#### Access, Sweet Access

Access is a term that we use frequently when describing the educational needs of students who are blind/visually impaired. When we provide access to instructional materials, we know that our students can be true contenders in their learning, literacy, and life pursuits. The certified teacher of students who are blind/visually impaired works with the student and educational team to ensure books are ordered and received in large print and braille formats, that students are involved in our state low vision clinics to acquire low vision devices, have instructional opportunities to learn and use braille, and have the needed technology to acquire information and participate in their daily learning and travel environments. Access is what we work hard to ensure and provide. This is a good thing.

Accessibility is a life long issue. Recently while attending the National Federation of the Blind (NFB) of Colorado Annual Convention, I had the opportunity to listen to and interact with adults of many ages who are blind/visually impaired. The issues of access are paramount: access to transportation in both urban and rural communities; access for college students to the same types of books and materials provided to them during their public school years; and access to participate in our voting process in a manner that protects both opportunity and privacy. We have made many strides in our communities over the years in accessibility, but we still have a long way to go to achieve full and continual access across all life environments.

We cannot take for granted all of what the federal law. Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), has protected for our children during their school years. Together we have a responsibility to advocate for lifelong access beyond the days of public school. Together, we must work together to ensure access, sweet access, is for all ages of the lives of individuals who are blind/visually impaired.

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# **Bits From Bonnie**

Have you heard of NVDA? The name stands for NonVisual Desktop Access. It is an open source screen reader that works with Windows XP and Windows Vista. I first heard about it from Nimer Jaber who had learned of it from Barb Galgano in the Cherry Creek School District.

NVDA doesn't have all the bells and whistles of the commercial screen readers ... yet. But, because it is open source, it is constantly being added to and improved by the author, Michael Curran, and other programmers who program in the Python language.

NVDA comes in two forms: the usual install program for use on one's own computer, plus it has a portable format that you can carry around on a thumb drive and plug into any Windows XP or Vista computer without ever having to install it. The portable version is more useable than the JAWS portable version because the JAWS version requires installation of a video intercept file whereas NVDA does not have to install any-thing on the host computer.

Since not all blind computer users can afford to run out and buy JAWS or Window-Eyes, I would strongly urge TVIs to inform their students about the existence of NVDA and even provide copies of it to them for use on their computers at home.

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#### Western Region Low Vision Evaluating Clinic



Students and their parents received a better understanding and purpose of devices for students with low vision and many left the clinic not only with a better understanding, but also with the suggested devices in their possession.

It went smoothly and a lot of good things were accomplished with the students, parents and teachers. # A CLOSER LOOK: LOW VISION NEWS

Looking for accessibility options for your Apple computer? If you have a current operating system, just go to your Spotlight bar in the upper right corner of your screen and type in "Universal Access". Click on the top Universal Access hit display which gives you free options built into the Apple operating system. Four tabs provide assistance with 'seeing', 'hearing', modifying the 'keyboard', and controlling the 'mouse and trackpad.'

If you click on the 'Seeing' tab, three options show up. Just select the 'on' or 'off' buttons with your mouse and the following utilities start up.

"<u>VoiceOver</u>" Select the 'on' or 'off' button with your mouse or the keyboard shortcut to toggle between on and off modes.

You can make adjustments by clicking the "Open VoiceOver Utility" bar which allows you to:

- control the verbosity,
- navigations items,
- adjust the rate, pitch, and volume of 23 voices.
- choose how much punctuation you want to hear.

"<u>Zoom</u>" Selecting the 'on' or 'off' button with your mouse or use the keyboard shortcut lets the user select from:

- between 2X to 20X magnification
- keyboard access can be used anytime Zoom is turned on
- the image can move continuously with the pointer, when the pointer meets an edge, or the pointer can be at the center of the image.



"<u>Display</u>"

Let the user adjust their display from the following choices:

- Black on White
- White on Black
- Grayscale
- Reduce and Increase Contrast

It's free and easy to register with CareerConnect-and the site is a great resource for teenagers who are beginning to explore careers for the first time.

