INTRODUCTION

During this biennial period, all education has had the privilege of continuing to serve our country in its effort in behalf of freedom for mankind. The service of the educational forces of America have been of inestimable value in the world's greatest struggle—World War II.

The State Department of Education has served as a liaison and the official agency between the United States government and the county and local school districts, the representatives of the government contacting the State Department in setting the scene and making the plans for the operation of government activities in the interest of the war effort. Besides assisting in various and numerous drives, arranging conferences, and disseminating directions and information, the Department particularly aided in the following areas, lending all possible services:

- (1) Physical Fitness; (2) Pre-induction Training—Skills with emphasis on Mathematics and Science; (3) Study of possible effects of inflation; (4) Air-mindedness; (5) International Relations; (6) Geography; (7) Human Relationships; (8) Countless time-consuming surveys designed to show local needs; (9) Providing information that made for property releases; (10) Assistance to mothers employed in war work; (11) Transportation.

The demands of the war have so controlled the activities of the State Department that it has been unable, with its limited budget and lack of personnel, to continue the usual services throughout the state. Needless it is to say that the local districts and school authorities have so changed the general run of activities that the regular school program has more or less been sidetracked from its traditional routine.

As the war progressed, difficulties and problems increased in the administration of the schools of the state. For example: Keeping the school buses in uninterrupted operation under the war program with gasoline restrictions and the wearing of equipment presented problems which demanded patience and study.

The necessary priorities given to armed forces by the government prevented many school boards from providing adequate transportation to consolidated schools. These priorities also discouraged consolidation during the war period.

In general, the curricula in elementary and secondary schools have been revised not only to meet the needs of war activities but also to meet pupil needs.

It is believed that by participating in the wartime activities, many pupils will have learned how to meet the changing demands of society not only in the emergencies, but also in times of peace, for the new world will demand a constantly changing curriculum. In our struggle to preserve the democratic way of life, the responsibility of the school is becoming more clearly defined. More than ever before, the general public recognizes the school as the training ground for citizenship and the place where democratic ideals are taught. The war situation has demanded recent revisions in the social studies, and there is evidence that there is greater cooperation in many parts of the state between the community and the school for the common good of both. This is particularly noticeable in the health area. We have emphasized the importance of good health and physical fitness. In some instances, schools have assisted in making surveys of the community health needs. Also, the schools have been charged with the teaching of safety, both on the farm and in the home. They helped in the collection of scrap materials, and assisted in the sale of stamps and bonds and other drives requested by the government.

Outstanding services were rendered in many parts of the state by high school students. Because of the serious shortage of farm labor in Colorado, it became necessary for school youth to aid with the planting and harvesting of farm crops. In many communities, groups of boys and girls took the place of the men and women who had answered their country's call and entered the armed forces. Hundreds of high school boys and girls accepted employment in many different types of jobs.

From various contacts, I find that it is generally agreed among educators that the participation in America's challenging programs by the students of the schools is a sound basis for building an intelligent citizenship in this democratic society of ours.

Colorado owes a debt of gratitude to the teachers who kept school morale high under difficult situations and emphasized the blessings that come from democratic life. Upon their shoulders rested not only the ultimate success of all drives, but also the burden of maintaining educational standards. No greater challenge has ever come to the schools of the nation than our schools had to meet. The people of Colorado should realize the contributions that the schools have made during these trying times.

EDUCATION HAS NOT STOOD STILL DURING DEPRESSION AND WAR

CONSOLIDATION

The State Department is happy to report that there has been greatly increased statewide interest in consolidation of schools. While Colorado has made a splendid record in consolidation and merging of districts in the past, there still remains much to be done. More than a decade ago, Colorado served as a splendid example to other states by demonstrating the feasibility of transporting children over long distances. But due to the handicaps of depression and war of the last few years, general consolidation has been retarded.

Since the rural school problem is a social and economic one, as well as an educational one, it should move forward by common consent of the people concerned. I have felt that more consolidation will come with a greater knowledge on the part of our rural people of what part education must play in maintaining our democracy.

The Statute of 1933, which provided for the dissolution of the districts by the vote of the people, has brought significant results. Even during the war period, many districts voted themselves out of existence. By consent of the people, the territory involved automatically became unorganized and the county superintendent concerned added territory to one or more districts according to his discretion.

As a war measure and to encourage consolidation, the State Department urged the closing of many one-teacher schools and suggested that the local authorities transport the children to larger centers. This has led to the temporary closing of at least 300 schools and there is an indication that many of them will not reopen—that the citizens concerned will vote for consolidation. However, the success of an extensive statewide program of consolidation can develop only with better highways and an increase in transportation facilities—two of the most important factors in eliminating the inadequate district.

The problem of consolidation and the merging of territory is of such significance and proportion that the State Department for some time has urged the legislature to appropriate funds for the appointment of a Director of Organization and Transportation. It would be the duty of such a Director to assist the people in studying the possibilities of consolidation, as well as to direct surveys which would lead to the development of intelligent understanding of the need for creating larger administrative school units.

