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

To the Governor and Members of the Legislature:

Complying with the requirements of the law, I hereby submit for your consideration my official report for the biennial period ending June 30th, 1932. These two years have been difficult years for our citizens and the financial troubles of our people have been inevitably reflected in reduced income for the support of schools as well as other functions of government.

One of the sources of trouble in financing the schools is the fact that we have such a large number of school districts, whose assessed valuation is so low in relation to the number of children in their schools, that even with a high levy they are unable to maintain the kind of schools Colorado wants its children to have. Another serious trouble, emphasized by times such as these, is that through crop failures farmers and other citizens living in these relatively poor school districts are unable to pay their taxes, and, as a consequence, school terms have been shortened, educational supplies seriously curtailed, and other needs of an efficient school have not been made possible.

The minimum salary law which provides an equalization plan has significantly aided these weak districts to maintain a reasonably efficient school program, because it provides a county general tax for the support of a large portion of the expense of schools. Whenever the taxable property within the county cannot produce sufficient revenue to maintain a reasonable standard of education in the weak districts within the county, the State sustains such districts in its efforts to maintain at least a minimum standard of efficiency by supplementing the General School Fund. Under certain conditions, specified in the law, the State is required to supplement the General School Fund, which gives needed State aid to the counties which have many children to educate but have relatively low assessed valuations.

It may be that there are minor defects in this law which should be corrected, but in the main the law is just, because it equalizes the burden of school support between relatively rich and relatively poor districts within the county as well as the relatively rich and relatively poor counties of the State.

There are districts in the State where assessed valuations are insufficient to provide proper educational advantages for boys and girls who are residents of the districts, while lying near at hand there are often other districts with very large valuations of property per school child. For this reason a superior school is provided at comparatively low cost in some districts, while the residents in other districts are burdened with a heavy tax to support a school program of inferior quality. Therefore, this Department believes that the plan of equalization in Colorado should not only be maintained, but should be strengthened.

The minimum salary law is an expression of Colorado's conception of the State's obligation to furnish financial aid to weak schools. It is Colorado's only attempt to equalize educational opportunities for all boys and girls regardless of race, creed, economic standing or social position.

It is generally conceded that we are burdened with too many school districts in the various counties of the State. The Legisla-

ture can render a great service to education, from the standpoints of efficiency and economy, if it will pass a comprehensive statute under which the number of school districts in the State will be greatly reduced.

It is sometimes contended that the maintenance of schools is the exclusive responsibility of local school districts. This is not in accordance with the spirit of either the Constitution of the United States or of the Constitution of the State of Colorado. Section 2 of Article IX of our State Constitution says:

"The general assembly shall, as soon as practicable, provide for the establishment and maintenance of a thorough and uniform system of free public schools throughout the State, wherein all residents of the State, between the ages of six and twenty-one years, may be educated gratuitously."

It is important to note that the Constitution says, "The general assembly (not the school districts) shall * * * provide * * * a thorough and uniform system of free public schools" for the children of Colorado. This is one of the most important duties with which the Legislature is charged.

Too long have we neglected the matter of State support for elementary and secondary schools. Records in my office indicate that Delaware takes care of 87% of the cost of the public schools; Alabama, 40%; Georgia, 35%; Texas, Utah and Mississippi, each 33%; Washington and Maine, each 28%; New York, 27%; Kentucky, 26%; Michigan, 18%; and Wisconsin, 17%.

Colorado contributes less than 4% of the cost of the public schools. Practically all of this comes from the Public School Income Fund, which fund is produced from the sale, rental, etc., of our public school lands, which lands were granted to the State of Colorado by the Federal Government.

Additional sources of support other than the ad valorem property tax should be found for the support of public schools. It is urged that a serious effort be made by the present Assembly to find such sources, and thereby relieve the farm and home owner of their present excess burden of taxation for the support of government.

Minor changes in the school laws are greatly needed, and I shall feel at liberty to call these items to the attention of the proper committees of the present Legislature.

The depression has led to a marked increase in enrollments throughout the country, as many young people have remained in or returned to school when in normal times they would have sought and obtained employment. It is estimated that two and one-half million young men and women in America would be added to the present ranks of unemployed were it not for the increased school attendance. In common with other states, Colorado's attendance has increased perceptibly in the high schools. Schools are finding it difficult to make ends meet with increased enrollment and curtailed budgets caused by lowered property valuations and by non-tax collections.

Activities in the field of education in Colorado have become an integral part of our every day life. Public opinion is the force which has relentlessly demanded advancement for many new

school activities which are carried on today and which were unknown in the traditional school of former days.

The modern school program includes health education objectives, vocational guidance and training, as well as additional subjects along cultural lines. The additional subjects of cultural values seek to train the youth of the State for the new machine age and the changing civilization in which we find ourselves.

Those who are in charge of the schools of the State must of necessity respect the sentiments of those whom they serve and our teachers have been true to the trust. The educational program at the present time demands cooperative endeavor of the taxpayer and all educational officials.

This Department can truly and whole-heartedly pay tribute to the splendid men and women who are serving Colorado schools in these difficult times.

