FOREWORD

This biennial report is the first one of the post war period and reflects some of the problems of readjustment that are peculiar to such times. The State Department realizes fully the responsibility as head of the school system of the state to exert every possible effort, not only to bring the state school system back to normalcy, but also to point the way to improve standards in every field.

The teacher shortage continues to be the acute problem. During the war, thousands left the profession to serve their country. Others were attracted to other fields, either because of better salaries or new interests. The influence of an aroused public opinion was felt in the 1947 Legislative session. For the first time money was allocated by the state on the basis of aggregate days attendance, the state thereby acknowledging its responsibility for the education of every child. A total of \$16,300.000.00 was appropriated by the state; \$4,300,000.00 for replacement on the County General School Fund, and \$12,000,000.00 for the Minimum Education Program and Aggregate Days Attendance.

In order to staff the schools Emergency Certificates have been continued.

The peak of Emergency (Sub-standard) certification of teachers was reached during the school year 1946-47. Beginning with the school year 1947-48 the need for such certification began to lessen. The State Board of Examiners then set up a requirement of 4 quarter hours of college credit for all persons who had previously held Emergency (Sub-standard) Certificates before another Emergency (Sub-standard) Certificate would be issued for the school year 1947-48.

The General Assembly in 1947 adopted the resolution to submit a Constitutional Amendment to the vote of the people for the reorganization of the State Department of Education, thereby changing the office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction to the office of the Commissioner of Education and providing that such Commissioner shall be appointed by the Board of Education, the members of which shall be elected.

The Amendment to be submitted on the ballot of November, 1948 is herewith quoted:

Section 1 of Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Colorado shall be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. Supervision of Schools-Board of Education. The general supervision of the public schools of the state shall be vested in a Board of Education whose powers and duties shall be as now or hereafter prescribed by law. Said board shall consist of a member from each congressional district of the state and, if the total number of such congressional districts be an even number, one additional member, and said members shall be elected as hereinafter provided. The members of said board shall be elected by the qualified electors of the state, voting at general elections, in such manner and for such terms as may be by law prescribed; provided, that provisions may be made by law for election of a member from each congressional district of the state by the electors of such district; and provided, further, that each member from a congressional district of the state shall be a qualified elector of such district. If the total number of congressional districts of the state be an even number, the additional member of said board shall be elected from the state at large. The members of said board shall serve without compensation, but shall be reimbursed for any necessary expense incurred by them in performing their duties as members of said board.

From and after the general election of 1948, the office of Superintendent of Public Instruction shall be known as the office of Commissioner of Education, and from and after the expiration of the two-year term of that office next following said general election, such commissioner shall be appointed by said Board of Education and shall not be included in the classified civil service of the state.

The qualifications, tenure, compensation, powers, and duties of said commissioner shall be as prescribed by law, subject to the supervision of said board."

Section 2. Each elector voting at said election and desirous of voting for or against said amendment shall deposit in the ballot box a ballot whereon shall be printed the words, "For the amendment of Section 1 of Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Colorado providing for a change in the membership of the State Board of Education, providing for the election of the members thereof, changing the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction to the office of Commissioner of Education and providing that such Commissioner shall be appointed by the Board of Education," and the words "Against the amendment of Section 1 of Article IX of the Constitution of the State Board of Education, providing for a change in the membership of the State Board of Education, providing for the election of the members thereof, changing the office of Superintendent of Public Instruction to the office of Commissioner of Education and providing that such Commissioner shall be appointed by the Board of Education," and shall indicate his choice by placing a cross (X) opposite one or the other groups of words.

Section 3. The votes cast for the adoption or rejection of said amendment shall be counted and canvassed and the result determined in the manner provided by laws of the State of Colorado for the canvass of votes for Representatives in Congress.

Although some progress has been made in school district consolidation, 1800 school districts still remain. Much interest was shown in the 1947 Legislature in a school district reorganization bill, but no statute was enacted. No doubt the question will come before the 1949 session. It is to be hoped that some provision for transportation assistance will be incorporated in the bill.

COLORADO STATE LIBRARY Biennial Report

1946-1948

Introduction

During the biennial period represented by this report, the work of the Colorado State Library was planned to a large extent to meet certain current and deeply-felt needs in the field of rural library service. 1.) A program designed to satisfy the reading requirements of a population involved in post-war adjustment (especially returned service men and women) was undertaken. 2.) Emphasis was placed on a long-range plan for a state-wide library development program, planned to provide all of the people of Colorado with adequate library facilities — preferably through locally-supported systems. 3.) Educators, librarians, service clubs and all kinds of citizen groups were urged and encouraged to participate in projects to establish large-unit libraries supported by tax funds collected through local levies. 4.) And finally, the staff of the State Library launched a campaign to raise the standards of the public school libraries in small towns and rural areas.

