Dear Governor Carr:

This report goes to press when America is engaged in World War No. 2.

The attack on Pearl Harbor December 7, 1941, brought war to the American people. The following day, December 8, President Roosevelt officially notified the Congress of the United States that—

“Yesterday, December 7, 1941, a date which will live in infamy—the United States of America was suddenly and deliberately attacked by naval and air forces of the Empire of Japan.”

The Congress immediately declared war on Japan December 8, 1941, and later on Germany December 11, 1941, and World War No. 2 became a stark, grim reality.

The President of the United States, the military and civil authorities and government agencies brought forcibly and compellingly to the attention of the American citizenry that World War No. 2, by nature of the drastic demands and imperative needs of immediate mobilization and production, was a “total war”.

In “total war” the schools of the Nation have great responsibility and opportunity for service. The government had urgent need for the assistance of organized educational agencies throughout the country.

Colorado educators in common with educators throughout the Nation recognized the authoritative claim of the war demands, as well as their privileges and responsibilities and opportunities to have a great part in the world effort, responded by immediately laying plans for readjustment of the school curricula to “war needs”, particularly in areas of Science, Mathematics, Geography, History and English.

The Colorado school program now stresses the need of keeping the morale of the people high. Our schools unsparingly emphasize the call for sacrifice on the part of every man, woman and child in Colorado.

Our teachers throughout the State are teaching appreciation of the precious heritage that is ours in a free government. Their efforts are directed to the end that there shall be a greater understanding of the priceless human values enshrined in the record of achievement by this Nation.

It is the aim of our schools also to develop more clearly in this war period a consciousness on the part of our students that the blessings of democracy once gained are not fixed and remain forever free from the dangers of aggression. Instead, our boys and girls are taught that eternal vigilance, devotion, high ideals and a broad knowledge of duties and responsibilities of citizenship are the forces that keep alive the spirit of democracy and a sensibility to the need of social justice.

In accordance with the announcement of the need of service of the schools of the Nation to our country, the State Department of Education began a careful study of the possible assistance in various lines of service which the schools could render.

Accordingly in January, 1942, a conference was called by the State Department of Education of county superintendents, city superintendents, principals, teachers and boards of education. At this meeting there were presented a series of guideposts for the emphasis and direction of the school program, a program which would make for cooperative effort between the war agencies and community activities:

1. To assist schools to mobilize the high schools of the state for maximum efficiency in the war effort.
2. To give school officials a picture of the nature of the curriculum conversion which is necessary.
3. To suggest administrative changes which may be needed in the development of various phases of the program.
4. To assist teachers to organize their courses and to develop new teaching units in line with the recommended emphasis and adaptations.
5. To show the relationship between the High School Victory Corps movement and the present task of the high school.

In general the schools' contribution to the war effort, the instructional activities and extra curricular activities have been geared to the obvious war time needs. This is especially true in the high school program.

Our Military, Navy and Air Forces prove to us that the soldier needs thorough training in order to be an effective fighting man and the one who had the best chance of survival in combat with the enemy upon the field of battle. Accordingly, then, our superintendents and administrators responsible for the local school program laid the foundation for activities which would best train the young man who will soon be face to face with war authorities.

The State Department has cause to feel proud of the local initiative. Throughout the State there has been created a dynamic program with increased emphasis in Science, Mathematics, English Language and History.

Military authorities brought to the attention of the State Department that physical fitness is dependent upon a well rounded program of health education, health practices, recreation and safety. We accepted the challenge to understand that health education is the basis for the development of strength, stamina and endurance. The physical fitness program is important for girls and women, as well as boys. Therefore, in accordance with our challenge, schools at once gave increased attention to the organization of all health activities and daily living of those activities.

We have stressed the fact that health consciousness does not serve the individual to become strong and healthy unless he translates his knowledge into action and everyday living.

In the development of the health and physical fitness program, the State Department of Education has been very fortunate in having the cooperation of the State Board of Health, the Colorado Council of Defense, and the Red Cross.

SHORTAGE OF TEACHERS

Very soon after the Declaration of War it became evident that Colorado, in common with the other States, would suffer a shortage of teachers for the duration. It was apparent that drastic action by State authorities be necessary if the schools of the State were to be kept open in all areas.

In order to prevent the closing of numerous schools, the Governor of Colorado issued the following Executive Order:

Executive Order by the Governor

WHEREAS, it has been made to appear to the Governor of the State of Colorado that by reason of the war in which the nation is now engaged an emergency condition confronts the public schools of the state of Colorado;

WHEREAS, because of such emergency condition certain of the public schools of the state are faced with a shortage of teachers; and

WHEREAS, if such conditions are not alleviated, certain of the schools of the state will not be able to function,

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS FOUND, DETERMINED AND DECLARED, that an emergency does exist; that it is of utmost importance that the schools of the state do function; and that through the machinery of the State Board of Education and the State Board of Examiners, rules and regulations should be set up under which special war emergency certificates may be issued to such persons as may be determined by said boards.