In our State, as in many other parts of the country, the length of the term has been shortened; salaries have been reduced and in many districts school warrants have not been cashed, therefore, some of our teachers have not been paid at all during the present school year.

Due to the careful planning of the boards of education in charge of our schools, to the attitude of our people toward public schools, and in many cases, to the personal sacrifices of both our citizens and our public school teachers, the wholesale discontinuance of schools has not as yet occurred in Colorado. The future is not clear, but with the careful consideration of constructive measures by the Governor and the Legislature, I believe by the united efforts of State, county and school districts, we may be able to protect, during these trying times, the educational interests of the growing children of our State.

REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT STATE LIBRARIAN
1931-1932

December 2, 1932.

To the Honorable INEZ JOHNSON LEWIS,
State Superintendent of Public Instruction,
Ex Officio State Librarian, State Capitol,
Denver, Colorado.

Dear Mrs. Lewis:

I have the honor to submit to you, for your consideration and approval, the biennial report for the years 1931-1932.

Statement

The greater portion of the collection which is in the State Library consists of United States documents and reports, and documents and reports of the sister States. Our own State documents are catalogued under departments and are all housed in the room used as the office of the Librarian. The material mentioned above, coupled with the large historical, biographical and general catalogued materials, enables research workers in our own State and from other States and libraries to secure very valuable information.

The law governing the circulation of books limits us to State officials and employes, who must sign a receipt for same, in order to insure their safe return; or there may be a book loaned by depositing twice the price of the book, providing it is not one which it is not possible to duplicate. While the State Library does not serve the public in a circulating capacity, it does give the research worker splendid assistance.

Some years ago a portion of the room which was designed for the library was taken from it and converted into a hearings room. If this could be restored and the library properly stacked, it would enable the Librarian to place the material in a much better and more accessible form.

The Legislature of Nineteen Thirty-one failed to appropriate any funds for extra assistance. This was an oversight in the recommendation of the Budget Commissioner. However, we feel that this will not occur again, and if such assistance is provided, we shall be able to look back upon the coming biennial with pride and great appreciation, and shall have cause to thank the members of the Legislature of Nineteen Thirty-three for their kindly consideration.

The genealogical department is one of the most interesting of all the collections and, when used in connection with the splendid historical and biographical material, contributes invaluable service to the researcher.

There is a large collection of Carnegie scientific material, also a complete line of the Carnegie Endowment material on International Relations. These are much in use by scholars.

The United States government patents and drawings, and those of Canada and England are kept up to date, and are in great demand.

The crowded condition of the library is deplorable. This is true of all libraries. Books are constantly being demanded, and those which are the most useful seldom are outgrown in a reference library, because here is where one goes for comparisons, so the discarding of the old for the new is one of the most serious problems which a reference librarian must face and one which may be solved in one way only, and that is by recognizing the dire need for room and proper shelving which will provide for expansion.

The last two years have been very busy ones, and much pleasure and hard work have gone into library service. In Nineteen Thirty-one I visited only nine libraries in the State, but in these visits I had many happy experiences. The Colorado Library Association met in Boulder, in October of that year, at which meeting I appeared on the program representing Special Libraries.

In Nineteen Thirty-two it was my privilege to visit several libraries in other States, from Kansas City, Missouri, to Wisconsin, and though some of them I had visited previously, I was glad to note the progress which had been made in each one of them.

The Colorado State Library Association met in Denver this year, at which time we were all delighted to be able to attend the dedication of the beautiful Mary Reed Memorial Library building at the Denver University. The week of October 26th to 28th was filled with splendid educational programs, all of which showed what libraries mean to the cultural world. The Association had only a twenty-four-hour session, but in that time there was much business and pleasure crowded, and I believe that every member of the Association felt fully satisfied. I have never appreciated more keenly the services which libraries render to scholars than I did during this splendid session. So, in conclusion, I wish to express to the members of the Legislature the necessity of a proper recognition of the needs of the State Library and bespeak for it at least as much appropriation for maintenance, equipment and assistance as has been requested in the budget recommendation.

**REPORT OF THE STATE ORGANIZER FOR THE COLORADO
CONGRESS OF PARENTS AND TEACHERS**

For the period June 30, 1930-June 30, 1932

Throughout the period covered by this report, the work of the organizer has been supervision of organization of Congress units, instruction in carrying this work on, and actual participation in the field work.

The development of the parent-teacher movement has been such that trained workers are active in all parts of the state, forming a small army under the leadership of the state organizer, carrying throughout the entire commonwealth our aims and purposes for "every child."

During 1930, thirteen schools of instruction were held, reaching thirty-five counties, with approximately seven hundred in attendance. This year questionnaires were sent out to those attending the schools which served as an examination.

Through this stimulus, four county councils were organized, making twenty-three for Colorado. The state membership this year was 56,239.

During the winter, because of the absence from the state office of a secretary, much of the office work was performed by the organizer. This included distribution of organization and program literature, holding conferences concerning the formation of associations and the work in general.