BUILDING

While there has been practically no building of public schools during the war, the depression of the 1930's had the effect of providing some new and splendid school buildings for the state of Colorado. From the period of 1933 to 1944, at which time Mr. George M. Bull served as Colorado Director of the Public Works Administration, the sum of \$6,607,227 was spent. Mr. Bull reports that in order to revive the construction industry after the great reduction from the normal volume of construction work following the business depression of the late 1920's, the Public Works Administration (PWA) was established by the Federal Govern-

ment. That made it possible for states, cities, counties, school districts, and all other kinds of political bodies to build needed works. Funds were provided by the Federal Government to pay a part of the cost—usually 45 per cent. The works were planned and built by the political body itself, and the grant was earned by making the development under certain regulations set up in a contract between the owners and the Federal Government. "Colorado School Districts took advantage of this opportunity and during the period 1933 to 1940 constructed 76 Elementary and High School Projects. Total Cost \$6,607,227." "The Schools of Higher Education in Colorado also took full advantage of the opportunity and initiated a large building program. Thirty projects were built at the several State Institutions. The total cost was \$4,958,497." The accompanying chart shows the towns and districts participating and the cost of each project.

ADULT EDUCATION

At the present time the State Department of Education of Colorado has no Director of Adult Education. In spite of this handicap, brought on by the war's creating a shortage of professional services, we have been able to carry on many activities in the realm of adult education. The statewide adult education program was initiated as a WPA project. During the first four years after its initiation, there were 215 American-

ization centers established throughout Colorado. Of course the purpose was to teach the foreign-born the fundamentals of American democracy and to prepare them for American citizenship. The enrollment in the American citizenship classes totaled 2,763. The classes met on an average of three evenings of two hours each per week. Units of instruction were sent out by the State Department. At the conclusion of each unit's work a test was given by the instructor in charge. Each course consisted of sixteen unit lessons. After the test was given, graduation exercises were conducted. The enrollment in other classes, both vocational and academic, reached over 23,000. There was a particular interest shown in the Social Science studies. In the discussion groups a careful plan of all viewpoints of a problem was presented. The cultural subjects were not overlooked and the State Department has recorded many human interest stories. Our instructors learned much of the undiscovered talents that lie hidden in human beings. For instance, in one of the English classes a little woman sixty-five years old came to the instructor and said: "I have always thought I would like to write stories. Of course I never had the time because I am a seamstress, but now since I am without a job I have come to this class to learn something about 'writing stories'." The instructor was impressed by her sincerity and the hungry look in her eyes, so she said "Well, why not try to write a short story? I shall be so happy to help you." To make a long story short the little woman did try. The instructor proved to be an inspiration and in a few months this little woman sold a story for \$800. Of course I do not mean to imply that the purely commercial value of adult education is the important thing, however, important it may be, but I have had ample evidence that the grown-ups who have grown weary in life's struggle for existence were renewed in spirit and were inspired by the opening of many doors into the fields of learning of which they had had little or no knowledge. Besides the cultural area, the economic value cannot be overlooked. Many adults took courses in commercial subjects and fitted themselves for new areas of endeavor. Such subjects as salesmanship, bookkeeping, typewriting, and mechanics, provided new avenues for a way of making a living.

While the activities just described would be wholly impractical if not impossible during a war period, the State Department had opportunity to assist in conferences for the purpose of disseminating needed information on the part of the community for the war program. Such subjects as health questions and ways and means of assisting working war mothers were fully discussed. The Department assisted in providing pre-induction courses for prospective servicemen and women.

During this biennial period, while the plan of Adult Education has not been of a formal nature as it was during the depression period, many adults have become aware of the need of a continuous education in the changing world. The constant development of new machines will demand refresher courses in the vocational field and the complexities of the new world economy will demand the development of greater social intelligence. To serve democracy, education must observe and weigh forces and tendencies in the social and economic scene. Therefore, the State Department strongly urges the establishment of a Division of Adult Education as soon as possible.

JUNIOR COLLEGES

The Junior College movement came into being in 1937 and met a great need in various sections of the state.

Colorado now has six Junior Colleges and Continuation Schools. These are located at Trinidad, Pueblo, Grand Junction, Sterling, La Junta, and Lamar.

The Junior Colleges were most cooperative in organizing and operating vocational training programs during the war period. Most of these colleges conducted vocational classes for the first time during the years of the war. Equipment was made available through federal funds. The colleges participating were located at Trinidad, Grand Junction, Sterling, Pueblo, and Lamar. The colleges at Alamosa and Fort Collins also par-

ticipated by conducting war training classes in cooperation with the State Board for Vocational Education. The training programs conducted by the above institutions were confined to the fields of agriculture, food conservation, and trades and industries.

Following the termination of the war, the Junior Colleges have taken definite steps to continue training courses in reimbursable vocational programs. Equipment has been reorganized and additional items purchased, making it necessary for additional space to be provided. New buildings are now under construction, making it possible for a permanent vocational program in all of the Junior Colleges. With this added interest and cooperation, the Junior Colleges are now able to assist in the training of veterans and other citizens. Under the State Junior College Acts, the Junior Colleges of Colorado are becoming more active in terminal education. Much of this has been due to the war training programs and the cooperative planning carried on by the Junior Colleges with the State Board for Vocational Education.

