# Act, Champion, and Inspire

I want to start out new the year with an adage that I learned last spring when I had the chance to attend a behind-the-scenes meeting of a world-famous business. The CEO shared her 3-part philosophy of what makes this business so successful. I have taken the liberty of adjusting it to the framework of our work in the education world and specifically with our learners who are blind/visually impaired.

**Act on what we must do**: It is important not to diminish the importance of this first statement. All school professionals must work together to ensure that every student has first-best instruction in the core content areas. We are key partners with general educational professionals. We can help to increase frequency and intensity of the core instruction in our time with students. We must take action to ensure that our students have the same high quality instruction as their peers.

**Champion what we choose to do:** In addition to recognizing the core curriculum, our field embraces the Expanded Core Curriculum (ECC), which targets the other learning needs of children with blindness/visual impairment. Some of the ECC's content may fall into the "need to champion" category as school personnel and family members work to support opportunities for students in recreation/leisure, social, and daily living skills— all critical for a learner's self identity, health, and independence.

Inspire what we uniquely do: This final category is what truly defines one business from another, one educational service from another. In our case, it details what is unique about our specific role with a student. We are a self-standing profession because of this unique knowledge. From knowing the braille codes, magnification or screen reader tools, or teaching a student to listen to traffic sounds to cross a street—we have a set of unique teaching skills for our students to learn and use. This is what we uniquely do. We are small, but-mighty field of practitioners and when we are the best we can be, so can our students be the best they can be.

We can and should <u>act</u> and <u>champion</u> – but always, we should <u>inspire</u> what is unique about our knowledge and skill set for the good of the student. My best wishes for a great school year – let's make it an inspirational one.

We have a lot of good things happening over the course of the upcoming school year. The following resources and activities are not exclusive to all that may be happening across the state in the area of supporting children and youth with blindness/visual impairment, their families, and service providers. Adult Role Model Team: The Adult Blind and Visually Impaired Role Model Team's purpose is to provide students who are blind/visually impaired, their parents and teachers the opportunity to meet successful adult role models who are blind/visually impaired and to openly and frankly discuss, from personal experience, topics related to low vision, vision loss and blindness. Team members share their experiences, triumphant and otherwise, on topics ranging from low vision aids and high-tech devices to overcoming denial and when and how to seek support. Discussion topics have included careers, social interaction, drivers' licenses, organizations, resources, orientation/mobility, daily living skills and other topics that are of interest to students and their families. Anchor Center for Blind Children: This not-for profit organization dedicated to providing early intervention / education to very young (birth through five years) children who are blind/visually impaired throughout the state of Colorado. It has a staff of TVIs trained in early childhood and related service providers including occupational, physical, music, horticulture therapists and a speech pathologist. Anchor Center for Blind Children was founded in 1982 by a librarian from the Colorado Library for the Blind, who saw a need for services for blind and visually impaired children, and the local Delta Gamma Alumnae chapter. The first group of children included four preschool students and six home bound infants. Today the Anchor Center serves more than 400 children and families each year from across the state. Colorado Services for Children and Youth with Combined Vision and Hearing Loss Project (also called the Colorado Deafblind Project): The project will be entering its second year of a new five year grant cycle. There are currently 134 children and youth, age birth through 21 years, who have combined vision and hearing loss (deafblindness) in Colorado. Free technical assistance is provided the families and service providers of children and youth with combined vision and hearing loss (deafblindness).

The Colorado Deafblind Project hosts an annual Summer Institute, which focuses key assessment of and intervention / instructional strategies for children and youth who are deafblind and/or who have significant support needs. The project website has over 100 fact sheets (in English and Spanish) on information specific to deafblindness. The library is open to parents and professionals and is stocked with great resources, including about 100 items specific to blindness/ visual impairment. 



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# Colorado Instructional Materials Center (CIMC) A Review of CIMC Brailler Check-Out Procedures

- Order forms for brailler check out are available online. You can visit our webpage at <u>www.csdb.org</u>, click on "Programs and Services," select "CIMC" from the dropdown menu.
- CIMC forms are frequently updated. Always make sure you are using the most current version of any form by starting at the CIMC page of the website. Please be sure to delete your cache and cookies on your web browser before opening the brailler order form. This will ensure your browser opens the most recent version and prevent you from unintentionally using a previous version.
- Braillers currently available for check out include:
  - (A) Perkins Classic Brailler
  - (B) Perkins-APH Brailler
  - (C) APH Light-Touch Perkins Brailler
- The new "APH SMART Brailler by Perkins" which will become available in July 2014 from www.aph.org, in limited quantities, for check-out from the CSDB Outreach Technology Loan Bank for the Blind. Loan bank request forms must be signed by Directors of Special Education and are entered into the circulation queue on a first-come-first-served basis. Technology is loaned for a 30-day evaluation period to allow TVI's to make a data driven decision about the effectiveness of technology for their students.
- Brailler order forms must be signed by the Director of Special Education
- The need for braille instruction or materials in braille format must be documented in the students Individualized Education Program (IEP). The CIMC reserves the right to ask for this documentation.
- The CIMC provides braillers for use in the school setting only. The CIMC does not provide braillers for use in a student's home environment.