In the *For Teens* section of CareerConnect, young people interested in the world of work can begin by unraveling the mystery of what type of jobs they would enjoy and be good at on the *Getting Started Exploring Careers* page. For anyone to effectively investigate careers, it is important to consider individual interests, talents, and values. In this section teens can learn to prepare a self-analysis profile sheet to consider what they have to offer a prospective employer.



CareerConnect also offers *Tips on Exploring Careers*. Teens can use this section to search for careers by key word, job title, interest area, or occupational category. Using any of these approaches, they will find detailed job descriptions, a listing of related jobs, and (if available) workers with visual impairments in the CareerConnect mentor database doing these jobs. Many visitors get firsthand advice from these mentors by communicating with them by email.

This site also includes a section where teens can read articles by and about other blind or visually impaired teens. In addition, the newest section of CareerConnect, *On Your Mark, Get Set...Go to Work,* focuses on young adults and their first jobs and was produced by AFB and the Braille Institute. This section contains two videos that feature firsthand accounts from numerous teens and adults talking about their first work experiences. Another great feature of the site is the section called *For Family and Friends*. Parents, teachers, mentors, or others will find a guide to the CareerConnect site, learn more about career options for blind or visually impaired individuals, and a list of helpful links for more resources. A set amount of money is set aside each year in order for Braillists who wish to become certified by the Library of Congress (LOC) to receive help from a Library of Congress certified Braillist. We are able to pay any LOC certified Braillist twenty dollars an hour to mentor a braillist who is striving to become a LOC Certified Braillist themselves.



This will help us be more proactive with data collection and analysis of outcomes for learners who are blind/visually impaired.
- We would still like to gather more information about financial resources for a student to have an eye exam. Tanni will post this request on the CDE state listserv.
- The braillist / VI paraprofessional example job descriptions are on the CDE webpage specific to blindness/low vision. Thanks to the VC for all their work on these documents!

#### **PROGRAM UPDATES**

#### Metro Region (Nancy Cozart)

The metro area vision teachers are planning to have their first meeting on Friday September 21th from 2:00-4:00pm in Littleton. This day was chosen to help accommodate some school district TVIs who are more available on Fridays. The hope is to offer different days through the year, so the same students aren't cancelled in order to attend and all local TVIs have at least some opportunities to attend. On Friday, September 21, Debbie and Tammy from the CIMC will be joining us to go over procedures and answer questions. We will also be updating everyone's contact information and going over the notes from Vision Coalition meeting on September 14th.

Through emails and at the 1<sup>st</sup> meeting, we will be finalizing the dates for future 2007-2008 meetings as well as determining topics of interest. A key interest currently is meeting with Jennifer Berg with Children's Eye Physicians. She has been trying to build an avenue through the medical offices of support and information to families who have a child with specific diagnoses that should be receiving assistance from VI Programs in the schools. The goal is to have set operations in place for communication between medical personnel and the educational teams so the families have a smooth transition of services and supports. Other topics include revisiting Functional Vision Assessments and Learning Media Plans, using the para modules and "Show and Tell" of what works for individual TVIs, etc.

#### Northern Region (Vicki Pearson)

The Northern Region will meet on September 7<sup>th</sup> in Longmont. It was decided that the region would meet again in Longmont. Everyone is very busy settling into a new school year.

At the meeting we discussed the need for the Technology Task Force as well as having Bonnie come up for technology training. The group also discussed the Low Vision Clinic, which will be held in Ft. Collins at the Ensight Skills Center on February 22 and 23. Sally Eldridge and Carol Love will be the clinic coordinators this year.

Additionally, Sally Eldridge and Carol Love will attend a seminar by Eschenbach/Opik on "Low Vision Care-What's It All About" on September 19<sup>th</sup> in Ft. Collins.