The great need of these Junior Colleges was made evident by the initial enrollments.

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

With the demands of the armed forces for skilled and semi-skilled men and women, the desperate need for trained workers in industry, vocational education moved forward rapidly to a place of great significance. The Federal Government made available large sums of money to Colorado for use for the Vocational Board and under its direction, vocational education made a tremendous contribution to the war program.

The period from the beginning of 1943 through 1944 covers the war activities when the vocational training programs were at their peak. Additional personnel were employed and contracts entered into between local school districts and the State Board for Vocational Education. During this entire period, as well as the preceding three years, all communities in Colorado cooperated to the fullest extent in the organization and operation of war training programs.

Under Public Law 647, 77th Congress, funds were first appropriated for defense training, to be allotted to State Boards for Vocational Education through the U. S. Office of Education. In 1943 this program reached the height of its development and by the close of the program in May, 1945, a total of 80,124 persons had been enrolled in training classes and a total of \$4,097,988.35 had been expended to carry on the training. Two programs were conducted: the Vocational Education National Defense program for the training of workers for wartime jobs in the shortest time possible, and the Food Production War Training Program for food conservation and repair, and construction of farm machinery and equipment. In the latter program a total of 15,787 persons were enrolled in training courses.

More than fifty public schools of Colorado maintained programs in war production training. Besides the programs conducted in public schools, in-plant training classes were operated in industrial plants, and paid-trainee and paid-learner, foremanship, supervisory, and training-within-industry programs were also conducted. Preinduction training for persons likely to be inducted into service was also supplied and women were given special training as replacements for men in industry who were inducted.

In the field of Food Production War Training, 77 local administrative units operated courses, with 97 different neighborhood centers conducting classes in food conservation, and repair and construction of farm machinery and equipment.

At the close of this period most of the war training programs had served their purpose and steps were taken to reorganize the total vocational program in the state. The influence of the war activities will have a direct bearing for years to come on the regular vocational program.

HEALTH

The State Department, in the 1936 Course of Study, made health the first concern of the public school. There is evidence during the last few years that this emphasis has helped to develop a desirable attitude of many school authorities as to the importance of health in any educational program. Not only health instruction, but health practices were made an objective in teacher plans.

Various schemes were suggested for carrying on "health practices". For instance, the State Department recommended a rest period as one of the devices to assure some of the health practices. The rest period was not to be confused with "recess". The rest period was to be "complete inactivity" for ten or fifteen minutes at both the morning and afternoon sessions.

Since the rest period was inaugurated, 55 schools carried on an experiment to prove the value of a few minutes of complete inactivity, where children could close their eyes and really rest. Teachers have reported that pupils were not so irritable and discipline became less of a problem. The majority of teachers who participated in the experiment were of the opinion that children were often over-stimulated by the full day's work and also often affected by the war tension. The rest period proved to be somewhat of a "release". The State Department hopes that rest periods will become a regular part of the curriculum.

The publication "Concerning the Health of Colorado's Children", a handbook for teachers, has met with the approval of health authorities and teachers. Teachers are in high praise of this little volume. Many requests for copies have come from teachers' colleges, health departments, and health instructors throughout the country.

The relation of food and health has been stressed at community meetings everywhere, whenever the State Department found it feasible and had an opportunity to present this general subject of health.

This department has continually directed attention to the laws demanding physical examination for all school children of the state. It is very gratifying that many of our superintendents have assisted in organizing the local communities to the end of better and more healthful living and more intelligent use of hospitals, nurses, and general scientific knowledge.

The State Department, therefore, feels gratified in the fact that it made health the first objective of the school ten years ago.

SAFETY

Several years ago, the State Department called a statewide conference at the State Capitol Building to discuss ways and means of saving lives on the highway. The year following, this department secured and was very gratified to have the splendid cooperation of the University of Denver. As a cooperative effort, we provided for a week's institute for the purpose of preparing teachers in the realm of safety on the highways.

The TEACHER'S LESSON PLANS for use with SPORTSMANLIKE DRIVING SERIES were prepared by those in attendance. These lesson plans have been used by many teachers who have given favorable reports as to their value. It is to be regretted that through lack of personnel and funds in wartime, this department has been unable to continue an aggressive program of assistance to our teachers. The teaching of safety on the highway, home, farm, and industry, is of such significance that the State Department of Education should have the services of a full-time director. Any program of importance must stress the making of citizenship, and the subject matter involved should be integrated into

the total program of the school. The State Superintendent, at the last legislative session requested an appropriation of \$10,000.00 to carry on an ample safety education program in the schools, but was not successful in the effort. This request will be repeated at the next session of the Legislature.

SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

During this period the School Lunch Program for children was sponsored by the State Department of Education. This was a war activity carried on in the interest of health and service to the home. It operated on the basis of federal aid. A representative from this Department served as coordinator and chairman of the School Lunch Committee, and assisted in the actual functioning of the group. During this last school year, 203 urban and rural schools participated in the program. A total of 2,367,369 meals were served to 133,517 children as recorded for the school term. This has proved to be one of the most satisfactory war activities in which we have participated.

