To His Excellency,

THE HONORABLE WILLIAM H. ADAMS, Governor of the State of Colorado.

Dear Governor:

In accordance with the provisions of the law, I have the honor to submit to you the Twenty-seventh Biennial Report of the educational progress of the public schools of the State of Colorado for the years 1929-1930.

KATHERINE L. CRAIG, State Superintendent of Public Instruction. To the Governor and Members of the Legislature:

In accordance with the requirements of the law, I hereby submit for your consideration a statement of the educational system of the State of Colorado, also the recommendations for the development and improvement of the educational work as determined by observation, practical experience, and present-day needs.

The educational growth and development of the public school system in the State of Colorado within the past two years has expanded and developed with marvelous rapidity in the construction of new buildings, in the professional growth of teachers and unified system of educational instruction.

The co-operation of supervisors, teachers and parents in the growth and development of the educational system has been outstanding.

The one-room school is fast disappearing in the settlement of the heretofore thinly populated localities and through consolidation and centralization the schools are being well organized and well directed for the best interests of the community. Buildings, equipment, transportation and the payment of tuition is met by the financial improvement and increased wealth and gain on property valuations. Sixty per cent of all taxes go toward the education of the boys and girls in this State.

The State has a large permanent school fund derived from the sale of land given the State by the federal government for the benefit of public schools and known as State school land. However, the largest part of the revenue of the public schools is derived from direct taxation.

The school laws should be revised to meet the present-day needs of the public school. I consider the school law a subject which is of the greatest possible concern to every individual in the State and should receive the greatest consideration by the members of the Legislature, the Attorney General's office and the Department of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT STATE LIBRARIAN 1929-1930

To the Honorable Katherine L. Craig,
State Superintendent of Public Instruction,
Denver, Colorado.

Dear Miss Craig:

I have the honor to submit to you for your consideration and approval the biennial report for 1929-1930.

Statement

There is much to be said in regard to the great need for an extension in stacking and space to care for the material which is fast accumulating and which needs to be properly assembled for the best service to be rendered to patrons.

The library and its service is growing rapidly and is truly

a joy to the research worker.

We have enjoyed the many expressions of the various patrons who have found in their work here much pleasure because of the information which they have been able to find so readily,

even against such odds as our crowded quarters.

One of the first recommendations which I wish to make is that the library be especially stressed in your own budget. More space, better equipment and a regular full time assistant to the librarian. With this proper recognition, I feel that the State Library can, and will be one of the greatest assets educationally to our State.

The library is of inestimable value to the different depart-

ments of State and to the legislative assembly.

The corner which is at present being used as a hearings room (but which really is a part of the library) should be fitted with stacks in order to care for our over-crowded historical and classified materials, giving more space for the documents department.

That there may be better work done and better service rendered, we need a better appropriation, more and better equip-

ment and a full time assistant with library experience.

I have not been able during this biennial to visit many libraries, or to attend the Library Association meetings, but we have had many visitors from other State libraries who have been complimentary in expression of what they have been able to secure from this library.



ADAMS COUNTY

Bonds voted for a new school at Hazeltine, District No. 11. New school at Long Branch, District No. 23.

ALAMOSA COUNTY

Our numbers have increased to such an extent that we have a new two-room brick school building in District No. Eight, besides a one-room building which is used to accommodate the pupils in a remote part of the district.

The course of study published by Miss Craig has been very beneficial to our teachers. The many suggestions from time to time in regard to the work have been very helpful. Miss Craig's History of Colorado has been used in our schools with great benefit to the pupils and satisfaction to the teachers.

Besides the regular State spelling and oratorical contests established years ago by Miss Craig, I have had other county contests in different subjects: arithmetic, oral reading and declamations, for instance.

In the third, fourth and fifth grades, also sixth, seventh and eighth, I require perfection in the combinations, and to reach this result we have a game in the old-fashioned multiplication tables. We find this interests the pupils and is a fine incentive for perfect work. If the pupils in the grades learn their combinations, no difference by what method, but perfectly, they do better work in high school.

In this day of silent reading, we have unconsciously neglected the oral reading, and for this reason I had a contest in oral reading in the primary grades. This proved to be one of the most interesting contests we had. The parents as well as the teachers were present. However, both parents and teachers attend the contests and take much interest in them.