Discussion: There was a question about providing services before or after school for academic learners – how is this reflected on the IEP. She has been with us for 7 years and will be leaving us in December to begin her student teaching and complete her elementary education degree. We wish her luck! Our other instructional assistants are working hard to get prepared to take the Colorado Braille Competency Test.

Grand Junction will again be the host for the Western Slope Low Vision Clinic to be held on September 27th and 28th. We continue to be thankful to CDE for sponsoring this much needed service to our students. At this time we are expecting a full clinic with all 12 slots scheduled.

We thank Barbara Adams for her continued work in being our Western Slope Representative!

UNBOCs: Tracy Mosbarger reports status quo at UNBOCS.

*Delta and Montrose* (Kevin O'Brien): We are off to a busy start of the school year. I had been gearing up BIG TIME to hire and train (i.e., braille) the first vision paraprofessional for the Montrose School District due to the expected enrollment of a new high-needs VI student but the student did not enroll after all and the family moved out-of-state very suddenly. There was quite a whirlwind of activity canceling orders, etc, and we're back to "business as usual". Thankfully, no one had yet been hired for the position.

Delta and Montrose caseloads are remaining steady. Early Childhood numbers in Delta County are increasing significantly so we're keeping a close eye on these children....a BIG "THANK YOU" (again and again) to JC Greeley for her outstanding 0-3 outreach in our part of state.

Two students from Delta County will be attending the low vision clinic on September 28th. Both of the students have attended in the past and it is just great to see how truly excited they are to return and spend time with the team once again. We look forward to seeing everyone there.

Lastly, it is my hope that we can pull together another regional TVI meeting on the West Slope this year. We have so many irons in the fire right now that I will wait until after the fall conference to put "feelers" out to our west slope colleagues. Stay tuned for more info on this.

The western slope did have a meeting in Grand Junction last year with 100% attendance with Bonnie Snyder offering technology training.

*Mountain BOCES* (Barbara Adams): Another year; students move in, students move out, and we scramble to get the paperwork for the first Low Vision Clinic of the year filled out on time. We are all looking forward to Dr. Tom, Jim, and Donice making the big drive to the Western Slope. It is official, Julie King is working full time on the Eastern side of Mtn. BOCES. That is about all, hope everyone has a great year.

Discussion: We had a discussion about what we could do to help further educate families and school districts about the educational needs of students with visual impairments. Many families are not aware of the expenses involved in securing needed equipment or the advance time needed to order and receive large print and braille textbooks.

An idea we talked about was to highlight some individual students as far as what services and equipment must be in place to educate the learner. Another idea is to develop a one page handout that could be given to classroom teachers about what daily instructional materials need to be identified for large print and braille transcription. We need to work with Curriculum Directors about how to flag the need for NIMAC materials. We will include a letter to Special Education Directors from Tanni and Ann for the October directors' meeting.

#### CIMC (Ann Hicks)

The CIMC has been extremely busy processing, receiving, boxing, and mailing out Braille Books, Large Print Books and Instructional Aids for all students with visual impairment in Colorado. Orders received as of May 31st, 2007 was 587. Braille orders total 405 and Large Print 182. 500 orders were shipped complete (85%). Orders received as of September 4th, 2007 is 907 total with 600 Braille and 307 large print. 675 orders have been shipped complete (74%) and 82 shipped partial (9%). As of this writing on September 5th, 2007, 147 orders have been received just since August 1st, 2007, and another 10-15 more since September 4th, 2007.

KLAS, the database that is used by the CIMC, is in the process of up-graded on all of our computers. This database is going to be much more user-friendly and will also come with an exciting addition. The CIMC staff is starting the training on September 11, 2007 for all of us to be able to get on this data base and be able know much more about the status of all of our books. The exciting addition is that the TVIs in Colorado are going to be able to log on to our system in order to see if we have a particular book and maybe able to actually check that book out on line. I am sure that we will have a few "glitches" with starting up this new version but we are going to try hard to keep the flow of orders going as smooth as possible.