It is to be recalled, too, that the Federal Government provided funds for "Extended School Services". In all congested war areas, the State Department has assisted in the operation of the program for these "Extended School Services". These services were provided for mothers working in war industries. The majority of these child-units were nursery schools, but also the program included care for school age children in many of the centers.

One of the results of this program has been to prove the value of the nursery schools to the common good.

COLORADO COMMITTEE ON AVIATION EDUCATION

The part that aviation plays in the life of all the peoples of the earth must be recognized by educators. The airplane will have great significance in the post-war period and the peace to follow. Therefore, there is a pressing obligation of schools to educate youth for life in a shifting era, in which aviation will play a magnificent part. The change will involve an understanding of the immediate effects of swift transportation and the necessary adjustments of society. Therefore, we must begin to develop an understanding in the schools of the change that the airplane will bring to all the peoples of the earth.

The State Department assisted in preparing a plan for study for the elementary schools and the secondary schools of the state. Miss Margaret Paradise, Director of Elementary Education, and Dr. John C. Unger, Director of Secondary Education, assisted in making plans for a program of study.

Dr. William L. Wrinkle, of the State College of Education, Greeley, and a former educational consultant with the Civil Aeronautics Administration, Aviation Education Division, served in the State Department as a consultant. His assignment consisted in following out the recommendations of the State Aviation Committee.

A general plan of study must be concerned with:

1. Adjustments in society as to the great magnitude of the social change that must come about. The social implication of aviation will need to be stressed in order that planes may not again be turned into a human menace as they were by aggressor nations. Airplanes must be made to serve the highest ethical purposes for the sake of our continued existence.
2. The effect of world travel.
3. The field of science and its relation to the success of aviation.
4. New view of the study of geography.

STATE LIBRARY

The State Library reached the height of its service during the depression, at which time it made available services to 238,559 residents in the rural areas of the state.

In a report of September 28, 1939, the average employment for the State Library was 367. The number of operating units were 70.

The total number working on February 9, 1939, were 332. The report shows that 33,030 school children were served by the project.

Sponsor's contributions, supplies, equipment, and costs other than libraries, \$70,000.00.

The report also shows that on February 9, 1939, the government paid \$6,017.40 for labor. By August, the government had an accumulated cost for labor services of \$10,704.27.

The number of volumes circulated by the WPA activity on August 9, 1939, was 20,777.

More than 238,000 rural residents of Colorado were given access to library service in the past year through the statewide WPA library project. The war emergency had brought about re-direction of the project along four general lines. These included establishment of Victory Information Centers to provide individual communities with information necessary to

conduct the war; central collection and distribution of civilian defense material; library service to military forces; and library assistance to congested civilian population areas resulting from war production and establishment of military camps.

During this biennium, the WPA bookmobile was purchased from the Procurement Division of the U. S. Treasury Department. The vehicle will be loaned to areas in the state where an effort is being made to establish or strengthen county or regional libraries.

The project-owned bookmobile which has been operated in Larimer, Mesa, and Weld counties was placed in direct service to members of the armed forces and civilians in congested population areas. Aid was given in the Denver area to rural libraries serving civilian workers at the Denver Ordnance Plant, the Medical Supply Depot, and Buckley Field.

Other services also included these activities: establishing a World Peace Information Bureau and the making of a skeleton survey of public library facilities in Colorado.

Number of project workers employed during the year varied from 150 to 213, with 170 employed at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1942.

Perhaps the outstanding accomplishment of 1942 was the Victory Book Campaign, during which several thousand books were collected, sorted, packed, and sent out through the State Library to camp and hospital libraries for use of the soldiers.

Since the close of the Works Progress Administration, a depression activity, the State Library has not been able to continue the high service, but has made some progress as the following will indicate:

July, 1943-June, 1944

ACCOMPLISHMENTS:

1. Rearrangement and reorganization of the State Library headquarters.
 - a. Juvenile non-fiction titles were segregated from adult non-fiction to form a complete juvenile section, thus making it more convenient for teachers and librarians who came to the Library to choose their own books, as well as greatly facilitating the work of State Library assistants. This involved many hours of shifting books, washing shelves, planning just how to best accommodate a growing collection of books in already overcrowded quarters.
 - b. Rearranging of shelving and furniture to provide work room, storage room for book trunks, and packing space.
 - c. Revision of rules, etc., governing loans.
 - d. Addition to staff of trained cataloger.
2. LIBRARY LENS—The first issue of the LIBRARY LENS, quarterly bulletin of the State Library, was in September, 1943. This little publication superceded the old LIBRARY BULLETIN which had not been issued since WPA days, and is sent to all public, college, and special libraries in the state, county superintendents, members of the General Assembly, state library agencies in the 48 states, numerous out-state college and university libraries, and a long list of interested persons and organizations. It contains short biographical sketches of outstanding Colorado librarians, news notes of activities in local libraries, short lists of recommended children's books, accounts of State Library projects, and highlights from the national professional scene.
3. Building up of book collection, not only on military and naval information, books useful to war workers, victory garden suggestions, etc., but also on world affairs and peace, looking forward to the end of the war.
4. Suggestions to libraries throughout the state on organization of war and peace information centers.