In addition to these activities, which to some extent involved policy and plans for the future, the Library continued to engage in conventional types of work common to library extension agencies, and part of its own basic work pattern. These functions include direct loan and reference services to areas where libraries do not exist, advice and counsel in connection with professional techniques and procedures, assistance in the establishment and reorganization of existing libraries, and reference assistance to state officials and employees.

1947 Library Law

On April 14, 1947, a new omnibus library law went into effect. It was passed without a dissenting vote by the 36th General Assembly, and repealed all of the conflicting and obsolete laws which for years had been retarding the expansion of library service in the State. Since the passage of this excellent act, the State Library has devoted considerable time to interpreting it to librarians and citizens, and assisting in minor reorganization problems created by it.

Field Trips

During the biennium, the Librarian made a number of field trips throughout the State. He visited more than half of the public libraries operating in Colorado and many school libraries on these trips, consulted with library boards and spoke to clubs and citizen groups on the subject of free library service for all the people.

Advisory Library Board

For the first time since the Library was reorganized in 1933 under the name of the Colorado State Library, a board of trustees is assisting the State Superintendent of Public Instruction and the Librarian in matters of planning and policy. The Board does not have official status since it is not set up by law, and functions merely in an advisory capacity. It fills a great need, however, since it is composed of influential professional and lay citizens from every section of the State. Its members are: Harriet E. Howe, Director of the University of Denver College of Librarianship; Mrs. Vance Kirkland, Denver; B. F. Coen, Fort Collins; Dr. Lawrence Barrett, Salida; Mrs. Emma Vance, Akron; Luther Bean, San Luis; Dr. Horace Wubben, Grand Junction; Mrs. Violet Noll Johnson, Hot Sulphur Springs; Mrs. E. A. Bloomquist, Pueblo; Mrs. Bessie Wilson, Burlington, and Claire K. Knox, Pueblo.

Demonstration Bookmobile

Early in 1948, the Library acquired a mobile unit. It was purchased as surplus property from the United States government at extremely low cost and recommissioned in Grand Junction by the International Harvester Company. The body was especially designed for library service and built onto a 1-ton International chassis. Complete with interior

shelving, magazine rack and charging desk, it will accommodate approximately 1,500 books and periodicals, about 10 patrons and two library workers. In June of 1948, the bookmobile was taken to the northeastern corner of the State on an inspection trip. Other tours for this purpose are tentatively scheduled before it begins operation on a demonstration basis. The purpose of the demonstration unit is to convince rural areas in the State of the value of bookmobiles as media of distribution, to the end that they purchase and operate their own. It will be loaned without charge to counties or regions—comprising two or more counties or parts of counties—fully stocked with books, for demonstration periods ranging in length from four to eight months.

Documents

The collection of official publications of the federal government, the State of Colorado and the other state governments represents between 300 and 400 items received by the Library each month, and it is hoped that one full-time professional assistant will be provided by the next General Assembly to handle the work.

Library Lens

During the biennium, the Library's quarterly bulletin, Library Lens, was discontinued because of the short staff. The purpose of the bulletin is to keep librarians and library friends in touch with the activities of the State Library, abreast of current trends in the profession, and possessed of information concerning the programs of fellow librarians in the region. The mailing list for the publication contains over 500 entries, and the Lens is sent to every state in the union. It is hoped that the bulletin may soon be revived, for its friends and readers continue to inquire about it and urge that it resume publication.

STATE OF COLORADO REPORT OF THE SECONDARY DIVISION OF THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

July 1, 1946-June 30, 1948

The Supervisor of Secondary Education is charged with the responsibilities dealing with curricula, courses of study, research, and general supervision of the high schools of the state for the improvement of teaching practices on the secondary level. In addition to the factors relating directly to the public high school, he must also represent the State Department of Education at conferences, meetings, etc., which are connected with the education of youth and adults.

The duties of the present supervisor began in June 1947 and the report herein presented covers chronologically from June 1, 1947, to June 30, 1948.

Early in June 1947, research was begun on Air-Age Education with the intent of producing a handbook for teachers concerning this important development in our national life. This research was completed and assignments made to do the writing to committees of volunteer educators and technical people. The areas of elementary, junior high, high school, and college Air-Age Education are treated in the handbook which will be ready for distribution to Colorado teachers by Fall, 1948.

Research is being carried on for a teacher handbook for Health and Safety Education. Committees are at work writing the book which should be finished by late Fall, 1948.

A third project has been started which concerns Driver Education and Training. The handbook for this purpose should also be ready for distribution by late Fall, 1948.

