Privacy Issues Tested on the Web by Government

Dozens of federal agencies are tracking visits to U.S. government web sites in violation of long-standing rules designed to protect online privacy. From the Air Force to the Treasury Department, government agencies are using either "web bugs" or permanent cookies to monitor their visitors' behavior, even though federal law restricts the practice. The practice of tracking web visitors came under fire last week when the National Security Agency was found to use permanent cookies to monitor visitors, a practice it halted after inquiries from the Associated Press. The White House also was criticized last week for employing WebTrends' tracking mechanism that used a tiny GIF image. Community Advocacy and Awareness Tools Free from OCLC

OCLC has launched a web site for an advertising campaign on behalf of public and academic libraries, aimed at library budget decision-makers. The 12 to 18 month campaign consists of a series of national print ads and similar posters that can be downloaded and customized by libraries. In addition, there's a portal that presents the facts about return on investment for public dollars supporting libraries and makes a case for sustained and increased funding.

Tattered Cover Book Store Launches Innovative Touring Authors Podcast

An innovative "podcast" of visiting authors launched in December by the Tattered Cover Book Store in partnership with BurstMarketing, a podcast publishing and marketing company. The podcast show entitled *Authors On Tour – Live!* can be found at www.authorsontour.live.com, a web site developed to distribute and support the show.

A podcast is a radio show that can be easily downloaded to either a computer or an iPod or MP3 player and listened to anytime. Moreover, a listener can subscribe to a podcast (most are free) and have new shows downloaded automatically to the computer or portable player using one of the many free "podcatching" software programs available on the web.

Authors on Tour – Live! is a free weekly podcast show featuring recently published authors reading from and discussing their books while at the Tattered Cover. Each show is approximately 30 to 45 minutes.

Find An Author Launched by Coalition

"Find An Author" is a newly launched statewide database of Colorado authors, searchable by name, genre, county and keywords. Developed by the Book Organizations of Colorado, a coalition of writers' organizations, publishers, and related groups, and supported by the Colorado State Library, the service facilitates contacts to writers who are willing to make a variety of presentations. They may talk about their works, writing in general, specific subject areas, and other topics. The database also links to web sites for those authors who provide them.

School-Public Partnership Campaign Makes the Grade

Last fall Douglas County Libraries and the Douglas County School District partnered to launch the Make the Grade library card campaign. Their intent was to make sure every Douglas County student has a library card. For 2005, the campaign focused on elementary school students. Local storytellers visited thirty-one area elementary schools to present forty-nine assemblies, entertaining the pupils while promoting the world of information and entertainment that a library card can unlock.

Recent results showed that the campaign generated 1,890 new library card registrations, or 7% of all Douglas County elementary school students. Polls at the school assemblies show that approximately 80% of all households with an elementary student in residence have a library card. In 2006, the Make the Grade campaign will encourage area high school students to sign up for a library card.
