running, throwing, skating, snowboarding, swimming, vaulting, skiing, or gymnastic routines, the goal is to give it your all. To practice and perfect. To try and to master. To take the wins and take the defeat, knowing both are parts of life. There is so much to be proud of from country to country, sport to sport, and event to event. It makes me wonder about hosting our own CO Olympics with our students with visual impairment, including blindness. In this edition, you will evidence of an exciting statewide braille competition. We can do so much more to build our students as individual and team competitors, as we prepare them for success today and moving ahead to the post-school world.

How about an Olympic Expanded Core Curriculum where students demonstrate their talents in compensatory skills, technology, social skills, recreation and leisure, career education, independent living, sensory efficiency, self determination, and O&M. Think of it: Low Vision Device Medley; Braille Fluency on the Beam; Beeper Ball Throw, Long Cane Marathon, Slate Stylus Free Style, Explain My Need for Accommodations Beach Volley Ball, Wheelchair Sprint, and Vocational Archery (hit the bulls-eye of your dream job) ... you get the idea! Scoring would be based on efficiency, accuracy, personal effort, and accomplishment. It would not be enough to read a page of braille with solid fluency, but with full comprehension of the text. Extra points for those who show judgment about whether to use a low vision device or use braille on a reading task. Self-advocacy in and out of the classroom may tip the scale from a silver to a gold medal! Knowing all many jobs in a grocery store and which ones could be for summer employment gets a bronze. Getting the job at the grocery store for the summer earns a gold!

Happy winter, everyone! Let's go for the gold throughout the rest of year to ensure our students have the team spirit and sportspersonship to build and nourish relationships and have the competitive knowledge and skills for school success and future employment. Go Team Colorado!

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recently announced its free new app, the <u>Milestone Tracker</u>, which allows users to track their child's development in a fun and easy way. This mobile app is a recent addition to CDC's popular suite of free, family friendly materials available through the <u>Learn the Signs. Act Early.</u> program.

The Milestone Tracker gives parents: (1) tips to help their child learn and grow; (2) a way to track milestones and to recognize delays; and (3) the ability to share this information with their child's healthcare provider.

Specifically, the app offers the following:

- Interactive milestone checklists for children ages 2 months through 5 years, illustrated with photos and videos
- Tips and activities to help children learn and grow
- Information on when to act early and talk with a doctor about developmental delays
- A personalized milestone summary that can be easily shared with doctors and other care providers
- Reminders for appointments and developmental screenings

# TOP NEWS: Department Releases Endrew F. Q & A

On March 22, 2017, the U.S. Supreme Court issued a unanimous decision in <u>Endrew F. v. Douglas County School District Re-1, 137 S.Ct. 988</u>. The court held that "to meet its substantive obligation under the *Individuals with Disabilities Education Act* (*IDEA*), a school must offer [a child] an IEP [individualized education program] reasonably calculated to enable a child to make progress appropriate in light of the child's circumstances.

As such, the U.S. Department of Education's Office of Special Education and Rehabilitative Services (OSERS) has released a question and answer (Q&A) document addressing the *Endrew F.* decision.

# BecDot Toy Created To Help Teach Kids To Read Braille!



The BecDot is an interactive children's toy that helps teach braille to children with visual impairment in a fun and affordable way. The toy, programmed through an app, uses NFC (near field communication) to identify objects placed on its surface. Objects that are tagged through the app and placed on the toy's surface are detected. The detection causes braille letters to appear, that spell out the word of the object.

The BecDot is a prototype that is intuitive and easy to program. It can be used to tag any toy the child already loves, and even comes equipped with internal speakers that can play the corresponding sound-effects of tagged objects. This innovative design is an affordable solution for parents seeking interactive, educational and sensory learning experiences for children with visual impairments.

# **Treasures from the APH Libraries**

Over 1,300 in-copyright items from the APH Migel Collection are now available for digital check-out from Open Library. Formerly available only in Daisy format, these items can be borrowed digitally for two weeks with a free Open Library digital library card account. Books can be viewed in your browser or downloaded in PDF or ePub format with Adobe Digital Editions. Up to five books may be checked out at a time. Each loan will expire after two weeks and be removed from your device.