Many schools have been assisted in curriculum planning. The supervisor has also developed and prepared several courses of study in the fields of biology, general science, agriculture, and English for individual schools.

Several student and teacher groups have been addressed, and several lay and professional conferences were held in which the supervisor participated.

The majority of the counties of the state were visited, wherein county superintendents, school superintendents, and principals were counseled in matters relating to teacher preparation, in-service training, organization, courses of study, curriculum, plant, and many other problems of individual nature.

Used texts and library books along with free materials on conservation, were distributed to the schools.

In June, 1947, a two-weeks' conference on Health Education was held at Logan, Utah. The United States Office of Education and the National Tuberculosis Association were sponsors of the conference from which a great deal of information was obtained that is proving helpful in planning the Health Education program for Colorado schools.

During the last of July, 1947, a week's conference on Supervision and Curriculum Development was held at Lincoln, Nebraska. The Supervisor participated in this conference as a speaker on the Use of Audiovisual Aids in Education.

REPORT OF THE ELEMENTARY DIVISION OF THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

September 1, 1947, to June 30, 1948

The duties of the present supervisor in this division began in September, 1947, and the report herein presented covers the period from September 1, 1947, to June 30, 1948.

The preparation of the Air-Age Handbook for teachers has been the year's major project.

Work on this undertaking began in September when the "Steering" committee met to formulate plans to set up the general organization of the project. Following this meeting, a "Special" committee was appointed to outline the objectives and formulate plans for the Units for the Elementary Division. This committee included teaching personnel from the colleges, the cities, and the rural areas. Numerous meetings were held throughout the winter to revise and correct the subject-matter to be included in the course, which is now completed and will be ready for distribution to the schools this fall.

The purpose of the Elementary Division is to assist teachers, principals, superintendents, and county superintendents to improve instruction in the elementary schools of the state. The plan of work which was begun during the year 1947-48 has been followed through the present biennial period.

It consists of the following:

- 1. Selection of problems most needed in the individual schools.
- 2. Study of these problems culminating in the preparation of materials and teaching aids sent to teaching personnel.

3. Meeting with groups of teachers for the purpose of discussing their problems, presenting teaching techniques, and exploring new fields in educational activities.

Various types of meetings were held in conjunction with county visitations:

- 1. A tri-county teachers' meeting was held in the evening in Delta County, in which the county superintendents, representatives from the Colorado Education Association and the colleges, classroom teachers, the Supervisor of Secondary Education of the State Department of Education, and myself, participated in a panel discussion.
- 2. In Costilla County, I participated in an all-day meet in which demonstration classes in an actual classroom situation was held in the morning and a discourse on Reading and Dramatization was given, following the luncheon, in the afternoon.

By these means the best information in the field of Elementary Education was available to teachers, the purpose of which was to improve teaching.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL LUNCH DIVISION OF THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

September 1, 1947, to June 30, 1948

In compliance with the Laws of Colorado pertaining to a biennial report of the Department of Education, herewith is submitted, report of the Colorado School Lunch Division of the State Department of Education covering the biennium from July 1, 1946, to June 30, 1948.

The School Lunch Program was inaugurated under the administration of the State Department of Education, October 1, 1946. The administrative expenses for the 1946-47 program were supplied by the State Department of Education together with a deficiency appropriation by the 1947 Legislature. The administrative funds of the 1947-48 program were derived from a direct legislative appropriation. The funds disbursed to the schools for serving lunches were derived from an annual congressional appropriation and allocated on a basis of school age population in the state of Colorado. The federal funds were matched by expenditures on the lunch program within the state as provided by the National School Lunch Act. The lunch program is operated in accordance with the policy and procedures of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Funds are allotted to the schools on the basis of individual program needs and the number of lunches served daily to children.

Non-food assistance in the amount of \$77,081.72 was given to 214 schools for the purchase of school lunch equipment. Non-food assistance funds were grant-in-aid funds and appropriated only for the 1946-47 school year.

SPECIAL EDUCATION

The program of special education has had a two-fold purpose during the past biennium 1946-1948, that of administering the program for home and hospital teaching, and the regular supervision of the special education in the schools of the state.

Requests for testing children with defective hearing, vision, speech, and mentality have come from nearly all the counties in the state. The number of examinations per month averaged three hundred and eight. Clinics have been held in twenty-two counties followed by teachers' meetings to discuss the best means of handling special problems in the schools.

The program of home and hospital teaching has more than doubled during the past year. Funds were not adequate to meet the demands. Twenty-eight districts had teachers for the homebound and four hundred sixty-one children were taught. In addition there were two hospital schools, one in Denver and one in Pueblo.

The division of special education now has six hearing aids, a gift from the Denver Kiwanis Club, to be used on a lending basis for needy children who have a hearing loss.