Each pupil who enters the contest receives a ribbon badge with the name of the contest printed on it. This shows that he or she has the honor of representing his or her grade and school.

The winners receive little diplomas, designating first, second and third places, respectively.

The contests are always held in the forenoons of certain Saturdays. The Parent-Teacher Association serves a lunch at noon. By the way, we have a Parent-Teacher Association in every district but one in the county.

We reassemble at 1:30 in the afternoon, for a program given by teachers and pupils. I assign different topics of interest that will be beneficial to our immediate system of work, to different teachers, limiting the time to a few minutes, with open forum. This is really a teachers' meeting, but we never call it that.

This program is interspersed with glee clubs from different schools, rhythm bands, and vocal solos, by teachers who have cultured voices. At one program we had athletics for one number. At our next we shall have a demonstration of tumbling by grade pupils from one rural school, whose teacher is an expert in teaching indoor athletics as well as outdoor activities.

These demonstrations are given for the purpose of helping other teachers and schools.

ARAPAHOE COUNTY

The routine business of the office has been carried on with one part-time helper. More than half the time there was no assistant in the office. The rural schools received most of the superintendent's attention and since the county seat is in one corner of a county seventy-two miles long, reaching these schools required a great deal of time out of the office.

1. A county school library was established with the money received from the Normal Institute Fund. These books are used by rural schools for additional reading, and we hope will form the basis for a circulating library supported by the districts that use

it. It was an experiment that proved worthwhile.

The University of Denver, at the request of the County Parent-Teacher organization, made a survey of all the schools in the county. Whether or not these recommendations are followed in the next administration, it is at least possible to know what an impartial educational survey indicates as the proper thing to do.

3. A most effective county-wide health program has been established with a full time (12 months) nursing service that works through the schools and is supported by county revenue. Hundreds of defective eyes and ears have been adjusted and dozens of children given needed care in hospitals who would not have had this attention until possibly too late to be effective but

for this health survey and service.

4. One hundred per cent of the schools have Parent-Teacher organizations that are linking the homes, school and community in a constructive program for mutual benefit. Where communities are too small to make an effective organization, they have joined with neighboring schools and formed a joint association. These community groups are lifting the standards of schools wherever they are formed.

5. All associations are linked together through a county Parent-Teacher Council which is the agency that fosters the county nurse, the Christmas Seal sale, the library interests and an annual declamatory contest and a teachers' annual banquet.

- These Parent-Teacher Associations are promoting the county health program and have aided the teachers in preparing hot cocoa and soup for lunch, and are securing sanitary drinking and washing facilities.
- The teachers and directors have an association which, for convenience, is divided into sections. The entire association has two yearly meetings, but the various sections meet as seems best to consider matters of interest to that section.

The directors meet bi-monthly. Thus far they have given most of their meetings over to the study of school finance with a

leader qualified to direct such a study.

The rural teachers' section also meets independently to consider those problems common to rural schools and country life.

The teachers of the first class districts have monthly meetings of their sections also.

8. The past year three one-room schools have been discontinued and the pupils transported to a larger school in the same district. Three schools have established ninth grades whose requirements and courses of study will entitle the graduates to enter the senior high school to which these schools are contributary.

Two two-teacher schools that were attempting high school work

are transporting students to accredited high schools and paying their tuition.

One entirely new school has been opened and seven others have added rooms, and two have put in running water, while two rural districts have dug wells.

10. No district has reduced salaries; most of them have increased, and most all have raised the requirements as to teacher training and qualifications.

Whatever has been accomplished is due to the splendid spirit of co-operation among all connected with the schools—from the State Superintendent's office to the children themselves. Parents, directors and city superintendents have all contributed to the pleasure of the work and have been one in their interest in the welfare of the schools. For this we express our heartfelt thanks.

BENT COUNTY

All schools in the county visited several times during the school year, carefully surveyed and assistance given the teacher in organizing and planning her work.

The buildings, school house and out buildings inspected, notes taken and on return to the office, letters written to the directors, calling their attention to any unsatisfactory condition which was found. In this way, there has been a marked improvement, in new paint, better buildings, new fences, shades, maps, books, furniture and playground equipment, and in many cases there is still room for improvement, but a little accomplished each year will in time reach a condition which will be satisfactory.