During the summer of 1931, plans were made for schools of instruction to be held in co-operation with the county councils. Sixteen schools were held with meetings lasting from one day to four half days for four sessions. Forty counties of the state were reached with 261 parent-teacher associations represented; attendance, 1551.

About five hundred organization letters, including four or more parent-teacher leaflets, were sent to superintendents, principals and teachers in thirty-two counties, for the purpose of general information.

The organizer's work included visits to ten county councils, four district conventions, and numerous local unit meetings, as well as daily conferences regarding organization, program and committee work.

Fifty-one new associations were formed, making a total of 394; 24 county councils and 7 districts, with a total membership of 47,059.

Organization is being developed throughout the state with the assistance of county superintendents and the state officers

according to the National Congress and state plan compiled and sent out from the state office.

In addition to general organization work, talks have been made on the Children's Charter. The organizer acted as vice-chairman of the committee on Family and Parent Education of the White House Conference on Child Health and Protection for Colorado.

The contest was divided into three parts, the Declamatory Contest for the Elementary Schools; the Essay Contest for High Schools, and the Oratorical Contest for the Colleges.

HISTORY OF THE WORLD FEDERATION OF EDUCATION ASSOCIATIONS

The World Federation of Education Associations was organized at San Francisco in 1923. Since then, it has held three biennial meetings, one at Edinburgh, one at Toronto, and the third at Geneva. Following the San Francisco meeting, Dr. Raphael Herman offered through the Federation a \$25,000 prize for the best plan calculated to produce world understanding and co-operation through understanding. Thousands of plans were submitted and the award went to Dr. David Starr Jordan, President Emeritus of Leland Stanford Jr. University, and educator, scientist and humanitarian.

It is the plan of the Federation eventually to establish a regional headquarters in the Orient, the Americas, and in Europe and Africa as a means of promoting education in ways of improving human relationships.

PURPOSE OF THE WORLD FEDERATION OF EDUCATION ASSOCIATIONS

The purpose of the organization is visualized in the following statements taken from the constitution:

1. To promote friendship, justice, and good will among the nations of the world.
2. To bring about a world-wide tolerance of the rights and privileges of all nations, regardless of race or creed.
3. To develop an appreciation of the value of inherited gifts of nations and races.
4. To secure more satisfying information and more adequate statement of facts for textbooks used in the schools of the

different nations, to omit from teaching material statements which tend to misunderstanding and false impressions.

5. To foster a national comradeship which will produce a more sympathetic appreciation among nations.

6. To bring together the experiences of the races and the achievements of the various peoples as a basis for teaching international understanding and good will.

7. Educational co-operation, to foster the dissemination of information concerning the progress of education in all its forms among nations and peoples.

8. To teach the young the interdependence of nations, that each nation is possessed of certain inalienable rights and among these are the rights to develop its national resources, to carry on trade and commerce, to cultivate the gifts peculiar to itself, and to provide for the welfare, progress, and happiness of its people.

Some Vital Activities

The World Federation of Education Associations is now in position to assist interested persons in a very definite way in securing materials both interesting and helpful in their work of building, through education, a better world. The Federation reaches the classroom teachers and will cover direct objectives. Some of the lines of activity of the Federation for the immediate future include:

1. The arrangement of meetings at which reports of great significance are made, and the making possible of exchange of materials as well as ideas among the members.

2. Provision for the formation of acquaintance of persons engaged in similar work in many countries, and for making education a great cause in which the five million teachers of the world can join interests in the greatest of all world-wide human-welfare projects.

3. The development of experiences and practices in the field of education into programs and projects to forward international cooperation.

4. Establishing contacts and cooperation with other organized workers in separate but similar fields.

5. Gathering and distributing information, first by means of congresses such as the Denver meeting, publishing reports, distributing books, magazines, and articles in educational journals in the several countries, and acting as a clearing-house by making educational discoveries of importance available to the interested workers in all countries.

6. Stimulating special studies and investigations in the various parts of the world which will be helpful professionally, and in stimulating special effort.

7. In addition to these, the promulgation of the findings of the several Herman-Jordan committees, whose reports will be fused into one great plan embracing ways and means of presenting to the childhood and youth of all lands the necessity of co-operation and a means to understanding. These reports will include, also, the declaration of principles growing out of the experiences of the educationists of the countries of the world as determined by the committees.

ILLITERACY

Upon request of a communication received by Mrs. Inez Johnson Lewis, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, from Honorable Ray Lyman Wilbur, Secretary of the Interior, and Chairman of the National Advisory Committee on Illiteracy, Washington, a reorganization of the Colorado Advisory Committee on Illiteracy was effected.

This Committee met in the office of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, on Friday, August 28th, 1931, at ten A. M. Mrs. Lewis, the State Superintendent, presided.

The following letter was read:

“June 12th, 1931.

“MRS. INEZ JOHNSON LEWIS,
“State Superintendent of Public Instruction,
“Denver, Colorado.

“My Dear Mrs. Lewis:

“I am appointing you a member of the Colorado Advisory Committee on Illiteracy and sincerely trust that you may find it possible to accept.