Open Library is a project by Internet Archive. Their goal is to provide a webpage for every published book that brings the user as close as possible to the actual document – be it a scanned version at Internet Archive, or a link to a bookseller where a copy can be purchased. The project began in November 2007 and has added catalog records from some of the biggest libraries in the world. Open Library has 20 million records, 1.7 million digitized books, and links to external sources like WorldCat and Amazon when available.

To create an Open Library digital library card account, click the "sign up" link at the top right corner of <u>https://openlibrary.org</u> You will be prompted to enter your full name, user name, password, and email address. Click "sign up" when you are finished, and you will receive an email requesting verification of your account. Once you are registered, click the "log in" link at the top right corner of any page to enter your username and password. Click on the link to display a drop-down menu; here you can edit your Profile, manage your Loans, manage the Lists you create, edit your Settings, or log out.

**Field Testers Wanted:** APH is seeking field evaluators for the UEB Math Tutorial. #### **Make-And-Take Northern Region Meeting**

On January 26, 2018 ten TVIs from the northern region participated in a Make-and-Take get together following Diane Sheline's presentation at the CDE State B/VI Conference. Our region was very impressed with Diane's presentation on making CVI-friendly books for students with CVI and agreed that we should modify some popular books to be used for students in Phase I, II and III of CVI. At this make-and-take, the TVIs listed below created three book sets (one book to be used with students on each of the three phases/levels of CVI (so three of the same book, modified with increasing levels of visual complexity) to encourage use of functional vision, literacy and/or concept development and inclusion with peers.

The first book modified was "Where is Baby's Valentine;" the group agreed that this would be a fun story to modify because we are so close to Valentine's Day and because it covers positioning concepts (under the blanket, behind the chair, etc.) and it could be adapted to then be Where is (insert student's name)'s Valentine? Where you hide something (preferred, familiar object) in a real-life setting. Or,

when it is not Valentine's Day anymore, you could just say where "is the heart?" and then introduce a shapes lesson from there or something. The book was quite easy to modify to address each of the three levels of CVI strategies and instruction.

The second book modified was "Clifford's Family," which is the exact book that Diane Sheline showed us at the conference and demonstrated how to modify on her Strategy to See website. The group really wanted to create this book set using the same process that Diane had, so we were sure we were modifying correctly. It ended up being a group favorite and, again, had so many concepts interwoven into the story that we all agreed we could do a great deal with it for teaching other concepts to our students while sharing the story.

The third and final book modified was "Pete the Cat: Too Cool for School." Although this was our most challenging book to adapt, it was definitely the most rewarding; the entire group collaborated on strategies for modification and ended up coming away with a great book set to be used in each of the three levels of CVI development! The story covers clothing items and being comfortable with yourself and the decisions you make, which we all agreed could lead to many topics and conceptual independent living lessons in the future for our students.

By the end of the Make-and-Take meeting, each of the 8 districts from the northern region left with the three stories, with 3 different modifications for each story – twenty-four books in total! It was so great to hear about how each of us were going to implement the stories and bounce ideas off of one another. We are so grateful for having the opportunity to come together, share ideas, and create books that will undoubtedly benefit our students' in multiple areas of their lives!

#### An Administrator Crosswalk for Evaluation of LI Service Providers

The Michigan Department of Education-Low Incidence Outreach (MDE-LIO) has created a wonderful guidance document to assist administrators in evaluating educators working with students who are blind / visually impaired (BVI) ,Deaf/Hard of Hearing (DHH) and Certified Orientation and Mobility instructors (COMS).

The Administrator Crosswalk for Evaluating Low Incidence Service Providers is divided into six evaluation areas, which are aligned with all areas of the four MI state-approved evaluation tools. Your state may have different approved evaluations, but the Crosswalk gives valuable keys to the evaluation process.

Applicable professional standards are listed under each area of evaluation in the document, along with educator observables that provide specific knowledge and skill expectations. The educator observables are neither exclusive nor exhaustive, but are offered as guidance for evaluators and educators.

# Licensure Requirements for TVIs and COMSs

# Colorado Initial Licensure in the Endorsement Area of Visual Impairment

All candidates for initial educator licenses in Colorado have historically been required to take and pass one or more of the PLACE Content Assessments. Candidates for the special education endorsement in Special Education Specialist: Visual Impairment were mandated previously to pass the *PLACE Educator Content Assessment for Special Education Specialist: Severe Needs – Visually Impaired.* This particular content assessment is suspended currently as a licensure requirement. Whether this specific test will be revised to include a section specific to Unified English Braille or is fully replaced with another test as a licensure requirement is yet to be determined.

At this time, it is important to note there is not a Professional Services and Educator Licensing Unit content test that requires a candidate for the Special Education Specialist: Visual Impairment to demonstrate braille competency as a requirement of licensure.

It is further important to note that if such a content test is reinstated, it does not replace the Colorado Braille Competency Test administered through the Exceptional Student Services Unit. This latter test is not tied to CDE licensure.

# Colorado's 21st Century Skills

CDE launched an opportunity for feedback on updates to Colorado's 21st Century Skills as part of the standards review and revision process. The 21st Century Skills are the essential skills students should develop to be successful in the post-secondary education and the workplace, such as initiative and innovation. # **CDE Licensure Requirement for O&M Specialists**

If you are working in a Colorado administrative unit as a School Orientation and Mobility Specialists, please know that you **MUST** have a current CDE license as a special services provider: School O&M Specialist.

If you do not have this license, your scope of O and M services should be severely restricted to those skills that could already be taught by a TVI. Without this license, you are placing yourself and your AU at risk for O&M-related liability. There is no temporary or emergency licenses for School O&M Specialists.

# Federal Quota Census Data Continues to Be Taken Out of Context

In today's world of data-driven decision making, we are constantly on the lookout for information that will support or negate the position or direction we have chosen. The relatively small population of people who are blind or visually impaired makes counting—and statistics—especially challenging.

Accurately depicting the number of braille readers relative to that population is also difficult. A frequently misused statistic comes from the federal Quota census: writers apply data which is gathered by APH to meet federal requirements and to inform APH product development to scenarios that are not connected to the intended use of the data. We want to help researchers better understand the data we provide and its appropriate use, so the following statement will appear on the APH website and other communication sources.

#### Appropriate Use of Federal Quota Census Data

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**NOTICE: For** Press Members and Researchers: The number of students who read braille in the United States CANNOT be determined from these data.

Before citing these data in a publication, please contact the American Printing House for the Blind at <u>censusdata@aph.org</u>

The specific purpose of the annual Federal Quota Census is to register students in the United States and Outlying Areas who meet the definition of blindness and are therefore eligible for adapted educational materials from APH through the Act to Promote the Education of the Blind.

Statements regarding student literacy, use of appropriate learning media, and students taught in a specific medium cannot be supported using APH registration data.

#### **Tonal Braille**

Tonal Braille is a project we have been working on, at the Colorado School for the Deaf and the Blind. This project was inspired by the observation that many of our students have a strong memory and affinity for pitch. We have especially observed this with many of our students who are diagnosed with Optic Nerve Hypoplasia. In the Spring of 2017, we created a pilot study to examine the use of pitch as a memory aide to assist students with braille learning. In our method, each pitch was assigned a dot number. The pitches were played in order of the dots, in the letter which allowed for a unique blend of pitches for each braille letter. Utilizing the pitches of bells and singing, the students rehearsed the sounds of the letters by singing them back to the teacher.

We completed the study with eight students and have found success with our students' ability to recall the correct dot numbers. Our hope is to continue to look at this method to increase the retention, for young students who are learning the braille code. We would love to share our work and get feedback from TVIs around the state. Please let us know, if you are interested in being part of this project or learning more about it.

Greeley Schools (District 6) is looking for two full-time TVIs for the 2017-2018 school year. Thompson School District is looking to hire a part-time TVI/COMS.

At our October 6 northern region meeting, TVIs participated in a Make-and-Take get together following Diane Sheline's presentation at the CDE State B/VI conference. Our region was very impressed with Diane's assessment and literacy tools for students with CVI and agreed that we should create some of these tools to use with our students, as many of the TVIs in this region have a high population of students with CVI or multiple impairments. At this make-andtake, the TVIs created two tools to encourage visual attention and test the preferred visual field, visual acuity at near, and color preference. The first item created was an assessment book Diane titled "Yellow Dot, Yellow Dot, Where Are You?" or "Red Dot" respectively. The second item created was a Mardi Gras bead curtain to be used with either the mini lightbox or an all-in-one board or something similar.

Sarah also sees the children at *KidStreet* and provides consultation and training for their program and nursing staff.

Kimala is relocating to Grand Junction from Alaska where she has been an Early Intervention TSVI for the past 10 years (after graduating from UNC!). With Kimala on the Western Slope, children in Early Intervention will now have access to consistent services from a TSVI. In addition to their current teaching positions, Sally and Edie will be providing much needed O&M support for a few families each week in the Denver Metro area. We couldn't be more thrilled to have these incredibly talented TSVIs/COMSs join us in serving the families of our littlest ones across the state.

#### Anchor Center for Blind Children (Callie Robinson)

*Program Services:* We are thrilled to announce the hire of Elise Darrow as the newest addition to our TVI team. Elise brings a delightful personality with a commitment and professionalism that will continue to elevate our team's success.

Our program continues to focus on understanding and assessing children with CVI, as we are proud to acknowledge Karen Jamison who has finished the Perkins CVI course and has received the national credential. Tammy Miller and Callie Robinson are also now enrolled in the Spring Perkins CVI course.

We are also proud to announce we will be offering the VIISA and INSITE birth to 5 training courses for children with visual impairments including additional disabilities beginning January 2018. We are working closely with UNC to include an option for college credit.

*Family Services:* October 2017: Anchor Center held a family event at Colorado's Children's Museum that provided free admission and a free year's membership for the families in attendance. We are teaming up with Colorado Center for the Blind to collaborate on a series of braille classes to offer Anchor Center families that will begin in January 2018. This month's parent education class covered the topic of transition to preschool and/or public school. The topic of grief issues was also discussed in October with infant and toddler parents.

November 2017: Our parent peer group began for preschool parents and one for infant/toddler parents as an opportunity to gather together and learn about various topics of interest to families of children with visual impairments. The topic this month was the process and use of a guide dog. We had a graduate of Anchor Center come and speak to families about her experience going through the process to be matched with a guide dog and how it has been having her own guide dog to date.

The parent peer group also covered the topic of holiday travel with a child with visual impairment and how to navigate through the holidays with all the festivities and changes in routine for your child. In honor of National Caregiver's month we spoke about self-care and shared how parents care for themselves while caring for their children and relationships. Handouts were provided to parents with ideas of how to incorporate self-care in their daily routines.

For our parent pull-out training we had a panel of home health professionals come and speak to parents about their options with supports and services for their child with visual impairment.

Book orders for next year are due April 1, 2018. This new date is being implemented for the first time this fiscal year so please work with your curriculum departments to plan accordingly.

The final release of "Braille Formats, 2016" is now available on the BANA website: The 2016 revision of *Braille Formats: Principles of Print-to-Braille Transcription* aligns BANA's braille formatting guidelines with Unified English Braille (UEB). Earlier this year, BANA posted a pre-publication version and offered an open comment period for users to provide input. BANA has incorporated this feedback and now provides this final publication on the BANA website. We have also posted a change log that lists critical changes made to the Pre-Publication version. Links are provided below.

*Braille Formats: Principles of Print-to-Braille Transcription, 2016* is available in three accessible electronic versions: BRF, enhanced PDF, and online HTML. Hard copy print and braille will be available at a later date from the American Printing House for the Blind (APH).

BANA is grateful to its Braille Formats Committee for their diligent work in revising BANA's formatting guidelines to align with UEB. We especially thank Cindi Laurent, Formats Committee Chair, and Clovernook's Saul Garza, Board Liaison to the Formats Committee, for their expertise in braille transcription, which made this revision possible, and for their tenacity in creating the BRF files.

We also owe a huge debt of gratitude to BANA Publications Committee members Susan Christensen, Sandy Smith, and Ruth Rozen for their immense skill and tireless work in creating the PDF and HTML versions of *Braille Formats, 2016*, and for assuring accessibility of its content.

#### Available versions:

- BRF download: BRF (zipped) and BRF (zipped individual BRF files)
- *PDF download*: individual PDF files (zipped), single PDF file (zipped), enhanced PDF portfolio (zipped) is a collection of individual files in a single PDF container. The portfolio is useful for those who want the files packaged together. Those who use screen readers will likely find the individual files easier to use.
- Online: HTML version: This online version includes a customized search function specific to the online files. The HTML version is not formatted for printing.
- *Change Log for Braille Formats 2016:* The Change Log provides a list of the critical changes made to the Pre-Publication version. PDF file, Excel file available.

The Federal Quota count is the first Monday in January annually. This year's count is on Monday, January 1, 2018. The biggest change for this year's count is the additional requirement of signed parent permission forms. As far as we know, this will be a one-time requirement, and there will not be an annual requirement to obtain signatures.

The CIMC does not provide administrative units with tractor feed (continuous feed) braille paper for use with braille embossers. Several years ago, Directors of Special Education agreed to purchase continuous feed paper for use in their own administrative units (AUs). The CIMC shipped every AU in the state a 2-year supply of paper based on their average paper orders. An explanation of this new procedure was disseminated via email, the CDE newsletter, and posted to the CIMC website. Recently, several districts have been inquiring about ordering paper. Please contact the CIMC, if you need additional assistance of available braille paper vendors.

*From the December 2017 APH News:* On January 23, 2018, the American Printing House for the Blind will celebrate 160 years of being in business. To celebrate this significant milestone, APH will host a community-wide Open House on Tuesday, January 23. During the day's festivities, they will kick off a National Writing Contest for students and adults who are visually impaired and the professionals who work with them every day. The deadline to submit work for this contest will be June 1, 2018, and they will celebrate the winning essays in each age group at APH's 160th Anniversary Banquet to be held on October 5, 2018 during our Annual Meeting. Cash prizes will be offered for first, second, and third place winners.

#### CSDB – School for the Blind (Jamie Lugo)

*Student News and Opportunities:* On October 5<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup> - 12<sup>th</sup> grade students attend the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation Resource Expo. The upper elementary and supported secondary students worked together to create their very own comic book characters. They created an adventure and costume to match their characters. They dressed up as their comic book character and created comic books panes and stories during literacy class as their final project.

The elementary geography students learned about Colorado geography and map-making. They all participated in an in-class competition called "Map Masters." The secondary classes just finished up a unit learning about natural disasters. Students discussed ways to help victims of tragedy and how to prepare for common emergencies in Colorado. Two seniors are enrolled in an online Hadley Braille Music class.

The Science classes are performed sheep pluck dissections (lungs, trachea, and heart) to study the respiratory system. Our Friday Workshop Theme for the months of September and October was Orientation and Mobility. Students participated in various activities to include a cardinal directions scavenger hunt, O&M bloopers, and obstacle courses under blindfolds or simulators. Our Friday Workshop Theme for the months of November and December is Social Skills. We hosted our 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Lunch in the Dark on December 1<sup>st</sup>. A handful of students participated in the Veterans 5K with Achilles Running Club and USABA on November 11<sup>th</sup>. Students from CSDB attended the Low Vision Clinic on November 30<sup>th</sup>. Two of the student leaders from the junior class attended CASB to represent CSDB. *Campus Events*: CSDB Celebrated White Cane Day at Acacia Park in Colorado Springs on October 13<sup>th</sup> with speeches, music from the Bulldog Band, a picnic lunch, and yard games. The National Federation of the Blind of Colorado (NFBCO) and The Colorado School for the Deaf and the Blind hosted a screening of "Do You Dream in Color?" at the Stargazers Theatre on October 18<sup>th</sup>. CSDB hosted the New Mexico School for the Blind and Visually Impaired during our Homecoming weekend, October 20<sup>th</sup> - 22<sup>nd</sup>.

*Parent News:* Parent Braille Classes will be starting up 2<sup>nd</sup> semester on Tuesday nights from 5:30—6:30 p.m. 9 sessions beginning January 23<sup>rd</sup> and ending March 20<sup>th</sup>.

#### **CSDB Outreach Services (Sara Noel)**

We held our annual Fall Festival on October 29, 2017. Six families attended and participated in art, music and movement activities. CSDB staff led the activities from CSDB and the parents remarked that they loved getting to talk to the teachers and learn about new ways to engage their children.

We held the Southern Region Low Vision Evaluation Clinic on Thursday November 30<sup>th</sup> and Friday, December 1<sup>st</sup>. The location of the clinic was Low Vision Services of Southern Colorado. Nine students received evaluations from: CSDB – 4 appointments, Mount Evans BOCES (Bailey) – 1 appointment, El Paso County District 8 (Fountain Fort Carson) -3 appointments, El Paso County District 12 (Cheyenne Mountain) – 1 appointment.

Colorado Braille Challenge-Denver Metro will be held at the Colorado Center for the Blind on January 25, 2018.

#### University of Northern Colorado – VI Program (Paula Conroy)

Congratulations to our five December graduates from the Visual Impairment Specialist program. Two of these graduates are from Colorado: Erin Kerr and Elise Darrow. They will both be completing their O&M coursework over the next year. Cathy Smyth graduated with her doctorate this semester as well. This is quite an accomplishment and we are all very proud of her.

We are in the midst of preparing for another reaccreditation review through CDE and the Higher Learning Commission. This process will take place in 2018 with deadlines throughout the upcoming year. Our programs at UNC continue to have healthy enrollment. We have accepted our students for the first year of the new Personnel Preparation grant, which focuses on behavior. These students will take supplemental coursework in behavior intervention techniques for students with visual impairment. This includes students diagnosed with autism and those without an autism diagnoses. In our research we have found that behavior intervention is a real area need in our field.

The new grant award is in progress. The slate is currently full for this first cohort. This includes people from out of state, as well as Colorado. The grant offers some financial supplement to the fiscal requirements of the program. Candidates will also have personal financial requirements.

#### **Colorado Department of Education (Tanni Anthony)**

**Colorado Services for Children and Youth with Combined Vision and Hearing Loss Project**: We are in the final year of our five-year cycle. The grant is funded from October 1, 2013 through September 30, 2018.

The project's mission is free technical assistance to parents and services providers of children and youth, ages birth through 21 and who are deaf-blind or who have both a vision and a hearing loss. The project has a lending library and a website with a multitude of electronic resources that are available to families and educational personnel.

*Project Staff:* Tanni Anthony and Gina Herrera coordinate the grant project. We have three Technical Assistance Specialists. Callie Robinson has been hired to do specific work on the topic of interveners. She will be building networking opportunities for our existing interveners and information materials on the role of the interveners. Callie joins Kathryn Daniels and Wendy Stoltman as Technical Assistance (TA) Specialists for the project. Kathryn and Wendy provide onsite child-specific consultation and customized training to the educational teams of the children with deaf-blindness. Shannon Cannizzaro is our Family Specialist. Annual Deaf-Blind Census: The December 1, 2017 Census forms were mailed to agency and school district contract personnel by mid-November and are due back into CDE by January 15, 2018. Thank you in advance for helping to keep our census data up-to-date. A child can be registered at any time in the school year. If you work with a learner with both vision and hearing loss, please be sure to work with Tanni to register the child. All learners identified as having combined vision and hearing loss are eligible for free technical assistance.

*Summer Institute:* The dates, topic, and presenter(s) have not yet been determined.

Annual CDE O&M Seminar: The 2017 CDE O&M Seminar will be held on May 4-5, 2018. Dr. Wendy Sapp will train on O&M for learners with deaf-blindness and other disabilities on Friday, May 4<sup>th</sup>Susan Chandler will train on balance / body work on Friday, May 5<sup>th</sup>. The training will be held at the Double Tree Hotel on Quebec Street in Denver. Tanni will be sending out the flyer and registration information by mid-February.

*CDE Low Vision Evaluation Clinics*: Three clinics have happened thus far in the school year with favorable results. They have been held in the Western, Northern, and Southern regions. The Metro Low Vision Clinic is scheduled for February. There will also be one additional day clinic in the Southern Region. We thank our Low Vision Evaluation Clinic Team of Dr. Tom Theune, Wendy Stoltman, Jim Olson, and Debbie Haberkorn.

*Recruitment and Retention:* We have a 1 FTE opening in Thompson School District, two full time TVI/COMS openings in Greeley, a full time opening in Cherry Creek, and possible full time TVI/COMS opening in Pikes Peak BOCES. We continue have work to do to be proactive with existing and anticipated openings across the state. CSDB just filled a newly vacant position with TVI Julie Swegle. Fort Collins filled a TVI position with TVI Vicki Chinski. Denver Public Schools has hired Jill Bookwalter and Morgan Fitzpatrick as new TVIs to their crew. It is so exciting to see four new TVIs employed by Colorado school districts!

*Listservs:* The CDE ESSU maintains three separate listservs specific to personnel working in BVI programs in Colorado school districts. One is specific to Colorado TVIs and COMSs. The second one is specific to Colorado braillists. The third is specific to Colorado TVIs and braillists. It is important to remind all users of these listservs that personally identifiable information (PII) on students and parents should never be posted in any listserv messages. If anyone has questions about the listservs, please be in touch with Tanni.

*Parent Database:* We currently have about 210 parents registered on the CDE Parent Database. This is out of over 1,214 families across the state. The database is used only to mail out the *Keeping in Touch* newsletter and, on rare occasion, other mailings. It is important to keep it maintained with accurate addresses AND families of children with visual impairment, including blindness that are currently enrolled in our Colorado early intervention or public school programs. As children graduate or families move out of state, we need to ensure that we remove those families. As new families come into the system, please help Tanni to be proactive with getting families registered on the database. This is a voluntary process – so families need to complete and sign their registration forms.

*0-5 Vision Screening Committee:* The CDE is updated its *0-5 Vision Screening Guidelines*. Committee members include Tanni Anthony, Paula Landry, and Wendy Stoltman from our TVI community.

*Braille Competency:* The CDE Braille Committee just did an item analysis review of the multiple choice test portion of the Colorado Braille Competency Test. The review targeted items that have a higher-than-expected error frequency rate. No question was found to be incorrect, but three small adjustments were made to the design of the question or the provided answer slates. The committee is also in the process of finalizing a Practice UEB Test that will be posted on the CDE website.

#### **DISCUSSION ITEMS**

#### Parent Need Survey

The Vision Coalition has a strong commitment to provide support opportunities for Colorado families with a child with visual impairment, including blindness. In this capacity, it is critical to glean the needs of families to the extent possible on a statewide basis. A Parent Needs Survey was disseminated to families of children with visual impairment, including blindness in 2008. That survey was mailed to parents who receive the *Keeping in Touch* newsletter though CDE, as well as personal dissemination of the survey to parents by TVIs. That survey was reviewed and suggestions were made for updated content. <u>Assignment:</u> Tanni will make the needed adjustments and return the next draft iteration to the Vision Coalition members by January 15<sup>th</sup>. The finalized survey will be mailed to families receiving the KIT newsletter in hard copy format. Families will also have the option of completing the survey electronically via Survey Monkey. TVIs will also be asked to share the survey / survey link with families.

#### Eye Report Form

Julie has updated the example state Eye Report Form. Our goal is a reasonably standard Eye Report Form for TVIs to use across the state, rather than each TVI developing their own. The one we finalize will be a template that people can customize (if this is truly needed beyond contact information). <u>Assignment:</u> Tanni will send to the TVIs for their recommendations for changes. The deadline for feedback will be January 15, 2018. <u>Assignment:</u> Paula Landry will edit specific to the 0-2 populations and then we will solicit feedback from A Shared Vision, Anchor Center, Developmental Pathways, and CSDB Infant/Toddler Program.

#### **Eligibility for Visual impairment, Including Blindness**

Tanni will be presenting the OSEP Memo specific to the eligibility category of Visual Impairment, Including Blindness with the State Director Leadership Team (SDLT) on December 14<sup>th</sup>. The SDLT is a composite group of special education directors who represent their geographical representation. A goal is to seek support to create a small stakeholder group to make recommendations about revising the ECEA criteria of this eligibility category.

There was considerable discussion about the needs of students with oculomotor-based visual problems. <u>Assignment:</u> It is suggested that we work with the optometric community to learn more about accommodations specific to poor binocularity, convergence insufficiency, etc.

#### **Resource Allocation Document (Amber Rundle Kahn)**

Amber shared that the workgroup has completed each section of the document. It moved from an original of six sessions to now 10 sections. The former medical section has been deleted and the ECC section on Sensory Efficiency was not included. There will be language that details the need for full-bodied sensory efficiency assessment with attention to programmatic implications. The latter can be also addressed in the needs section specific to the results of the Learning Media Assessment. This document is not used to determine eligibility, but after eligibility is determined. This document is not intended to determine O&M service needs. It also is recommended that the Vision Services Severity Rating Scale for Students with Additional Disabilities from the Michigan Department of Education supplement the proposed CDE Guidelines for a Caseload Formula tool further for learners with VI and additional disabilities.