Rural Teachers' Club organized. This meets the last Saturday in each month (except when postponed for good reason). Object of the club, mutual help with everyday problems of the school room, study of the Teacher's Reading Circle books, and to become better acquainted and more deeply interested in each other.

Reading Circle books were discussed, some teacher being a leader for each meeting on certain chapters, open discussion followed, both on the books and school room problems. Also a musical and literary program given, then luncheon together for the social contact.

This club has been very beneficial and deeply enjoyed by all. The Bent County Educational Association has grown in interest and all teachers in the county are members. This takes in the teachers from the city schools as well as the rural teachers. We usually have one meeting in the fall and a two-day meeting in the spring.

New books added to the County Library, which are used constantly by the children in the rural schools.

Pupils encouraged to work for the Reading Circle Certificate from Greeley. This has aroused a keen interest and nearly 300

children have received these certificates. Interest growing each year.

Uniform text books for the county have been talked about for a number of years, but the plan was never legally carried through to adoption.

Miss Allie V. Richmond, County Superintendent of Schools, called a meeting of all directors in the county, since they have the legal authority to decide upon the text books used. This meeting was well attended, and after some fine talks supporting the movement, and open discussion, the directors voted in favor of adopting uniform text books for the county. A committee of twelve was chosen, two directors, nine teachers, and Miss Richmond, the County Superintendent, to select the books for adoption. A list of books was selected and at a meeting called later, the directors of the county approved the list of books selected and adopted same. So, at last we have uniform text books in Bent County.

Working on consolidation in two sections of the county of several small schools.

And had material and starting to give Standard Tests in all schools in the rural districts.

Planning an organization for all directors, in the rural districts, to create an interest and gain a deeper appreciation of the teacher and a better co-operation from the directors. But since I am giving up the work of the office in the middle of the year, these ventures will likely be dropped, as each new person has his own ideas.

Bonds for a proposed new \$200,000.00 County High School is being voted upon today. Should this bond issue carry, it will give us one of the finest high school buildings in this section of the State; the Branch High School at McClave will also be rebuilt, adding new class rooms and an auditorium.

In closing would say that we have had two very successful years of work in the schools, much interest shown in every department, a keen interest in each new movement, the contests and all school activities.

I especially appreciate the wonderful friendships, support and co-operation from all teachers and pupils.

During the last biennial period standard and efficiency tests have been given throughout the county, resulting in greatly improved grading, grouping and general efficiency of organization.

It has been found that an inability to read understandingly has interfered with intelligent interpretation of other subjects and for this reason reading has been especially stressed, with very beneticial results.

The Parent-Teacher Association is very active in the county. They are of great assistance to the schools. Child welfare and health work has been greatly advanced through co-operating with the schools.

A number of school buildings have been renovated and improved and one rural district has built an attractive and well constructed building.

The three months summer school has practically disappeared and even the most inaccessible mountain districts are conducting nine months of school.

Placed more school equipment. Reference books and playground equipment.

Every school in the county floats its flag.

Many schools have their bird houses on the house top, in trees, on posts set in yards.

Increase in number of teachers, number of children enrolled, average daily attendance; more school busses; fewer tardies.

Standard of certification raised. No third grade certificates and few seconds.

Length of school term increased. No school has less than eight months, with 90% having nine months.

CROWLEY COUNTY

We have two active teacher organizations in the county, namely, Rural Teachers' Association and County Teachers' Association. The former meets once a month with practical work in improvement in teaching methods; the latter meets twice a year, the first meeting social and the second educational in nature.

Most of the rural schools are now on a par with the town schools as far as teachers and equipment is concerned. We also have an active School Board Association, which meets to work out its problems together, making the county more unified.

We have six county adopted texts and are working toward greater unification.

We have carried out a health program this year in which each child was examined for the second time; a 25% defect correction resulted. We have had a county-wide testing program for comparison and a great improvement has been shown.

All schools are well equipped in texts, supplementary and reference material. All high schools are accredited. All districts are now on cash basis with bonded indebtedness being paid. County 100% C. E. A. for two years.

Have established a new free public county library, which functions through the County Superintendent's office.

Attendance at monthly meetings of the Custer County Teachers' Association averaged 90%.

DELTA COUNTY

During the year 1929-30 the testing program in the county was carried on with even more effective results than ever before. Tests were given from grades 2 to 8 in the "w" and "x" forms of the Stanford and a high school program initiated.

The co-operative purchase of school supplies was further perfected and resulted in standardizing equipment in old schools on the basis of quality. The budgeting and checking of school funds was carried out also to complete a school finance program.

Nine school bands were organized and a band instructor employed for this work by six districts co-operatively.

Districts Nos. 7, 32 and 14 consolidated to form District No. 28 and the high school was accredited in June, 1930.

An extension course in remedial instruction was carried on by Western State College for rural teachers, based on Reading Circle and three hours' credit was earned by forty teachers.

The county library purchased 1,200 books.

DOUGLAS COUNTY

Outstanding features of Douglas County School System, per

County Superintendent:

Increased interest in reading; enlarged library; County Superintendent carries library books to schools when she visits them. Much more interest in general reading and great increase in Colorado Teachers' College reading certificates won.

County teachers met in Douglas County and took extension

courses for the first time.

Teachers and County Superintendent made a study of classroom tests and measurements; prepared county tests for all sixth, seventh and eighth graders; made some investigations into the difficulties and recommended some remedial work.

A county nursing service instituted; about \$150.00 worth of corrective work done through the local organizations.

County spelling contests held and winner sent to Denver.

For the first time, Douglas County sent a contestant to the State oratorical contest in Denver in 1930.

The membership in the C. E. A. increased a great per cent.

A Douglas County Teachers' Association was organized and a delegate sent to Denver to the Delegate Assembly.

The teachers of the county and county superintendent entertained the directors of the county with a banquet and musical pro-

Each spring a county track meet is held for grade pupils. In 1930 there was instituted an inter-county high school meet, which was held at Castle Rock.

Each fall there is held a Douglas County Fair; one department is that of education. We divided the schools into classes so that schools with about an equal number of pupils compete against each other for prizes.

During the last three years, nine orchestras have started in our

county.

The teachers and County Superintendent have planned courses in drawing and writing and adopted basic and supplementary texts.

A Douglas County High School girl graduate won a Bonfils four-year scholarship to our State Agricultural College.

Before 1928 there was one P.-T. A. in the county; now we have four.

We have instituted the practice of labeling library books so that we send them at the reduced library rates.

We have made analyses of various county adopted texts and of new text books; have compared notes with other County Superintendents and made some changes in texts. Good work-books are rather generally in use.

Had "character training" and "birds" especially emphasized in schools. Essays written, and the best printed in the newspaper. These pieces of work and inspiration from the State Superintendent of Public Instruction I consider wonderfully good.

This State office has been most helpful to me as County Superintendent; always courteous, straightening out even trivial difficulties.

EL PASO COUNTY

The issuance of a printed monthly bulletin, The El Paso County School Review, is an innovation of the administration of the past two years in the County Superintendent's office. This bulletin has proved to be of assistance both to teachers and county superintendent in keeping every teacher in the county in close touch with school activities over the entire county, and with the plans, aims, and suggestions of the County Superintendent's office.

During the fall of 1929, a testing survey was carried on in the county schools to determine the ability and achievement of pupils. The survey was conducted by the College of Education of the University of Colorado working with the County Superintendent's office. The results have been published in booklet form and contain interesting data regarding grade subjects, achievements, grade levels, age norms, etc. Considering that all types and classes of schools in the county were tested, the results were very satisfactory, showing that the schools of the county met average standards. High school seniors on a county-wide basis made an average rating on a senior high school achievement test. Efforts are being made this year to strengthen the work in the subjects which the survey showed to be weakest.

Interest in music in the county schools is steadily increasing and in addition to supervisors in public school music, more instructors of school orchestras are being employed than ever before. Two boards are paying for individual instruction on orchestra instruments.

Another new movement this year has been the physical examination by physicians of all candidates for athletics in the county schools, with a view to eliminating any who are physically unfit for strenuous forms of athletics.

