## **Education Reform Law to Strengthen Student Privacy Rights**

A clause in the recently signed education reform bill provides some measures to protect students' online privacy rights. Gone are the days when companies could swap Internet access or IT equipment for information on students' purchasing habits and web-surfing trends. Under the new law, parents and students will have more rights protecting their personal information. Senator Dodd and Richard Selby of (R-AL) first introduced the Student Privacy Protection Act in 2000. The privacy language was attached to the education reform bill to better ensure its passage when the president signed the bill into law. ## Street Named for Librarian Charles E. Bates



In January, Pueblo City Council named the street that will be the primary entrance to the new Robert Hoag Rawlings Public Library for library executive director Charles E. Bates. Bates Lane honors his 21 years of service to the community, which includes the new main library, three branches and enhanced services from 1999's \$14 million bond to expand and remodel the main library. The Library Board selected world-renowned Albuquerque architect Antoine Predock to design the four-story addition.

When the architect's design exceeded the monies provided by the county's bond, Bates and the library board launched a fund-raising effort. The foundation for the additional support came from *Pueblo Chieftain* newspaper editor Robert H. Rawlings, who contributed \$4 million to the construction fund. Other citizens also helped meet the \$20 million construction budget.

## 3M Donates Library Detection Systems for Middle and High Schools

3M is partnering with AASL to provide \$1.5 million in detection systems in 2002 to middle and high school libraries through the "3M Salute to Schools" program. Applications must be postmarked by March 1. Approximately 100 libraries nationally will receive detection systems & Tattle-Tape supplies. ## National Storytelling Network Announces Grant Program

To further its mission of "bringing together and nurturing individuals and organizations that use the power of storytelling in all its forms," the National Storytelling Network announces a grants program through which NSN individual and affiliate members may apply for funding to develop new projects. Support (up to \$1000) is available for the development of individual work, for collaborative projects, for community-based storytelling programs or for scholarly research.