The supervision of the CIMC has been moved from Lou Tutt, the Principal of the School for the Blind to Dr. Laura Douglas who is in charge of the Outreach Department. We enjoyed the past four years under the direction of Mr. Tutt and are looking forward to working with Dr. Laura Douglas.

There is a trust fund connected with the CIMC that has been used in past years to support professional development opportunities for braillists. This year, the funds will support Burt Haas and Bonnie Snyder to attend a pre-conference training of the Getting in Touch with Literacy Conference. The CIMC would like to take this training content and host a Colorado training in early 2008.

Ann presented to the CSDB Board of Trustees at their September 13<sup>th</sup> meeting. She shared the handouts at our meeting. One was a database document, called the Access Log, of book orders. This document is sent out monthly to the district contact person in the VI Program. It is important that the document be reviewed back at the local level as a checks-andbalances system to confirm that all the book orders that a district has been made are indeed in process. Ann asked for input on how to improve this document. There was a question by the TVIs as to if this document is truly mailed monthly. Ann will also verify the content person of each AU. This information will go out in the CDE listserv. She will need to verify the content person, the contact information, and the preference for email mailing and mailing. It will be important each VI program to determine in-house system of communication.

Last year, the Vision Coalition asked the CIMC to confirm the receipt of a new order within three school days of its receipt. The membership would still like to see this policy implemented.

#### Anchor Center for Blind Children and CSDB Early Intervention News (Cathy Smyth)

Of course, the biggest news is the opening of our new facility at 2550 Roslyn St. in Stapleton. The Ribbon Cutting is at 1:00 on Friday, September 28, and you are welcome! Of course we hope there will be many opportunities to visit as we become a place to gather, meet, and learn about young children with Visual Impairments. The Strategic Planning for the next three years includes exploring research opportunities, becoming a more active teaching facility for new teachers and a national leader in services for young children with visual impairments and their families. A large part of the excitement over the new building is how it is helping the children learn <u>without</u> our intervention! The sensory garden and naturally lighted hallways are amazing places. We hope the community room will be a choice for the Vision Coalition to meet.

Our Lillis Grant practicum student this semester is Paula Stallman, a parent of one of our former students. It is great to have her with us and we are looking forward to her graduation from the UNC program this December so that she can become our newest TVI! This will bring us up to five full-time TVIs and some much needed help! It is fabulous to have Sarah Bickford join us this semester.

A meeting to discuss the Federal initiative, Results Matter, is scheduled for November 13<sup>th.</sup> CSDB early intervention teachers will be joining us. Hopefully this will be a brainstorming session that generates a list of "red flags" that would alert an EI provider to consult with a TVI when conducting the assessments. Now that we have more experience with the different assessments, we can bring our working concerns to the table. We hope to set up some meetings with the AEPS authors to work through appropriate adjustments to the test itself. As a Denver Public School preschool site, we also hope to learn what the expectations are for testing with this population.

We continue to work on our possible research project and journal article addressing the work Anchor Center has done around Feeding Strategies for the Visually Impaired Infant. The article should be ready for submission by January, and the Gerber Foundation is considering our research project. Stay tuned!

#### CAER (Samantha Hoffman)

CAER is very excited to welcome our new board members; Julie Adams an O&M Specialist from DVR, Sally Eldridge TVI/O&M from St. Vrain,, Mike Plansker TVI/O&M for Adams 12 and Paula Conroy associate professor for UNC and TVI/O&M for Boulder Valley. Additionally, we are happy to have two previous board members filling officer position. Trina Boyd-Pratt is the new treasurer and Louise Gettman is the new secretary.