In accordance with the above Executive Order, the State Board of Education met August 19, 1942, and passed the following Resolution:

Resolution of the State Board of Education

"WHEREAS, the State Board of Education is by virtue of the Constitution and laws of the State of Colorado given general supervision of the public schools of the state and is given power to adopt any rules and regulations not inconsistent with the law governing the public schools; and

"WHEREAS, an emergency situation confronts the schools of the state which is due to the war in which the Nation is now engaged; and

"WHEREAS, the State Department of Education has authentic information to the effect that many school districts within the state of Colorado are finding it impossible to procure for the 1942-1943 term teachers with legal certificates as described in the various enactments by the Legislature of Colorado; and

"WHEREAS, the maintenance of public schools within the State of Colorado is of utmost importance to the people of the State; and

"WHEREAS, it is the opinion of the State Board of Education that action should be taken to alleviate a situation now present in which there are not available sufficient teachers to teach the public schools in many of the school districts of the State, and that such action should properly be taken by the State Board of Examiners.

"NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That notification is hereby given to the State Board of Examiners that in the opinion of the State Board of Education, an emergency exists by virtue of the fact that the Nation is at war; and

"FURTHER, BE IT RESOLVED: That the State Board of Education hereby recommends to the State Board of Examiners that it authorize the State Superintendent of Public Instruction to issue limited certificates to teach in the public schools of the State of Colorado, and that it provide rules, regulations and standards defining the conditions under which such certificates may be issued. Such certificates shall be designated as Special War Emergency Certificates:

The resolutions of the State Board of Education were accepted by the State Board of Examiners and in accordance therewith the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolutions Made by the State Board of Examiners Concerning the Issuance of Special War Emergency Certificates

* * *

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

1. That it is hereby determined that due to the war in which the nation is now engaged, there is a shortage of available teachers possessing certificates as described in the statutes of the state of Colorado, and that due to such shortage many school districts within the state are unable to procure any teachers to teach in the public schools for the 1942-1943 term.

2. That it is deemed by the State Board of Examiners of the utmost importance that schools be maintained in the several districts of the state and to that end it is deemed by the Board that certain persons should under certain special emergency conditions be issued a special limited license to teach for the 1942-1943 term in districts in which shall be established the existence of conditions hereinafter described to the satisfaction of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

3. That it is hereby declared by the State Board of Examiners that such special certificates should be issued only where in the opinion of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, the issuance of such certificates shall be absolutely necessary in order that the public schools may function.

4. That such special certificates shall expire on August 31, 1943.

5. That the fee for the issue of such certificate shall be \$1.00.

6. That in no case shall such special war emergency certificates be authorized or granted, unless it is made to appear that there were available to accept a teaching appointment no persons in possession of one of the permits or certificates to teach enumerated in the applicable statutes.

7. That such special war emergency certificates shall not be granted in any case unless the following regulations and rules are complied with:

(a) The particular school district requesting the granting of such special certificate to persons to teach in its schools must show the following:

(1) That under no circumstances can it obtain persons qualified to teach, i.e., having a certificate as described in the various applicable statutes.

(2) That if such special certificates are not granted, the public schools within the district cannot function.

(b) The following rules, regulations and conditions in the order stated herewith form the only bases and conditions under which the State Board of Examiners authorizes the State Superintendent of Public Instruction to issue special war emergency certificates; subject always to the conditions hereinabove set forth:

(1) Special war emergency certificates may be issued to persons who have held state certificates issued by the Department of Education which have expired; provided such persons are not eligible for another state certificate under the present laws, and rules and regulations of the State Board of Examiners.

(2) Special war emergency certificates may be issued to persons who have never heretofore held a legal certificate to teach, but who certify to the State Department of Education that they have completed ninety (90) college quarter hours in an accredited institution of higher learning.

(3) Special war emergency certificates may be issued to those who are holders of valid teaching certificates issued by the proper department in a state other than Colorado; provided that such person certify to the Department of Education a completion of forty-five (45) college quarter hours in an accredited institution.

(4) Special war emergency certificates may be issued to a former holder of a valid county certificate within the state of Colorado who has had successful teaching experience.

OF SIGNIFICANCE

It appears to the State Department of Education that in any fair measure of the quality of an educational program the teacher looms as the largest factor. A measure of her educational background and preparation is of paramount importance. Accordingly, since 1931 the State Department has sought to increase the requirements for the certification of teachers over and above those of the Act of 1923.

I am of the opinion that the improvement in instruction from that period to the present justifies the faith that the quality of teaching is based upon the general educational preparation and training of the teacher.

A review of the progressive steps taken to attain the high standards that now prevail follows:

Review of the Growth of Standards of Certification For Teachers in Colorado Since 1923

Before the enactment of a more extensive certification law in 1923, no college credits or professional training was required by the statutes for teaching in the public schools of Colorado.

The following quotation from the statutes indicate the limited educational preparation which was required:

"* * * the county superintendent shall meet all persons, of not less than eighteen years of age, desirous of passing an examination as teachers, * * * at which time he shall examine all such applicants in orthography, reading, writing, arithmetic, English grammar, geography, history and constitution of the United States and the constitution of Colorado, civil government, physiology, natural sciences, theory and practice of teaching, and the school law of the state. If the applicant is to teach in a school of high grade, the examination shall extend to such additional branches of study as are to be pursued in such school."

In addition to the above, the law also required the applicant to be of "good moral character."

From the above measure of the quality of teacher preparation for certification, the following shows the progress and advancement which Colorado has made in standards for eligibility for teaching in the state in recent years:

Beginning with the school year 1925 teachers applying for examinations must have completed in addition to four years of high school work (or its equivalent) at least three (3) quarter hours of college credit.

