

RECOMMENDATIONS

I have already had the honor to submit to the Budget Commissioner and your Excellency, the complete budget of the office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction for the biennium of nineteen hundred twenty-five and six. Therefore, I am now contenting myself with a statement of the needs of the office for a further development of its efficiency.

I recommend for the fifth time what every State Superintendent of Public Instruction for the past sixteen years has also recommended, an increase in the salary of the Superintendent. In your Excellency's message to the Legislature, you called attention to the fact that the salary of the Secretary to the Governor had not been increased since that office was originally created in eighteen seventy-six. May I call your attention to another situation parallel to that, namely; the salary of the Superintendent of Public Instruction has not been increased since that office was created in eighteen seventy-six? That one of the six Executive Constitutional officers of the Commonwealth should receive a less salary than many holding merely appointive positions has become, in the eyes of thousands of thinking citizens of Colorado, little less than a scandal. I recommend the introduction and passage of a bill raising the salary of the Superintendent of Public Instruction to five thousand dollars. This should commend itself to your Excellency, as your recommendations for the increase in the salary of the Governor's Secretary range from thirty-six hundred to five thousand dollars, and your recommended increase of the salary of the Secretary of the State Board of Charities and Corrections is for a minimum of thirty-six hundred dollars. It is true that the increase in the State Superintendent's salary cannot take effect during the biennium upon which we shall enter January thirteenth, but the passage of such a law would redeem the Department of Public Instruction from the financial stigma that it has borne for so many decades, and the next biennium would see the Superintendent in possession of a salary commensurate with the importance of the service rendered and the place held by education in the hearts and minds of the people.

In accordance with the practice in most of the more progressive states, I recommend that the State and County Superintendents each be elected for a four-year term. There seems to be no good reason for discriminating between County Judges and County Superintendents, and in the case of the State Superintendent, no adequate supervisory and executive policy can be even approximately carried out in less than a four-year term.

I recommend that the Deputy State Superintendent of Public Instruction should receive a salary equal to that enjoyed by other Deputies of Constitutional executive officers of the State, the increase being from twenty-one hundred to twenty-five hundred dollars.

I recommend an increase of a minimum of twenty dollars a month on the salaries of clerks and stenographers. This is simple justice and should take effect immediately.

I recommend that a State Supervisor of Adult Education should be added to the staff of the Superintendent of Public Instruction at a salary of sixteen hundred and twenty dollars a year, in order to carry out the plans of the Illiteracy Commission, which your Excellency addressed and commended last April.

As far as general educational policies are concerned, I recommend the passage of the County Unit bill, the best educational thought of Colorado and the Nation being almost a unit in favor of this plan of educational organization in the counties. The district system has been abandoned in the majority of the forward looking states, and Colorado should take its place among them.

The above recommendations constitute my legislative program directly affecting this office and the County Superintendent's office. In addition, I desire to say that as a member of the State Council for Religious Education, I am co-operating and in hearty accord with that body in its program of providing for religious education among the pupils of the public schools. The bill on this subject does not provide for religious instruction to be given in the public schools, but authorizes school boards to excuse children for a limited period each week for the purpose of receiving religious instruction in a school of religious education connected with whatever church the parents may select. Also, the parents must request the school authorities to excuse the child for this purpose before it can be excused from school.

EDUCATIONAL ADVANCE

ATTENDANCE

The graduating classes of Colorado's high schools have been large, with a gratifyingly increasing number of boys remaining in high school during the full four-year term, to receive their diplomas and the recognition of the community and the State.

One who has been privileged to attend many of these commencements this year has reason to feel proud of the straight thinking, happy-hearted boys and girls who are being trained in Colorado schools, and to congratulate this State upon the fine spirit and devoted service of the teaching staff. Almost every section of Colorado has been reached by the Superintendent in the last year, and everywhere encouraging conditions have been found, particularly in the increased attention being given to vocational guidance and vocational training. New school buildings of a most satisfactory type are going up everywhere.