#### Colorado Division of Vocational Rehabilitation (Julia Zanon)

The Rehabilitation Counselors for the Blind (RCB) met on June 5 specifically for training on transition guidelines and practices. Cheryl Carver, transition coordinator for CDVR facilitated this training and we all should now be on the "same page" throughout the state regarding when to take a referral, attend staffings and provide services for transitioning blind students. CDVR is also coming out with a new "transition kit" that will soon be available to help counselors work with students and schools more effectively. RCBs from all over the state recently met on September 11 to learn about new assistive technology for the blind and tour the Colorado Center for the Blind. We are also collaborating with the National Federation of the Blind of Colorado to promote the Possibilities Fair on October 4 at the Doubletree Hotel in Denver. This event is not just for seniors and will host various service agencies providing services for the blind and vendors of assistive technology. The event is open to anyone interested in finding out more about blindness services.

The application for membership on the Commission for the Blind and Visually Impairment, which will be a statewide advisory council on Colorado services to individuals who are blind/visually impaired, were due on September 1. The advisement focus will be primarily on adult services.

There is a gap in the rural communities for low vision specialists for adults. The DVR counselors want to help solve this dilemma. It was suggested that some of our low vision service entities consider a traveling clinic.

#### UNC (Paula Conroy)

We are 3 weeks into the UNC semester and off to a quick start. We have 45 students and the traineeship grant for this year is full. I am encouraging students to look to Fall 08 as their entrance date. People interested in the program should still email and call for information and be put on the waiting list in case room on the grant opens up earlier than next fall. Silvia Correa-Torres has joined the UNC faculty full time and is doing a great job getting up to speed with the way the College and School of Special Education runs. Faculty is busy with accreditation renewal reports and with program assessment.

#### Colorado School for the Blind (Lou Tutt and Karla McKechnie)

A new school year is here and there are many exciting things happening at CSDB! We have ---20 new students in the School for the Blind (pre-school through transition). Elizabeth Umphress and Loretta Finnegan-Nelson are two new energetic staff members. Elizabeth is teaching in the Elementary Classroom and Loretta is in the Transition program. The School for the Blind is also pleased to have Paula Cochran as a para professional in the split Elementary Classroom, Christiana Walker-Potts as our library aide and Tammy Villalovos as 1:1 for a student in the Elementary classroom.

We are excited to share that Jim Olson has been selected as a 2007 APH Scholar and will be traveling to Louisville, Kentucky in October. Also the proposal for the 2007 Getting In Touch with Literacy (GITWL) conference submitted by Jim Olson, Karla McKechnie, and Lou Tutt has been selected as a poster presentation. Ann Hicks and Janet Rose will be presenting on literacy packs at GITWL.

Our new CSDB Outreach Department is growing! Dr. Laura Douglas is the new director with the following staff now under her supervision: Jim Olson, Donna Keale, Helen Freeman, Bonnie Ottmar, and Ann Hicks, including CIMC.

The CSDB Board of Trustees has changed their meeting date and times. The monthly work sessions and meeting will be on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Thursday and the Board meeting will begin at 4p.m. for the public. Dr. Douglas, as mentioned above will also supervise the two School for the Deaf Coordinators this school year. They are Deb Burton, former math teacher and Kent Swearingen, former voc/tech teacher in the School for the Deaf.

Karla McKechnie, our DLS/Transition teacher is also the School for the Blind Senior class sponsor. Six of our blind students are seniors this year. This year, none of our blind students are being mainstreamed this first semester. We have

moved Amy Gutowski, former PE teacher to the Elementary/Special Needs classroom because of an unusually high number of K-3 enrollments this year.

The School for the Blind is off to an exciting beginning of the 2007-2008 school year. Best wishes to Ann Hicks, Randy Witte, Linda Witte and Cathy Kearney as they are in their final year at CSDB!!

#### CSDB Outreach (Donna Keale)

Outreach at CSDB has now become a department that is directed by Dr. Laura S. Douglas. Donna Keale is still the contact person for Short Term Placement, Sports Abilities Days and Summer Enrichment. The 2007-2008 Short Term Placement schedule is currently under construction and should make the October newsletter as well as posted on the CSDB website (<u>www.CSDB.org</u>).