5. Mr. Gordon Bennett, librarian, served on the Colorado Nutrition Council which dispensed information on how to make the most of the food supply during the war.
6. Beginning of the "Equal Chance Campaign" in cooperation with the Colorado Library Association. Issuing of pamphlet material and letters to legislators and others, to acquaint them with the lack of library resources in the State of Colorado, with the aim to acquire a larger appropriation for the State Library.

TWO TEACHERS' RETIREMENT PLANS IN COLORADO

The laws of Colorado authorize two different plans for providing teacher retirement funds. One statute permits funds to be raised locally for a local plan, with no participation by the state, and the other sets up a state teachers' retirement fund with contributions by employer and employee.

Local Plan

Any board of education may set up a benefit or retirement plan for its employees. Provision is made for a "Board of Managers" to direct the plan. There is no provision for state assistance under this law; all funds are to be raised locally.

A special tax not to exceed two mills may be levied on the assessed valuation of first-class school districts, and county and union high school districts, for the support of a local retirement fund for teachers. The maximum benefits under this plan are \$50.00 per month to retired teachers. The retirement age is 65 years. It is permissible to combine and extend benefits under this plan with any benefits under the plan mentioned in the first paragraph above,

State Plan

The public employees' retirement plan is available to all school district employees, subject to acceptance by the local school officials. Under this plan, the school employee pays 3½ per cent of his salary and the local board of education an equal amount into the state employees' retirement fund. (The employees' salary deductions are refundable upon separation from the plan.)

Eligibility for full benefits of retirement begins at the age of 65 and after 20 years' affiliation with the plan. Benefit payments shall be 40 per cent of the average salary for the last five years of service, but cannot exceed \$100.00 per month. Provision is made for partial benefits to employees who have reached the age of 65 and have been affiliated with the plan five years or more, but who are otherwise ineligible for retirement. Under certain conditions, benefits are also available in case of permanent disability.

While only about a dozen school districts make levies to support a local retirement plan, two-thirds of the first and second-class districts are enrolled in the state public employees' retirement plan.

FINANCE

One of the most challenging problems of this period has been the matter of finance.

More adequate salaries for the teachers are necessary if we are to attract the best talent among our youth into the teaching profession. The state and the nation must recognize the responsibility of a democratic people to provide intelligent citizenship. The teaching profession must have men and women of native ability, high ideals, and scholarly attainments if we are to continue to occupy a place of leadership among the nations of the earth. While Colorado has had a high ranking among the states in educational values according to yardsticks for measuring education it has ranked below average among the forty-eight states in the matter of STATE SUPPORT. Colorado as a state must contribute more money to the support of the local districts.

Constructive steps were taken, however. In the legislative session of 1943 a new law was passed for a minimum salary of one thousand dollars per school year for the maintenance of each elementary classroom unit, and one thousand three hundred and thirty-three dollars per year for the high school classroom unit.

This bill, which was prepared by the Colorado Education Association, received support from all educational forces of the state, and was a splendid beginning for more favorable action on the part of the state to recognize its obligation to the local districts.

COLORADO'S RANK AMONG THE STATES

Public records show that it has been the practice of educational leaders of the various states to compare the achievements of other states with their own. Apparently this has been the custom through the years and educators have used these comparisons to stir the citizens of their own state into action for better things, or pointed to their own accomplishments with pride. This is revealed in the report of Horace Mann in the Common School Journal of 1839, when after a visit to New York he returned to Massachusetts and made his report.

Mr. Mann revealed that the "average length of schools in New York for the year 1837 was a little more than seven and one-half months." Whereas the terms in Massachusetts were less than seven months, While Horace Mann desired longer terms in Massachusetts, he said "the common school system of New York is of recent origin . . . it was established as late as 1812. Owing to this fact, it is worthy of remark that the people of that state have enjoyed one great advantage over the people of Massachusetts. They have been exempted from the immense labor of forever boasting of their ancestors and have had more time to devote to their posterity." This sly rebuke is interesting but at the same time Mr. Mann was very proud of the fact that Massachusetts did not support public education "in part" but that the schools in his state were entirely free.

With some feeling of pride that was felt by Horace Mann in his own commonwealth years ago, I submit the following to show the rank of Colorado's educational accomplishments in comparison with those of other states. The information is furnished by the Director of Finance and Research of the State Department of Education. His source of information is the United States Office of Education 1940; the report of the Office of the Surgeon General 1943; and the United States Census Bureau 1940.

RECOMMENDATIONS

While the people of Colorado have achieved much to be proud of, there remains much still to be done. The two major problems of public education are concerned with:

1. Adequate financial support, including the matter of teachers' salaries.
2. Adequate housing to provide suitable buildings for schools in communities wherever located. An adequate housing program must impress the idea that modern education demands increased services to the schools, recreational grounds, and equipment for health services, hot lunch facilities, and auditoriums for community activities.