EDUCATIONAL BILL

Good work has been done in behalf of the Education Bill sponsored by the National Education Association and thirty-two other national organizations, by many of the local educational groups, and a better understanding of this most important measure is becoming prevalent in Colorado. All Colorado's Representatives, both in the United States House of Representatives and the United States Senate, are reported to be in favor of the bill with one possible exception.

A GOOD RECORD

The following statistics of school census, school attendance and school enrollment, are most gratifying; particularly so, because of the somewhat misleading statements that have been broadcast throughout the State of Colorado in reference to the number of children of school age who are deprived of school privileges.

Total census, 6 to 21 years, 287,318.

Total enrollment in public schools, 237,915; or 82.8 per cent of the children of school age enrolled in public schools, 74 per cent are in school every day.

Only about .8 of 1 per cent of children between 8 and 14 years of age are not enrolled in the schools.

In making these averages, it must be kept in mind that a great number of children are through high school at 17 and 18 years of age, yet they are kept on the census list till 21 years of age, thus giving a wrong impression of the number of children who are not in school.

During the past biennium, additional work has been undertaken by the Department in the fields of illiteracy, the reorganization of rural schools on the basis of tests and measurements according to the Three Track plan, the standardization of requirements for the issuance of special certificates to teachers, and the standardization of music, art, and commercial schools.

The work for the Blind, the undertakings of the Child Welfare Bureau, the Reading Circle work, the certification work, and the work of the other already well established divisions of the Department of Public Instruction, will be found in detail in the body of this report under the special reports made to the Superintendent by those in charge.

Surely your Excellency, "if education be the chief business of the Republic," as one of America's greatest educational and social philosophers once pronounced it to be; and if the English speaking world's most brilliant and versatile writer is not in error when he says that "civilization is running a race between education and destruction,"—then surely, the above requests and recommendations are not excessive. They will have back of them the sober and enlightened thought of the majority of Colorado's nearly eight thousand teachers, and they directly affect the welfare of the two hundred eighty-seven thousand, three hundred eighteen children of school age who are Colorado's chief glory and most valuable asset.

STATE LIBRARY

Dear Mrs. Bradford:

I herewith present for your consideration a report of the activities and expenditures for the State Library for the biennial years nineteen twenty-three and nineteen twenty-four.

The library continues to serve the public as a reference library to the very best of our ability, and feel much has been accomplished in this way, considering the limited amount of assistance granted to the library. The interest in, and demand for this work is growing so very rapidly that I have recommended an increase of appropriation in the Budget, which, I am convinced, is the very least with which we can operate successfully during the next biennium.

The United States documents of all departments are in constant demand, and are used to a very great extent, which calls for much time in service. The material in the legislative reference department was especially helpful during the meeting of the General Assembly in nineteen twenty-three, and much use has been made of it in preparation of the coming session. We still have the great cry for more room, better equipment, more assistants, and an adequate appropriation for maintenance, thereby enabling us to give still better service.

The circulation of books for the blind, which is a part of the work done in this library, has been unusually large. The same can be said of the daily circulation of magazines and periodicals among the employees of the State. Card records are kept of all this work. After they are circulated in this way they are then taken over to the Rest Room in the building where they continue to serve for another month or more.

Our Genealogical Department is considered one of the best collections in the West, and is used very extensively. We have added several new books but need more, and should have them, as the demand for them is growing.

There has been a complete check made of all Colorado documents, and a card index completed to date. We are continuing the checking of all State documents of other States, and re-classifying and cataloging our general collection. The following classes have been completed to date: Philosophy, Religion, Education, Philology, and Sociology, are well under way.

I have had the pleasure of attending the meetings of the Colorado Library Association, both in nineteen twenty-three and twenty-four, and was most delighted to be able to do so because of

the great inspiration which I received from them. I served as a member of the Council for one year and am now a member of one of the important committees.

There have been many visitors from other libraries and educational institutions and departments.

I have visited twenty-three different libraries during the last two years, which include the Wisconsin State, Wisconsin University and Historical Libraries, Milwaukee Public, Chicago and North Western Universities, John Crerar, Newberry, Chicago Public, St. Louis and Kansas City Public Libraries, and in Colorado, some of our State Institution and Public Libraries. All of these visits have been used not only for pleasure but for profit also. My week in Madison was filled with most interesting work in library methods.