“The State Committee is expected to be part of and to co-operate with the National Advisory Committee on Illiteracy, which was appointed by me with the approval of President Hoover. We have great need of an active leader in each state and we believe you, through your official capacity, can aid in having a vigorous program to eradicate illiteracy developed in Colorado.

“May I suggest that you call a meeting of the Colorado Advisory Committee for purposes of reorganization. Some of the members greatly desire this, and it seems the best way to get action there.

“Very sincerely yours,

(Signed) “RAY LYMAN WILBUR,
“Secretary of the Interior.”

One of the major things accomplished by the Committee was the idea fostered that Adult Education was the biggest question to be considered and if illiterates could realize that other adults were eager to go on learning, it would be easier to arouse their interest in going to school.

Because of the interest and enthusiasm of the Illiteracy Committee, a foundation was laid whereby the interest in Adult Education was being fostered and plans were laid for a future program in Adult Education.

The above Committee as named was called by Mrs. Inez Johnson Lewis, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, to meet on Tuesday, October 13th, 1931, in the Senate Chamber of the State Capitol Building. Many interesting talks and suggestions were given. Dr. Randall J. Condon, National Field Secretary of the National Advisory Committee on Illiteracy from Washington, gave a brief outline of the illiteracy work being done in other states. He stated that Colorado was the twenty-fourth state in the Union as far as percentages were concerned, and eighteenth in actual number of illiterates. He left two messages of interest—that each state be urged to organize and that each county in every state be organized to stamp out illiteracy. He commented on the fact that Colorado had already started this organization.

My Dear Governor Johnson:

In accordance with Section 8270 Compiled Laws of Colorado of 1921, it becomes the duty of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, to submit to the Governor, a Biennial Report covering the conditions, progress made and needs of the educational system in this state. Therefore, in compliance with the terms of said Statute, I am herewith presenting for your consideration the following report:

You will note that our schools have not escaped the blasting effects of the economic depression. I am of the opinion that at no other time within the history of Colorado has the administration of educational affairs been attended by such precarious situations in regard to its finances. By reason of great loss in valuations among the various districts of the state, we are face to face as never before with the bewildering problem of producing sufficient funds to give the children of Colorado an adequate education, which is their rightful inheritance. In many instances, the length of the school terms have been shortened. In all instances, salaries have been materially reduced, and in many districts, school warrants cannot now be cashed by the teachers. Some teachers have not been paid at all during the present school year.

There is no doubt in my mind but that these conditions are resultant partly from our economic depression, but in addition to the economic depression which has caused drastic losses in the school program, Colorado has been laboring for a number of years with an antiquated taxing system which is wholly inadequate to meet the school needs of the present day. We must have new sources of support for public education—the old source has broken down.

The question of education is of major interest to the people of the state. Education is the bulwark of our republic. Our democracy can survive only upon an intelligent citizenry; therefore, education is and must continue to be one of the major functions of a free government. The grave situation in which we find ourselves demands the noblest kind of thinking on the part of the people of Colorado, who feel the responsibility to our future citizens, as well as the obligation to protect those forces which make for stability in society.

In my opinion, it has been very unfortunate that Colorado has, year after year, forced the real property owners to bear the cost of state government. In Colorado, this burden has fallen heaviest upon the small home owners and farmers. It is evident that Colorado is now awakening to the fact that there are better ways to support government than that of forcing an unjust burden upon such property owners.

The theory and practice for financing public education varies widely among the various states of the Union. In common with

many of the states, Colorado adopted in the beginning the district system. As a result of the property taxing system, coupled with the district system, Colorado has all sorts of educational standards. There is a wide spread between the best and the poorest schools in the state. The range of valuations is as low as \$260.00 per child in district number six of Costilla County up to \$58,943.00 per child in district number forty-one of Boulder County.

The special tax levied by the local districts has been the chief support of our schools, with but one exception. This exception is the funds provided by the minimum salary law. The minimum salary law provides Colorado's only equalization plan at present. It has aided weak districts during the last few years to keep schools open in spite of the existing economic conditions. The funds accruing under the minimum salary law have been supplemented by the general school fund whenever the county funds so accruing were not sufficient to pay each eligible teacher \$75.00 per month during the school term.

I beg to call your attention to the fact that with the great loss in district valuations, Colorado cannot continue to provide public schools worthy of our ideals of what schools ought to be. The time has arrived when our state must seek further ways and means of equalizing the burden of the cost of free education. I am of the opinion that it has now become the duty of the state to further provide financial aid so that all districts may, in the main, be able to have a creditable school. Please note the following from the Constitution of the State of Colorado, Section 2 of Article IX:

"The general assembly shall, as soon as practicable, provide for the establishment and maintenance of a thorough and UNIFORM system of free public schools throughout the state, wherein all residents of the state, between the ages of six and twenty-one, may be educated gratuitously."

Therefore, in my opinion, the State Legislature is charged with the duty of further equalizing the burden of financing the schools.