Beginning with the school year 1927 the requirements were raised to twenty-five (25) quarter hours of college credit with five (5) quarter hours in Education.

Beginning with the school year 1931 the requirements were raised to ninety (90) quarter hours of college credit including thirty (30) quarter hours in Education.

In 1933 the State Department of Education in order to raise the standards of teachers secured the passage of a bill which eliminated one of the three yearly county examinations.

In 1937 the Department secured the passage of a bill which eliminated all county examinations and placed the authority for the issuance of certificates in the State Department of Education, with the exception of those issued by the state teachers colleges as provided by law. Also the State Superintendent of Public Instruction ruled that the right of first class districts to issue special certificates, for the teaching of special subjects only, was not affected by the new certification law.

Moreover, in the interest of more adequate standards for state certificates, to the end that Colorado would have better teachers, the State Board of Examiners on June 14, 1937, passed a resolution that would rescind existing rulings concerning requirements for applicants from outside the state who possess a diploma of graduation from an out-of-state standard two-year normal school. This action was effective September 1, 1937. (The rulings rescinded did not refer in any way to four-year college graduates who had an A.B. or equivalent degree. The Graduate Temporary Certificate is issued to applicants who hold the four-year college degree.)

Beginning September 1, 1937, one five-year Non-Renewable Elementary Temporary Certificate might be granted to applicants for Colorado state general certificates who have completed, over and above graduation from a four year high school, a minimum of 135 quarter hours of college credit earned in one or more accredited colleges, including 30 quarter hours in Education, 6 quarter hours of which must be in Practice Teaching. In lieu of the Practice Teaching credit, three school years (27 months) of successful teaching experience may be substituted when properly certified to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Under rulings of the Board of Examiners in April, 1942, the number of Non-Renewable Elementary Certificates that may be issued to an individual was changed from one to two. However, no Elementary Life Certificate may follow the Non-Renewable Temporary Certificate.

COMMUNITY SERVICES

It is worthwhile to record that late in August, 1942, representatives of the State Department of Education attended a meeting in Washington, at which time high ranking authorities of our military forces and the Manpower Commission drove home, in a most compelling way, the need of cooperation of the educational forces with the war effort. Many specific recommendations were made. One of the topics discussed was community services of the High School.

It was emphasized that opportunity should be provided through the schools for all young people to participate in an organized fashion in the nation's war effort.

It was agreed that the students should have an opportunity to help plan the community service activities which they expected to carry out. Only when students share largely in making important decisions as to what they shall do does participation in community activities assuredly become education for democratic citizenship.

With this in mind the State Department attempted to build the machinery which would gear the school program to war time objectives.

Illustrations of Services, Campaigns, and Drives

In June, 1942, the State Department of Education called a meeting of educators to discuss with them the Scrap Iron Drive, the Waste Paper Drive, and the Victory Bond Drive. One of the most important pieces of work which the Colorado schools undertook was to make a continuous effort to accomplish the goal set for securing salvage materials for the war effort.

During the Liberty Ship Scrap Salvage Contest which closed in October, 1942, there were collected 4,026,579 pounds of scrap iron by the

pupils who entered the contest and reported the results. In addition hundreds of schools entered who did not report the results.

War Savings Program in Our Schools. County and local superintendents of the state have provided the type of leadership in the schools' part in the War Savings Program which has resulted in the sale of over a million dollars in War Savings Stamps and Bonds by boys and girls.

School Lunch Program in Our Schools. As part of our general health program, the State Department of Education has been encouraging rest periods and adequate school lunches for all children.

At the present time, 180 Colorado schools have taken advantage of the help given by the Food Distribution Administration through its Community School Lunch Reimbursement Program and are serving lunches to approximately 20,000 students. The average cost to each pupil is ten cents a day, which is in addition to the nine cents per meal paid by the Food Distribution Administration.

War Visitors

Of particular interest was the visit of Colonel Hans Christian Adamson of the Army Air Forces. The purpose of his visit was to assist in a pre-induction program for the high schools. His message was timely and forcible. It may be recalled that Colonel Adamson was with Eddy Rickenbacker for twenty days on a raft in the Pacific Ocean when Captain Rickenbacker was sent on his war mission.

Lt. John R. Rackley, 1st Lt., Sig. C. of the Seventh Service Command, Omaha, Nebraska, spent three weeks in Colorado discussing with superintendents and principals the question: "How the secondary school can best aid youth to prepare themselves for service to their country." He emphasized the following points:

Boys should have sound backgrounds in science, mathematics, English, language and history. It is good pre-induction training for the majority of students to emphasize practical competence in general education fields, and training in vocational or manipulative abilities.

Transportation

The war emergency has brought new and serious problems in the matter of school transportation. Old busses cannot be replaced by new ones. As this report goes to press, school authorities face the need of making the busses they now have serve for the duration.

GROWTH AND EXPANSION OF PUBLIC EDUCATION IN COLORADO SINCE 1913 AND THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION SINCE 1931

At a Joint Conference of the Legislative Committee on Education of the Senate and House of the 1942 legislature, statements were made and questions asked which made it appear to the State Department of Education that a review of the growth and expansion of the Department of Education since 1931 and a general statement of the magnificent expansion and growth of public education in Colorado since 1913 is mandatory if the legislature is to intelligently evaluate the present program.