The following number of books have been added to the library by purchase, exchange, and gift during this biennial.

REPORT OF THE STATE SCHOOL SUPERVISOR

Honorable Mary C. C. Bradford,
State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

My dear Mrs. Bradford:

I am herewith submitting for your consideration my report as State School Supervisor for the biennial period 1923-1924.

During this period, the State School Supervisor visited fifty three out of the sixty-three counties of the State, and a number of these counties many times. The state has been served in many ways during these visits, a partial enumeration of which are given below.

(1) ADDRESSES

The following number of addresses have been given throughout the state:

and numberless impromptu talks in schools and elsewhere.

(2) ASSISTING INCOMING COUNTY SUPERINTENDENTS

During the first six months of the biennial period, the State School Supervisor spent the major portion of the time visiting the counties where new superintendents had been elected, assisting them as much as possible in planning and operating constructive rural supervision.

(3) TESTS AND MEASUREMENTS

The largest problem undertaken by your State School Supervisor during this biennial was the attempt to put into actual practical operation in the rural schools of the state a system of intelligence and achievement tests. The school year 1923-24 was given almost exclusively to this work; and that the entire state might benefit as near equally as possible, four counties were chosen by the State Superintendent as representative of the four parts of the state; Las Animas in the south, Boulder in the north, Mesa in the west, and Logan in the east.

With the co-operation and assistance of the State University, State Teachers' College and the Western State College, an average of about two months were spent in each county chosen. Day by day in school after school, tests were given and scored by educational

experts from these institutions in the presence of the teacher, and in each school the teacher was shown how to make practical use of the information thus gained that it might benefit the pupil *now*.

The results obtained from the year's work were so satisfactory that requests are listed from county superintendents, teachers, and school boards in every county of the state for help in instituting the tests as an essential part of their school curricula.

(4) OBSERVATIONS

The outstanding change noticeable throughout the state, is the new, alert, progressive attitude of both teacher and local school officer in regard to the Certification Law enacted by the last legislature. This advanced demand of our state for better trained teachers is rapidly changing the old viewpoint held by too many in the past, I regret to say, viz.: "that schools and school funds are in a way but pawns in local control of affairs," and not a sacred trust for the training of future citizens. Teachers in the poorest paid, remote, one-teacher schools are now training themselves in service through extension courses, and attending the summer sessions of our colleges and universities during their vacations; and third class district school boards are understandingly trying to secure the best trained teacher possible, consistent with the salary and environment they have to offer. The next few years will work wonders in educational betterment throughout the state, because of this law.

The growth and activity of Parent-Teacher Associations are seen in every county, and the importance of their work in bringing teacher and parent together in an understanding co-partnership cannot be over-estimated.

Physical Education in Rural Schools is every year receiving more attention, but I regret to report that many rural schools are still sadly lacking in physical education and health training. If health be one of a state's greatest assets, we are thereby neglecting a very vital duty.

Music and Art as educational factors in all our schools, both urban and rural, show we are recognizing the need of training the emotions of the child together with the body and the intellect.

Many school buildings throughout the state, erected at great expense and almost unbearable sacrifice, are found to be inadequate and unsatisfactory, because they were either unwisely planned, or incapably supervised during construction. The State Supervisor is convinced that a School Building Supervisor in the Department of Public Instruction, with legal authority to approve all public school buildings in the state, is needed.

REPORT OF THE STATE TEACHER FOR ADULT BLIND

MRS. JENNIE COWARD JACKSON

State Teacher for Adult Blind

Biennial Period from November 30, 1922, to November 30, 1924

To the State Board of Education :

It is with some reluctance that I attempt to write this biennial report, because it can be but little more than a repetition of the reports of former biennial periods. The Twenty-fourth General Assembly failed to provide for more Home Teachers and I have had to continue coping with the great problem of trying to re-educate the Adult Blind of the entire state with only the help of a secretary. I was further handicapped in my efforts by the reduction of my expense fund from \$1,500 annually to \$1,000 annually. In 1923 the annual fund was exhausted by October first, making it impossible to hold the usual sale of work at the State Fair or to do any work outside of Denver during October and November. With great care I have been able to meet the expenses of 1924 with a small balance.

There is a steady need in different parts of the state for the services of a teacher, but only a limited number can be taught each year. Besides being unable to instruct or even to visit once all of the blind of the state, it is impossible to do the "follow up" work which should be done among those who are taught.

PLACES VISITED

Blind people have been visited in Greeley, Johnstown, Ft. Collins, Longmont, Boulder, Colorado Springs, Cripple Creek, Victor, on a ranch near Rush, Edgewater, Englewood, Pueblo, Canon City, The Pines near West Cliff, Leadville, Salida, Glenwood Springs, Grand Junction, Fruita, Delta, Montrose, and Denver—eighteen counties.

A TRIP TO THE WESTERN SLOPE

August 12, 1924, I started in the automobile for the Western Slope and returned to Denver October 6, 1924. On the way to Grand Junction, I made short stops in the principal towns, attended the monthly meeting of the Colorado Springs Association for the Blind, visited pupils of former years, gathered information regarding the blind from County Clerks, and went out of my way to instruct a woman at The Pines. I spend some time in Grand Junction, going out from there to Fruita, Delta, and Montrose. I started twelve people in reading, and one of them also learned rake-knitting. We held a one-day sale of work in Grand Junction and a three-day sale at the Montrose Fair. I received a warm welcome from the blind and their friends in that part of the state. There were more requests for help than I could respond to, and I started

on my return trip with regret, because of the amount of good which could have been done for the people all over the Western Slope had it been possible for me to remain to do it.

There should, by all means, be a teacher located in Grand Junction to take charge of the work in that section.

THE ADULT BLIND HOME SHOP

As chairman of the industrial committee of the Adult Blind Home Association, aided by my committee, Mrs. Mabel Smith, Dr. E. J. Clark, and L. C. Jackson, I assisted in opening a shop in connection with the Adult Blind Home. This shop is being financed by the Adult Blind Home, which is one of the private charitable institutions of the City of Denver. Instructions have been given in the shop in rug weaving, mop making, and basketry. Work of the finest quality is being produced. The work is progressing slowly but steadily under the efficient direction of Mrs. Pearl M. Gran, aided by the industrial committee.

SALES

During this period sixteen sales were held—thirteen in Denver, one at the Crowley County Fair, one at the Montrose Fair, and one in Grand Junction. The total value of the work sold was \$328.35. Twenty blind people have contributed work to these sales, and have received the money for their work which was sold.

A FEW VOLUNTARY EXPRESSIONS OF MY PUPILS

“I am so glad you came. Reading is my only pleasure.”

“The Lord sent you to me. I was unable to work and had no way to pass the unhappy hours, but now I don't have to be idle if I am able to sit up. I get comfort from my books.”

The following was written by the widow of Judge Charles E. Waldo of Canon City, soon after his death, July 13, 1924:

“I can never be grateful enough to you for teaching him to read and write the blind system. It helped him to put in the time and made him feel he was not quite useless.”

Judge Waldo learned to read and write New York Point in February, 1916, when about seventy years of age. He used the writing to assist himself in his office work until about six months before his death and he read the Matilda Zeigler magazine for the blind until the last two months of his life.

Miss Ellen M. Forswall, having resigned as secretary, Howard Pine of Denver was engaged as her successor and began his duties November 1, 1924.

Besides visiting and assisting many who were already on my list, I have come into personal touch with 115 other people during this period, and 85 received instruction.

Twenty-six have received personal instruction in Braille Reading.

Three were helped in Braille reading by mail.

Five were instructed in Braille writing.

One was instructed in New York Point reading.

Thirty-two were instructed in Moon Type reading.
 One was helped with Moon Type reading by mail.
 Two were assisted with Typewriting.
 Twenty-four were assisted with pencil writing.
 One was assisted with spelling.
 Nine were assisted with rake knitting.
 One was assisted with door mat making.
 One was assisted with hammoek making.
 One was assisted with crocheting.
 Three were assisted with bead work.
 Ten were taught the use of self-threading needles.

It is impossible to be very accurate in stating the number who have really succeeded with their work, especially in the case of those who live at a distance from Denver, because it is impossible for me to keep in personal touch with them and it is difficult to get them to send in satisfactory reports.

I already have a list of twenty-six pupils for the new year.

STATE BOARDS, BUREAUS AND COMMISSIONS STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

During the biennium just ended, there have been held twenty meetings of this Constitutional Board, two of which were the annual meetings required by statute to be held on the last Saturday in December, nineteen twenty-three and twenty-four, respectively. At these meetings there were issued upon the recommendation of the State Board of Examiners, 194 Diplomas of Eminent Service. During the biennium 14 appeals were handed down, at which 3 hearings were had with legal representatives of both sides and evidence taken.

STATE BOARD OF EXAMINERS

Sixteen meetings of the State Board of Examiners, a statutory board appointed jointly by the State Board of Education and the Presidents of the State Educational Institutions, have been held during the past biennium. The main task of the Board during that period has been the formulation of rules based upon the interpretation of the certification law for teachers, which took effect July fifteenth, nineteen hundred twenty-three. This has been a delicate and difficult undertaking, and the Superintendent is deeply grateful to all the members of this Board for the time and thought so freely given and also to the office of the Attorney General who has assisted in clearing away legal technicalities and placing the issuance of certificates of various types upon a sound, statutory and professional basis.

CO-OPERATIVE COMMITTEE OF THE INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER LEARNING

Among the newer and most important pieces of co-operative work undertaken by the Department of Public Instruction, is that conducted in unison with the Institutions of Higher Learning under the Chairmanship of the Superintendent.

The task of this Committee has been to establish Extension Summer Schools in connection with some of the Institute districts, where work of college grade has been conducted by extension Professors of the several Institutions. The credits given at these Extension Summer Schools are recognized by all the Institutions, and can be used in meeting the requirements of the certification law of nineteen twenty-three. By this means, many teachers have been enabled to work toward the B. A. degree, have their certificates renewed, and still remain in the vicinity of their homes.

In the summer of nineteen twenty-four, such schools were conducted at Glenwood Springs, Fort Lewis, and Alamosa, and were of incalculable benefit to the teaching force of those localities. Those projected for this year are located at Glenwood Springs, Lamar, and Fort Lewis.

There were many legal and educational difficulties to be overcome before these schools could be authorized to give college credits, and at the same time receive money from the Institute fund, but the cordial co-operation of the Attorney General's office, the Faculties of the Institutions of Higher Learning, and the Institute Committees, made possible this educational achievement.

REPORT OF THE STATE READING CIRCLE BOARD

The following is the report of the State Reading Circle Board for the biennium. Much time and thought are given by this group to the careful selection of books for the use of the teachers and pupils in the public schools of Colorado. The Teachers Reading Circle Books if purchased each year, soon form a nucleus of an excellent pedagogical library, while the school districts which purchase the Pupils Reading Circle Books are indeed to be congratulated upon the vital service they render to the district that they serve.

THE COLORADO BLIND BENEFIT COMMISSION

The Colorado Blind Benefit Commission is a statutory board created by an initiative law passed in November of nineteen eighteen, and in effect since January first, nineteen nineteen. It is composed of two ex-officio officers, the Auditor of State, and the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, and one member appointed by the Governor to act as Secretary. The meetings of this Commission average about eighteen a year. During its sessions, careful scrutiny is given to all applications, and testimony both written and oral is received, recommendations from the counties from which the applications are made being given great weight in the making of decisions.

During the past year the Commission received 209 new applications, making the total registration since January 1, 1919, when the Relief law took effect, 1,542. The Commission, composed of the Auditor of State, Superintendent of Public Instruction, and the Secretary, held twenty-four meetings to pass upon these cases as well as many other important matters.

Since the inauguration of this relief, the following shows the decision as to the applications:

A great deal of work is necessary in investigating and preparing these cases for hearing. The closest scrutiny is given to each person to determine that they are blind and worthy of this relief. It has developed upon the secretary to devote all the time to this work, which has been done most conscientiously.

During the past biennial period the cost to the state in benefits amounted to \$237,077.91, while the expense including secretary's salary amounted to less than \$1,000 for the two years.

Inasmuch as the average age of these beneficiaries is 65 years, and the greater proportion of them have lived in Colorado more than 40 years, the death rate will continue heavy. We have fewer than 100 blind persons under 45 years of age.

FACTS ABOUT THE COLORADO BLIND

A Rebuttal of Misstatements Recently Propagated by the Sensational Press.

Colorado has proportionately no more needy blind than other states, nor is the number increasing from the outside.

Total registration for relief in six years, 1,542.

Benefits in effect at present time, 1,072.

Allotments run from \$60 to \$300 per annum.

Total payment by State past fiscal year, \$124,947.36.

Individual average, \$115.75; monthly allowance average, \$9.63.

Cost of maintaining office of Commission past year, \$499.16.

Average age of Beneficiaries, 68 years.

Average length of residence in Colorado, 40 years.

There are fewer than one hundred under 45 years of age.

In 1924 only four registered as having lived in Colorado the legal time of three years; six for four years; five for five years; seventy-five from 40 to 70 years and 63 between 20 and 40 years.

One hundred eighty-seven are from 60 to 106 years of age.

Three hundred eleven Beneficiaries have died; more than one hundred have been disallowed or suspended.

Thirteen Beneficiaries have removed from the State, and seven have been sent to the insane asylum.

All of the 23 beneficiary states have decided that the Colorado plan is the most equitable and just compensation for the blind.

Dividing the cost equally between State and County is generally approved and other states are adopting it.

SHEPPARD-TOWNER

November 23, 1921, Congress passed the law known as the Sheppard-Towner Act. December 17, 1921, Governor Shoup designated the Child Welfare Bureau to carry out the provisions of the National Sheppard-Towner Act in Colorado.

September 18, 1922, the National Children's Bureau approved the working plans for the Maternity and Infancy work submitted by the Colorado Child Welfare Bureau and deposited with the State Treasurer \$7,500.00 for use in Colorado.

On April 30, 1923, the State Legislature ratified Governor Shoup's designation of the Colorado Child Welfare Bureau to carry on the Maternity and Infancy work and appropriated \$5,000.00 of the \$11,337.20 asked for to meet the Federal grant on a dollar for dollar basis, the Federal Act providing for \$5,000.00 flat to the State regardless of legislative action. The annual amount available for work for Maternity and Infancy in Colorado for 1923 was \$15,000.00 with a like sum of \$15,000.00 for 1924.

FOREWORD ON HEALTH CONFERENCES

These conferences are conducted thru five state agencies. The Extension Division of the State University thru their organization department enter a community explaining the advantages to the community in having a health conference where mothers may bring their children for a thoro examination and be taught the first rules of health. A charge is made for service to this community—and if the service is accepted committees are appointed and the local people are instructed in arranging for meeting places, for helpers, and for physicians' services, and in obtaining the proper publicity, etc. The day of the conference it is usual to have the physical examination in the morning conducted by the State Pediatrician assisted by local physicians. A program on health in the afternoon and a summary of the examination in the evening complete the day. Both meetings are open for discussion after each talk. The agencies represented are the State University, the State Board of Health, The Colorado Tuberculosis Association, the State Dental Association and the Child Welfare Bureau.

The follow-up work from these health demonstrations is one of the most valuable pieces of work done by the Bureau. It is arranged, whenever advisable, to establish a permanent Health Station about a month after the first conference. This is the special work of the State Maternity and Infancy Nurse. She uses the same committee and notices are sent direct from the Bureau to every one attending the first conference that the Station will be open at such an hour, at such a place. Out of 45 conferences held this nurse was able to establish 17 permanent health stations, one of the best records for any state doing Sheppard-Towner work.

The follow-up work from the conferences with the defective child, mentally and physically, has been most gratifying considering the State appropriates no funds for this special child. The cases are handled financially thru the parents first if there is the

slightest possibility of their caring for the bill in the future, next thru the county and many times thru local organizations like the local Child Welfare Bureaus, the Rotarians, the Masons, and other groups so ready to help the needy child.

In 1923 the Bureau was in touch with 104 feeble-minded children in 76 homes. The parents objected to the distance of the State Home and Training School for the Feeble-minded and also to the relinquishment of all authority over their child when taken over by the State. In 1924 the Bureau had referred to it 53 cases of feeble-mindedness. Of these only 20 families were favorable to institutionalizing their children. Being overcrowded the State Homes could not accept any more boys and only one girl was admitted thru the efforts of the Bureau.

With conditions such as these facing our efforts in caring for this special child, the Bureau felt the necessity of surveying the State, thru the schools, of the mentally retarded and abnormally unsocial child in order to put before the legislators the facts that special training or housing might be provided. This survey started November 1, 1924. Teachers were sent 5,000 letters asking them to specify their retarded children, children in homes or schools incapable of learning and the abnormally unsocial child in their school or district. The results are to be tabulated and presented to the Legislature in January.

STATE FAIR

In co-operation with the Extension Division of the State Agricultural College, the Bureau put on a Health Demonstration for the children of the Boys' and Girls' Clubs attending the Fair. A most thoro examination was given 65 children. The Pueblo County Medical Association furnished the attending physicians, the County Dental Association the dentists, the Parent-Teacher Association the women clerks, the Bessemer Y. M. C. A. the men clerks for care of the boys. The Fair Association provided entrance tickets for the workers. While the boys' physical examination was taking place in the morning, the girls were being given a mental test. In the afternoon, the girls were examined physically and the boys tested mentally. The mental tests were conducted under the direction of the State Department of Public Instruction.

SURVEY IN EL PASO COUNTY

BREAST FEEDING AND VITAL STATISTICS

Under the direction of the El Paso County Child Welfare Bureau, the services of a Maternity and Infancy Nurse were granted that county to make a survey of the midwife situation and maternal and infant births and deaths. One midwife was found in the eastern part of the county doing a heavy business with more than a hundred births to her credit and never one registration. The widwife situation was recognized by the County Health authorities and efforts made to remedy the condition. This piece of work was largely instrumental in establishing a County Nurse. The Bureau of Vital Statistics of El Paso County is sending out birth registration certificates with a card saying the Colorado Child Welfare Bureau will supply literature on prenatal, infant, and child care to anyone interested.

PRENATAL CLASSES IN SAN LUIS VALLEY

In order to reach the pregnant mother in the Spanish speaking population of the San Luis Valley, a Spanish Social Worker was engaged to band these women together in small groups for instructions in maternal hygiene by the State Nurse. Not to confine these classes too definitely to prenatal cases only, any woman of any age was welcomed to these lectures. One of the most definite results of this work was the establishment of a Health Station at Lariat with the local W. C. T. U. carrying on the work.

LARIMER COUNTY

The Maternity and Infancy classes in Larimer County held by the Maternity and Infancy nurse were in co-operation with the Colorado Agricultural College, Extension Division. The County Home Demonstration Agent arranged meetings with the different Women's Home Economics Clubs in the county. It gave the Maternity and Infancy department a chance to have organized groups for classes and in turn helps the Home Demonstration Agent in the following manner: When the mothers and women of the communities become more definitely interested in proper care for their children they will be more interested in the proper way to sew and cook for them and in the most efficient ways of keeping house.

The classes in Larimer County were very successful. Because of these, three of the rural communities have organized Health Centers. They will take one club day in three months for the weighing and measuring and examining of their pre-school children.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL DIRECTOR

DECEMBER 1, 1922-MAY 31, 1923

The time of the director in and out of the office has been spent in giving information to the public and the legislators regarding the Sheppard-Towner Law for Maternity and Infaney.

Thru her efforts an infant welfare station has been started in the Jewish Social Center under the supervision of the Visiting Nurse Association.

Assisted in three one-day Health Conferences in the San Luis Valley at Del Norte, Monte Vista, and Alamosa, and explained the Sheppard-Towner Act at the afternoon meetings. Wrote a report of these conferences for publication.

Prepared a Better Babies folder containing a list of valuable books recommended by librarians and the National Children's Bureau. These books have been placed in the Denver Library and all of its eleven branches. The folder has been sent out with all library advertising material and all Bureau literature. A letter was also written to each librarian in the state requesting them to include these books in the Home-Making Section of their library and give this new reading matter as wide publicity as possible thru their local papers and all public welfare organizations.

A package of literature containing pamphlets on Prenatal Care, Infant Care, Child Care, and Malnutrition, leaflets on breast Feeding, Birth Registration, and Better Babies folders, have been sent to all libraries in the state for loaning purposes. Very encouraging returns are coming in as to the increasing use of this material by young mothers.

A dodger was printed calling attention of parents to the importance of using all of this material as the beginning of a Home-Making Library to which they can constantly refer. "The aim being to prevent illness and keep the child well." This dodger has been placed in every one of the packages of literature sent from this office.

REPORT OF THE PARENT-TEACHER ASSOCIATION

The Parent-Teacher Association co-operates closely with the Department of Public Instruction, and its State Organizer as a part of the Child Welfare Bureau, is a co-operative member of the staff of the Department.

My dear Mrs. Bradford:

In response to your request for a short report of the activities of the Colorado Congress of Parents and Teachers we are pleased to submit the following.

On account of voting to hold our State Convention in the fall instead of in the spring, we held two meetings this year, one in Canon City and one in Denver. Both were well attended and much interest was shown by teachers and parents in plans for improving the condition of the schools throughout the state.

The National Board of The Congress of Parents and Teachers held its October meeting in Denver and a great deal of inspiration was gained through having the members of this Board with us at our fall Convention. Our National President, Mrs. A. H. Reeve, spoke at the City Auditorium to a large audience and all present were impressed with her wide vision of the field for service offered through the united efforts of our 700,000 members.

Our State membership has increased over three thousand in the past year and we have forty-six new associations since September, 1924.

This year we have concentrated our effort largely on the Legislative work and have been instrumental in having seven bills introduced, all of them being Child Welfare measures. We have sent letters to all our four hundred and eighty-six associations urging them to take action on the Child Labor Amendment and the Library Bill and many of them have passed resolutions, copies of which were sent to the members of the Legislature.

The Children's Reading Chairman devised a plan for using worth-while magazine articles and stories in the form of booklets, which were sent out to the rural schools through the offices of the County Superintendents, after having been bound and packed by the members of the County Councils. Jefferson, Arapahoe, El Paso, Boulder, and Larimer Counties all have "Book Caravans" out on the road. These caravans are proving of great benefit to schools far removed from libraries.

The Music Chairman is very desirous of having the children of Colorado familiar with good music so she has planned a State-wide Music Memory Contest sponsored by the Colorado Congress of Parents and Teachers. She hopes every school will enter this contest so Colorado's future citizens will know and appreciate the

best in music. Further details of this contest may be obtained at the State office, 321 State Museum Building, Denver.

Another activity that is proving of much interest to both the teachers and parents is the "Sleep Campaign," which was so successfully tried in St. Paul last year. All teachers know the need of the growing child for plenty of sleep in a well ventilated room, so pledge cards have been compiled which explain the need of sleep and the number of hours children of different ages require. These are sent to the homes, signed by the parents and returned to the school. This plan has been received with enthusiasm by the teachers and most of the schools that are trying it report almost unanimous co-operation by the parents. The children are educated along the line by being taught sleep songs and quotations and in making posters.

All the superintendents, both city and county, have received a letter asking their co-operation in forming new congresses and encouraging the old ones. We have received letters from many of the newly elected ones expressing their interest and desire to help, also encouraging reports from many of those who have served so faithfully in the past years.

The Boys' Loan Fund, Thrift, Humane Education, and Health committees and many others are doing splendid work along their own lines and we feel that the work of the Congress is progressing very satisfactorily throughout the state.

We heartily appreciate the fine co-operation of the State Department of Education and of our State Superintendent and wish at this time to thank all who have lent their assistance in furthering this work.