Records filed in this office from the various states in the Union show that Colorado as a state contributes much less to the local school district than do many other states. Please note that the Commonwealth of North Carolina pays 100% of the cost of a minimum school program prescribed by that state; Delaware pays 87.9%; Alabama pays 40.8%; Georgia pays 35.6%; Texas pays 33.9%; Arkansas pays 33.7%; Utah pays 33.6%; Mississippi pays 28.6%; and New York pays 27.6%. Contrast the taxing load which the above states carry with that of Colorado. Colorado contributes only 4% to the maintenance of its local school districts.

It is evident that the framers of the Constitution of Colorado contemplated providing equal educational opportunities for all the children of the state. At the present time, the "equal opportunity" is an idle dream. Under the existing taxing system, we have the spectacle before us of high taxes in poor districts pro-

viding inefficient schools, and on the other hand, of low taxes in rich districts providing excellent schools.

The State Department of Education urges the people of the state to provide sufficient funds for the support of its schools as a practical means for self-protection in government. If we are to have government we must have taxes, and if we are to have a free government, we must have free schools.

The collection of school taxes is by far the most economical method of educating the masses. The burden of taxation is felt because it rests upon a few. If our people as a whole would bear their just share, the burden would not be great.

This Department during this Biennial Period begs to pay tribute to the County Superintendents who have served this state faithfully, and to the school boards who have been the unpaid servants of education, and to the teachers who have worked incessantly and unselfishly for the common good.

It is my belief that the people of our state want to continue the modern school program. The modern school program includes health education, vocational guidance and training, as well as educational subjects along cultural lines. The new school seeks to train our young citizens so that they may adjust themselves to the machine age and to our changing civilization. Public opinion has been the force which has continuously and consistently demanded advancement for the new school activities and the new school program.

It becomes my duty and pleasure to report to you that this Department has carried on, under the direction of the Federal Government, an adult educational program supported by the Federal Emergency Relief Administration funds. During the last year there were enrolled 23,000 men and women who took advantage of classes offered by unemployed teachers of the state. The organization for the adult program, of necessity, was not complete. The speed with which we had to work in getting the funds to the teachers who were in need of financial help somewhat disturbed our educational ideals of organization. Nevertheless, we saw hope and courage and renewed faith come to the discouraged members of the adult classes. The experiments which this Department has carried on during the last two years prove that the adult individual is made happy by new knowledge, which will make it possible for him to adjust himself to new conditions. It is hoped, therefore, that some time in the future, Colorado will make provision for the establishment of "opportunity schools" wherever needed and desired throughout the state.

The serious situation of the educational program at the present time demands the immediate attention and co-operation of the taxpayer and all educational officials. This co-operation can be best expressed in new laws which will meet the difficulties which we are facing. This can come about only after much thought, planning, and intelligent action on the part of the people's representatives, the Legislature.

INTRODUCTORY STATEMENT

As the following report for the biennium 1932-1934 indicates a change in policy and adjustment in program, some interpretation is desirable. In 1932 due to change in the demands for service as well as in the outlook for a redistribution of duties especially in the public health nursing field, the Board of Control, after much deliberation, determined on a program directed more toward education and case work in such other child welfare fields as mother's compensation, school attendance, child placement, etc. Because of economic pressure in state government, still further reductions were necessary in an already too limited staff. In the light of these existing needs and resources, the program has been directed along the following lines:

I. **Surveys and studies** of conditions affecting child welfare in Colorado, to serve as a basis for a program to improve conditions in the care of handicapped children. In carrying out this phase of its program the Bureau has helped to establish and to carry out the State-wide Social Welfare Survey, which was begun under the auspices of the Colorado Conference of Social Work, the report of which will be issued later. The Bureau conducted a limited survey of school attendance as affected by the beet harvest in the latter part of 1933 and presented the findings at the AAA sugar hearings recently. It has, also, conducted a State-wide survey of crippled children with assistance through Civil Works Administration and Federal Emergency Relief Administration as a part of a plan leading to a permanent program of coordinating the work of social agencies and of individuals and for providing effective legislation for the better care and education of these children.

II. **An educational program** on child care and administration of child welfare services. Pamphlets on child care are distributed throughout the State. Outlines containing summaries of Colorado child welfare laws, and giving basic ideals in various child welfare fields such as mother's compensation, child labor, etc., are distributed among study groups in the Parent-Teacher Association, Women's Clubs, etc. Federal Children's Bureau pamphlets on the same topics are also given on request. In cooperation with the University of Colorado Law School and with the

assistance of State social work leaders, the Bureau is compiling the laws of Colorado affecting child welfare.

III. Service to the individual child that he may have full advantage of the resources within our State which serve the welfare of the child. General case work includes a wide variety of fields. There is a rapidly increasing demand. This service includes assistance to county officials, local agencies and individuals on problems of the pre-delinquent and delinquent child, the unmarried mother and her child, the mental defective, mother's compensation and maternity benefit, school attendance problems, etc. This service frequently involves coordination of the facilities available in other existing agencies, both public and private, such as the Child Guidance Clinic at the Psychopathic Hospital, Colorado General Hospital, Colorado Children's Aid Society, etc.