And since the school is the chief agency for the betterment of society, it is mandatory that Colorado immediately face these other pressing educational problems:

1. More adequate services to rural communities.
2. Elimination of many small inadequate districts, and the creation of larger administrative school units.
3. A dynamic health and recreational program.
4. Planned transportation routes for the safe travel of the school children.
5. Extension of library services.
6. Educational services to veterans at all levels of their need.
7. An effective adult education program in all communities.
8. Financial support by the State Legislature to staff adequately the State Department of Education that it may render proper service to the state.

Particularly needed at this time are:

1. Director of Organization and Transportation.
2. Director of Adult Education.
3. Director of Health Education and Recreation.
4. Director of Safety Education.

SPECIAL LIBRARY UNDERTAKINGS

1. During the year 1943-1944, a new library publication was begun. On September 1, 1943, volume 1, number 1, of LIBRARY LENS, quarterly bulletin of the agency, was ready for distribution. The publication is sent to all public, college and special libraries in the state; county superintendents; members of the General Assembly; state library agencies in the 48 states; numerous out-state college and university libraries; and a long list of interested persons and organizations. BIENNIAL REPORT BUREAU HOME AND SCHOOL SERVICE

July 1, 1942, to June June 30, 1944

The activities of the Bureau of Home and School Service fall into the category of extra curricular activities. One of the secretaries of this office renders services to all types of physically handicapped children and gives mental, vision, and audiometer tests throughout the counties. The duties of the executive secretary involve health education (including nutrition and school lunches), radio education, safety education, parent education, and membership on the State Board of Standards of Child Care.

During the past biennium the executive secretary has given special emphasis to various phases of health education and health practices among school children, and to various forms of foster care given children during this war emergency.

The executive secretary has been a member of the editing committee of a Handbook for teachers, called "Conserving the Health of Colorado's Children," which was completed during this biennium. Five thousand copies have been distributed through this Department and through the State Health Department, which co-sponsored this Handbook. This publication has received nationwide commendation and the demand has been such that a reprint had to be ordered.

As a member of the Colorado Board of Standards of Child Care established by the last General Assembly, the executive secretary has represented the State Department of Education in formulating and publishing "Minimum Standards, and Rules and Regulations Governing All Types of Foster Boarding Homes and Child Placement Agencies," including nursery schools and day nurseries. Since this board is an entirely new venture, intense, exhaustive study, with frequent all-day meetings preceded the issuance of the Standards.

Following this publication, the Board of Standards began licensing all homes, institutions, agencies, and day nurseries caring for children. The executive secretary of the Bureau of Home and School Service has acted as secretary of the Board of Standards which meets twice a month for hearings, for determining policies, and for granting licenses. She also represents the State Department of Education on the committee which visits and investigates all child care institutions. The board is beginning to see results in raising the standards of foster care of children in the state.

The development of a school lunch program throughout the state, whereby local districts received help and federal funds to supplement their own local equipment, products and services, got off to a very satisfactory start during the school year 1943-1944. Two hundred and three schools were serving nutritious school lunches under this program by June 1, 1944. Most of these were so well satisfied with the simplicity of the plan that gave the local district freedom and control over their own school lunch program, that they signed up for the following year. Only a small number of these schools had regular cafeterias and were serving hot, nutritious lunches previously. With the cooperation of a statewide coordinating committee, on which the executive secretary of this office represents the State Superintendent of Public Instruction as chairman, strides have been made both in health education and in the actual participation of children in better nutrition and eating habits.

Legislative bulletins summarizing child welfare measures and education bills, were prepared and distributed by the executive secretary during the 1943 session of the legislature. Approximately two thousand of these bulletins were sent to those requesting them. This service will be continued in the coming session. These bulletins have been requested by libraries of other states.

The executive secretary is the representative of the State Department of Education on the Advisory Committee of the Rocky Mountain Radio Council, whose staff members supervise and assist groups or agencies in producing educational material for broadcasting over the radio. It is the hope of the Council that more educational programs can be broadcast directly to classrooms.

As a member of the State Parent Education Council, the executive secretary helps to formulate policies controlling parent education programs. Each summer some national leader in parent education is secured by this Council to conduct child guidance classes in the colleges and universities of Colorado. These classes are open to parents, teachers, and others interested. Each year several thousand parents are enrolled.

The scope of the work of the secretaries in the Bureau of Home and School Service has broadened considerably within the last biennium. It was with regret that the resignation of Mrs. Elizabeth Shuttleworth, Field Organizer of Community Groups, was accepted in July, 1943. The two remaining secretaries have tried to take over that part of her work which was not absorbed by the State Parent Teacher Association. In addition, each secretary has found greater demands in her own field arising out of the war emergencies. These demands have been met as far as possible with limited funds and personnel.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF SPECIAL EDUCATION

July 1, 1942, to June 30, 1944

During the past biennium, work has been intensified in counties where there has been a request for special education services.

In most instances when a county is visited, all of the children are tested to find out if they need remedial work. They are brought to a convenient center and there the type of testing which is indicated is done, and the follow-up work is explained to the teacher and the parents. Usually a week is spent in a county, and the following week is given to the making of reports.

The Supervisor of Special Education has held semi-annual clinics in Grand county, the summer clinic being given over to the testing of pre-school children, and the winter clinic to the work with school children, covering low mentality, defective speech, defective hearing, and where there is no school nurse, children with defective vision.

