

LETTER OF RECOMMENDATION TO THE GOVERNOR
AND THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

My dear Governor Morley:

I have the honor to submit herewith a statement of the needs of the office of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction for the biennium that will close November 30, 1928.

I recommend for the sixth time an increase in the salary of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction from the sum of Three Thousand Dollars a year to Five Thousand Dollars a year. May I call your attention to the fact that the salary of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction has not been increased since that office was created in 1876—A HALF CENTURY AGO? That one of the six executive constitutional officers of the commonwealth should receive a less salary than many holding merely appointive, and comparatively unimportant positions, has become, in the eyes of the school people of the state, and thousands of other thinking citizens of Colorado, little less than a scandal. The salary of every other state official, not fixed by constitutional limitations, has been raised more than once during that period, and, while it is true that this increase in the salary of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction cannot take effect during the biennium upon which we shall enter January 11, 1927, the passage of such a law would redeem the Department of Public Instruction from the financial discrimination and stigma that it has borne for so many decades. The next biennium would see the State Superintendent of Public Instruction in possession of a salary commensurate with the importance of the service rendered and the place held by education in the hearts and minds of the people.

In accordance with the practice in most of the more progressive states, I recommend that the State and County Superintendents each be elected for four-year terms. There seems to be no good reason for discriminating between County Judges and County Superintendents, and, in the case of the State Superintendent, no adequate supervisory and executive policy can be even approximately carried out in less than a four-year term.

I recommend that the Deputy State Superintendent of Public Instruction should receive a salary EQUAL TO THAT ENJOYED BY OTHER DEPUTIES OF CONSTITUTIONAL EXECUTIVE OFFICERS OF THE STATE, the increase being from Twenty-one Hundred Dollars to Twenty-five Hundred Dollars per annum.

I recommend suitable increases (such increases being noted on the budget sheet accompanying these recommendations) in the salaries of clerks and stenographers in view of the general rising salaries paid for this kind of service. This is simple justice and should take effect immediately.

I recommend that a State Supervisor of Adult Education should be added to the staff of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction at a minimum salary of Sixteen Hundred Twenty Dollars a year, in order to carry on the struggle against illiteracy which is necessary in this, as in other states.

The total number of illiterates in Colorado is 24,208 of which

8,624 are native white illiterates; 14,224 are foreign born white illiterates, and 619 are negro illiterates. There are 22,080 illiterate voters in the Commonwealth of Colorado, an appalling number, indeed, for thinking citizens of this state to contemplate. That some other states have this evil to combat in even greater numbers is nothing to the point. It is a disgrace that Colorado has even as much as 3.2% of illiteracy. In school districts of various classes, and by volunteer organizations, such as the Parent-Teachers Association and the Daughters of the American Revolution, and similar groups, a heroic fight against this condition has been waged with measurable success, but the STATE ITSELF must be enlisted in the battle as a unifying and directing force before there will be much hope of a speedy betterment of conditions.

I again recommend the passage of the County Unit Bill, the best educational thought of Colorado and the nation being almost unanimous in favor of this plan of educational organization in the counties. The district system has been abandoned in the majority of the forward looking states and Colorado should take its place among them.

I also desire heartily to endorse the legislative program of the Colorado Education Association, including the proposed survey as a basis for a Teachers' Retirement measure to be submitted to the General Assembly two years hence, and the reorganization of the State Department of Public Instruction as outlined by the Colorado Education Association.

Reports of progress already made will be incorporated in the complete biennial report of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction for 1925-1926. This communication consists solely of recommendations necessary for the improvement of the educational service of the state.

STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

During the biennium just ended, there have been held eighteen meetings of this Constitutional Board, two of which were the annual meetings required by statute to be held on the last Saturday in December, nineteen hundred twenty-five and twenty-six, respectively. At these meetings there were issued upon the recommendation of the State Board of Examiners, one hundred six Diplomas of Eminent Service. REPORT OF ASSISTANT STATE LIBRARIAN

Hon. Mary C. C. Bradford,

Dear Mrs. Bradford:

I have the honor to submit, for your consideration and approval, a report of the activities of the State Library, for the biennial period of 1925-1926, which has been one of struggle and disappointment. The battle to overcome difficulties encountered has been hard and most discouraging. The State Library, a constitutionally provided for department of the State, had the machine gun of destruction turned upon it at the opening of the Twenty-fifth General Assembly and, while it lived through the attacks made by certain legislation, and the bills which were drawn and introduced that were calculated to destroy it were lost, the Governor saw fit to veto all appropriations touching its support, including the salary of the Assistant State Librarian, which was restored, after almost a year, by a decision of the Supreme Court. However, notwithstanding all these hindrances, the doors have been kept open and the general and special work of the Library has been carried on every day, and, in spite of the fact that there has been no money for book purchases, subscriptions to periodicals, or for maintenance of any kind, there has been added to the Library much valuable material as gifts and upon exchange.

Our cry is still for more and better stacks and equipment, and the restoration of that portion which was taken from the Library to create a hearing room for the Public Utilities Commission before the erection of the new State Office Building. I recommend that this be done during the early part of the coming biennial period.

More assistance is needed and there should be a much larger appropriation for this, as well as for maintenance and book purchases than we have ever had. With no funds with which to purchase reference books which are published annually, there has been much difficulty in giving out the latest and most valuable information which is needed by the patrons of the Library and the failure to secure these has not only been a serious handicap, but has also caused a gap in the collections which, if they are not secured, will still prove a great inconvenience to the Librarian and also to those who come for earlier references. I believe such purchases should be made as soon as there is any money available. There are many valuable books which might have been secured during the past two years at a minimum cost, which we may not be able to secure now, or in the near future. I trust the incoming Administration may see the need, and that the State will be able to do more for the State Library than it has ever done.

Through gifts and on exchange we have acquired some very valuable books which have been properly classified and catalogued, and, in most cases, properly shelved at the expense of great labor in shifting and manipulation on the part of the Librarian. We have added to our splendid collection of genealogy, besides some valuable family records, forty-seven volumes of Maryland Archives and many other historical books from the different states.

The number of volumes which have been added to the Library in the two years nineteen twenty-five and nineteen twenty-six is 774, which does not include unbound books or pamphlets.

Two hundred and fifty-five books were received in the Library and sent to the Supreme Court Library.

The Adult Blind Department has sent out eight hundred thirty-seven volumes. This work could be increased by the addition of new books, but there have been none purchased during this biennium.

The demand for books of reference and educational material has been unusually large and the patronage is growing very rapidly.

May I add that the re-arrangement and handling of all these books and documents, the classifying and recording of the same, besides serving the general public, caring for the correspondence and giving special attention to the incoming bills and matters pertaining to the Legislature while it is in session, is a more varied and arduous task than should ever be expected of one official? Indeed it can not be done, therefore, I have been compelled to secure some assistance, paying for this from my own meager salary.

Let us hope that another biennium will give us more room by the restoration of what rightfully belongs to the State Library, more and better stacks, and more assistance for real library service. Those who come to a library for legislative reference are usually working under high pressure, and need to have the help which will give them the information needed in the quickest and surest manner. This, with many other things should receive consideration in looking toward a larger growth of the Library.

When we have come to the end of a biennial period which has shown great advancement, we can look upon the work with much pleasure. I trust that such will be the feeling two years hence, when there will again be a report submitted.

The report of the Certification Division included in the nineteen twenty-four Biennial Report of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction states:

"The Superintendent of Public Instruction congratulates the

entire educational system of the Commonwealth on the valuable achievements that have already resulted from the operations of the certification law of nineteen twenty-three. While adding greatly to the work of the State Board of Examiners, the members of that group have been more than willing to co-operate with the State Superintendent and Supervisor of Certification in this constructive effort to professionalize teaching in Colorado, and to guarantee to Colorado children the advantage of a well trained teaching body."

This effort and lavish expenditure of time by the State Board of Examiners has continued. In addition to working out the details of the interpretation of the new law, the Board has, through committees appointed from special groups of teachers in the state, standardized the minimum requirements for six special certificates. These are special certificates to teach Music, Art, Commercial Subjects, Home Economics, Physical Education and Manual Training.

The Certification Division has been augmented by the addition of a stenographer to aid the Supervisor.

REPORT OF CHARLES E. GREENE

THE COLORADO METHOD OF STATE EXAMINATIONS
FOR TEACHERS' COUNTY CERTIFICATES

THE FIRST EXAMINATION UNDER THE NEW LAW

In August, 1923, the first examination held under the new law was given. Questions were made as usual by various people requested to make five or ten each of the essay type. About August twentieth, twenty-five thousand papers arrived at the office of the State Superintendent to be graded. Mrs. Mary C. C. Bradford, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, had evolved a tentative plan of grading and had called in some thirty teachers, principals, and superintendents to grade the papers, placing the writer of this paper in charge. After working two weeks on the problem certain features of it stood out plainly:

1. The questions were made by one group of teachers and the papers graded by another group who did not always know what the former meant by their questions.
2. The questions were often capable of more than one interpretation.
3. Each grader worked on one subject only, using his own standards. They worked in groups by subjects and conferred often about the marking of certain questions but this affected the marking very little. The distribution of marks by individuals was as great as is usually found among teachers who grade essay type examinations.
4. Since no clerical force was provided, graders had to copy their marks. A large number of inaccuracies resulted.
5. Some graders turned out a large amount of work, others accomplished very little. The law provides one dollar per applicant to pay for the grading of papers, and when all papers were graded and grades copied a large deficit in the fund made up from the fees resulted.
6. The examination questions were inadequate for measuring the teacher's professional knowledge. All were of the essay type. On the subject of grammar and composition all were on technical grammar. In arithmetic all were verbal problems to be solved by the applicant.
7. Often papers were missing when the time came to copy the grades.

After a conference between Mrs. Mary C. C. Bradford, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, and the writer, it was clear that further re-organization of the examination system was necessary. The re-organization was not effected all at once. Experience indicated the necessity of further changes before the following organization was perfected.

THE STANDARDIZATION COMMITTEE

The writer chose seven assistants with the approval of the State Superintendent who were appointed and certified to the State Civil Service to act as a part of the staff of the State Superintendent and to have charge of the examinations of teachers. The stan-

dardization committee consisted of three city school superintendents, one senior high school teacher, one junior high school teacher, one elementary school teacher, the head of the English department of one of the State educational institutions and the writer as chairman.

THE MAKING OF QUESTIONS

All questions are made by the standardization committee. Examinations are given in twenty-three subjects in Colorado. They are as follows: Geography, school management and reading circle, reading, elementary science and agriculture, sanitation and hygiene, grammar and composition, spelling, arithmetic, history and constitution of the United States and Colorado, civics, writing and school law for third grade certificates; physical and commercial geography, Colorado history, American literature, and current events in addition for second grade certificates; and geometry or algebra, physics or chemistry, general history, English literature, and psychology in addition for first grade certificates.

In making examinations the standardization committee has in consultation with the State Superintendent attempted to do the following things:

1. Since one reason on the part of would-be teachers for attending institutes is to prepare for the state examinations, the questions should not consist of faetual material that will aid in a cramming process, but should encourage study of recent trends in education and methods of teaching.
2. Because of the unreliability of essay type tests at least half of the examinations are of the new type.
3. Older examinations related mostly to subject content much of it not of value to a teacher; the present questions are divided about equally on method and content, many times relating method to content.
4. All questions are critieised on the basis of the following criteria:
 - a. Is the English clear and capable of only one interpretation?
 - b. Is a knowledge of the answer to the question necessary or desirable for a teacher to have?
 - c. Do the questions sample fairly the content of the subject?
 - d. Are the questions too difficult or technical in character?
 - e. Are the answers obviously easy?

STANDARDIZATION OF ANSWERS

Essay Type Examinations—

One of the chief defects of the essay type examination is that the scoring is not objective. The same paper that is marked high by one grader may be marked low by another. The task of the standardization committee is to attempt to remedy this. After the papers from the various counties come into the office of the State Superintendent the standardization committee first grades one hundred papers in each subject in which the essay type question was used, each member of course grading papers for which he made the questions. The papers are selected from counties that are generally typical of the state in the grades given in former examinations. For the work of standardization the papers are graded by questions, the answers to each question being read through all papers. This makes possible a classification of the various answers

given. The answers with very few individual exceptions are of some four to six types. Sometimes more than one type of answer is correct. The incorrect types are given a rating on the basis of a credit of ten to twenty for a perfect answer, depending on whether there are five or ten questions in the examination. After the examinations have been graded by questions they are then graded by papers to see whether the sum of the ratings allowed for the various questions on an individual paper sums up to a reasonable grade for the paper as a whole.

The marking system is to some extent fixed by law. To receive a certificate a teacher must have an average grade of seventy-five per cent; a grade of less than sixty per cent in any subject bars the applicant from a certificate. A part of the work of standardization is to find the per cent of the papers graded that fall below seventy-five per cent and below sixty per cent. It is sometimes discovered that the examination questions are much more difficult than was supposed so that a large percentage of the applicants fall below seventy-five per cent. When such a situation arises the distribution of grades for all the other examinations is taken as the norm for grades to be given in the particular examination on which the grades are low, unless it is a clear case of neglect on the part of all applicants. This is sometimes true as in school management and reading circle where the answers to the questions can only be obtained from a knowledge of the state reading circle books. In all events a very close scrutiny is made of papers marked below sixty per cent because such a grade fails the applicant for a certificate.

When one hundred each of the essay type examinations have been so marked the distribution of grades in each subject is made. Since there are one hundred papers in each the number of applicants given each mark is the per cent receiving it. A distribution is then made of all the marks of all essay type examinations. This is compared with the normal distribution below:

Below 75	7 per cent
75 to 81.....	24 " "
82 to 87.....	38 " "
88 to 93.....	24 " "
94 to 100.....	7 " "

The distribution is then compared with distributions of former examinations. If the distribution of grades varies greatly from the normal distribution or from those of other examinations a conference of the committee follows in which the distribution for each subject is scrutinized. If the committee believes that the grades are too high or too low papers are graded from other counties to verify judgment.

NEW TYPE EXAMINATIONS

When the distribution of scores has thus been determined for essay type examinations it is used to convert the scores from new type examinations to percentage grades. To do this one hundred papers are scored according to keys prepared by the committee members who wrote the various examinations respectively. When they have been marked the scores are changed to percentage grades by using the per cents receiving each grade on the essay type dis-

tribution of grades. For example suppose the following to be the distribution of grades on the essay type examination:

Below 60	3 per cent
60 to 75.....	14 " "
75 to 81.....	45 " "
81 to 93.....	30 " "
93 to 100.....	8 " "

The lowest three per cent of scores on the new type examination are then given grades below sixty per cent, varying according to the differences in those scores and giving no grades lower than the lowest grade on the distribution of scores on essay type examinations. The next fourteen per cent of the scores are assigned from sixty per cent to seventy-five per cent on the basis of the per cent receiving each grade on the essay type distribution after the curve has been smoothed and so on until percentage grade equivalents have been assigned all scores on the new type examinations.

After the above work of standardization has been done it is subject to the common sense and judgment of the committee on standardization and all grades are subject to change if found unfair or invalid. It should be remarked that while the one hundred papers on each examination are being graded the committee is constantly studying the validity of the question. If a question is invalid it is not considered in the marking.

INSTRUCTION TO GRADERS

After the work of standardization has been done some twenty to thirty teachers and other school people are called in to do the work of marking. They are asked their preference in regard to subjects where essay type questions have been used. Each grader is assigned a letter which he must record with the grade given at the top of the first page of each examination paper, so that errors can be traced and responsibility fixed.

The graders then meet in conference with members of the standardization committee for instructions for grading. Each receives score keys for all new type examinations with grade equivalents and a list of answers allowed with the credits to be given for each on essay type examinations. He is instructed to consult the standardization committee if other answers are found that seem acceptable. The first day's work is largely one of conference between the graders and members of the standardization committee.

MARKING THE EXAMINATIONS

Organization of Sub-Committees—

The graders are assigned to sub-committees of six to eight each in such a way that all subjects are represented in each sub-committee and with a member of the standardization committee as chairman. Further assignment or re-assignment of subjects has to be made in some sub-committees and this is done by the sub-committee chairmen. The sub-committee organization is made to aid in the supervision of marking and to see that justice is done each county and each applicant. Each sub-committee is assigned the grading of papers from certain counties so that the grades for individual applicants may be compared when a question arises and so that the

chairman may see what the range of grades is for each county. At the end of each day a report is handed in by every grader showing the number of papers graded, by essay type and new type separately and listing the grades given. The sub-committee chairman may then check up as to the amount of work done by each grader and the distribution of grades received. During the first two days papers often have to be regraded.

INSPECTION OF GRADES

After the grades have been copied and averaged it is the task of the writer to inspect all grades before they are turned over to the State Superintendent for final inspection before being sent back to the counties. This inspection sometimes reveals questionable grades within a subject or within a county so that the papers may have to be regraded.

RESULTS OF THE SYSTEM

1. The County Superintendents were glad to be relieved of all suspicion of being unfair or partial in marking.
2. The questions were fairer though often more difficult.
3. Applicants liked the new type examinations because they took less time to answer and gave one a better chance to show his knowledge of the subject.
4. Most of the County Superintendents were professional minded and saw the advantages of the new type examinations; in fact many of them have requested the use of the new type for eighth grade examinations.
5. Since the questions call for professional reading a larger number of applicants are going to summer schools.
6. The school people of the state respect the system of certification and the method of administering the state examinations.
7. Through careful management the fee of one dollar per applicant now pays for making the questions and marking the papers.
8. Mistakes are nearly always discovered before grades are copied and sent to County Superintendents.

REPORT OF THE STATE READING CIRCLE WORK

In the last two years this work has progressed rapidly in Colorado. Permanent work has taken on a new aspect. The people are more enthusiastic and greater beneficial and lasting results are being reported from all counties carrying on the work.

The major part of these activities are carried out through the Traveling Health Conference. Another State Agency has joined this organization during the last biennial period. There are now six State and State-wide agencies contributing to the personnel of this group.

HEALTH CONFERENCES

The organizer of the local groups, who is a representative of the University of Colorado through its Extension Division, asks that each community in which this health program is to be put over furnish a group of not less than twenty women to assist with the work at the time of the conference clerking for and aiding the local doctors and the visiting specialists. Arrangements are made that the local doctors and dentists shall always be a part of the examining group.

The conference is divided into the following divisions—First. The history room, under the direction of the Child Welfare Bureau. Here the parents register their children, giving a full physical and hygienic history of each child going through the conference. They also give an outline of the family history showing the child's home contacts.

Second. The child goes to the Dental room under the direction of the State Dental Association where a thorough examination of the teeth is made and advice given. Where there are local dentists the State's representative turns the division over to them and assists them in every way possible with their examinations.

Third is an eye examination by a representative of the Child Welfare Bureau. In this division only vision tests are made as the time allowed for each examination would not warrant or allow anything more complete for the eyes. The specialist at the close of the clinic makes note of any gross defects of the eyes and refers the patient to an oculist.

Fourth is the undressing room under the direction of local women.

Fifth is the weighing and measuring room under the supervision of the Colorado Tuberculosis Association. Here is where a child's nutrition is noted and from the findings in this room the specialist draws many of his conclusions for his advice to the parents as to diet, corrective posture, rest, etc. The nurse in charge of this division talks with the parent on malnutrition.

Seventh is an examination and a check up of the conference findings and the advice to the parents by a pediatrician from the Colorado Child Welfare Bureau. At this time the parent is granted all the time she needs for consultation on the previous findings.

Eighth is the dressing room under the supervision of local women.

Ninth is the record room under the Child Welfare Bureau where a copy of the complete diagnosis and advice from all the

divisions is made on a Health Certificate with which the parent is presented for further reference when consulting her family physician and for use at the time of follow-up work.

Tenth division is that of the psychologist from the Colorado Psychopathic Hospital. As the children pass through the conference about 10% are found to be special cases. These are all referred by the pediatrician to the psychologist. She makes her examinations and refers such cases as are necessary to the eleventh division under the psychiatrist representing the Colorado Psychopathic Hospital. These last two divisions extend their services to the adults of the community as well as to the special children passing through the conference and to any special nerve case referred to them by local physicians.

Twelfth division is presided over by an obstetrician from the Child Welfare Bureau. To him are referred prenatal cases and all cases of pelvic disorders resulting from maternity as well as cases of young maturing girls.

Thirteenth division is that under the Child Welfare Bureau giving service to the crippled children by a competent and recognized orthopedist.

When this health group is out on a series of conferences, cases for the last three named divisions are centered in one town, thus necessitating that these specialists be out a very small part of the time in comparison to the rest of the workers. The obstetrician does not enter any community which has less than twenty cases registered as there is too great an expense of time and money to justify his entering that community for less.

FOLLOW-UP WORK

Extremely interesting and profitable follow-up work from these conferences has been attempted throughout the state. Out of the sixty-three counties in Colorado fifty-six have had one or more health conferences and in very few communities have there been a lack of follow-up work. Wherever there is a local nurse the Bureau nurse turns over the work to her. In some communities the Red Cross has undertaken the entire follow-up program.

The Bureau nurse plans to return to a community about one month after the first State Health Conference. By that time a check-up can be made on corrections, on teeth, tonsils, health habits, diets, etc. She presides over the first permanent clinic instructing the local women in their tasks and guiding their activities. She often directs a tonsil clinic and so far splendid results have rewarded this work.

JUNE INSTITUTE

The two annual meetings for the county chairmen of Child Welfare Stations were held in June, 1925, and in June, 1926. These Institutes are three days of intensive study. Lectures are given on all phases of maternity and infancy hygiene. Reports from the different districts were read and local problems discussed at length. The reports of the chairmen whose stations have developed and grown stronger with the years were most encouraging to the chairmen just starting stations, with an uncertain attendance and in a community with only a half hearted interest in child health.

CONEJOS COUNTY FAIR

An unusual baby program is being put over at the Conejos County Fair. Babies are registered, weighed, measured and examined. These records are then carefully kept until the fair of following year. At that time the child is again weighed, measured and examined and his records compared with his records of the previous year. His markings for the prize are based upon his gains for the year. The contest confines itself to children under two years of age.

SUMMER ROUND-UP

The National Congress of Parents and Teachers undertook to put over a health program for the pre-school child endeavoring to have every child entering school in September examined the previous May. This would allow the parent the summer vacation months for correctional work.

The Sheppard-Towner division of the Bureau co-operated with this organization by allowing the big health conference to examine the pre-school children as a special group. The National organization permitted the use of the local records and accepted the findings of the conference physicians in both the May and September examinations. A great many Parent-Teacher Associations signed up for the first examination but on account of a change of hygiene chairmen at their spring elections and the examination occurring at the very first of the next school year before the new administration had become really active, the follow-up work suffered severely and only ten associations made any attempt to have a final round-up.

ORTHOPEDIC CASES

FOLLOW-UP

The follow-up work on orthopedic cases has been quite difficult as the State of Colorado makes no provision for this special child. In order to finance its hospitalization and its convalescing it has to be taken through as a county case, or through men's or women's service clubs, public organizations or other interested groups. The great drawback in putting over these cases is the length of time it takes for correction. The Masons have been very liberal in assisting but the age limit with the older children and the provision it must be a curable case have hampered the work beyond words.

STATE FAIRS

The annual examinations of the children of the Boys and Girls Clubs attending the State Fair as guests of the Colorado Agricultural College were held in September of 1925 and 1926.

In 1925 local doctors and dentists assisted at the physical examinations and the Pueblo Public Schools psychologist gave the mental tests.

