2006 President George W. Bush signed into law the Louis Braille Bicentennial-Braille Literacy Commemorative Coin Act, which commemorates the 200th anniversary of the birth of Louis Braille, who created the raised-dot system of reading and writing for the blind that bears his name. It calls for the Secretary of the Treasury to issue up to 400,000 silver-dollar coins commemorating this bicentennial anniversary. The bill is part of a larger campaign initiated by the National Federation of the Blind (NFB) to encourage Braille literacy among blind youth, The coins, which go on sale in 2009, will emphasize Braille literacy by featuring Louis Braille's image and raised dots that spell out "Brl" the Braille contraction for the word "Braille." This will be the first coin ever minted by the United States Treasury with a Braille symbol. 





- O The Colorado Talking Book Library provides free library service to Colorado's print-disabled. Both the school and the individual can have separate accounts with CTBL. We are responsive to students who need books for school by filling a school request within 24 hours if it is specifically called in to the library. While we do not provide textbooks, we do have the other books that students need for English or research in other classes. We also have the only circulating collection of Braille books in the state. - Recording for the Blind & Dyslexic (RFB&D), created in 1948, is a nonprofit organization whose volunteers record textbooks for students who are blind, visually impaired or physically challenged. The Rocky Mountain Unit, created in 1951, is located at 1355 S. Colorado Blvd., Ste. C-406, Denver. Our volunteers record textbooks for students attending k-12, college and graduate school. We record textbooks from 8am to 8pm Monday through Friday. We offer individual memberships to students for \$100 per year the first year, and \$35 per year from then on. We offer school memberships for \$350, \$500 or \$950 per year, offering teachers the ability to order audio textbooks for their students during the year. #### **Unique Field Testing Opportunity for Students who are Visually Impaired**

Recent studies indicate that less than 12 percent of students who are visually impaired have skills in Braille. Yet the majority of experts in this field claim that Braille skills are paramount for persons with visual impairment to acquire literacy in reading. An official with the American Foundation for the Blind (AFB) argues that literacy cannot be gained through listening alone.

**Do you know the literacy level of your students who are visually impaired?** You have a unique opportunity to find out if your students have the literacy required for life and work in the community. This is not just simply translating some academic test items into Braille. This is the first time that test items are realistically applied to the daily life and work activities of persons who are visually impaired.

**About the CASAS Braille Field Test** The Braille field test was developed by CASAS in cooperation with the American Printing House (APH). It began in 2005 and will continue through the 2006-2007 school year. The development of the Braille reading items involved extensive field review and feedback from programs for the visually impaired. The test items consist of twenty-five multiple-choice questions. The items reflect realistic daily life and work scenarios of persons who are visually impaired.

Who can participate? Youth age 16 through adults who are blind/visually impaired from secondary education, State Schools for the Blind, secondary diploma, adult education, community-based organizations and adult rehabilitation programs can participate in the field test.

**How will I know if my students qualify?** Test items are written in contracted or Grade 2 Braille. Students functioning at CASAS skill levels A through D (third to ninth grade equivalent in reading) may participate in field-testing.

**What accommodations are allowed?** Frequent breaks and field-testing a few items at a single time period are allowable testing accommodations. Students do not need to complete every test item if they do not know the answer. Teachers who are visually impaired may receive the administrative directions electronically.

What materials need to be completed? CASAS provides participating agencies with Braille field-test booklets, Braille answer sheets with special marking stickers, test administration directions, and a pre-paid UPS label to return all field-test materials to CASAS. Interested parties can request a preview copy of the test items.



# Colorado Braille Mastery Test and Renewal Modules

Information about the Colorado Braille Mastery Test is available on the Blindness/Low Vision webpage (<a href="http://www.cde.state.co.us/cdesped/SD-BLV.asp">http://www.cde.state.co.us/cdesped/SD-BLV.asp</a>). All Colorado TVIs are mandated to demonstrate braille competency in reading and writing literary braille, if they are providing braille instruction. It is recommended that district braillists demonstrate braille competency, if they have not earned a Library of Congress Braillist Certificate.

To schedule the test, please contact Tanni Anthony at (303) 866-6681 or <anthony\_t@cde.state.co.us>. Test proctors can be used for outside the greater Denver area. Otherwise the testing site is at the Colorado Department of Education in Denver.

Once an individual has passed the Colorado Braille Mastery Test, there is a mandated one time renewal process. Within a five year period, the person must pass 15 clock hours of renewal modules. The renewal modules are designed to be taken in hour long increments. They can be taken in a group or individual setting. They must be proctored for grading purposes. There are four CDE approved proctors:
