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EXPELLED AND AT-RISK STUDENT SERVICES (EARSS) GRANT PROGRAM

History

The "Services to Expelled Students" grant program was enacted by the Colorado state legislature in 1997. The statute was amended in 2000 to include students at-risk of expulsion and renamed the "Expelled and At-Risk Student Services" program. With additional amendments in 2008, funds can also support services to students at-risk of being declared habitually truant.

Eligible Applicants and Students to be Served

Funds are annually appropriated to the Colorado Department of Education for the purpose of making grants to school districts, alternative schools within school districts, charter schools, BOCES, non-profit, non-parochial schools, and facility schools. Grants are awarded on a competitive basis for a 4-year award period.

For the purposes of the program descriptions contained in this document, the term "at risk" indicates only the students eligible to be served by the grant. These students include only expelled students, students at risk of expulsion, and truant students defined by unexcused absences. Program descriptions may describe a broader context so not all strategies referenced may necessarily be fundable.

Purpose

The primary purpose of the grant is to prevent future expulsions and habitual truancy. Because non-attendance and disciplinary actions in response to misconduct are risk factors for dropping out of school, the EARSS program contributes to dropout prevention efforts by concentrating on early intervention strategies, student engagement strategies and supportive services to reduce these risk factors. At a minimum, grantees must provide educational services, meaning instruction for academic content areas.

Accountability and Sustainability

Grantees are required to set performance measures and report progress on their measures in the following three areas: academics, attendance, school discipline/safety or social-emotional wellness. Grantees currently in Year 3 and 4 also have a parent/family engagement measure.

To support sustainability efforts, the grant is structured with a scale-down of funds in the third and fourth year of the grant. Funds are reduced by 25 percent and 50 percent in years three and four, respectively, from whichever is the highest funded amount in years 1 or 2.

Appropriation and Number of Grants Awarded

For the 2019-20 school year the appropriation is \$9,493,560 and 58 grants are funded. This includes 13 EARSS Intervention Grantees (EIG) that were funded in a second round of funding the spring of 2017 when the legislature increased the appropriation by \$2 million.

Program Description: Justice High School serves as the Alternative Education Campus for all Boulder Valley students 6-12 who face expulsion, are convicted delinquents, habitually truant, or who display other at-risk behaviors. As such, J.H.S. is in constant need of a plenary of services to adequately address the issues of its students. It is critical that the school offer good Academic and vocational programs as well as providing key services to address issues like drug and alcohol addiction, truancy, and delinquency.

Program Description: Boulder Prep is an alternative school serving 175 9th -12th graders annually who are identified as high-risk. Additional elements of this grant program include training on trauma informed teaching, developing more supports for students based on functions of behavior, training students in social/emotional resiliency, and creating unique alternatives to suspension for increased self-regulation, attendance, and credit completion.

Program Description: New Legacy Charter School, which primarily serves teen parents, will reduce truancy and increase student engagement with three key student groups: 1) students with IEPs and other subgroups with disproportionate truancy rates, 2) students who take an extended leave (e.g. maternity leave), and 3) other students who are at risk of being habitually truant. Key strategies include robust family engagement, intensive student advocacy and support through case management, more flexible and engaging home-based instruction for students on maternity leave, more effective credit recovery opportunities, and a life skills-based Foundation class.

Program Description: Of the 1,119 New America School Thornton, Lakewood and Lowry students, 55.6% manifest at least one risk factor that correlates closely with behavior incidents. Through our EARSS program, we intend to implement a tiered system of interventions to remediate low level behavior violations (pre-suspension) and habitual truancy remediation interventions for 510 students and their families. Key to our efforts will be hiring a Behaviorist at each school to provide direct services and facilitate the work of other 'intervening' staff.

Program Description: In 2017-18, 344 New America School-Thornton, Lakewood and Lowry high school students were habitually truant, 30 habitually disruptive and 74 received in- or out-of-school suspension. Through our EARSS program, we will assign 120 of these individuals, identified by our schools' support-staff data teams, to receive intensive case management services that include: the students, their parents and their case manager jointly developing a detailed educational, behavioral, attendance and resiliency-building strategic plan for the year and then monitoring adherence to that plan.

Program Description: Atlas Preparatory High School (APHS), a charter school in Harrison School District Two, serves 450 low income students in grades 9-12. APHS will supplement and expand the existing framework for behavioral supports and interventions that has identified 260 at-risk students. This program will decrease truancy, suspension and expulsion rates of 80 at-risk students before they reach the disciplinary crisis-level. This will be accomplished by hiring two social workers who will provide targeted interventions and specialized support services at APHS.

Trainings will be focused on culturally relevant restorative practices to ensure support for the students in these subpopulations. Programming is targeted to help students develop skills and behaviors that support increased school engagement, reduce disciplinary incidents, and increased school attendance.

Program Description: Providing another opportunity for at-risk secondary students to stay in school in our district is a continued priority. Immediate interventions such as a paraprofessional for behavior intervention and an Attendance Specialist will provide the time and opportunity for school leaders to identify and systematically address root causes.

Program Description: Moffat County School District intends to improve and expand its support program for Moffat County High School students at risk of expulsion, suspension, and truancy. The EARSS program will serve students in grades 9 through 12. During the 2016-2017 school year, there would have been 186 EARSS eligible students, comprising 31% of the MCHS student body. This program will provide attendance support for MCHS students and parents.