In 1926 the State Health Conference group made the physical examinations and the mental tests were made under the supervision of a professor from the University of Denver.

SUMMARY AND COMMENTS

The State of Colorado, in the opinion of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, has reason to be proud of the foregoing reports.

The Assistant State Librarian particularly, deserves commendation for the uninterrupted, though for many months unpaid, labor she gave for the cause of library work in the State.

The certification law of 1923 has by this time fully vindicated itself through improved standards of teacher preparation that have resulted in placing Colorado among the half dozen states with really professional requirements for its teachers. There are two reports under the division of certification, one by Miss Helen von Rosenberg relating to state certification and one by Mr. Charles E. Greene, Chairman of the Grading Committee, relating to county certification.

One of the most noteworthy results of the certification law has been the very fine piece of work done by the several groups to which were entrusted by the State Superintendent the formulation of requirements for Special Certificates. These include—

- Music
- Art
- Commercial Subjects
- Home Economics
- Physical Education
- Manual Training

The State of Colorado is deeply indebted to the representatives of the various Schools and Institutions that co-operated with the State Superintendent and the Deputy State Superintendent in this work.

It is the earnest hope of the State Superintendent that the report of the Chairman of the Grading Committee may be read very carefully, as the adoption of the new type questions for county examinations has won for Colorado still another high place among educational progressive states.

The Child Welfare Bureau submits a most interesting, valuable and well articulated report, whose recommendations, if carried out, would mean much for the welfare of Colorado children.

Referring to the decrease in the number of illiterates reported to the Governor and the General Assembly in the beginning of this report, I desire to congratulate the schools and the lay organizations that have co-operated in the great crusade for the enfranchisement of those who are enslaved by lack of the ability to use the symbols of printed and written language.

The increase in school attendance and in the number of graduates from Colorado high schools during the biennium of 1924 and 1925, has continued through 1925 and 1926. During this period every section of the State of Colorado has been reached by the Superintendent, and everywhere has been found an increased spirit of professionalism on the part of the teachers, and greater attention to vocational guidance and vocational training, while the fame of Colorado's school buildings has been recognized throughout the union.

As will be seen from the reports submitted by the Reading Circle Board both in literary quality and professional value of the selected books, and in the number of sets distributed, the Reading Circle work has been conducted on an ever-advancing plane, and there is reason to believe that the service rendered by the Reading Circle Board has been of great value to the teachers and through them to the children of Colorado.

As was to have been expected from the general growth of the State during the biennium just ended, the census enrollment is larger than ever before. In 1925, the total census (6 to 21 years) was 300,778.

Total enrollment in public schools 255,115; or 84.8 per cent of the children of school age are enrolled in public schools. 73 per cent of those enrolled are in school every day.

Only about .7 of 1 per cent of children between 8 and 14 years of age are not enrolled in schools.

For 1926 the figures are as follows:

Total census 6 to 21 years, 301,783.

Total enrollment in public schools 250,087; or 83 per cent of the children of school age are enrolled in public schools. 73 per cent of those enrolled are in school every day.

Only about .7 of 1 per cent of children between 8 and 14 years of age are not enrolled in schools.

The estimated enrollment in private and parochial schools in the State of Colorado is about fifteen thousand.

These statistics are most gratifying, as they prove that the compulsory education law is accomplishing its purpose by securing the school enrollment and attendance of such a satisfactory percentage of the children of school age.

Once more I submit to the people of Colorado, my belief "that education is the chief business of the Republic," and I also desire to concur in the statement of one of the English speaking world's most brilliant and versatile writers when he says that "civilization is running a race between education and destruction." Therefore, I venture to believe that the recommendations of this Biennial Report will have back of them the sober and enlightened thought of the majority of Colorado's nearly eight thousand teachers.

There is much to encourage in the history of the past two years. It goes without saying that much also remains to be done, but if the first thought in the conduct of the educational affairs of this Commonwealth shall be the welfare of the more than three hundred thousand children of school age, who are Colorado's chief glory and most valuable asset, then, indeed, the progress and the happiness of the Centennial State will be assured.