Efforts have been made to provide home-teaching services for crippled children not able to attend school, but until some legislation is enacted providing funds for this service, work will not be satisfactory, as volunteer help is all that is available at present.

In all, about five thousand children have been examined during this period. Following the examinations, contact has been made with the teachers to determine upon the best methods of remedial work. A report on every child examined is sent to the school of the child's attendance.

REPORT ON THE WORK OF THE ELEMENTARY DIVISION

For the Period July 1, 1942, to June 30, 1943

ACQUAINTING TEACHERS WITH THE NEW STATE COURSE OF STUDY FOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS (1942)

The major undertaking this year has been that of acquainting teachers, by means of group meetings and some individual conferences, with the New State Course of Study for Elementary Schools which came from the press early in the fall of 1942. I believe that this work has stimulated an interest in the Course of Study which would not have existed otherwise. County superintendents, superintendents, principals and teachers have stated that after these meetings the Course of Study was referred to more frequently than before. My experience with the Course of Study and other publications of our division has convinced me of the wisdom of presenting these types of teaching aids to the teachers through group conferences.

During the school year 1942-43 I was able to meet with teachers in forty counties to discuss the course. In all, ninety-three meetings of this kind were held attended by 1,731 teachers. There and then, twenty-two counties, not counting Denver, in which no work on the course has been done directly with teachers. In my opinion these group meetings should be continued in 1943-44 in an attempt to reach the remaining teachers of the state.

SUPPLEMENT TO COURSE OF STUDY

Social Studies

This supplement was prepared by the Social Studies Committee which prepared the social studies section of the Course of Study under the chairmanship of Dr. Wilhelmina Hill. It is a comprehensive and thorough piece of work and should be a valuable aid to teachers in using to best advantage the social studies section of the Course of Study. The representatives of all of the textbook companies were invited to go over this supplement, making additions and corrections. Several of these people responded, but found few things to add and few mistakes to correct.

The supplement lists, by grade and by unit within each grade, the following types of materials for pupil and teacher use:

- Textbooks
- Supplementary books
- Readers and selections from readers
- Poems
- References for teachers
- Visual aids
 - Films
 - Pictures
 - Slides
- Art
 - Reproductions of paintings and sculpture
- Music
 - Songs
 - Recordings

The State Library is issuing the supplement which has gone to the printer and should be ready for distribution this fall.

READING EVALUATION

This program, begun in 1940-41, has been continued this year to the extent that work on introducing the Course of Study would allow. No special effort was made to advertise this service, as I felt my first obliga-

tion to be the Course of Study. Three school systems, Meeker, Hugo, and Salida, did request help in evaluating their reading program and this help was given. Two days were spent at Meeker, three at Hugo, and four at Salida. All three places reported this kind of service to be of much value to them.

The only limit to this type of work, once schools knew the service to be available, is time. It does require time to assist even a small school in such an evaluation. If the elementary division has other important projects under way, as we usually do, only a limited amount of evaluation assistance can be given.

BULLETIN ON TEACHING DEMOCRACY

Materials for this bulletin have been collected over a two-year period and were put in final form this year. This material is now ready for the printer, but war conditions and other factors seem to make its publication unlikely. I believe the bulletin to be timely and of much value to teachers. I regret that it probably will not be possible to issue it.

READING READINESS AND THE BI-LINGUAL PROBLEM

Here again we have been collecting materials for a bulletin dealing with these topics. Through working cooperatively with the Inter-American Relations Workshop at the University of Denver, valuable additional materials are being developed. A bulletin dealing with the teaching of English to non-English speaking children and developing a readiness for reading is being prepared with the hope that it can be made available to teachers either in printed or multigraphed form. The second part of this bulletin, developing a readiness for reading, will be of value to all first grade teachers even though they have no non-English speaking children.

COUNTY VISITATION PROGRAM

Counties were visited primarily to hold meetings for introduction of the Course of Study.

DISTRIBUTION OF USED TEXTS

We have continued this service when requested, sending used texts to Mesa, Moffat, La Plata, Montezuma, Archuleta, Conejos, Costilla, and Bent counties during the year. Used texts are becoming more difficult to obtain as we have exhausted the supply in nearby schools.

BOOKS LOANED THROUGH STATE LIBRARY

Whenever opportunities have arisen we have loaned professional books to teachers through the State Library. Several school systems and teachers have availed themselves of this service. We have continued to inform school people of the total service available to them from the State Library.

A conference for County Superintendents of the Southwest was held cooperatively with Fort Lewis College August 4 to 10. It was attended by nine county superintendents of that area. Topics discussed and studied were "Teaching Social Studies" and "Teaching Arithmetic."

REPORT OF THE WORK OF THE SECONDARY DIVISION OF THE
STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

July 1, 1942, to June 30, 1944

Plan of Work

The purpose of the Secondary Division is to assist teachers, principals, superintendents and county superintendents to improve instruction in the secondary schools of the state, especially in the smaller schools and rural areas, and to aid members of the boards of education with their problems concerning the secondary schools.