In the tabulation which follows, various interesting and vital points may be noted. For instance—

In 1913 the high school enrollment in Colorado was 16,479.

In 1942 the high school enrollment in Colorado was 69,290.

It will be noted that Colorado is now operating, by virtue of the statutes, three junior colleges as a part of the public school system. They are located at Pueblo, Grand Junction, and Trinidad.

It is interesting to note that in 1913 there were no kindergartens. Colorado now has 7,961 kindergarten children enrolled (1942).

There was no report on consolidation filed in the office of the State Department of Education concerning consolidated schools in 1913. In 1942 we find that there are 73 consolidated schools and 22 county high school systems.

As reported in 1913 school property was valued at \$15,613,819, whereas in 1942 estimates were \$69,094,616.

Kindly note that in 1913 the salary, per teacher, per month, was \$50.00, whereas \$75.00 per month was the minimum salary in 1942. The above minimum salary is provided by the county and the state.

The school curriculum in Colorado since 1913 has grown from a simple Reading, Writing, Arithmetic program at the elementary level, and from English, Language, Science, Mathematics, and History to a modern high school curriculum which includes Business, Science, Agriculture, Manual Training, Art, Music, Home Economics, Health Education and Home Making. This expansion has taken place chiefly in the last thirty years.

How Colorado Ranks With Other States

Apparently one of the first considerations in evaluating Colorado's public education system should be its rank in illiteracy. While recent and comparable data for the nation are not available at this time, it is interesting that in 1942 Colorado reported 503 persons between the ages of 8 and 21 years who could not read and write the English language. For the same year 303,532 persons of ages 6-21 were listed in the census. Also, since 1934, 3,500 illiterate people were taught to read and write through the Adult Education and National Citizenship programs.

Nationwide figures are available however on the number of people who have completed certain years of schooling. As to the proportion of the population aged 25 and over who have not finished one year or more of school Colorado ranks 19th among the states. (A rank of 48 would be the poorest record.) When it comes to the proportion who have finished one year or more of high school Colorado ranks 10th, and in respect to those who have finished a year or more of college, the rank is 8th among the 48 states. These facts speak well for the educational effort in the past in Colorado.

The qualifications of the teachers should be one of the principal indices of the excellence of the schools. Few states demand as high qualifications for the certification of teachers. In Colorado there is required three years of college training as the minimum standard for teachers. A few states require four years of college but most of them permit certification of teachers with less than three years of college training.

The table below contains a summary of Colorado's rankings among the states on fourteen phases of the school program. Unless otherwise indicated figures are for 1940 from the U. S. Office of Education and the World Almanac.

On the basis of the above mentioned fourteen items only, the median rank for Colorado is 17.5 or in other words 7 above the average state. If rank in teacher preparation and in rate of literacy were considered it would no doubt be considerably higher.

Thus it is gratifying to observe that Colorado ranks well above the average on most phases of its educational effort. While it ranks 21st in per capita income it is 16th in school expenditures, showing good financial effort on the part of the taxpayers. May this progressive trend continue.

Vocational Education

1933—Became part of Department of Education, enrollment 11,508.
1942—July 1—enrollment reached 30,132, exclusive of war production program.

1942—State staff consists of one director, 7 state supervisors, 5 assistant state supervisors, two case workers for rehabilitation service; four special instructors in family life education; firemanship, safety and first aid and peace officer activities; sixteen stenographers, 1 auditor, 1 bookkeeper, equipment specialist, four clerks.

This enlarged staff is paid from federal funds, which became necessary because of war protection training program.

The need of vocational education has been definitely demonstrated by the work that is being done in the war effort.

Growth of the State Department

According to figures submitted to the U. S. Office of Education, the number of employees of this department increased from eleven in 1930 to sixty-three in 1942, an expansion of 473%. Services rendered the public have grown from a skeleton consisting of the branches of Certification, Statistics, and Library in 1930, to at least a dozen agencies at present. The cost of the state educational services was \$22,384 in 1930, while in 1942 the amount was \$132,315, indicating a growth of 491% in this respect.

The following table shows the trend over a twelve year period.