USABA has requested dates to facilitate the Sports Abilities Days in collaboration with CSDB. By creating several different abilities days throughout the state we are hoping to revive the Summer Sports Education Camp. This was canceled in 2007 due to low enrollment.

The 2007 Summer Enrichment Program brought in over 50 blind and visually impaired students. We were able to offer two elementary camps and one Independent Living 2 week camp that focused on all aspects of the Expanded Core Curriculum.

CSDB is currently working with two districts to provide O&M services to students in areas where there is not an O&M staff available.

#### **CDE (Tanni Anthony)**

*CSAP, CSAPA, and CELA Braille and Large Print Formats:* Janet Anderson, Tanni Anthony, and Nancy Cozart met with Holly Baker of the CDE Unit of Student Assessment in early August to review the 2006-2007 TVI-submitted CSAP comments. Thank you to all the teachers who took the time to submit their feedback. Each comment was analyzed for its accuracy. If it was a valid observation, it was classified as to whether it was a TVI training issue, a test question alteration issue, and/or a test preparation issue. The 29-page document that was completed was submitted to the assessment unit and the test publisher. Tanni will also be reviewing TVI-training issues at the State of the State portion of the 2007 Fall Conference on Visual Impairment and in follow-up *WHOT* articles. In addition, the CSAPA and CELA comments from last year's test administration were reviewed with appropriate CDE personnel.

*ECEA Rules Specific to Braille Competency:* The ECEA Rules are currently in a public comment period. The proposed changes to ECEA section 2220-R-4.00 Child Identification And Planning Process 4.02(4)(1) include: (a) renaming Literacy Modality Plan to Learning Media Plan; (b) adding learning to the phrase learning and literacy mode; (c) inserting language that braille competency is expected of all CO teachers licensed and endorsed in the area of visual impairment; and (d) adding a statement specific to guidelines developed by the Colorado Department of Education. As of September 14th, there was one public comment, which was in support, specific to these changes... The proposed ECEA Rule changes will need to be approved by the Colorado State Board of Education.

*Recruitment and Retention:* We have some new faces in Colorado TVI positions. Debbie Mendoza is now in Adams 12; Holly Guinan is with Pikes Peak BOCES, Elizabeth Umpress is with the School for the Blind, Loretta Finegan-Nelson is with the CSDB Transition Team, Judy Wiepert is with Cherry Creek, Kaitlin Lombardi is with Denver, Bill Muir is with Aurora, Lorraine Hutcheson is part time in Aurora and Cherry Creek, Carol Jordan is with Douglas, Danielle McGrath is work Brighton, and MeLinda Carter is now with JeffCo. We still have vacancies in Adams 12, Douglas, and El Paso 11. CDSB has already announced several vacancies for the next school year. This is a good example for everyone! We all need to be highly proactive with our expected future retirements! Please be in touch with Tanni as your administrative unit has positions to announce!

*Fall 2007 VI Conference:* The 2007 State Conference on Visual Impairment has been scheduled for October 18-20, 2007. Conference registration has been sent out in the August-September What's Happening Out There newsletter. We will have a Thursday evening State of the State, a full day on Friday with Dr. LaRhea Sanford, and a series of speakers (Samantha Hoffman, Dr. Tom Theune, Jim Olson, and Dr. Penny Rosenblum) on Saturday!

*Low Vision Clinics:* We have our four regional Low Vision Evaluation Clinics scheduled. The forms are posted on the CDE Blindness/Low Vision page. The tally of the LVE Clinics from last year (parent survey and TVI survey) has been sent to the four regional TVI meeting coordinators for review at a regional meeting. There were some great things to celebrate and some concerns. A concern is that parents are reporting that the report is not being reviewed with them by the local TVI. There were very few surveys that indicted that a child's IEP goals and objectives reflect the use and care of a low vision device.