IV. Development of the organization and program of the Parent-Teacher Association based on the National Organization and ideals. Throughout its existence the Bureau has had on its staff a Parent-Teacher Association organizer or field secretary whose duty it is to develop local organizations and to give encouragement to better practices in the care of both normal and handicapped children.

The statistical report covering activities in the above fields during the biennium July 1, 1932, to June 30, 1934, is as follows:

BEET HARVEST SURVEY

A questionnaire was sent to the Superintendent of Schools in each county asking for the absences resulting from the beet harvest of 1933. These reports showed:

ADVANCE FIGURES ON SURVEY OF CRIPPLED CHILDREN IN COLORADO

June 30, 1934

To date there have been found 2,321 crippled children under 21 years of age residing in Colorado. Since only 50 of the 63 counties in Colorado have been covered, it is to be expected that this number will have increased to about 3,000 children before the survey is put in its final form. Of these cases 1,329 were of a complete enough nature so that a medical classification could be made. The results of this were as follows:

- 372 or 28% bone and joint
- 275 or 21% paralysis
- 506 or 38% congenital deformities
- 162 or 12% accident
- 14 or 1% miscellaneous

Another grouping was made of 1,628 cases, the information being sufficient for classifying as to the distribution of types of medical advisors:

- 827 or 51% had consulted orthopedists
- 534 or 33% had consulted medical doctors
- 76 or 5% were treated by oral surgeons
- 191 or 11% had seen no doctor in the last three years

Of those who had medical advice, 35% were advised that there should be a follow-up, in a large number of cases it being suggested that they seek the advice or treatment of a specialist.

Using these cases as a basis for the 50 counties which have been completed, there is shown to be 2.3 crippled children to 1,000 population based on 1930 census. It was found that there were slightly more boys than girls reported in the survey, 55% being male, while 45% were female. It can be deduced from the age classification which increases only through the twelfth year that a large percentage of crippled children between twelve and twenty-one are not included in the survey, since they drop out of school after this age and a correspondingly less number is reported.

An economic classification was made to determine whether or not the immediate family of the child could bear the expenses resulting from treatment of these children. The following items were used in making this classification: occupation, last period of employment of parents, rent, debts, whether or not the family was on the relief list, and in many cases the hospital records of the financial status of the family. Although the income necessary to have them classed as capable of taking care of their children unassisted was placed very low, only 29% of the families could be said to come under this classification, whereas 71% could not be expected to bear this expense without an extremely derogatory effect upon their standard of living, which in most instances was already too low.

Out of 754 cases in which the school grade was given, only 25% of the children were in the normal grade for their age, while 59% were retarded more than one year. This does not include 106 or 14% of the cases between six and 16 in which the children either were not in school at that time, or had never been in school. Of these cases it was found that nearly three-fourths fell into the latter grouping. The effect of the handicaps of these children is seen by the fact that 76% were retarded in comparison to normal Denver school children where only 35% were retarded.

PUBLIC HEALTH REPORT

By Miss Helen Burke

The State Department of Public Instruction was granted a C. W. A. project which provided fourteen Public Health Nurses in sixteen counties. The Colorado Tuberculosis Association was assigned the supervision. Selection of counties served was based on requests from county superintendents and health committees. Of the total cost of the project, the C. W. A. provided 64%. Christmas Seal funds 27% and the County Superintendents 9%. The nurses traveled 21,679 miles. The mileage was provided largely through County Superintendents.

Poorly Fed

The C. W. A. project was granted for a study of the health condition of children on relief. Unsatisfactory nutrition was twice as common among children on relief as among those not on relief. The high incidence of physical defects was proportionate with unsatisfactory nutrition. Handicapped children are a serious problem for parents, teachers and school officials, because of their reduced ability to learn and increased tendency to disease.

Lunches at School

Only a small proportion of children were having adequate lunches at school. Lack of planning on the part of the parent, and lack of community effort was noted. In some places milk lunches or hot lunches were made available through interested organizations. In other schools, children were encouraged to bring milk from home when a hot lunch was not feasible. The hot-jar lunch proved practicable in rural schools.

Tax Money Wasted

Reduced capacity to study, impaired health, and facial disfigurement on account of defective teeth was found in 42% of the children. Lack of dental care, proper food, and neglect of mouth cleanliness were too common. Not one school program on dental hygiene was found which might be used as an example for other teachers, even though much money is being spent to teach children physically unfit to receive instruction.

Community Planning

In several counties, the nursing committees worked out arrangements for a loan fund from which parents might draw for remedial care for handicapped children. Thirty operations for tonsil and adenoid removal, seven vision and many dental corrections have been done by this united effort, in one county alone. Doctors report in many communities a satisfying number of corrections following the service.

Tuberculosis in Childhood

Because tuberculosis still causes more deaths than the total from the eight common communicable diseases, special attention was given by the nurses to children exposed to tuberculosis. In

Jefferson and Fremont Counties, tuberculin tests, X-rays and chest examinations showed 87 children infected with tuberculosis and 24 needing preventorium care. "No child is safe until all children are safe."