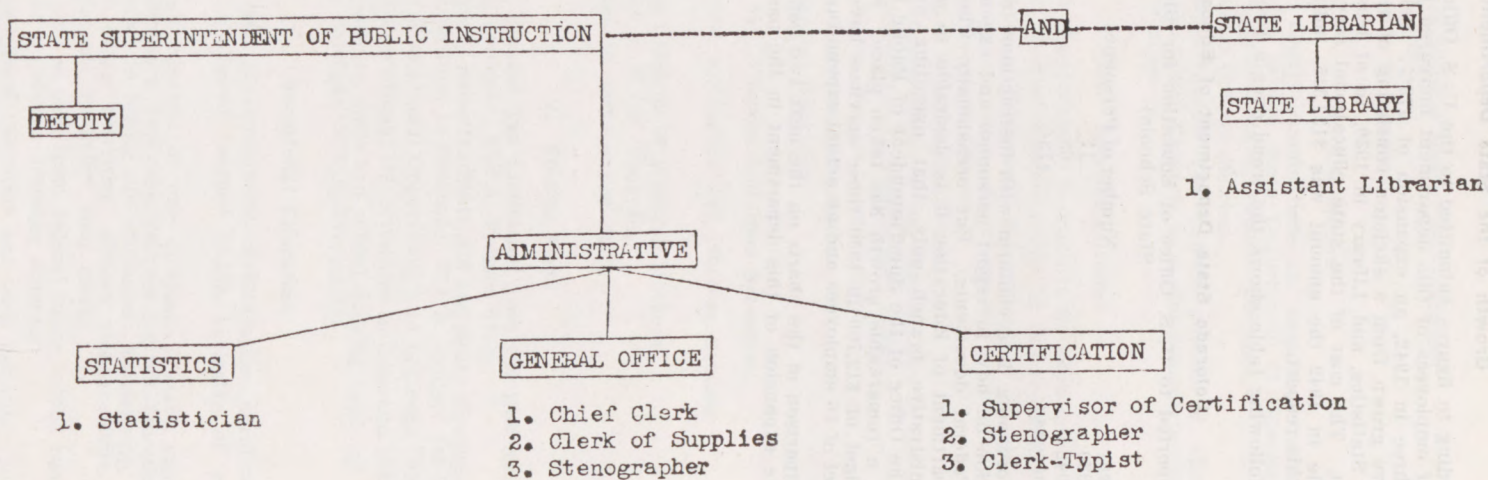

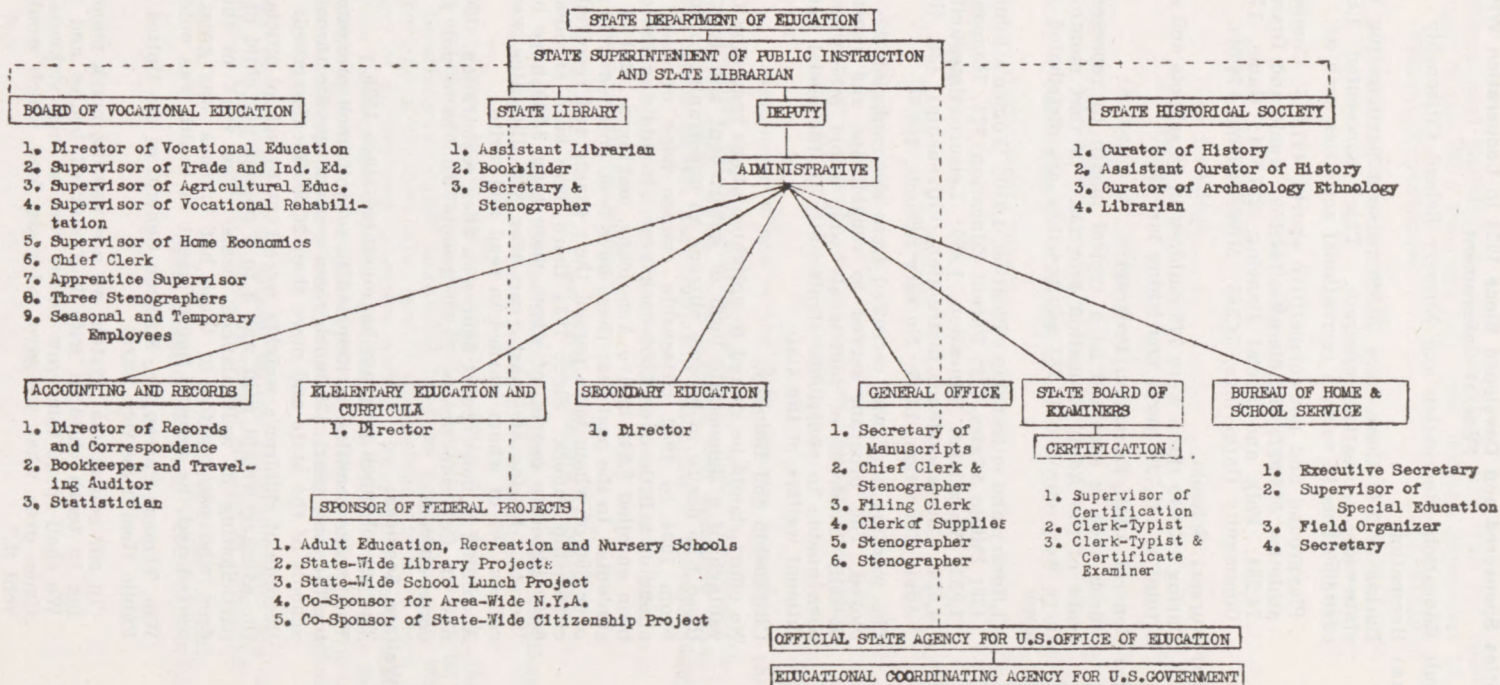
The foregoing data conform with instructions from the U. S. Office of Education on how to report personnel and expenditures for publication in Federal documents. But occasionally when referring to the State Department of Education it is desirable to use figures covering the administrative branch only, that operating under appropriations made to the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction. In this case also, a remarkable growth has taken place. From six employees and a budget of \$12,700 in 1930 these services have been expanded to a personnel of 16 employees and an actual expenditure of \$32,835 in 1942.

A comparison of the charts on the next two pages will indicate the progressive expansion of this department in the past eleven years.

Activities Sponsored and Developed Since 1933 in Cooperation With the Federal Government

1. Adult Education—Recreation and Nursery School Citizenship

(a) Recreation

During 1939-40 there were 50,000 persons participating in the state-wide recreation program. This represented 1,822,256 participations in various recreational activities such as:

Playground and non-competitive sports, 497,015; Competitive athletics, 588,927; Handicrafts, 141,159; Music and Dramatics, 74,234; Folk and Social Dancing, 217,894; Game, 170,631; Community Gatherings, 54,585; Miscellaneous, 78,011.

(b) Nursery Schools.

During 1939-40 there were 778 children in 28 schools and served a total of 123,720 warm nourishing lunches.

(c) General Adult Education Program:

March 1940 is accepted as a typical month to represent the scope of the Adult Education program. In that month alone there were enrolled 16,281 adults; they are distributed as follows:

Literary and citizenship education, 1,910; Women's Education, 439; Public Affairs, 571; Parent Education, 379; Homemaking, 1,953; Vocational Education, 1,880; Leisure time activities, 4,924; Correspondence instruction (citizenship), 436; General Adult Education, 1,023; Nursery Schools, 766.

The working staff was recruited from the ranks of the unemployed. The program served to rehabilitate and reestablish literally hundreds of individuals who would otherwise have been unable to contribute significantly to the social and educational welfare of the state.

(d) Citizenship and Literacy.

No effort should be spared to enlighten aliens regarding the advantage of a democratic form of government and to give to those who desire to become citizens an opportunity to do so.

From 1934 to 1942 citizenship classes have enrolled 17,927 aliens or a little over 2,500 each year. In addition there have been enrolled 5,541 native Americans, making a total of 23,488 students. In the past year there have been enrolled 2,790 aliens, over 800 of whom have passed their exams and received their citizenship papers. Since 1934 there have been enrolled over 6,400 illiterate people, of whom more than 3,500 have become literate. During the past year over 815 illiterates were enrollees, 405 of whom learned to read and write.

According to most recent figures on alien registration, there are now in Colorado nearly 30,000 people who have not yet become citizens.

Welfare Services:

The school lunch program has operated since 1935.

Thirty-nine counties participated in school lunch programs during the past year; 325 lunch room centers operate through the schools of the state and more than 26,000 meals served.

Records of children's weights were kept by school officials and the average weight gain was 5 to 6 pounds per child of those participating in well-balanced meals. The work of the children who participated in these hot lunches was greatly improved and the general improvement in health was noted.

Wm. Thomas Parran, Jr., Surgeon General of the United States Public Health Service, says:

"In our educational system we are wasting much money trying to teach children with half starved bodies and minds. We shall spend tomorrow on the care of their sickness many times over what we save today on food which would prevent it."

Recommendations to the Next General Assembly

1. Provision for the reorganization of school districts into larger administrative units, which reorganization will eliminate many school districts which do not have sufficient valuation to operate adequately.
2. State aid for financially inadequate district activities.
3. Tenure law for teachers.
4. Adequate retirement law for all teachers of the state.
5. Additional funds for the State Department so that additional and better services may be provided for local communities.

This report would not be complete without a tribute to the educators of Colorado. Our teachers, besides carrying on the regular work, have cheerfully accepted additional burdens created by the war and the shortage of teachers. Our county superintendents have been administrators of dignity and executive ability. They have cooperated with the State Department and war agencies in an unselfish and able manner. Superintendents and principals of our city schools have shown characteristic statesmanship in school activities which geared the school program to the war effort.

The splendid men and women of the profession who are serving Colorado in these difficult times are indeed soldiers of democracy.

BIENNIAL REPORT, BUREAU OF HOME AND SCHOOL SERVICE*

July 1, 1940 to June 30, 1942

In 1939 the Bureau of Home and School Service became a division of the State Department of Education. It now renders services dealing with the problems of Special Education of handicapped children under the direction of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Teaching health and physical fitness among school children is recognized by the Department as one of the fundamental educational problems of this war period. During this biennium this Bureau has given special emphasis to: (1) developing a practical program for conserving and teaching health in public schools; (2) conducting audiometer and speech tests in the various counties and local school districts of the state as a basis for adjusting the school program of children handicapped in speech or hearing; (3) aiding in the organization and successful carrying out of a Colorado White House Conference on Children in a Democracy; (4) participating with other state and local agencies in cooperative efforts to develop plans for Civilian Defense, for better nutrition of children, and for various programs connected with Defense and Welfare services.

The usual services to the various sections of the state have been performed by the secretaries of the Bureau. These include testing children and recommending programs for education of all types for the physically handicapped; organizing parent and community groups for better understanding between home, school and community; extending the services of parent education classes; promoting safety in cooperation with other state agencies; serving on the advisory committee of the Rocky Mountain Radio Council for education by radio; and working with various individuals and agencies for a better understanding of the causes and methods for prevention of juvenile delinquency.

Each of the secretaries of the Bureau headed important committees which prepared and presented material to the Colorado White House Conference on Children in a Democracy held in Denver, March 19-21, 1942. The office and field secretaries helped prepare the printed report of this conference, which is now being distributed.

The executive secretary has been a member of the state-wide committee acting under the direction of the State Division of Public Health and State Department of Education to prepare and distribute a much requested bulletin on, "Policies in the Teaching of Health in Public Schools." Following this publication, an editing committee of five members representing the two State Departments has been preparing a handbook on the teaching of health, which is to be available to all teachers of the state. This handbook, called "Conserving the Health of Colorado's Children," is a compendium of available material and pertinent daily helps to teachers in the class rooms. The executive secretary is directing the work of the editing committee.