*Technology Consultation for Next Year:* Bonnie Snyder will once again provide technology consultation across the state. Each of the four VI-regions will have seven days of Bonnie's time. This includes travel, onsite, phone, and email time. TVIs in each region should let their TVI Regional Meeting Coordinator know if they are requesting Bonnie's time. Bonnie will also be keeping track of region-specific time.

O&M Conference: Be watching for dates, times, and speaker /presentation content of this conference.

*NIMAS and NIMAC:* All Colorado administrative units have turned in a public assurance document specific to their work with NIMAC. Each public agency has the option of participating in NIMAC. Whether a public agency does or does not participate in NIMAC, the public agency will be responsible for ensuring that each child who requires instructional materials in an alternate.

*NIMAS and NIMAC:* All Colorado administrative units have turned in a public assurance document specific to their work with NIMAC. Each public agency has the option of participating in NIMAC. Whether a public agency does or does not participate in NIMAC, the public agency will be responsible for ensuring that each child who requires instructional materials in an alternate format will receive it in a timely manner. The Colorado Department of Education recommended that Colorado's public agencies choose to participate in NIMAC, because this national effort to centralize the distribution of instructional materials in alternate formats will help guarantee timely provision of such materials to students.

For public agencies that choose to participate in NIMAC, **contracts with publishers executed on and after December 3**, **2006** for textbooks and other printed core materials *must* include a provision that requires the publisher to produce NIMAS files and send them to the NIMAC (this will not add any cost to the contract). Curriculum publishers have been involved in discussions relating to NIMAS and are well aware of its requirements.

*State Listserv:* Per the request of CO TVIs across the state, there is a CDE-based listserv for Colorado school district TVIs and O&M Specialists. Tanni has worked to populate the listserv with all TVIs email address unless they have asked not to be included. If you are not on the listserv and want to be, please send an email to Tanni.

*New State IEP Forms*: A state work group has been revising the State IEP Forms. Tanni met with the group on one occasion to review the wording specific to students who are blind/visually impaired and the requirements for Learning Media Plans. It is anticipated that the new form will be finalized after the November 2007 State Board of Education meeting. Tanni will let everyone know when they are posted on the CDE website in final format. Administrative units may adopt the state form or develop their own IEP forms.

*Colorado Services for Children with Combined Vision and Hearing Loss Project:* This is the last year of the grant's five-year cycle. Gina and Tanni will be working with others to complete the activities of the project and to prepare, funding allowed, a new grant proposal. Please be in touch with either Tanni or Gina if you have ideas for the new grant proposal Parents and teachers of children ages birth through 21 years who have a combined vision and hearing loss are eligible for free technical assistance from the project. The project's website has many resource documents, including some in Spanish. The project also has a free lending library that is chockfull of VI-specific books, videos, and DVD. In addition to the tech support from Bonnie, TVIs and O&MSs are encouraged to use the CDE listserv to communicate about tech strengths and needs so we can continue to learn from one another.

Vicki provided an update on the Technology Committee. The committee will meet at the state conference during one of the lunches. Interested people should be in touch with Vicki or Rita. They would like to find models from other states that we can learn from specific to training and resources. It was recommended that Vicki talk to Jim Salstrum from the Colorado AT Project.

#### **PARAEDUCATOR MODULES**

On July 10<sup>th</sup>, the following people got together to begin work on a series of modules to training administrative unit paraeducators: Barbara Adams, Tanni Anthony, Paula Conroy, Nancy Cozart, Ann Hicks, Judy Mumford, and Vicki Pearson. Four modules are in draft format; an overview module of visual impairment and the role of the paraeducator working with students with visual impairments, one specific to working with students who are blind, one specific to students with low vision, and one specific to students with vision loss and additional disabilities.

The VC reviewed the current draft modules and offered feedback. Tanni will make the recommended changes and send it out for one more peer review. We are hopeful these modules will be ready to go by the State Conference. The goal is to prepare a training disk for each administrative unit that will be supplemented by a book on paraeducators working with students who are visually impaired published by the Texas School for the Blind.