The plan of work which was begun during the year of 1941 has been followed through the present biennium. It consists of the following:

1. To furnish and foster leadership necessary for the development of a sound system of education for Colorado.
2. To assist in the administration of the laws controlling various phases of secondary education.
3. To cooperate with groups interested in education.
4. To make available to the schools of Colorado the services of departmental members trained in special areas.
5. To collect and publish data on the program of the schools, the problems of the school and the latest developments in school administration and supervision.
6. To make available to the schools of Colorado published material which are necessary for the efficient functioning of school units in the state.
7. Meeting with groups of teachers throughout the state to introduce, discuss and plan the new trends of secondary education and methods of teaching these trends.

By these means the best available information in the field of secondary education is made available to the teacher and the use of such information to improve the quality of teaching is encouraged.

Program

In 1942 the Victory Corps program was selected as the first field study.

Introduction to the Armed Forces and Suggestions for Pre-Induction was the second field study.

Introduction to Pre-Flight Training was the third field study.

A conference lasting a week was held in the Senate Chamber, at which time a suggestive course of study in pre-flight training was prepared.

The program included also:

1. A plan for school visitation.
2. A program for improvement of plant, equipment, and instructional materials.
3. A program of adult education.
4. A program of evaluation.
5. A program of constructive school administration and supervision.
6. A program of conservation.
7. A program of physical education.
8. Reorganization of the curriculum to meet the needs of the times.
9. Reorganization of student activities to meet the needs of older groups who will return to school.

REPORT OF FINANCE AND RESEARCH DIVISION

This division of the State Department of Education was created in July, 1943, in order to better serve the public schools of Colorado; to help meet the growing demands upon the department in the fields of finance and research, and to reorganize the work in this area in the State Department. A director was employed in September, 1943.

To the regular duties of auditing, bookkeeping, and apportioning funds for schools, there have been added to the duties of this division certain responsibilities for educational research and the carrying out of the financial policies of the department.

Concentration of all financial operations of the Department of Education into the area of one organizational branch under the supervision of one director is designed to result in greater efficiency and better service to the public.

In the field of educational research, much service can be performed by making available to the schools and to the citizens of Colorado certain school information, comparisons, data on trends in education, and various summaries of school data which previously have not been available in satisfactory form, or perhaps have not been available in any form.

Statewide studies have been prepared on such pertinent school information as salaries of teachers, numbers and classes of school districts, enrollments, annual costs per pupil and per capita, etc.; and the material has been made available for guidance of legislators, the State Planning Commission, educational groups, and others interested in state public education. Some of these studies have likewise been of interest in Canada, Hawaii and Alaska, in addition to the United States.

Field work in the nature of advising county superintendents, school officials, and other interested persons, on matters pertaining to school revenues, budgets, and the application of state school financial legislation, constitutes an important part of the activities of this division. Over forty of the county seats have been visited by the director or the auditor in this capacity.

The new state Minimum Education Program has required much preparation in the form of published statements, legal interpretations, rules and regulations by the state superintendent, and conferences with local and county school officials. Twenty-five counties have been visited with the purpose of assisting schools in putting into operation this new law. Due chiefly to lack of operational funds, it has been impossible for the department to make available to the entire state the field services essential to satisfactory compliance with state laws. With sufficient operational funds to enable employees of the finance and research division to hold conferences in all parts of the state, great strides forward could be taken in simplifying the administration of school revenues, assisting local units in their efforts to comply with financial legislation, and providing a broader advisory service in this area to the school and officials so desiring.

Public School Income Fund

Earnings of the Permanent School Fund, representing profits on transactions connected with the state school lands, were distributed to counties in which a five-mill general school levy failed to raise sufficient revenue to pay the teachers' minimum salaries of \$75.00 per month.

For the school program of 1942-43, the state apportioned to forty-three counties from this source the sum of \$810,789.44. For the school year 1943-44, \$797,517.30 was apportioned to thirty-five counties as aid in payment of the \$75.00 per month minimum salaries. This amount was 86.4 per cent sufficient to meet the applications received from counties.

STATE SCHOOL EQUALIZATION FUND

Under the Minimum Education Program Act of 1943, Colorado's first school equalization bill, 15 per cent of the state income tax collections, were set aside for the schools on a matching basis. Minimum programs of \$1,000 of support for each elementary classroom unit, and \$1,333 for each high school unit, were established. Districts with special levies of 2.5 mills, or higher, could become eligible for state support if proceeds from the \$75.00 minimum salary fund, the district 2.5 mill levy, and a county 1 mill minimum educational needs levy were found to be insufficient to maintain the classroom units.

Many counties failed to qualify under the act by refusing to add the county 1 mill tax and deficiency levy. A number of districts failed to qualify because of the provision requiring a matching levy, whereby the state would furnish one-half of the deficit in the program, provided that the district gave evidence of a special levy (over and above the 2.5 mill minimum) sufficient to raise funds equal to the anticipated state apportionment.

In all, fourteen counties participated in the State School Equalization Fund for 1943-44, receiving \$162,578.89. There remained unused in this fund \$753,012.89 on June 30, 1944.