Encouragement

School boards responded to suggestions for improved lighting and sanitation. Eagerness to cooperate in health planning was indicated particularly by 1,791 parents who came to see the nurse at school or office concerning the findings of the health inspection. Rural schools in these counties were uniformly poorly equipped with drinking water, hand-washing and toilet facilities. In several counties immunization programs were developed through community cooperation and physician's contributions of services.



RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Publicize the needs of your county children as revealed by this service. Use this report at Parent-Teachers Associations, clubs, teacher and other meetings to secure the interest and attention of those concerned.
2. Direct attention of school boards to needs in lighting, heating, ventilating, seating, handwashing facilities, drinking water supply, toilets and the health program, for which school time may be rightfully used. Many corrections can be made with little or no cost. Reports of the findings for each school were left with county superintendent, teachers and board members.
3. Encourage a milk lunch, if hot lunches are not feasible.
4. Have supervised handwashing to precede supervised lunch period.
5. Have morning inspection, to discover symptoms of communicable disease, to exclude the child who needs protective or remedial care, and to encourage health practices of pupils.
6. Regulate ventilation, lighting and heating by pupil participation as far as possible.
7. Use the health record card left with each teacher by the nurse for conferences with the child to encourage him to correct faulty health habits and to secure his interest in needed remedial care. Interview the parents concerning these needs.
8. A thrice a year measurement of height and monthly weighing are excellent devices to develop interest in factors influencing growth.
9. Feature health needs in school and other public programs. Use this report to show situations among your children. The "Thanks for Health Day Program" sent each teacher provides material that will interest your patrons.
10. Promote immunization against diphtheria and smallpox.
11. Tuberculin testing of school children is the best case-finding plan. All children exposed to tuberculosis should be tested. Positive reactors should be X-rayed and examined.
12. Establish pre-school health conferences.
13. A public health nurse is urgently needed to develop the county health program.
14. Actively promote the sale of Tuberculosis Christmas Seals, which provide practically the only health service for school children in the county.

From the extreme northern part of Weld County to the extreme southern part of Las Animas County, from the eastern boundary of Kit Carson County to the western boundary of Mesa County, and from the many towns and rural districts in between, come requests for books; reading outlines and book lists; and aids for book buying, cataloging, and program building.

During the one-year period, July 1, 1933, to June 30, 1934, the Library Extension Division of the State Library—more popularly known as the Traveling Library—has given library service to rural schools, rural communities; study clubs, Parent-Teacher organizations, small public libraries, and individuals in fifty of our sixty-three counties in Colorado. The distribution of the book service is shown as follows:

The library has sought to be of every possible help during these trying times, especially to those schools that have little or no library facilities. Annotated book lists and reading outlines have been prepared and given to the teachers to aid in their endeavor to interest their pupils in the better books. We have intended that these book lists contain suggestions to the teachers: for example, a child who likes only popular Western stories, such as **Rusty Pete of the Lazy A B**, can be led through his love of horses to enjoy such stories as **Song of Roland** in **Knights of Charlemagne**, **Horse Fair** by Baldwin, **Wonder Book** and **Tanglewood Tales** by Hawthorne.

Many of the **Reading with a Purpose** outlines, which are published by the American Library Association, have been requested during the year. The five outlines or reading courses **Exploring the Times**, which were also published by the association during 1933 and 1934, have been in circulation constantly. These outlines have been designed to stimulate intelligent thinking on public questions. Because these outlines have proven so popular, we list them below:

- World Depression—World Recovery.....Harry D. Gideonse
- Collapse or Cycle?.....Paul H. Douglas
- Living with Machines.....William F. Ogburn
- Meeting the Farm Crisis.....J. H. Kolb
- Less Government or More?.....Brownlow and Ascher

Another service this library affords is aid in book buying. The standard book-buying aids for school and public libraries are a part of the reference collection of this library. Some of the information that can be obtained from these aids we list as follows: graded lists of books for children, books for the senior high school library, illustrated editions of high school classics, popular books in science, recreational reading for young people, guides to reference books, periodicals for the small library, guides

to new books, and books and pamphlets for study groups. Since many of our local libraries do not have the standard aids for book buying, we lend these aids for a period of two weeks. Colorado does not have—as most state library agencies have—a field librarian to confer regularly with the librarian of the local school or public library; for this reason, requests for aids in book buying and cataloguing are taken care of by correspondence.

The appropriation for this one-year period is \$3,300 and is distributed in this way: Salaries—two librarians—\$2,100; books, boxes, freight, et cetera—\$1,000; and office expense—\$200. The fund for books, boxes, freight, et cetera was expended as follows:

During this period we have purchased four hundred fifty-five new books: adult books, 209; juvenile books, 218; and reference books, 28. We have also purchased five hundred pamphlets for circulation. As a result of the greatly reduced appropriation for books for this period, the chief problem of this library is to obtain enough books to take care of the demands that are made upon us. In order to take care of more of the requests for books, we have shortened the time allowed on all book selections and we have included fewer books in each selection. Yet we are unable to keep the number of requests on the waiting list below forty, and our patrons are obliged to wait several weeks for them.

