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Executive Summary

Current Colorado law does not provide for full funding of the excess costs for students receiving special education services. In 2017-18 state funding accounted for 24 percent of the costs for providing special education services (see Figure 1). The Special Education Fiscal Advisory Committee (SEFAC) feels strongly that state and federal funding should fully provide for the excess costs of providing special education services.

Tier A (all students with disabilities) per student funding of \$1,250 has not increased since 2006. Tier B (students with more significant needs due to the severity of the disability) per student funding in 2018-19 was still approximately 31.4 percent of the statutory maximum of \$6,000. This maximum is supplementary to the \$1,250 for all students with individualized education programs (IEPs) (Tier A). The Tier B allocation for 2019-20 is \$1,873 per student, and the \$22 million appropriated for Tier B students in FY 2019-20 increased this by \$962 per student, totaling \$2,835 per student. In summary, the \$22 million appropriated in FY 2019-20 increased Tier B funding for each eligible student from 31 percent to 47 percent of the statutory maximum of \$6,000.

Special education student increases require a proportionate increase in funding in Tier A with maintenance of Tier B funding levels in order to remain at least at the 47 percent funding for Tier B.

Given this funding history, the SEFAC is making the following recommendations for the 2020 legislative session:

Tier A Recommendation:

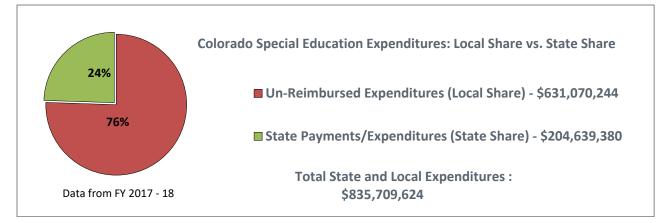
 Add \$26.1 million to the total annual appropriation for Tier A without reducing the current Tier B appropriation. Based on the December 1, 2018 pupil count, this will increase Tier A perstudent funding by \$250, to a \$1,500 per-student level. In future years, annually increase the Tier A per-student funding amount of \$1,500 by the Denver/Aurora/Lakewood Consumer Price Index.

Tier B Recommendation:

- Increase the level of Tier B appropriations by \$24.8 million to bring the per-student allocation to approximately 75 percent of the statutory maximum. In subsequent years, annually increase funding by \$500 per student until the statutory maximum level of \$6,000 is reached.
- Re-evaluate the \$6,000 threshold based on current expenditures and develop a mechanism for annual increases in Tier B.

Introduction

Colorado House Bill 06-1375 established SEFAC by amending Article 20 of Title 22, Colorado Revised Statutes (CRS). As specified in section 22-20-114.5 C.R.S., members of SEFAC were first appointed by the State Board of Education (SBE) on Sept. 14, 2006. HB 11-1277, effective Aug. 10, 2011, changed the composition of SEFAC membership for the 2011-12 school year and all subsequent years. SEFAC membership consists of 12 members, as follows:

- A representative from the unit in the department responsible for the administration of special education programs;
- A special education director with expertise in special education finance from a board of cooperative services;
- A business official from a large urban or suburban administrative unit (AU);
- A business official from a small rural AU; and
- Eight special education specialists with appropriate statewide geographic representation.

SEFAC was scheduled to repeal on July 1, 2016. Pursuant to section 2-3-1203 C.R.S., the Department of Regulatory Agencies completed a review of this committee and submitted its findings to the General Assembly. HB 16-1171 continued SEFAC until Sept. 1, 2021.

The work of the Committee consists of:

- Determining the form and manner by which AUs document the high costs they have incurred and by which they may apply to the committee for a high-cost reimbursement grant for either out-of-district or in-district high-cost placements (section 22-20-114.5 (3)(a));
- Using 50 percent of the total appropriation to award grants to AUs for out-of-district placements and the remaining 50 percent to award grants to AUs for in-district placements (section 22-20-114.5 (3)(a.5));
- Determining whether to award a grant to an AU, considering for each AU's application/s the annual audited operating expenses for the preceding budget year and the percentage of those expenditures that represent the high costs incurred in the previous budget year (section 22-20-114.5 (3)(b)(I));
- Awarding grants for out-of-district placements by first prioritizing the AUs that spent the highest percentages, based on the AU's annual audited operating expenses in the preceding budget year, on high costs incurred in the previous budget year in providing special education services to students in such placements (section 22-20-114.5 (3)(b)(II)(A));
- Awarding grants for in-district placements by first prioritizing the AUs that spent the highest percentages, based on the AU's annual audited operating expenses in the preceding budget year, on high costs incurred in the previous budget year in providing special education services to students in such placements (section 22-20-114.5 (3)(b)(II)(B));



- Disqualifying any applications for AUs that have failed to provide the department with the data collected concerning special education programs as required by section 22-20-114 (6), including the count of assessed students receiving special education services (section 22-20-114.5 (3)(d));
- Determining, on an annual basis, the threshold amount of costs incurred in providing special education services to a child with disabilities above which an AU may request reimbursement in the form of a grant (section 22-20-114.5 (3)(e));
- Reviewing AU high-cost applications;
- Recommending allocations to SBE developed by the committee from AU applications;
- Developing the statutorily required report (section 22-20-114.5 (5)); and
- Making recommendations regarding the future funding of special education (section 22-20-114.5 (5)).

The content of this report fulfills the responsibility of the SEFAC to provide recommendations regarding future funding of special education. This report represents actual audited expenses incurred by AUs during the 2017-18 school year with reimbursement payments to AUs made in fiscal year 2018-19.

Analysis of Special Education Data

Pursuant to section 22-20-114.5 (4), C.R.S. the department shall gather and provide to SEFAC data that includes but need not be limited to the following:

- The extent to which the amount of special education funding appropriated pursuant to section 22-20-114 (1) is distributed based on the needs of children with disabilities and the severity of the needs of such children (see Appendix A);
- The number of children with disabilities who receive special education services from each AU and the nature of the disability of each child who receives special education services from each AU (see Appendix B);
- Patterns of identifying children with disabilities that include but need not be limited to recognized incidence rates of over- and under-identification of children with disabilities at the AU, state and national levels;
- The number of hours of special education services that each AU provides, disaggregated by disability; and
- The percentage of the school day during which children with disabilities receive special education services from the AU, disaggregated by disability.

Based on analysis of the 2017-18 school year, the committee made the following observations regarding Tier A and Tier B funding.



Tier A and Tier B Funding

Funding under the Exceptional Children's Education Act (ECEA) is allocated for all students with disabilities identified for special education under Tier A for students who generally, but not always, will have more significant needs due to the severity of the disability under Tier B.

Tier A

- Students with disabilities identified for special education services and served in 2018 equal 11.47 percent of the total student population.
- Students with disabilities total served count increased by 2.8 percent, while total population grew by .13 percent, which reflects a 2,054 percent, or more than 21 times, the percent increase over total student population.
- Each AU receives \$1,250 for each student identified for special education services from the prior-year December 1 count. This amount has remained unchanged since 2006; there has not been an adjustment for inflation.
- When there is an increase in the number of special education students in an AU from one year to the next, the AU provides services with no revenue for the student for a full year.
- The number of 2015-16 total students identified as special education and served was 94,565. The number of 2018-19 total students identified as special education and served was 104,569. This increase of 10,004 students marks a 10.58 percent increase in total students served over the four-year period (see Appendix B).
- Funding of Tier A proportionately increased consistent with the total number of students with disabilities, equaling a 0 percent increase of per-pupil funding.

Tier B

- From the 2015-16 school year, when funding was at its height of \$2,131 per Tier B student, to 2018-19, when Tier B funding was \$1,886, per student funding decreased by 11.5 percent.
- Students funded in Tier B represent approximately 2.53 percent of the total student population and equal 22.08 percent of all funded Tier A students in the 2018-19 count of students with disabilities (the December 1, 2018 count).
- In school year 2015-16, AUs served a total of 20,814 students identified as Tier B. In school year 2018-19, a total of 22,891 students were identified as Tier B. This increase of 2,077 students marks a 9.98 percent increase in total students identified as Tier B and served over the four-year period (see Appendix B).
- Tier B consists of students identified with one or more of the following disabilities:
 - Visual Impairment, including blindness
 - Hearing Impairment, including deafness
 - o Deaf-blindness
 - o Serious Emotional Disability
 - o Autism Spectrum Disorders



- o Traumatic Brain Injury
- o Multiple Disabilities
- o Intellectual Disability
- Statute allows up to a \$6,000 per-pupil for a limited percentage of eligible Tier B students.
- In 2018-19, actual Tier B funding was \$1,886 per eligible student, which is 31.4 percent of the \$6,000 per-pupil maximum for Tier B students (see Appendix C).

Flat per-pupil funding since 2006-07 for Tier A at \$1,250 per student has not kept up with the increase in cost of services. There is fluctuating funding for Tier B, ranging from 35.5 percent of the \$6,000 maximum in 2015-16 (the highest-funded level) to 31.4 percent of \$6,000 in 2018-19.

The funding level in fiscal year 2018-19 of \$1,886 per student identified as Tier B still falls far short of the statutory maximum of \$6,000 per student. In fact, it has decreased by \$121 per student since fiscal year 2017-18. The school districts must shoulder the increase in costs of educating both students identified as Tier A and Tier B.





The Gap Analysis (see Appendix E), based on the December 1, 2017 funded count, identifies that the average special education cost for a student with disabilities in fiscal year 2017-18 was \$9,698. Comparing that average cost with the fiscal year 2017-18 state revenue of \$1,250 for Tier A, \$2,007 for eligible students identified as Tier B and \$32.8 million in preschool special education funding plus federal funding, there remains a 64 percent gap between available funding and costs to educate students with disabilities in Colorado. (Excluding federal funding and the expenditures offset by those funds, there is a 76 percent gap in funding in Colorado).

As of 2017-18, Colorado school districts were paying \$631,070,244 in unreimbursed special education costs for students with disabilities.

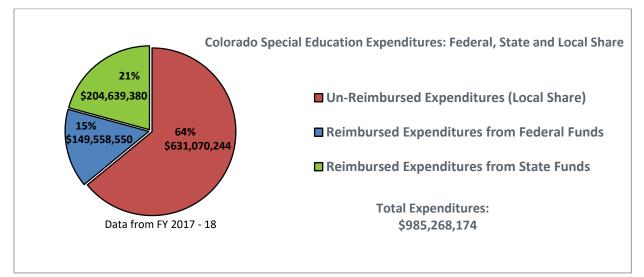
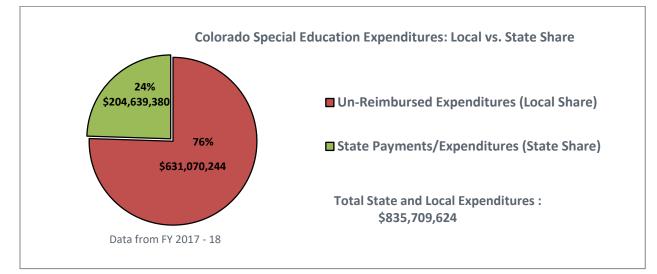

In 2017-18, local district general funds covered 76 percent of the special education program costs; up from 75 percent in the prior year. These costs represent \$18,487,953 more than the 2016-17 school year. In comparison, the state paid, via the ECEA and funding for preschoolers with disabilities, 24 percent of state and locally funded special education expenditures, or 24 cents of each dollar of a district's special education expenditures. While the state increased funding in 2017-18 by \$3,642,589 over the 2016-17 funding, this increase did not keep pace with the increased costs of special education. As a result, even though state funding increased, the percentage of costs covered by state funding decreased by 1 percent, going from 25 percent to 24 percent.

High-Cost Out-of-District and In-District Reimbursement

Section 22-20-114.5 (5), C.R.S., as amended, requires the SEFAC to submit an annual report to the House and Senate education committees of the Colorado legislature that includes, at a minimum, a list of the AUs that applied for and received high-cost reimbursement during the preceding budget year. This report covers costs from 2017-18, paid in June 2019.

Because the SEFAC's work largely reflects the data obtained from a voluntary application process, this report does not fully reflect the additional funding needed to support the costs of educating students with disabilities in high-cost out-of-district and in-district placements in Colorado.

A total of \$4 million was appropriated under ECEA to reimburse AUs for students in high-cost placements or programs. The total appropriation consists of \$2 million for students in high-cost out-of-district placements or programs, and \$2 million for students in high-cost in-district placements or programs. This report represents the 13th year of high-cost reimbursements and the 11th year that a total of \$4 million was appropriated to reimburse AUs for students identified as high cost and being served. The SEFAC maintained the eligibility threshold for reimbursement at \$40,000 per student for high-cost out-of-district placements and at \$25,000 per student for high-cost in-district placements.

The SEFAC has adopted the following values to guide the decision-making process:

- It is essential to communicate to the AUs that high-cost reimbursements are awarded on an annual basis and fluctuate depending on the relative fiscal impact per district and the total dollar amount represented in the applications received for that year;
- Allowable costs should include only those incurred for the individual child, related to special education services, and not general education and/or special education overhead costs that would otherwise already be incurred by the AU; and
- Applications should be reimbursed at 100 percent of expenditures minus revenues until money runs out in order to honor the legislative intent of meaningful reimbursement.

The SEFAC defined a child eligible for high-cost reimbursement as any child with a disability, having an IEP and whose services cost more than the defined threshold, and the intensity of special education services and fiscal impact on the total district expenditures must differ significantly in the costs for other children receiving special education services in that AU.



Using the same uniform process annually since 2006, the SEFAC reviewed applications from AUs and determined which grant applications to approve and the amounts to be awarded after applicable revenues were deducted from the costs submitted for reimbursement. In making these decisions, the SEFAC considered each district's annual expenditures for special education and the percentage those expenditures represented of the district's total audited expenditures.

The following is a summary of the applications received for 2017-18 expenditures and paid in June 2019:

- Number of Applications Funded:
 - The \$2 million appropriated for out-of-district applications funded 26 of 136 applications (19 percent); and
 - The \$2 million appropriated for in-district applications funded 84 of 229 applications (37 percent).
- Number of AUs Receiving Funding:
 - Out-of-District: 23 of 66 AUs submitted high-cost applications;
 10 AUs received funding for all or some of the applications submitted; and
 - In-District: 23 of 66 AUs submitted high-cost applications;
 14 AUs received funding for all or some of the applications submitted.

Educational Orphans

The ECEA allocates \$500,000 for Educational Orphans. An Educational Orphan is defined as a child with a disability for whom parental rights have been relinquished by the parents or have been terminated by the court; the parents of whom are incarcerated; the parents of whom cannot be located; or the parents of whom reside out of state but the Department of Human Services has placed the child within the AU or who is legally emancipated (section 22-20-114 (1)(a)(I)(B), C.R.S., as amended).

The most current data available is for the 2018-19 school year. Five AUs received funding under this part for 26 children reported in the 2017-18 December count (December 1, 2017). The reimbursement was \$11,231 per pupil. Actual cost for Educational Orphans in this year did not equal the \$500,000 allocation, and the balance of \$207,982 was distributed as Tier B funds (see Appendix A).

In addition to the Educational Orphans funding, the AUs serving these students also receive \$1,250 Tier A funding per child. Most of these children have disabilities eligible for Tier B funding; therefore, the AUs also potentially received funding under Tier B.

Birth to Age Three Evaluations (Part C)

Funding is provided under the ECEA for evaluations of children, birth to age three. For 2018-19, \$2,706,561 was appropriated to offset costs incurred by AUs in conducting Child Find activities for children who are less than three years of age for eligibility in Part C services under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). This birth-through-three, Child Find activity is required under section 22-20-118, C.R.S.. The payment for 2018-19 is based on evaluations of 8,189 children in school year 2017-18 at a reimbursement rate of \$330.51 per child (see Appendix A).





Recommendations of the Committee

Pursuant to section 22-20-114.5 (4), C.R.S., the SEFAC is to recommend changes, if any, to the manner of distributing funds to AUs for special education expenditures. In addition, the SEFAC is to recommend changes, if any, to the categorization of children with disabilities for Tier A and Tier B children for the purpose of distributing funds.

Tier A (all students with disabilities) per-student funding of \$1,250 has not increased since 2006. Tier B (students with more-significant needs due to the severity of the disability) per-student funding in 2018-19 is approximately 31.4 percent of the statutory maximum of \$6,000. Colorado statute authorizes funding for each Tier B eligible student at an additional \$6,000, supplementary to the \$1,250 for all students with IEPs (Tier A). The allocation for Tier B in 2019-20 is \$1,873 (31 percent of the \$6,000), and the additional \$22 million appropriated for Tier B students increased this by \$962 per student, which totals \$2,835 per student or 47 percent of the maximum \$6,000 per student. The \$22 million appropriation increased Tier B funding for each eligible student from 31 percent to 47 percent of the \$6,000 statutory maximum.

Special education student cost increases require a proportionate increase in funding in Tier A with maintenance of Tier B funding levels in order to remain at least at the 47 percent funding for Tier B.

The percentage of reimbursed expenditures for Educational Orphans is larger than the percentage of funding for both Tier A and Tier B.

Subsequently, the SEFAC is making the following recommendations for the 2020 legislative session:

Tier A Recommendation:

 Increase the total annual appropriation for Tier A by \$26.1 million without reducing the current Tier B appropriation. Based on the December 1, 2018 pupil count, this will increase Tier A per student funding by \$250, to a \$1,500 per student level. In future years, annually increase the Tier A per student funding amount of \$1,500 by the Denver/Aurora/Lakewood Consumer Price Index.

Tier B Recommendation:

- Increase the level of Tier B appropriations by \$24.8 million to bring the per student allocation to approximately 75 percent of the statutory maximum. In subsequent years, annually increase funding by \$500 per student until the statutory level of \$6,000 is reached.
- Re-evaluate the \$6,000 maximum based on current expenditures and develop a mechanism for annual increases in Tier B.

Educational Orphans Recommendation:

• No changes are recommended for the \$500,000 appropriation or the distribution of the allocations.



Part C Recommendation:

• The Colorado Department of Education (CDE) will work with partners to fully evaluate actual costs of Part C evaluations. The results of the evaluation will drive future recommendations by the SEFAC.

Current state law does not provide for full funding of the excess costs of the special education programming and services for students on IEPs. The SEFAC feels strongly that the State of Colorado and federal funding should provide full funding of the excess costs of providing special education services.

Conclusion

The SEFAC appreciates the opportunity to assist with this important funding issue specific to serving children with disabilities. The committee believes that the high-cost appropriation is a critical step toward meeting the needs of districts that are financially impacted by serving children identified with high-cost special education programming. We ask the Colorado General Assembly for leadership in recognizing this critical need.

- Column 1: Under the Exceptional Children's Education Act funding formula, AUs each receive \$1,250 for each child with disabilities, referred to as Tier A, that were reported on the December 1 count of the prior fiscal year.
- Column 2: An additional \$6,000 per student (or proportion thereof) of the remaining funds distributed to AUs for a percentage of the student with more significant needs, referred to as Tier B, reported on the prior fiscal year December 1 count. This percentage is determined by the amount of funding appropriated. Tier B is comprised of students with one or more of the following disabilities:
 - o visual impairment, including blindness
 - o hearing impairment, including deafness
 - o deaf-blindness
 - o serious emotional disability
 - o autism spectrum disorders
 - o traumatic brain injury
 - o multiple disabilities
 - o intellectual disability
- Column 3: Final allocations to AUs based on student count actuals for the Charter School Institute for new charter schools in the current fiscal year. This is the combined total of funding for Tier A and Tier B (column 1 + column 2).
- Column 4: Initial payment made to AUs in September as calculated from preliminary student counts for new charter schools and distributing 90 percent of the total appropriation.
- Column 5: The remaining 10 percent of the appropriation distributed to AUs in February. The amount is calculated after actual counts of students identified as Tier A and Tier B in new charter schools opening up under the Charter School Institute are used to recalculate the total allocation for each AU and then subtracting out the payment already made in the prior September when 90 percent of the appropriation was distributed.
