AskColorado Joins Forces with Colorado.Gov

AskColorado, the 24/7 online reference service provided by Colorado libraries, has joined forces with a new, real-time online service that is part of the state of Colorado web site. Live Help is available on the state web site, <u>www.colorado.gov</u>, by clicking on the "Live Help" icon to reach a member of the Colorado.gov customer service staff or a librarian through AskColorado.

"Live help is a tool that librarians have used with great success for several years," said Eugene Hainer, Director of the Colorado State Library, Department of Education, "We are pleased to partner with Colorado.gov to make this tool available to everyone that visits the official state web site."

The Live Help service is delivered through a unique collaboration between Colorado.gov, Ask Colorado, and the Statewide Internet Portal Authority, which was formed in 2004 to oversee the success of Colorado.gov. Ask Colorado is a collaborative effort of 61 libraries from around the state.

Out and About with CSL Staff

State Library staff have extended their support over the past few months in many locations on a diversity of projects.

Lori Smith provided training on SWIFT through the following: December 2005--Ft. Collins Public Library, Sterling Public Library. January 2006--Limon Public Library, Glenwood Springs - Quigley Library, Grand Junction - Mesa County Library District, Boulder Public Library, Wellington Public Library, Loveland Public Library, Denver Public Library, Woodland Park - Rampart Library District. February 2006--Lafayette Public Library, Yuma High School Library, Sterling -Northeastern Junior College, Gunnison Community School, Pueblo City-County Library District.

State Librarian Gene Hainer attended the COSLA -Chief Officers of State Library Agencies--and ALA Midwinter. COSLA is a chance for all attending state librarians to meet and hear what's going on locally and nationally. They also plan the fall meeting's professional development activities, and Gene is on the COSLA continuing education committee to assist with that. In San Antonio, he chaired two committee meetings in SA. One is the ASCLA-State Library Agency Section discussion group, which is made up of state library consultants and state librarians. This group offers a chance to share ideas and plan ongoing professional development for program managers in library agencies. The second was the AASL Alliance for Association Excellence, a group of AASL members, staff, and vendors designed to exchange ideas about and resolve issues related to AASL bi-annual conference planning. He also helped organize and attended a joint CLiC-CSL workshop on planning for Library Districts in the Arapaho Library District.

- Sally Gillch, from Institutional Library Services, visited Grand Mesa Youth Center to begin the process of automating their library, scanning more than 2,500 books in 2 days; conducted a two-day weeding project at Pueblo Youth Services Center and created a cataloging profile for them; visited Platte Valley and Lookout Mountain Youth Services Center, and CMHI-Ft. Logan to gather input to develop a Youth Corrections intranet for library staff
- Diana Reese & Sally Gillich, from Institutional Library Services, visited with the Division of Youth Corrections Education Director to offer technical assistance for technology plan development and obtain funding for library materials

- School Library Consultant Nance Nassar is traveling so much, it's difficult to catch her on the run. Her "Better Library Instruction by Using Test Data" shows school librarians how to use CSAP data to increase student achievement, integrate "Power Libraries" common goals, and create a collaboratively designed lesson that will help increase student performance. January, February, and March take her to Pueblo, Robert Hoag Rawlings Public Library; Fort Collins, Harmony Branch Library; Grand Junction, Mesa County Library; Alamosa, Adams State College; Durango; Steamboat Springs; Salida; and La Junta, La Junta/Woodruff Memorial Library.

They Ain't Down Yet!

With the demise of the seven regional library service systems a year ago, savants predicted difficulties in networking with libraries in locations across the state. While this has been substantiated, another phenomena has been occurring—the spontaneous creation of informal networks. These have been reported in the Colorado Springs area and other places.

An example is ArkValleyLibs, a cooperation of libraries in southeastern Colorado, created from the closing of the Arkansas Valley Regional Library Service System. They realize the value of collaboration and networking to the future success of libraries of all types. The group, affiliated under the auspices of the Colorado Library Consortium (CLiC), the statewide library service system, is planning spring training and continuing education opportunities.