Although the circulation records are not complete, we give the statistics on 14,065 books, showing an average of 4.53 readings per book. We are appealing to those in charge of the book selections to keep an accurate record of the circulation, and we hope to have a complete circulation report this next year.

Under the Civil Works program of the Federal government, a library project was put in force in December, 1933, and continued through March, 1934. The Federal government paid the salaries of three professionally-trained librarians, one typist, and three bookbinders; and the State library furnished the necessary material. The work accomplished is reported as follows:

Catalogue :

Books catalogued—2,000.

Old catalogue system revised—50%.

Catalogue cards typed—15,000.

Book Repair :

Books mended—800.

Books recased—1,300.

Library Survey :

Data gathered from the tax and non-tax supported public libraries; State institutions; special libraries, such as Federal institutions, music and business schools; higher educational institutions; and the public school libraries.

The objectives of this library survey are: to ascertain what library service is available throughout the State; to picture present library conditions in a graphic form; and to make recommends from the results of our findings.

In May, 1934, another library project under the Federal Emergency Relief Act was started. These twelve Federal employes were not trained in library methods so the State library employes instructed eight of them in the methods of reconditioning books according to library standards. We feel that we have accomplished a very splendid piece of work, which we report as follows:

Catalogue:

Books catalogued—1,200.
Old catalogue system revised—30%.
Catalogue cards typed—5,450.

Book Repair:

Pages and binding washed—1,586 books.
Pages mended—2,580 books.
Books recased—1,650 books.

There are many organizations and individuals interested in this library. Some of the women's clubs give library trunks filled with books in honor of their retiring presidents and other members. Two clubs which have honored their presidents this year are Mrs. M. E. Grant, president of the East Side Woman's Club; and Mrs. Harry L. Morgan, president of the Reviewers Club of Denver. **FEDERAL EMERGENCY EDUCATIONAL RELIEF PROGRAM
STATE OF COLORADO
1933-1934**

The Federal Emergency Educational Relief Program for Colorado began in December, 1933, and continued through April, 1934, with the exceptions of the Nursery Schools and the Rural School Program. The work was divided into the following divisions:

General Adult Education
Vocational Education
Education for Illiterates
Nursery Schools
Parent Education
Vocational Rehabilitation
Rural School Education

An appropriation of \$16,500.00 was received from the Federal Government for the month of December, 1933, and \$16,500.00 for each of the following months. A special allotment was made for the rural school program, since the amounts mentioned did not make provision for rural school education.

During the program a total of \$101,342.41 was paid to 536 teachers who were otherwise unemployed. Instruction was given to 17,762 persons in 854 classes. Total hours of instruction were 113,717.

The nursery school program began in January, 1934, with the special training of 53 teachers in nursery school work. On February 1, 1934, these teachers started nursery schools in 26 centers. The parent education program was operated in connection with the nursery schools.

Approximately \$4,000.00 was used in connection with this program for the vocational rehabilitation of the physically handicapped. Eighty-one were benefited by this program.

The rural school program began in April, 1934, with an appropriation of \$86,000.00 to cover the work for three months; \$17,500.00 of which was not used as the schools needing it did not meet the requirements of the Federal Government. A more detailed summary of this program follows.

A detailed report of the Federal Emergency Educational activities has been compiled and is filed in the office of the State Department of Education. Duplicate copies have been forwarded to Dr. L. H. Alderman, Educational Division, Federal Emergency Relief Administration; to the United States Commissioner of Education; the National Education Association, and the State Relief Association.

RURAL SCHOOL EDUCATION

The Rural School Educational Relief Program was a part of the Federal Emergency Educational Relief Administration. Its chief purposes were: First, to give instruction to children living in districts where schools had closed or would have to close with shortened terms because of lack of local finances; second, to give work relief to needy rural school teachers; and third, to indirectly aid the school district and community.

Method of Procedure. The data pertaining to the rural school districts which were in financial difficulty were obtained from the County Superintendents by the Emergency Education Division of the State Department of Education. Enrollment, date school closed or would have to close, number of teachers, teachers' salaries, monthly current expenses, assessed valuation, general and special mill levies, and cash on hand were some of the facts collected. After it was determined that a district was in sufficient need and met Federal requirements, the Board of Education was notified that Federal funds could be used to pay the teachers, provided the schools were reopened or continued to complete a normal term. However, funds were not available after July 1. The Board of Education then signed an acceptance form which indicated that the Federal requirements would be adhered to and that the schools would be operated to complete a normal term.

Before any teacher was paid from Federal funds, an affidavit was sworn to before a Notary Public. In this it was stated that the teacher was of legal age, and held a legal Colorado teacher's certificate; the amount of income received from sources other

than teaching and from husband or wife in the case of married teachers was also shown. This supplementary income was deducted from the teacher's salary before he (or she) was paid relief funds.

Summary. The rural school program was started April 1, 1934, and continued until July 1, 1934. Five hundred nineteen teachers gave instruction to 12,766 pupils and were paid \$56,310.35. Administrative expenses for this work totaled \$2,732.05 or 4.4 per cent of the amount expended from Rural Education funds. The following table summarizes briefly the activities and results of this work:


