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

THE STATE EDUCATIONAL SYSTEM

The Biennium ending November 30, 1920, has witnessed a marked improvement in the educational standards in Colorado, and educational efficiency has been increased through a more widely diffused knowledge of educational needs on the part of school officers, teachers and the community.

The Department of Public Instruction, through additions to its staff, has been able to come into a more vital touch with the various units of the school system than has been possible before.

Once more Colorado's Department of Public Instruction has been the first in the United States to establish on a state-wide basis, an efficient aid to the development of the New Education. As Colorado was the first commonwealth to adopt Americanization in the schools by the authority of the Department of Public Instruction, so it has also been the first commonwealth to use the modern Educational Tests and Measurements, even in the country schools, under the supervision of the Department.

During the past eight years, the vision of the Department has been service through fraternity and unity, and much has been accomplished toward translating this vision into the actual working practice of the Colorado school system.

WHAT THE NATION HAS DONE FOR COLORADO SCHOOLS

Colorado's school children own a great estate, guaranteed to them by the United States of America when Sections 16 and 36 in every township were consecrated to the maintenance of the schools.

With full development of these lands, particularly those which have proven to be underlaid with coal, great wealth should accrue to the use of the schools, but for the children to enjoy the full educational advantages that are possible, better transportation facilities and more thorough and scientific development of these lands must be undertaken.

Two years ago it was my privilege to report that the Permanent School Fund amounted to \$4,948,492.23. At this writing, this treasure chest of the children contains invested money in the sum of \$6,507,574.12. At the same time that I reported on the Permanent School Fund two years ago, the Public School Income Fund was \$250,799.49, while the latest figures from the office of the State Treasurer, reveal the fact that there is to the credit of this fund, the sum of \$281,530.06.

From the Public School Income Fund during the past biennium, there has been apportioned to the aid of Weak Districts under the provisions of the Minimum Salary Law, \$24,490.00. Of this amount in 1919, eleven counties and thirty districts received \$10,760.00, and in 1920, there was apportioned to seven counties and thirty-six districts, \$13,730.00. There is still a balance of

\$75,510.00. These amounts are vitally necessary to the districts receiving them, as without this aid, large numbers of children could not have enjoyed educational advantages of any kind.

It must be borne in mind, however, that the State of Colorado did not receive this money by taxation of its people. The sums just apportioned are the product of the sale and leases of land given by the United States to the children of school age in Colorado. Therefore, this statement of Aid to Weak Districts, belongs under the caption, "What the Nation has Done for Colorado Schools," rather than under the caption of "What Colorado has Done for its Schools."

COLORADO'S SCHOOLS SINCE 1918

Two years ago, my report contained the following sentence: "For the past six years, substantial gains have been made toward the realization of an ideal school system and an improved school equipment. In the last two years, particularly, the growth has been tremendous." With even greater emphasis, can I repeat those words and apply them to the present Biennium. School Bond Issues for fifty, seventy-five, one hundred and even one hundred and fifty thousand dollars have become common in the second and third class districts of this state with the result that architecturally beautiful, magnificently equipped school buildings, with efficient and well-paid teaching staffs, are being established all over Colorado. During the present Biennium, an alarming shortage of teachers existed with a consequent filling of teaching positions by far too many teachers without professional training. The year 1920 has witnessed a lessening of this shortage and a raising of the qualifications of those applying for teaching positions in Colorado.

In both city and country schools, teachers' and superintendents' salaries have been raised until they have reached an approximately fair standard.

School spirit has always been notable in Colorado's large cities and communities and school patriotism is manifesting itself in all types of Colorado schools.

About one hundred and thirty consolidated and centralized schools function in Colorado at the present time. These schools are making educational history so memorable, that educational pilgrims have come from various states in the union to study these glories of Colorado's Educational System.

There are over four thousand school buildings in Colorado, a decrease of nearly two thousand in recent years, owing to the rapid growth of the consolidated school idea.

The school population of Colorado has increased materially in eastern and northern Colorado and in Denver, but has decreased in the mountain counties and on the western slope. Much of the above noted increase has taken place since the last school census, February, 1920, which makes it difficult to estimate exactly the present school census of Colorado.

STANDARDIZATION CONFERENCES

The executive rulings for Standardization for the year 1919 and 1920 were made at five conferences, held, respectively, at Grand Junction, Denver, Alamosa, Sterling and Pueblo. Previously, this work had been conducted by the State Standardization Committee at meetings held in the office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction. The conference plan, however, was adopted with a view to familiarizing the largest number of superintendents with the Standardization Plan and the achievements already made in that line of school work. This aim was largely accomplished, as the total number of superintendents present at these conferences was thirty—nearly one-half of the county superintendents of the state. In addition to the county superintendents, there were present the State Superintendent, the State Supervisor, the State Organizer of the Parent-Teacher Association and Child Welfare Bureau, and others interested in community betterment.

The Conferences have been fruitful in the extreme as the standardization of many schools can be traced directly to the instruction received at these meetings.

The following legislative program was recommended:

- That a new certification law be passed;
- That the County Superintendents be paid the same mileage as that of other county officials;
- That the salaries of County Superintendents, State Superintendent and Deputy State Superintendent be raised;
- That the age for admission to the Reformatory at Buena Vista be changed;
- That the Department of Public Instruction shall receive reports on the school work in the State Institutions;
- That a law be passed in regard to teachers' contracts, concerning the breaking of and providing a penalty for same;
- That there be a re-districting of the Normal Institute Districts;
- That joint districts be allowed to consolidate;
- That mental examinations be given to juvenile delinquents;
- That the suggestion concerning the Child Welfare Bureau be changed to read thus: "That the Child Welfare Bureau be continued and that an increased appropriation be allowed for it";
- That special schools be provided for retarded pupils.

STATE EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

The Twenty-second General Assembly honored itself by placing Colorado State Educational Institutions upon a millage basis, and this year the people of Colorado rallied to the support of these institutions most notably by voting an amendment to the State Constitution, making it possible to increase the mill tax for educational purposes, so that these institutions might be able to meet the demands of these crucial times.

A detailed statement of the growth of these institutions would be a duplication as they report directly to the Governor for transmission to the General Assembly.

THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION

The Department of Public Instruction deems it a privilege to acknowledge its indebtedness to all school workers. It has received appreciation, inspiration, information, loyal friendship and good comradeship from every type of worker in the educational field. For these good gifts, it returns fervent thanks. The department finds its most efficient aid in the offices of the County Superintendents whose service is linked directly with that of the state office. The department has also received co-operation of City Superintendents and the teachers in the city systems.

SUB-DEPARTMENTS OF THE DEPARTMENT

The work of the Department of Public Instruction may be grouped under several heads.

THE PUBLICATION WORK. During the biennial period just ending, this department has prepared for publication, had printed and distributed, three million and odd thousand pieces of printed matter, in addition to handling over a million pieces at the request of the United States Government. The state matter includes report blanks of all descriptions, physical examination tests, state courses of study, school laws, etc.

GENERAL CORRESPONDENCE. For the past two years, about three thousand letters a month have been received, answered and filed.

BOARDS. All the work of the State Board of Education, the State Board of Examiners, the State Reading Circle Board and the State Emergency or Call Fund Board is done in this office, including the recording and keeping of minutes, issuance of certificates, communications with schools and colleges in reference to credentials of applicants for state certificates of all grades, the hearing of appeals and rendering of decisions in all matters of school law and conducting the correspondence incidental to all these branches of work. In addition, the superintendent has sent a personal letter with each certificate that has been granted.

Eight meetings of the State Board of Examiners have been held at which six hundred and ninety-seven certificates have been recommended. Twenty-five meetings of the State Board of Education have been held, ten of which have been appeal cases and decisions rendered by the State Board of Education.

It will readily be seen that these four boards, of each of which the State Superintendent is president and the Deputy Superintendent, secretary, involve an immense amount of book-keeping, record keeping, clerical work and special correspondence.

During the present biennium, two additions have been made to the office staff, the Elementary School Supervisor and the Educational Statistician. For many years there has been a need for the type of work done by these two educators, and for almost the first time in its history, the department has been able to experience real supervisory powers, all school visits and supervisory action having heretofore been performed by the superintendent without assistance. The complete report of the State Supervisor of Rural Schools is appended to this report.

The above resume of some of the activities of the Department of Public Instruction, carried on with an utterly inadequate clerical force, makes it plain why the assistance rendered by the State Teachers' Association and the management of the Colorado School Journal has been so vitally necessary to the efficiency of the state office.

FINANCIAL AND STATISTICAL REPORT.—A detailed financial and statistical report will be found in the proper place of this volume. That portion of the Biennial Report of the Department of Public Instruction is based upon more comprehensive data than any hitherto attempted, and, it is believed, will prove of great interest.

THE STATE SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION

For the biennial period the superintendent has traveled forty thousand miles in the performance of her official duties, centralizing, consolidating and standardizing schools and visiting educational meetings. In addition to hundreds of school visitations, she has attended County Superintendents' Associations, County Teachers' Associations, Superintendents' Sessions of the National Education Association, state associations and conventions of the National Education Association.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND OPPORTUNITIES

For the biennial period just ended, education in Colorado has made rapid strides in socializing the schools, readjusting subject matter and method in accordance with the new conditions created by the war, and offering rich opportunities to those who seek a state where education expresses idealism through practical service. Long-time citizens of the Centennial State are proud to recognize the quick and efficient reaction of education in Colorado to the beginnings of the wonderful future that must inevitably come to this potentially greatest of all states. Newcomers to the commonwealth are assured that they have made no mistake in setting up their household goods in the shadow of the Rockies after they have familiarized themselves with some of Colorado's educational achievements and have learned to recognize the signs of a still richer fruition to be in educational matters, while some of the characteristic developments of the educational life of this state, such as its standardization plan, have attracted critical attention far beyond its borders and acted as inducements to a not inconsiderable number of people to make Colorado their educational Mecca.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The State Superintendent respectfully recommends that there be added to the Department of Public Instruction, a supervisor of high schools.

It is also recommended that a new certification law be passed which will increase the value of Colorado's certificates so that they may not be rejected in neighboring states as at the present time. At present the Colorado county certificates are graded by sixty-three county superintendents. The measure recommended makes it obligatory upon the State Department of Public Instruction to grade and issue county certificates.

The attention of the Governor and the Legislature is called once more to the fact that the State Superintendent of Public Instruction receives a salary of one thousand dollars less per annum than the lowest paid of the other state executive officers. It is recommended that this discrimination be rectified at the earliest possible moment and the educational office be placed upon a par with that of the Secretary of State and the State Auditor, by increasing the salary to four thousand dollars per annum, the same as that received by those officials.

It is respectfully recommended, as the most crying need of Colorado's educational system, that there be a state millage tax for elementary education.

Because of the fact that Colorado's system of raising school revenue is antiquated and inefficient, and particularly because of the additional fact that there is no state-wide tax for elementary education, Colorado has been placed by the most recent educational statisticians as fourteenth in the list of states, when its other educational achievements would entitle it to at least second place among the states of the union.

It is also recommended that the county unit of administration and taxation be created by the next Legislature to the end that the educational opportunities of all Colorado children may be equalized and the state extend fair play educationally to all the children of all the people.

RESUME

Finally, and to give a resume of the preceding recommendations, may I present the following summary of what appeals to me as the absolutely necessary expenditures for the Department of Public Instruction for the biennium upon which we are just entering:

All of the above should be made as continuing appropriations, in order that the department may plan to work along substantial and permanent lines. This is a modest request in view of the work that should be done by a state department of education. If the work of which this department has supervision and general direction—the work of the public schools of the state—is not worth this amount per annum, it is not worth anything to this commonwealth.

I have the honor, my dear sir, to submit the above report and recommendations with the earnest hope that you will approve them in your fortheoming message to the Legislature, and that the Twenty-third General Assembly may reeognize the value to the children of these measures, and secure their benefits by putting these provisions upon the statute books of the commonwealth of Colorado.

STATE LIBRARY

My Dear Mrs. Bradford:

I have the honor to submit for your consideration a report of the activities and expenditures of the Colorado State Library, covering the last biennial period, between the first day of December, 1918, and the thirtieth day of November, 1920.

There has been a circulation of over sixteen hundred books and periodicals during the last two years, largely among the employees of the state, who are allowed free use of the Library. Much has also been done to make the ladies' rest room more pleasant, by lending the past issues of our periodicals after the current issue of the month has been received, for further use there.

The circulation of the embossed print books for the blind, which is the property of the State Department of Public Instruction, has been sent upon request throughout the state, to the adult blind. Such material may be sent through the postoffice without charge.

A large number of patrons daily consult the reference material in the library, which is practically unduplicated by any other library in the state. Through the splendid efforts of the Assistant State Librarian, whose resignation came last July after a term of office covering seven and one-half years, this special department has proven a valuable help to all who have come seeking information.

The State Library has for several years been collecting a large amount of printed and written material with special reference to actual and possible use in the preliminary work of legislation. This has been carefully classified and arranged for the immediate use of legislators and those interested in legislation.

The genealogical department may be mentioned with pride as being the best in the state and though not very extensive has been carefully selected, thus making it exceedingly helpful to those who use it. It is completely catalogued and shelf listed to date.

The Twenty-second General Assembly wisely increased the appropriation for the maintenance fund, and also for the salaries of assistant librarians, which has made it possible to secure more help in cataloguing, classifying and preparing books for shipment. However, the funds for exchange work are still far too small to meet the demand from sister states. The State Library every year represents a larger and larger investment of the state's money, and this investment is good in proportion to the amount of service rendered by the library. Any increase in the cost of

administration which results in a greater proportionate quality of service rendered, is clearly a saving to the state. In the Assistant Librarian's judgment, no better investment of the state's funds could be made than a sufficient amount of appropriation for the employment of more assistance in the library, and a larger fund for the purchasing of books and periodicals. Through the efforts of Mrs. Alice Lambert Rathborne, during her term of office there has been much accomplished in this matter and the present incumbent recommends that the suggestion made by her, in the budget which she presented, be considered favorably by the next legislature.

The need for better shelving can still be mentioned, in order that hundreds of United States public documents may be brought from the sub-basement vault and made accessible for research work and that the increasing collections of such documents and those from the sister states may be properly cared for. During this biennial period, approximately two thousand reports from the various states of the United States have been shelved in alphabetical and chronological order. The extensive collections of such matter are not duplicated in any other library in the state. To the uninterested, these state documents may mean little, but to the one who is seeking material on civic and state betterment, they prove a veritable treasure mine of information.

The war has taught as nothing else has, the value of United States government publications, from those of aid to the house-wife to those of help to the technologist in business and professional lines. While the present funds and space of the State Library do not permit the extensive and valuable collections of these reports in the main room, the older reports being stored in the sub-basement, an effort has been made to keep the most recent ones on file for use. Not less than five thousand bound volumes and pamphlets have been shelved during this biennium. One department head in the Capitol testified that the state was saved several thousand dollars in a suit arising out of industrial trouble, because of the immediate accessibility of government statistical material in the State Library.

Acknowledgment and thanks are hereby publicly made to all institutions, public and private, and to individuals, for all courtesies which have been extended the library, and to the former Assistant Librarian whose mantle has fallen on me; and for those which have been received since I have been in charge of the department.

REPORT OF STATE TEACHER OF ADULT BLIND

Nov. 30, 1920.

To the State Board of Education:

In reviewing the events of the past two years, I recall first the presentation, in January, 1919, of a "Complimentary State Teachers' Diploma for Eminent Service" by your honorable body, which was all the more highly appreciated because of its being a complete surprise. It is, indeed, gratifying that my efforts for the good of the blind have met with your approval and that you deem them worthy of such recognition.

It was also gratifying to have the value of Home Teaching for Adult Blind recognized by the Twenty-second General Assembly in the passage of an amendment to the statute of 1911, which created the office of State Teacher for Adult Blind. This amendment provided for secretary and an office. It also increased my own salary and expense fund. This measure became operative March 19, 1919. With your unanimous approval, L. F. Caward was appointed as my secretary April 16, 1919, and we were given office room in the state museum building in May of that year.

To add to my efficiency as a teacher the State Auditing Board unanimously consented to the purchasing of a Ford automobile July 2, 1919.

The services of my secretary have relieved me from the necessity of spending almost every evening doing clerical work, which I had been in the habit of doing for nearly eight years—working until ten and eleven and sometimes one o'clock at night. The moving of office supplies and teaching materials from my own home to the office relieved the crowded condition of my home and provided a more suitable place for doing office work. The use of the automobile has enabled me to visit and teach people who live in country districts and could hardly be reached in any other way. During one month, when traveling on the street cars in Denver, doing my ordinary work, I spent thirteen hours standing upon corners waiting for cars; this loss of time is now avoided. My secretary drives the automobile, and owing to his carefulness and timely repairing we have had very little loss of time in the seventeen months' use of the machine. In the past eight months, I have traveled three thousand eight hundred and twenty-four miles in the machine.

Counties visited during the Biennial Period: Larimer, Weld, Adams, Jefferson, Denver, Arapahoe, El Paso, Pueblo, Fremont, Lake, Las Animas, Huerfano, Chaffee and Otero—visiting blind in twenty-three towns, besides numerous mining camps and country homes.

There are more blind in Las Animas county than in any other county of the state, excepting Denver county, but I found the majority of them Mexicans, and many of them are very aged who cannot speak English and have never read any language.

Without more time and greater resources it seemed impossible to do anything for them in an educational way. Some of the women were furnished self-threading needles. One elderly woman cried aloud for joy when she had threaded a needle and said to my interpreter, "Now I can sew all I want to, for I won't have to wait for someone to thread my needle." Another Mexican woman laughed happily when she threaded a needel for the first time.

Among my pupils of this period is a woman who has been totally blind since the age of thirty. In spite of her handicap she reared three children and was a good mother and housekeeper. She not only sewed for the family, but taught her daughters to sew when they were old enough. She had no one to teach her to read by touch until I visited her in August, 1919. She was then seventy-two years old. At first she thought she could easily learn the Moon type alphabet, but was equally sure she could never read if she did learn the alphabet. Being induced to try, she was reading very well in a month's time, much to her surprise and delight. In September, 1920, she read the entire New Testament in four weeks.

Another pupil was thirty-eight years old. At the age of nine she had scarlet fever and then gradually lost her hearing, but did not forget how to talk. In February, 1918, she became entirely blind. I visited her about one year later and communicated with her by supposing that each letter of the alphabet was written in a certain place upon her left hand and by touching the imaginary letters and spelling out words for her. It was easy to get her to understand this method as she had read about it before she lost her sight. She readily learned to read and write New York point, and now gets great comfort and pleasure from reading "The Matilda Ziegler Magazine for the Blind."

A young man in a distant part of the state learned to read New York point from lessons which I prepared and mailed to him.

My eldest pupils are a man who began learning Moon type just after passing his eighty-sixth birthday, and a woman who began just before her eighty-seventh birthday, both find much pleasure in reading.

A marked example of pluck and one which should put to shame those who are ever ready to say, "I can't," is that of a colored woman who was born a slave. When about forty years old, after raising a large family of children, she learned to read without a teacher. Losing her sight late in life, she has learned to read Moon type at about the age of eighty-three.

Several elderly people who have not felt equal to the task of learning to read have been made happy by finding that they can write to friends and relatives with the help of the grooved writing cards furnished them.

Rake knitting introduced into my work in 1919 has proved of great value to some whose touch is impaired so that they cannot do other work, while the strong, pretty bags they make are appreciated by their friends for shopping and other purposes.

The following extracts from letters received express the appreciation of the blind people of the work that is being done for them:

"I can now truthfully report that I have finally mastered New York point to such an extent that I get a great deal of enjoyment out of the magazine and books. I read slowly, but without difficulty and understand and appreciate that which I read. I am deeply appreciative of the part you have played in making my life decidedly less commonplace and shall ever remember and remain your debtor."

"Before I learned to read, I felt whipped and helpless and didn't like to ask anyone to read to me, not even my wife. I would not take a thousand dollars for my ability to read, if I could not get it back again."

From a woman of eighty-four: "I get so lonely, I don't know what I would do without this reading. Nobody knows what a pleasure it is but God and I. I don't know what I did without it."

"I wish I could express in fitting words the joy and deep sense of gratitude which I felt when I heard that the relief law had passed. I wish that all the blind in Colorado could, in some befitting manner, express their thanks to the kind voters, and particularly to those who, by their labor and efforts, started the movement. Let me, as one, thank you and the workers for the blind for all that you have done for us."

"Your visit was an inspiration and very great pleasure. I am very glad that the relief law for the blind carried and we have you to thank for it more than any other person. I hope that I shall never need it, but it is a great satisfaction to know that it is there if I do. We shall look forward to your next visit."

"I tender to you my sincere congratulations upon the handsome vote registered in support of our blind relief measure. I think it is not too much to say that the success of this measure, advocated by you for so many years, should be credited to you more than to any other single individual or organization in the state."

The "Relief Law for the Blind," or "The Blind Benefit Law" initiated by the society of "United Workers for the Blind of Colorado" in 1918, proclaimed a law by Governor Gunter, Dec. 31, 1918, and faithfully executed by The Blind Benefit Commission, aided by Dr. E. J. Clark, secretary of the society of the United Workers for the Blind, has indeed proven a blessing to the blind of the state. On every hand I hear words of gratitude which assures me that the law is fulfilling our highest expectations. I feel confident that it is, as I had hoped, bringing relief and sunshine into a larger number of lives than any other one measure could have done.

Industrial Needs: While fully appreciating the great work that is now being done for the blind of the state through the Blind Benefit Commission, The State Workshop, Home Teaching, The Adult Blind Home Association, and The Society of United Workers for the Blind, I cannot fail to recognize the need of industrial training and opportunities for work, especially among the men. A large per cent of our people are physically disabled, from age or other causes, and some others are already well employed, but I have quite a list of those who are willing and anxious to work, and it is hard to turn aside their frequent appeals for remunerative employment. They would be glad to earn their own way, if they could, instead of accepting the bene-

fit, but I have not the facilities for aiding them in this way. Instead of helping them to overcome their handicap and develop into busy, happy men, as is being done for the blinded soldiers, we are leaving them to be overwhelmed in the battle of life and they are in danger of sinking into a condition of permanent helplessness and hopelessness.

SALES OF FANCY WORK

Sales have been held each year, one at the State Fair in Pueblo, one each year in Denver, one in Salida, and one in Trinidad. The amount realized in these sales was \$365.07. Eleven women and seven men contributed work and each received the price of his work which was sold.

Much of the work done in 1919 was of such a nature that it cannot be represented by figures. Time was given to legislative work and to invoicing supplies and materials, and moving them to the office. As I had been obliged to keep all accounts and records in embossed writing, I had to read and explain them to my secretary so he could transfer what was necessary to his new books. All of this required considerable time and I could not give as many lessons as I would otherwise have done. A comparison of the summary given will show a marked increase in the number of visits and lessons given in 1920.

Besides the number of pupils shown in the table, instructions were given to fifteen who did not succeed in their work. After spending almost a year upon New York point two men were so discouraged because of their poor touch that I gave them Moon type and they were soon reading quite readily—much to their delight.

I have already started a class of seventeen for the winter months and there are ten more whom I expect to begin work about the first of January. Among my pupils are seven who are taking Revised Braille, grade one and a half. As this type has been adopted as a uniform type for the United States and sufficient amount of literature has been printed in it to justify me in doing so, I have taken up Revised Braille in place of New York point, but I know of no embossed type which can take the place of the Moon type for the elderly blind and those whose touch has been impaired. I bless the memory of Dr. Moon, its inventor.

REGISTER OF THE BLIND

Through the courteous aid of the secretaries of the Blind Benefit Commission, and the Society of the United Workers for the Blind, I have been able to add more names to the register than in any previous period. It now contains 559 names, besides 125 names of those who have died or left the state.

REPORT OF STATE RURAL SCHOOL SUPERVISOR

Honorable Mary C. C. Bradford,
State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

My Dear Madam:

Herewith is submitted for your consideration my report as State Supervisor of Rural Schools for the biennial period 1919-1920.

I entered upon the duties of this position on April 16, 1919. It is a pleasure to state that I have had a cordial welcome from the county superintendents, school superintendents, principals and teachers, a fact which speaks loudly in praise of a spirit of professional loyalty and interest in the plans of the Department.

During the period I have spent four hundred and ninety days in the field, traveling fifty thousand miles in sixty-one counties, visiting four hundred and twenty schools, having nineteen hundred and sixteen teachers in charge, with a school enrollment of forty-nine thousand eight hundred and fifty-five. I have visited twenty-one Institutes, addressed one hundred and forty Community Meetings, held conferences with three hundred and sixty-five School Boards and have assisted in forty-nine consolidation campaigns.

The introduction of the Educational Tests at the beginning of my term gave me an opportunity to show the teachers in many of the schools where the work could be strengthened. The tests furnish both teachers and pupils definite objective aims for their work. They also furnish patrons definite objective results which they can compare with recognized standards.

The following tests were used in the state under the direction of the Department: Reading, Monroe Silent Reading Tests, Grays' Silent and Oral Reading Tests; Arithmetic, Courtis Standard Research Tests, Series B Addition, Subtraction, Multiplication and Division; Spelling, Ayres' Measuring Scale for Ability in Spelling; Penmanship, Ayres' Measuring Scale for Handwriting.

The tests were given in twenty-five counties, at one hundred and fifty schools, to three thousand pupils, during the first year of their introduction. This year, a much larger number of schools are planning to make use of the tests.

In the year 1915, a State Plan of Standardization was adopted by the Department. Since this plan has been in operation, over six hundred schools of the state have standardized and it has been my observation that in the counties that have made the most use of the plan, there is to be found the best unified educational standards. The plan for this school year is to score every school in a second or third class district for standardization, during Standardization Week in February.

As consolidation is one of the two major factors in the Department's program for rural school betterment, no oppor-

tunity to advise consolidation wherever feasible, has been overlooked. We have now one hundred and thirty consolidated schools in the state. Many of these schools have a national reputation. I have found the work in these schools to be equal in all respects to the work carried on in the larger schools of the state.

Health is the greatest asset of childhood. Any system of education that permits the lowering of health standards, is archaic. The Great World War proved to the many as it was known to the few, some years ago, that health of country children is not as good as that of the city children. It ought to be better. A number of counties, through the aid of the Red Cross, have the services of a county school nurse. I hope the time is not far distant when all the counties of the state can have school nurses.

The need of rural schools is more supervision. In many counties of the state it is not possible for the County Superintendent to make even the three visits required by law. Even if this were possible, this is not enough supervision for the type of teachers who many times began teaching in the one room schools without any training whatsoever. Every county should have supervisors to assist the County Superintendent to carry on the work in an efficient manner. If supervisors are necessary to maintain the progress of the larger systems, it is even more important that they be provided for the rural schools where we find such a large part of the teaching body entirely without professional training.

In the training of teachers, whether in normal schools or through supervision while in service, we cannot lose sight of the tremendous importance and obligation of fitting them for the best possible rural school work. The people of the rural districts, if they are to be prosperous and influential in the nation and among the people of the earth, must be educated. The duty of the teacher training schools, should be to work out some plan whereby all the teachers needed for rural schools shall receive adequate special preparation for this task.

In assuming the duties of this position, my main objective was to visit as many schools as possible in company with the county superintendent, note conditions of school property, observe the teacher at work in the class room and advise with the superintendent and the teacher about ways and means of improving class room instruction and on proper modes of procedure to meet the conditions found. Through this co-operative supervision of the Department of Public Instruction, there now exists a unity of interest and effort on the part of the teachers, school boards and patrons that make it possible for reform and improvement to sweep quickly over the whole state. Districts that might have continued indefinitely to operate their schools under the old order of things, have been swept by supervision into the irresistible stream of progress. This greater stimulation of public school sentiment that has been brought about, is shown by a growth of the feeling of responsibility to the community on the part of the teacher, an attitude of greater interest and responsibility of the school boards toward the school; an increased willingness on the part of the people to vote money for new school plants and enterprises; a growing demand for consolidation as a means for

school betterment for the purpose of meeting the needs and demands of modern rural life; a better trained class of teachers receiving higher salaries. Through this more widely extended administrative function of the Department, the school organization has been improved in the following lines: Practical and sane methods of classification, grading and promotion of pupils, improved physical conditions of the school plant, better sanitary equipment, definite class-room instruction, record of pupils' mental and physical conditions and development, the use of scientific methods of measurement.

For the further progress of our rural schools, I submit the following recommendations:

1. Living conditions of rural teachers should be improved and salaries raised, so that trained and capable teachers for rural schools may be secured and retained.

2. Assistant supervisors should be furnished for rural schools to work under the general direction of the county superintendent to insure better teaching and reasonable uniformity in regard to text books and methods of organization and management.

3. Schools should be consolidated or centralized wherever practicable and a large enough valuation can be obtained.

4. That all teachers should have professional training and the educational qualifications should be increased each succeeding year until by 1925 the state should require as a prerequisite to teach in any school in the state the following qualifications: For elementary teachers, general education equivalent to four years in a standard high school, and, in addition, the equivalent of two years' professional training in a standard Normal School or college. For high school teachers, four years' education in a standard high school and, in addition, four years in an approved college or university including professional courses in education.