- Braillers checked out of the CIMC are the property of the Colorado Department of Education (CDE). The braillers are not the property of Colorado AU's or school districts and must be returned to the CIMC upon request. Braillers will have a CIMC barcode affixed to them that states "Property of CIMC B/VI Technology" printed on a
- Braillers checked out of the CIMC are the property of the Colorado Department of Education (CDE). The braillers are not the property of Colorado AUs or school districts and must be returned to the CIMC upon request. Braillers will have a CIMC barcode affixed to them that states "Property of CIMC B/VI Technology" printed on a blue header.
- When a student withdraws from your AU, the brailler checked out to them needs to be returned to the CIMC or your district will be invoiced for the current replacement cost of the brailler. If a student is transferring between two Colorado school districts, the first school district is required to return the brailler to the CIMC. The CIMC will then update the statewide brailler inventory. The second Colorado school district will be required to submit a new brailler order form to the CIMC signed by their Director of Special Education. The new school district will then be re-issued the exact same brailler, with the same serial number/barcode, for use by their new student.
- No braillers will be provided by the CDE/CIMC for use by TVIs, para-educators, parents, consumers, etc.
- The CIMC will repair braillers currently checked out with the blue CIMC barcodes attached; repair of all other braillers is the responsibility of the administrative unit. Go to the "CIMC Braillers" section of our web page and click the "Brailler Repair" tab for the "Braille Repair Form" in Word, PDF, and plain text formats.

# **CONJUNCTIVITIS**

**What is Conjunctivitis?** Conjunctivitis, also known as pinkeye, is an inflammation of the conjunctiva. The conjunctiva is the thin clear tissue that lies over the white part of the eye and lines the inside of the eyelid.

**What Causes Conjunctivitis?** Conjunctivitis has a number of different causes, including: viruses, bacteria (such as gonorrhea or chlamydia), irritants such as shampoos, dirt, smoke, and pool chlorine, and allergies, like dust, pollen, or a special type of allergy that affects some contact lens wearers. Conjunctivitis caused by some bacteria and viruses can spread easily from person to person, but is not a serious health risk if diagnosed promptly. Conjunctivitis in newborn babies, however, should be reported to a doctor immediately, as it could be a vision-threatening infection.

**What Are the Symptoms of Conjunctivitis?** The symptoms of pinkeye differ based on the cause of the inflammation, but may include: redness in the white of the eye or inner eyelid; increased amount of tears; thick yellow discharge that crusts over the eyelashes, especially after sleep; green or white discharge from the eye(s); itchy eyes; burning eyes, blurred vision; and increased sensitivity to light.

**How is Conjunctivitis Diagnosed?** A doctor will conduct an exam of the eyes and may use a cotton swab to take a sample of fluid from the eyelid to be analyzed in a lab.

**How can Conjunctivitis be Treated?** The treatment will depend on the cause of the inflammation. If the conjunctivitis is from bacteria, it will be treated with antibiotics in the form of eye drops, ointments, or oral medication. Eye drops or ointments may need to be applied to the inside of the eyelid three to four times a day for five to seven days. Pills may need to be taken for several days. The infection should improve within a week. If it due to a virus, such as from a common cold, it may need to run its course, which usually lasts four to seven days. Viral conjunctivitis can be highly contagious. An individual should avoid contact with others and wash his or her hands frequently. The individual should talk to the doctor about whether or not to replace contact lenses worn during the episode of conjunctivitis.

**What Are the Complications of Conjunctivitis**? Usually, conjunctivitis is a self-limited disease, either clearing up on its own or after a course of antibiotics. However, certain forms of conjunctivitis can become serious and sight-threatening, because they can cause cornea scarring. They include conjunctivitis caused by gonorrhea, chlamydia, or certain strains of the adeno virus.

**Is Conjunctivitis Preventable?** Yes, it can often be prevented with good hygiene. Best practices are: Change pillowcases frequently, do not share eye cosmetics or towels, keep hands away from eyes and remember to wash hands often.

# Policy Statement on Early Literacy Promotion from American Academy of Pediatrics

The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) recently published a formal policy statement recommending that pediatric providers promote early literacy development for children beginning in infancy and continuing at least until the age of kindergarten. Literacy Promotion: An Essential Component of Primary Care Pediatric Practice<http:// pediatrics.aappublications.org/content/early/2014/06/19/ peds.2014-1384.full.pdf> (June 2014; discusses five recommendations related to: (1) encouraging all parents to read with young children; (2) counseling all parents about developmentally appropriate shared-reading activities; (3) providing developmentally appropriate books at health supervision visits for all high-risk, low-income young children; (4) using a robust spectrum of options to support and promote these efforts; and (5) partnering with other child advocates to influence national messaging and policies that support and promote key early shared-reading experiences.

# **Help for Problematic Sleep Patterns**

Does your child who is blind have sleep patterns that are different than the rest of the world? Does he or she sometimes fall asleep during the daytime when it is time to be awake? Are there difficulties falling asleep, staying asleep or keeping a regular sleep routine? If your child is blind, this could be due to a real sleep problem related to the lack of light needed to keep the body's internal clock in sync with the day and night cycle, called Non-24-Hour Sleep-Wake Disorder.

If your child or someone that you know might be affected, please email info@non24registry.com call (844) 361-2424 to learn about clinical research studies with investigational treatments being studied for this type of sleep problem. When calling, you can complete a short sleep survey. For each completed survey, \$24 will be donated to an organization that supports individuals with blindness. Your child may be eligible to participate in the clinical trial if she/he is less than 18 years old and is totally blind. Volunteers will be compensated for their participation in the clinical study and will receive study-related medication, and medical evaluations.

# **UEB Resource from Australia**

RIDBC Renwick Centre is delighted to announce the launch of its first online training course in Unified English Braille (UEB), entitled "UEB Online for Sighted Learners". UEB Online is an ideal course for professionals, parents and community members who wish to learn braille. It may be used by classroom teachers as a project for their students, or by specialist and mainstream educators and support staff who wish to obtain a qualification in braille.

UEB Online consists of 30 lessons that are sub-divided into two modules. The course may be accessed using a Mac or PC computer and any web browser (e.g. Safari, Internet Explorer). The course is not available via a tablet, e.g., iPad. Lessons are completed with a standard computer keyboard using a number of keys to replicate the keys of a braillewriter. Marking is fully automated so that learners receive immediate feedback as they progress through each lesson. There are a number of lesson support videos under "video resources" in the "resources" section of the course. The videos are also available via YouTube.

For those wishing a Certificate of Completion, RIDBC Renwick Centre offers certificates for each of the two modules, with a processing fee of AUD\$50.

# **BANA News**

The Braille Authority of North America (BANA) held its 2014 spring meeting April 3-5 in Philadelphia, PA. Associated Services for the Blind and Visually Impaired, (ASB), a BANA member organization, hosted the meeting. During its three-day meeting, the BANA Board reviewed and acted on semiannual reports from its eighteen committees, considered committee recommendations, and deliberated issues and challenges facing braille users and producers. The UEB Task Force reported on the development of a plan for the transition to UEB in the United States as well as the collaborative steps that have been taken to initiate dialogue and planning among the various braille communities. The development of resources for training teachers, transcribers, consumers, and family members is a focus of BANA's efforts at this time.

BANA welcomed three new organizational representatives to their first meeting as members of the Board. Dawn Gross is the new representative from the Alternate Text Production Center of the California Community Colleges (ATPC). Peggy Schuetz now represents the California Transcribers and Educators of the Blind and Visually Impaired (CTEBVI). Kyle Key has recently been appointed as the representative from the Clovernook Center for the Blind. In addition to extensive deliberations involved in the 44-item meeting agenda, the actions of note included the following:

- Revisited and revised organizational priorities in order to balance BANA's work during this time of focus
  on the transition to UEB.
- Approved a recommendation from the Tactile Graphics Technical Committee that any braille volume containing one or more tactile graphics should contain a note on the Transcriber's Notes page stating: "The Guidelines and Standards for Tactile Graphics, 2010 was used in the preparation of the tactile graphics."
- Approved a document detailing specific factors and specifications that should be employed when producing braille signage. This new fact sheet will be posted on the BANA website.
- Voted that, in light of the major revision underway to align the Braille Formats publication with UEB, BANA will not produce for sale hardcopy editions of Braille Formats 2011, which can be downloaded free of charge from the BANA website and printed or embossed. The Board also voted to add the recently posted errata in the HTML, PDF, and BRF files of Braille Formats 2011 that are posted on the BANA website. These decisions followed an extensive deliberation of the complex issues impacting BANA's current obligations and resources. NOTE: Braille Formats 2011 went into effect on January 1, 2013. Materials now being transcribed should follow these guidelines.

On Saturday morning, BANA hosted an Open Forum,. They discussed the progress of the transition to UEB as well as ongoing plans for informing braille readers and preparing educators and transcribers about specific code changes. # Report from the NRTC State of the Science Conference

The National Research and Training Center on Blindness and Low Vision (NRTC) held its State of the Science (SoS) Conference on Improving Employment Outcomes for Individuals who are Blind or Visually Impaired on April 9th and 10th, 2014 in Bethesda, MD, in conjunction with the annual NCSAB Spring Conference. Results from the six projects funded under the NIDRR grant on the same topic were presented during the conference. The six project areas are: transportation barriers to employment, employment mentoring, VR agency-employer interactions, best practices for the Randolph-Sheppard Business Enterprise Program, competitive employment outcomes of SSDI recipients, and accessibility of office equipment.

More than one hundred people attended the NRTC's SoS conference. Audience members were able to participate in the conference through the use of clickers, wireless devices that allow instant polling, and discussions with expert panel members who discussed the implications for practice of the research findings. Center staff received a great deal of informal positive feedback on the conference, and formal feedback from audience members indicated that the conference was informative and worthwhile, with 93% of attendees agreeing that they could envision improvements for their agency or organization based on the information that was presented.



# **Access to Exhibits**

I just returned from AER (Association for Education and Rehabilitation of the Blind and Visually Impaired) Conference in San Antonio and interest in tactile images seems to be at an all time high. Not only did we have people, like Lucia Hasty of Colorado Springs, presenting great information about making tactile graphics for school subjects, we also had the Meadows Museum from Dallas talk about how they are building accessibility into *all* their tours.

The staff at AER kindly gave me a table so that I could share an exhibit about "Access to Exhibits." This exhibit features the information that we have been able to learn about how different types of information are received by patrons at the Denver Art Museum (DAM) on access days.

Arrangements can be made to see the tactile images anytime at DAM but if you just want to stop by, every other month tables are set up and manned by docents to share in-depth information about the featured pieces in the exhibit. The next exhibit will be on October 10th and 11th, 2014 from 10AM to 1PM. The types of tactile images we have been using range from on-the-spot raised-line drawings traced on the Sensational BlackBoard, small models, collages and fully painted and sculpted low relief pictures of paintings from their collection. I have used a wide variety of materials like sculpy, an oven baked clay, paint and sticky backed foam, glass bead textures and even plastic fruit!

I received a mini grant from the Colorado AER State Chapter and was able to take the same exhibit to Orlando to share with people attending the National Federation of the Blind Convention. I can safely report that the more materials I am able to use that mimic the actual subject matter makes for the most realistic images. The cut and paste collages are appreciated but perceived as more cartoon-like. The raised-line images are good to help make more information accessible but they are just that, more information. For an aesthetic experience the clear winner is the sculpted low relief multimedia kitchen sink approach. They are fun to make too! I will be sharing this information with Colorado AER at a meeting this fall. Thanks CAER for your support.

# National Federation of the Blind Names Michelle Chacon

2014 Blind Educator of the Year

**Orlando, Florida (July 3, 2014):** The National Federation of the Blind (NFB) has named Michelle Chacon, a teacher of blind students in Colorado, as its 2014 Blind Educator of the Year. Ms. Chacon was presented with the award at the NFB's seventy-fourth annual national convention, held at the Rosen Centre in Orlando, Florida.

Ms. Chacon began working with blind people in 1997 as a home management instructor at the Colorado Center for the Blind. In the summer of 1998, she directed the center's Confidence Camp for Kids, a program targeted to blind children ages four through ten. She balanced all of these duties with raising her four children and providing advice to other blind parents. Ms. Chacon went to Albuquerque, New Mexico, to receive her master's degree in teaching blind children and worked in the Albuquerque public schools. She returned to Colorado in 2008 and earned a second degree in orientation and mobility from the University of Northern Colorado. In addition to her daily teaching duties as an itinerant teacher of blind students in Arvada, Colorado, Ms. Chacon spends evenings and weekends with her students, teaching them independent living skills such as cooking and cleaning or taking them on field trips to work on orientation and mobility skills. She is also active in the National Federation of the Blind, serving as president of the North Metro chapter of the NFB of Colorado and as a co-coordinator of the NFB of Colorado's Braille Enrichment for Literacy and Learning (BELL) programs.

Dr. Marc Maurer, President of the National Foundation for the Blind, said: "Ms. Chacon's exceptional work in the education field is proof of our conviction that blind people can compete on terms of equality. She has dedicated herself to educating blind students, providing much-needed instruction and also serving as a role model and mentor for her students, who are likely not often exposed to competent and successful blind people.

She is also an outstanding mentor for blind parents. The National Federation of the Blind commends Ms. Chacon for her outstanding professional accomplishments as well as her commitment to helping all blind people live the lives they want."

The Blind Educator of the Year Award carries with it a \$1,000 prize. While in Orlando, Ms. Chacon addressed several hundred people and have an opportunity to share the experiences and insights that she has gained from being a blind educator.