We believe that educational standards are steadily advancing in El Paso County and that the system as a whole is working efficiently.

The pupils of Gilpin County have grown very much interested in earning Reading Circle Certificates. In 1929 only three were won, but in 1930 seventy-seven Reading Circle Certificates were awarded to our readers.

Plans have been made to have a public health nurse sent by the Colorado Tuberculosis Association, for our schools during this school year.

Several of our schools sent exhibits of their work to the Colorado State Fair at Pueblo in September of 1930. Districts one and eight carried away seven prizes.

Orators are preparing to make the debut of Gilpin County at the State Oratorical Contests in 1931. Heretofore Gilpin County has been represented at the contests by prize spellers only.

We have endeavored to have our schools, no matter how isolated geographically, realize that they are an important part of our Colorado School System.

GRAND COUNTY

The following is a brief resume of my past two years' work as County Superintendent of Grand County:

A County Teachers' Association was organized September 16, 1929. We have had five very successful meetings, one of which was in the form of a lecture-correspondence course under the direction of the State Teachers College of Greeley.

A start toward a county library system has been made with the purchase of the Reading Circle Books for all of the grades. We expect to enlarge the library from year to year. We still have thirty-six dollars to buy books with this year.

The Stanford Achievement Tests were given to all of the pupils in the county above the fourth grade. The results were very interesting indeed. One important point was the fact that the children of the county ranked well up with the median child.

An old mimeograph was found in an under-stairway closet in the court house, put into working order and used to make eight bulletins for school board members and teachers. These have been a great help to all. Attendance has been stimulated in this way.

In 1929 there were no Reading Circle Certificates issued to Grand County. In 1930 we received 61. We hope to receive certificates for at least half of the children in the county this year.

We were given a nurse from the Colorado Tuberculosis Association this year. In the two weeks she was here we visited twelve schools and had eleven other schools brought to the schools visited. We examined 433 children, 158 of which were average weight. There were many corrections found necessary and in many cases these have already been made.

JEFFERSON COUNTY

The year's work has been successful. Co-operation is almost 100 per cent between teachers and board members.

The teachers' meetings have been well attended and exceptional interest shown.

Two School Board associations have been formed, the Moun-

tain Division and Valley Division. Much enthusiasm is shown in these divisions.

Three schools have consolidated.

We need uniform text books. We have a recommended list, but several of the schools do not use it.

KIOWA COUNTY

Kiowa County is divided into nineteen school districts. Eighteen of these are third class districts. November 8, 1930, dated the union of District No. 12 with Eads District No. 1, thereby forming a second class district.

These districts support twenty-five schools supervised by sixty-three teachers. Miss Ruth Phillips of Denver rendered two weeks of efficient nursing service to Kiowa County. A total of 651 school children were examined.

Kiowa County has reorganized a peppy Parent-Teacher Association. Mrs. C. L. Denney is the efficient leader of this phase of the school curriculum.

Our Kiowa County Educational Association is very active, and we are doing good work with Superintendent M. D. Aspinwall, of Towner, as President. Mrs. Marion Warden as Vice-President and Miss Catherine Thayer, of Rush Creek, as Secretary-Treasurer.

In a few of our rural schools, where we have the equipment, the first and second-year high school work is attempted.

We have had two new brick buildings completed the past two years. One of these is at Sheridan Lake. Modern in every respect.

This building has five class rooms, a typing room and an office. A full-size gymnasium is in the basement. This room is used as an auditorium. The cost of the building was \$35,000.00.

The second one is a new gymnasium at Eads. This building cost \$20,000 and was built without a bond issue. The surface is of cream faced brick, the inner walls were constructed from brick and steel purchased from a condemned sugar factory and was secured at half-price.

The building is 110 feet by 50 feet. It has a seating capacity for 700 people. At one end of the main building is a stage 33 feet wide and 16 feet high. (The senior class of 1929 purchased a beautiful velour curtain for the stage.)

This gymnasium floor is large enough to accommodate one basketball court the lengthwise or two courts the crosswise of the building.

On one end of the building is a mechanical room, where mechanics are taught by day. Where eight district-owned busses are stored each night.

On the other end are the domestic science and manual training rooms.

I find a larger percentage of the teachers are reading the Reading Circle books. A number of the teachers are taking advantage of the Current Educational Literature Course offered by the Extension Department of the Colorado Teachers College. This course is based upon the study of the Reading Circle books.

The Bird and Arbor Day books have been distributed over the county. The books are studied and enjoyed by the children. A keener knowledge of bird lore has been the result.

KIT CARSON COUNTY

An educational survey was made of the seventh, eighth and ninth grades in the county. This was conducted by the County Superintendent and the superintendents of the larger schools.

School was dismissed for a day and teachers took pupils to centers where the Otis Intelligence and Stanford Achievements were given. The results of this test were tabulated and graphed in this office. The results are being used for the year 1930-31 for the application of remedial measures. Schools were lowest in spelling and literature.

Two interesting teachers' meetings were held. One hundred thirty-six teachers are members of the Community Education Association.

County Library established 540 volumes.

LAKE COUNTY

During my two years' term as County Superintendent I have striven to keep the standard of teaching in the grade schools of the rural districts on a level with the city system, so that the pupils upon graduation from the eighth grade will be prepared to enter high school on an equal with the city children.

I am putting forth great effort to keep all rural children in school until they are sixteen years old at least. In the past there has been a tendency to have the boys leave school to work after fourteen years of age.

Due to the decline in mining activity in Lake County some of the districts are without any school enrollment but the organization is being kept up so that in case there is a revival in mining, schools will be available.

A new district, number fourteen, has been cut from old District 13 in order to better administer the school at Climax, a new thriving mining camp, with an enrollment of thirty-two. The American Metals Co., the owners of the Climax Molybdenum Co., have built an eight thousand dollar school house with a nicely furnished, modern, steam heated, teacherage in connection. The company is very anxious to have up-to-date equipment and well-paid, well-prepared teachers in the camp.

An Educational Department in the Larimer County Junior Fair has been established and has proven successful.

A Budget System for school districts has been put into effect.

Objective tests have been put into use in the rural schools to replace the old type of tests.

Special instruction classes for new and inexperienced teachers have been inaugurated with excellent results.

Hot lunches have been put into schools in several districts.

Character development has been worked out on an organized basis and introduced into the rural schools.

A detailed County Course of Study, based on the State Course, was worked out to prevent loss of time on the part of pupils changing from one school to another.

A system of permanent records for grades one to twelve in second and third class districts has been perfected.

A plan for the solution of the beet labor question among children has been developed but owing to a change in the administration can not become effective.

Lincoln County, the only county in the State enrolling 100 per cent in Junior Red Cross.

Lincoln County received 598 Reading Circle Certificates from State Teachers College, making a gain of 321 over last year and leading every other county in the State.

Because of sale of Tuberculosis Seals we have a nurse for four weeks who visited every school in the county and examined all but a few children in the schools.

County school exhibit at the County Fair and at State Fair.

Took second prize at State Fair in best exhibit third and second class district, and second in best Exhibit Rural School, third class.

Much work done in repairing buildings and equipping for Standardization.

Hot lunches in forty-five rural schools.

LOGAN COUNTY

County Contests

Contests in spelling, oratory, and music were held in the spring of each year. The contests in music have been arousing great interest throughout the county. Last April there were approximately one hundred entries in voice, trios, quartets, choruses, string instruments, reed instruments, and orchestras. A number of our small consolidated schools made a fine showing in the State contests, winning a number of awards.

The schools of Logan County have extensive exhibits of school work at the County Fair. The entries include rural schools, grade schools, and city systems.

Health Service

A State nurse was employed during the year 1929-30. The County Superintendent furnished the transportation of the nurse and assisted in a physical inspection of 2000 children.

Library

The Logan County Parent-Teacher Association has supplemented the funds for the county library which was established in connection with the office of County Superintendent of Schools. A recent survey of the number of books read indicates that 2,000 children have been served. Many children took advantage of the books during the summer months.

Bulletins and Outlines

The schools receive monthly bulletins from the office of County Superintendent, outlines and new type examination questions over. each six weeks period, besides special outlines and suggestions for art work and constructive seat work.

Supervision

Adequate supervision is impossible with 63 one-teacher, 7 two-teacher, fifteen consolidated, thirteen branch high schools, and four first class district systems, but the County Superintendent visits each as many times as possible, besides assisting in community meeting.

MESA COUNTY

Mesa County has tried, in all things, to carry out the policies of the State Department, and we feel our county has progressed because of this.

Mesa County stands second in the United States in organized county health work.

We have stood near the top in the spelling contest for the last

six years, winning first place in 1928. We believe these contests have been a benefit to all students.

We have uniform text books in Mesa County and have adopted the State Course in definite county lines, so that Mesa County, while following the State Course of Study, is doing it within specified time limits.

Mesa County now uses quarterly examinations sent out from the County Superintendent's office to check on the work of grades, 5 to 8 inclusive, as well as State examinations.

We have given the Stanford tests also in January of each year. They have proven our county to be doing work equal to other schools of the country.

We have established a Field Day in May which has tended to give a feeling of unity to rural and town schools, which we count of value.

Only one school in Mesa County has less than a nine months' term; it has eight months.

Most of our rural schools are equipped with all needed supplies, as required by our present methods of teaching. This in a way equalizes educational opportunities.

There are eight one-room schools. Only two of these, however, teach all eight grades.

Many of the small rural schools have up-to-date playground equipment.

There has been a steady improvement due to a good leader in our State Department and to teachers well trained for their profession.

matters.

The standard of teachers' certification requirements has been raised materially. Just a few of the old first grade certificates are still used and it is our hope that all these will be changed to the newer certificates in the future.

Our teachers are alive professionally and a new era of better school work seems to be beginning for Montezuma County. Though we are in the southwest corner of the State of Colorado, our county is being developed noticeably and the dry farming region is rapidly becoming a part, so our schools must keep pace with progress and this is our aim.

MORGAN COUNTY

The Morgan County Teachers' Association held two meetings as is their custom. The fall meeting in Brush gave an opportunity to become better acquainted.

The spelling and oratorical contests were held at the time

of the spring meeting.

Six Community Education Associations held regular meetings. Many teachers attended the Rural Conference at Colorado State Teachers College in Greeley and the meetings of the C. E. A. in Denver.

The annual meeting of the teachers of third class districts was held Saturday, August 31st. The morning session was given over to the inexperienced teachers. During this time definite plans and suggestions were given for the first days of school. These included daily programs, reading methods, etc. In the afternoon plans for the year were discussed, supplies distributed and the announcements made.

During the year the County Superintendent sent to each teacher monthly bulletins and six weeks' outlines, followed by questions to be given at the end of each six weeks' period.

During April and May the County Superintendent gave the Stanford Tests to all the 6th, 7th and 8th graders, and to some others. These were used as a basis of promotion in all but the eighth grade.

OTERO COUNTY

Arrangements for three extension centers, with enrollment of more than 300 teachers.

Provisions whereby all teachers in the county will have at least first grade certificates by end of present school term.

Library facilities established on a permanent basis, with aid

from organizations and individuals, enabling each school to have

a suitable library.

Thorough check of all county general and special school funds so that each district has been placed on a cash basis. All old irregularities straightened out, and by end of 1931 all districts will have cleared up debts and registered warrants.

Careful check of all bond funds and bonds outstanding so that county is now retiring bonds on regular basis at rate of about \$40,000 per year, with optional bonds being called as soon as optional to save interest after it is possible to have the bonds retired.

Systematic office records prepared and kept so that information requested may be furnished in an intelligent manner and without delay.

Monthly record of attendance kept so that regular attendance may be stimulated. In this connection inexcusable absences are handled from County Superintendent's office, and good attendance stimulated by attendance charts, markers and gold star records. Also by personal letters.

Regular teachers' meetings each month provided for so that helpful exchange of ideas may be had. Also special meetings of school boards and principals of schools.

Hundreds of children enabled to read reading circle books and

get certificates therefor.

Community organization work arranged for in all of the larger

centers, and in many of the smaller schools.

System whereby all school budgets are audited in the office of the County Superintendent and budget fitted to the needs of the school. This has put taxation levies on a more uniform basis. Tax reductions for the present year exceed \$15,000 when compared with past years, but districts that were low have had higher levies to care for needs.

PHILLIPS COUNTY

There are thirty-three rural, one centralized, two consolidated, and three town schools in the county, employing sixty-four teachers. We have a county high school system. Two buildings are used solely for high school purposes each offering four year courses. In addition there are three branch schools offering ninth and tenth grades. Twenty-two high school teachers are employed.

All but two of the districts furnish free text books. Every

district has a nine months term.

The teachers employed are well above the average in qualifications. A number of rural teachers hold Life Certificates and one rural teacher holds a degree. The elementary teachers showed their interest professionally when all but three attended a two-day lecture course on the improvement of reading, held in Holyoke in September.

We have an active County Teachers' Association. Almost every teacher in the county attends these meetings. In February,

1930, a School Board Association was organized.

During the past year County contest were held in Spelling, Oratory and Declamation.

In addition to using the State Examinations, Stanford Achievement Tests are given to the eighth grade. This year a wider use of these tests will be made in the other grades.

Much interest has been taken in health work the past two years, brought about through nursing service rendered by the Colorado Tuberculosis Association through the sale of Christmas Seals. An effort is being made to secure a levy for a longer nursing service each year.

I conscientiously feel that our County Superintendents' meetings have been very much worth while. Our round table discussions where we have presented numerous problems have proved to be very interesting and instructive.

I wish to extend many thanks to everyone in your office for having always been so willing to assist me in the numerous problems which County Superintendents so often have.

WASHINGTON COUNTY

Under the leadership of Mary M. Young, County Superintendent:

First. A county-wide seventh and eighth grade quarterly uniform test in each subject is given all seventh and eighth grade students.

Second: The introduction of a reading program for all elementary pupils in the county has been successfully put into practice. When a pupil has read and reported on six good books and learned two good poems he is issued a small reading circle certificate and when he has read and reported on eighteen books and learned six good poems he is awarded a large certificate. The first year the reading circle work was introduced there were 515 pupils earned a small certificate and thirty-five who earned a large certificate.

Special stress has been put upon reading the State Reading Circle books. In 1929 the children of Washington County were issued 333 reading certificates from State Teachers College for having read the State Reading Circle books. Washington County led all other counties in this work in 1929. In 1930 the Washington County children were issued 449 Reading Circle certificates by the State Teachers College and stood second in the State, Lincoln County being first with 598 certificates.

The money received from the old Institute fund in 1929 was used to establish a county school traveling library, consisting of work type books, such as supplementary readers, nature study series, travel series, history and health books. Each district was asked to contribute 15 cents per pupils to this fund. These library books are kept in the County Superintendent's office. This library has been of great benefit to the rural schools with a limited supply of supplementary books.

Third: A ten page monthly bulletin with announcements, outline of work and suggestions has been prepared by the County Superintendent and sent to each teacher every month during the school term.

Fourth: Eighteen active Parent-Teacher Associations have been organized in Washington County with the help of the County Superintendent of Schools, which have affiliated with the State and National organization. A County Parent-Teacher Council was also organized in 1928 which has sponsored two successful grade and rural music contests.

Fifth: Twenty-two districts have improved their school equipment and teaching force and have become standard schools in the past four years.

Sixth: During the time Miss Young has served as County Superintendent and as Secretary of the High School Committee a set of modern bookkeeping books has been installed in the high school and an annual audit has been made of the High School books.

Seventh: During the past four years the County Superintendent has visited the 120 schools in the county and spent at least an hour in each school except in 1929-30 thirteen schools were not visited on account of extreme bad roads and weather.

Eighth: Washington County is divided into sixteen centers consisting of about eight schools in a center. These schools hold a field and exhibit day in the spring. The past four years the County Superintendent has personally supervised each of these field meet center contests and assisted in the eighth grade graduation exercises at each center.

Ninth: The County Superintendent has acted as chairman of the Tuberculosis Seal Sale for Akron and Otis. She has also helped in planning and carrying out a county-wide Health Clinic during the county fair in 1929 and 1930.

Tenth: Miss Young, the Washington County Superintendent, was elected Secretary of the State organization of County Superintendents in 1930 and acted upon the committee to select the subject for the oratorical contest in 1931.
