# Free Computer Equipment for Schools and Community Organizations

The Beaumont Foundation of America grants Toshiba branded equipment to support digital inclusion for underserved individuals. The Foundation will grant \$350 million over 5 years in all 50 states and the District of Columbia.

BFA grants Toshiba-branded hardware to support digital inclusion for low-income citizens. The Foundation has three distinct grant programs, all of which are designed to reach poverty-level populations:

- Individual--Grants of technology equipment directly to individuals
- Schools--Grants of technology equipment for schools
- Community--Grants of technology equipment to community-based organizations

In 2003, the Foundation will award grants in 21 states, including Colorado, beginning

### **Colorado Digitization Program Launches New Web Site**

The <u>Colorado Digitization Program</u> (CDP) is pleased to announce the launch of its new web site. Through the site the people of Colorado can access Heritage Colorado, a freely available database of over 150,000 digital images from more than 70 museums, libraries, historical societies, and archives in Colorado with collections that span the globe. Sample searches are available to help new users, while advanced search options allow researchers, genealogists, and hobbyists find the specific items to meet their information and research needs. Educators can find guidance for using Heritage Colorado's digital photographs, manuscripts, maps and artifacts in the classroom through curriculum based lessons, workshops, and tutorials based on the Library of Congress's American Memory Project Fellows Institute and the CDP's 'Teaching with Colorado's Heritage' Program.

Cultural heritage institutions interested in providing online access to their collections can browse CDP's nationally recognized digitization resources, including CDP Best Practice guidelines for digital imaging, digital audio, metadata and references to national projects and resources. The site also features announcements about CDP's grant opportunities and upcoming workshops and events.

The Colorado Digitization Program, established in 1998, provides the people of Colorado online access to cultural, historical, and scientific resources through the collaborative efforts of museums, archives, libraries and historical societies. Through CDP's working groups, best practices, collaborative resources and grants cultural heritage institutions are able to unlock the potential of their collections and maximize their investment in technology. ### **Colorado Digitization Program Announces New Grant** Awards

The <u>CDP</u> announces \$34,000 in new grants to nine Colorado museums, libraries, archives and historical societies to digitize materials from their collections on the theme of Western Trails. "More than 7,000 new digital objects from the collections of these Colorado institutions will soon be available through the Colorado Digitization Program's database," noted Nancy Allen, Chair of the Board of Directors of the CDP and Dean of Libraries at the University of Denver. "These 8 libraries and museums will join an ongoing project that involves libraries and museums from Wyoming, Nebraska and Kansas in a larger Western Trails, already digitizing materials on the topic of Western Trails. By the end of 2003 we will have more than 30,000 digital objects on the topic for the people of the West. This is a major multi-state collaborative initiative never undertaken before."