<u>Assignment:</u> Amber and crew will complete the final tweaks on the document. It will then go out for a quick field review before a deliberate pilot. Tanni will also bring the document to the SDLT for their input and review. Amber, Nancy, and Tanni will review the *Vision Services Severity Rating Scale for Students with Additional Disabilities* from the Michigan Department of Education.

#### **Retention and Recruitment**

It is critical that Colorado develop a strong strategic plan for retention and recruitment of its VI-specific trained workforce. We are entering a phase ahead of significant retirements as many TVIs and COMSs prepare to leave the field after a career of service. We also need to be ready for unexpected vacancies as personnel leave the state or even the field. Tanni has asked our state to let her know of expected vacancies for this next school year, in addition to the currently unfilled positions. At this point in time, it is expected that there may be up to 10 vacancies across our state.

A key strategy will be an organized recruitment effort. Key factors include:

- Proactive recruitment of personnel training programs in the winter/ spring of the school year
- Specific recruitment target of personnel with BA degrees
- Specific recruitment target of personnel who have had experiences with learners with visual impairment, including blindness and/or significant support needs and/or the fields of TVI / COMS

Tanni and Paula Conroy have met twice with Poudre School District special education leadership and district Human Resources on the topic of recruitment and retention. Information from these meetings, as well as the VC discussion have results in the following proposed next steps:

#### Steps for Recruitment

- Anticipate vacancies be in the know of expected retirements
- Develop recruitment materials such as a "recruitment module" to use for presentations
- Be deliberate with recruitment efforts of both undergraduate and MA level educators
  - ⇒ Provide experience with students with visual impairments, including learners with additional disabilities
  - $\Rightarrow$  Provide experience with TVIs and/or COMS
- Deliberately appeal to undergraduates
  - ✓ Community Colleges (with a prepared module)
  - ✓ Career Center
  - ✓ Extended Campus UNC
  - ✓ Finding undergrads to come to VI specific events

#### January—February 2018 KIT

- Explore tuition reimbursement / incentive pay through CDE ESSU
- Explore funding sources such as the Lions Club to sponsor graduate training
- Work with HR to:
  - ✓ Honor years of teaching experience do not cap an expert teaching of veteran personnel
  - ✓ Hire personnel on temporary authorizations
  - ✓ Increase salary of personnel who are dual certified as TVIs / COMs
- Utilize mentor supports for newly hired personnel
- Be a host site for a practicum or intern student (both in and out of state)

- Define the role of the TVI for administrators
- Define the role of the COMS for administrators
- Identify reasonable caseload expectations
- Provide evaluation support documents to administrators
- Hire braillists to support the braille production needs of the students.
- Understand the abilities and limitations of the role of a braillist and a VI paraprofessional
- Allow opportunities for field-specific training, networking, and support
- Consider stipends to support personnel to have an addition credential such as COMS
- Utilize mentor support for new personnel.

#### 2018 American Foundation for the Blind Scholarships

- **The Rudolph Dillman Memorial Scholarship**: Four scholarships of \$2,500 each to undergraduates or graduates who are studying full-time in the field of rehabilitation or education of persons who are blind and/or visually impaired.
- **The Paul and Ellen Ruckes Scholarship**: Two scholarships of \$2,000 each to a full-time undergraduate or graduate student in the field of engineering or in computer, physical, or life sciences.
- The R.L. Gillette, Gladys C. Anderson, and Karen D. Carsel Memorial Scholarship: One scholarship of \$3,500 given to a female undergraduate student studying music. #### NFB Kenneth Jernigan Scholarship

The American Action Fund for Blind Children and Adults annually sponsors the largest scholarship granted in the United States to a legally blind person\*. Named the Kenneth Jernigan Scholarship, it honors the man who changed perceptions regarding the capabilities of the blind in this country and throughout the world. Dr. Jernigan, who was active in affairs of the blind for over half a century, taught that with proper training in the skills of blindness and a proper attitude toward blindness, any blind person can be as successful as a similarly situated sighted person. Finally, Dr. Jernigan taught that the real barrier to success as a blind person is the public's misconceptions concerning blindness, often shared and even affirmed by the blind themselves.

The Kenneth Jernigan Scholarship is given annually to a legally blind student who exemplifies the fruits of Dr. Jernigan's teachings. The Kenneth Jernigan Scholarship is valued at \$12,000.

Applications for this scholarship are available for five months, from November 1 to March 31 of the following year.