This office prepared and distributed a total of 1,150 legislative bulletins summarizing bills introduced in the legislature that dealt with education and child welfare. It also assembled and prepared for mailing 4,000 copies of Parent Education lessons for various classes being held under the direction of Mrs. Jean Cowan Bloom, instructor in Parent Education sent out by the State Board for Vocational Education.

From July 1, to October 15, 1940, during the absence of the regular secretary, Mrs. Emily M. McCord acted as executive secretary of the Bureau.

**REPORT OF THE FIELD SECRETARY TO THE COLORADO
BUREAU OF HOME AND SCHOOL SERVICE**

July 1, 1940 to June 30, 1942

The Field Secretary has carried on the regular organization work, visiting most of the counties of the state during the past two years and contacting approximately 450 groups of parents and teachers. She has been a member of the Rocky Mountain Radio Council, the State Council for Crippled Children, the State Council for the Promotion of Nursery Schools, the executive board of the Colorado Society for Crippled Children, a representative on the State-wide Council for Defense, Health and Welfare Services, a Bureau representative on the State Parent Education Council, and a member of the planning committee for conducting summer institutes on Parent Education in the various institutions of higher learning in the state.

This secretary was the State Chairman of the Division of Social Service for Children which developed ten committees and prepared the material of these committees for the Colorado White House Conference. Since the holding of this conference, this secretary has visited or contacted many committees of the state to promote the holding of local White House Conferences. She has also been a member of the State Nutrition Council and helped to develop local Nutrition Councils for promotion of better health among children, and an understanding of better food habits and meal planning during the wartime emergency.

Considerable time was spent in establishing school lunch programs and in maintaining higher standards in school lunch rooms in rural communities.

Many agencies of the state, as well as private individuals, request the services of this secretary and the aid available through the Bureau to straighten out various tangled problems in local communities. This is part of the intangible service performed by this Bureau through its secretaries.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF SPECIAL EDUCATION

July 1, 1940 to June 30, 1942

During the past biennium practically all of the counties of the state have been visited. About 5,000 children have been referred for some type of examination. Most of these have been referrals for defective speech, hearing and mentality.

Emphasis during this period has been placed upon school contacts. Upon the request of the county superintendent and nurses, the Supervisor of Special Education has visited the county where groups of children to be examined had already been selected. Larger schools have been used as centers. Children needing examination have been brought to these centers from smaller schools to have their various handicaps diagnosed. Conferences with local teachers were held regularly and methods of corrective educational procedure discussed.

Wherever a study of cases needing educational adjustment has been begun, the county has been revisited after a six months' period and a reexamination conducted to see if remedial work has been helpful.

An audiometer for testing defective hearing has been purchased for this Bureau and several thousand children have been examined in various counties.

REPORT OF THE WORK OF THE ELEMENTARY DIVISION OF THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

July 1, 1940 to June 30, 1942

PLAN OF WORK

The purpose of the Elementary Division is to assist teachers, principals, superintendents, and county superintendents to improve instruction in the elementary schools of the state. The plan of work which was begun during the year of 1939-40 has been followed through the present biennium. It consists of the following:

1. Selection of one or more problems in the field of elementary education for intensive study.
2. Study of these problems culminating in the preparation of curriculum bulletins dealing with them.
3. Meeting with groups of teachers throughout the state to introduce and discuss these bulletins.

By these means the best available information in the field of elementary education is made available to the teachers and the use of such information to improve the quality of teaching is encouraged.

The worth of this plan seems to have been demonstrated over the three-year period in which it has been in operation. Reports from educators all over the state indicate that the curriculum materials which have been issued have been of great value to teachers and that the meetings which have been held to discuss these materials have stimulated an interest which has resulted in wide use of the aids provided and a noticeable improvement in instruction.

READING

In 1939-40 reading was selected as the first field for study. The work begun in this area was carried on throughout the present biennium. Several problems in the field of reading were studied and bulletins dealing with them prepared and introduced to teachers.

Adapting the Reading Program to the Needs of the Individual Child

The building of a reading program adapted to the needs of the individual child is an important problem which all teachers face. Work on this problem was begun in 1939-40 and carried on through the next two years. Committees of teachers worked with the Elementary Division in studying teaching practices which offered promise of helping to meet this problem. In the fall of 1940 a curriculum bulletin entitled **Adapting the Reading Program to the Needs of the Individual Child** was issued. The first printing of this bulletin was exhausted within a year and a reprint was necessary to supply continuing requests.

Teaching Phonics

The many requests from teachers for information and practical helps on teaching phonics lead the Elementary Division to begin a search for material on this subject. It was found that Mrs. Helen R. Gumlick, primary supervisor for the Denver Public Schools, had materials on teaching phonics which were being successfully used by Denver teachers. Mrs. Gumlick consented to make these materials available through the State Department of Education to the teachers of the state. In the fall of 1941 these materials were issued in a bulletin entitled **Teaching Phonics in Grades One to Four**. The demand on the part of teachers for this bulletin had, by the end of 1942, completely exhausted the supply, necessitating a reprint.

Preparation for First Reading Experiences

A problem which all first grade teachers meet is that of preparing children for their first experiences in reading. In order to gather information in regard to promising practices in use in this area, ten study centers were set up throughout the state in which teachers from thirty-five schools participated. The Elementary Division supplied these study centers with informational materials and guidance and the centers reported fully on the various procedures which teachers tried out in their schools. These reports contain valuable help for all teachers which will be made available through a bulletin.

Bibliographies of Reading Materials for Children

The Elementary Division cooperated with the Colorado State Library in the preparation of three bibliographies of reading materials for children which were made available to schools. Teacher committees were used to aid in making the selections. These bibliographies were: **Bibliography of Supplementary Books in Science and Social Studies**, **Bibliography of Books of Easy Difficulty for the Recreatory Reading of Slow-Learning Children**, and **Bibliography of Free Materials**.

Evaluation of the Reading Program

Criteria were worked out by which a school might evaluate its program in reading. These criteria were used in a number of schools and suggestions were made for their improvement. The Director of Elementary Education and Curricula assisted in conducting evaluations in seven school systems. Present plans call for revising the evaluative criteria and making them available to all schools.

Study of Children Having Difficulty With Reading

One hundred twenty children having difficulty with reading were studied by the Director of Elementary Education and Curricula. These children were widely scattered throughout the state. Suggestions were made to the teachers of these children as to the best means of helping them become better readers.

NEW COURSE OF STUDY FOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

Work on a new Course of Study for Elementary Schools was begun in 1941 and completed in 1942. The colleges and universities of the state cooperated with the Elementary Division in this enterprise by loaning the services of faculty members to head committees and to serve as consultants. These people contributed their services to the State Department of Education in addition to carrying their regular work. Six committees prepared the six sections of the Course of Study. Teachers from all types of schools served on these committees.

The new Course was built on the excellent foundation laid in the last previous Course (1936) with the addition of the proven advances in the elementary field which had been made in the last six years. A special effort was made to include a wide variety of practical teaching helps.

Much of the work of the Elementary Division for 1942-43 will be devoted to assisting teachers in the effective use of the new Course.

THE DAILY PROGRAM IN SMALL SCHOOLS

Teachers in small schools where several grades are taught by one teacher often experience difficulty in preparing a workable daily program. A teacher committee worked with the Elementary Division on this problem and suggestions on how to plan a good daily program were included in the new Course of Study for Elementary Schools which was issued in 1942.

TEACHING DEMOCRACY IN COLORADO SCHOOLS

A study of what is being done in Colorado schools in the field of teaching democracy was begun in 1941. Many worthwhile procedures have been brought to light and a bulletin dealing with these is in preparation.

COOPERATIVE WORK WITH THE COLORADO ASSOCIATION OF ELEMENTARY SCHOOL PRINCIPALS

The Elementary Division has worked closely with the Colorado Association of Elementary School Principals in conducting conferences on elementary education and in studying problems of elementary administration and supervision. Three regional conferences were held each year and four major problems in the elementary field have been under study.

GROUP TEACHER CONFERENCES

One hundred ninety group teacher conferences were held in sixty-one counties during the biennium. These conferences were attended by 2,790 teachers. The purpose of these conferences was to introduce to and discuss with teachers the reading bulletins issued by the Elementary Division to the end that instruction in this field might be improved throughout the state. Teachers were urged to bring any instructional problems to these meetings and many fields other than reading were discussed. Conferences of this type constitute one of the most worthwhile services of the Elementary Division.

COUNTY SUPERINTENDENTS' CONFERENCES

Regional conferences for County Superintendents were held during May and June, 1942, in seven conveniently located centers. Each conference lasted two days and was devoted to a study of the new Course of Study for Elementary Schools.

SUPPLYING USED TEXTBOOKS TO NEEDY DISTRICTS

The Director of Elementary Education and Curricula has found many districts without an adequate supply of textbooks. Teachers and county superintendents have requested help in locating textbooks discarded by schools, which could be obtained free for use in those districts needing them. The Elementary Division has been able to assist these districts in getting needed texts. Approximately 3,000 pounds of used texts have been collected and sent by freight collect to eight counties during this biennium.

REPORT OF THE WORK OF THE SECONDARY DIVISION
of
THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

February 9, 1942, to June 30, 1942

The Secondary Division was organized in July, 1941, for the purpose of assisting those engaged in secondary education with their problems.

Dr. Peter P. Mickelson was appointed as director of secondary education. After his resignation, Dr. John C. Unger was appointed and he took over the work on February 9, 1942. This report is a summary of the secondary division since February 9.

The Plan

The underlying principles accepted for the Office of Director of Secondary Education are as follows:

1. To furnish and foster leadership necessary for the development of a sound system of education for Colorado.
2. To assist in the administration of the laws controlling various phases of secondary education.
3. To cooperate with groups interested in education.
4. To make available to the schools of Colorado the services of departmental members trained in special areas.
5. To collect and publish data on the program of the schools, the problems of the school and the latest developments in school administration and supervision.
6. To make available to the schools of Colorado published materials which are necessary for the efficient functioning of school units in the state.

Program

With the above underlying principles as a basis, the following program for secondary education has been formulated:

1. A plan for school visitation.
2. A program for improvement of plant, equipment, and instruction materials.
3. A program of adult education.
4. A program of evaluation.
5. A program of constructive school administration and supervision.
6. A program of conservation.
7. A program of health and physical education.
8. Reorganization of the curriculum to meet the needs of times.
9. Reorganization of student activities to meet the needs of older groups who will return to school.
