## More than a Quarter Million Coloradans Need ESL Programs

## Chart 1. Percent Change in "Spoke a Language Other Than English at Home," U.S., West, \& Colorado, 19902000



Between 1990 and 2000, the number of Coloradans who reported speaking "a language other than English at home" grew from 320,631 to 604,019. (See Table 1 and Chart 1.) Of that figure, 267,504 assessed themselves as speaking English less than "very well." (See Table 1.)

Not surprisingly, for Western states including Colorado, the fastest-growing language minority is speakers of Spanish. Speakers of Spanish in the Western states increased by more than 58 percent. (See Table 2.)

In Fall 2002, 86,129 students in Colorado public schools were identified as English language learners. Many parents and other family members of these students are served by programs funded by the Adult Education and Family Literacy Act (AEFLA) and by the Colorado Refugee English as a Second Language (CRESL) program.

Of 15,137 students in AEFLAfunded programs, over 60

percent were ESL students. Of the total Colorado clientele served by AEFLA-funded programs, 66 percent were Hispanic or Latino. Of the 9,306 ESL students served by AELFA-funded programs, 7,652 identified themselves as Hispanic or Latino.

During fiscal 2003, the Colorado Refugee English as a Second Language (CRESL) program served 454 of the 476 refugees who arrived in the state. Of the 454 CRESL
students, 208 were from eastern Europe, 195 from Africa, 52 from the Middle East, 15 from southeast Asia, and six from other regions of the world. Since 1993, 10,758 refugees have arrived in Colorado.
