Libraries for the Future Announces MetLife Foundation Reading America Grant Winners

Bemis Public Library (Littleton) and Denver Public Library are among 12 public libraries across the nation selected for the MetLife Foundation Reading America Program, announced <u>Libraries for the Future</u> recently. The innovative, library-based national book and film discussion program for teenagers and adults, was developed to foster greater understanding and communication among youth and adults, especially in immigrant families. Reading America also aims to expand awareness and use of public libraries, particularly in communities experiencing significant demographic change, and is intended for libraries across the country to adapt to their own communities. Each participating library will receive \$5,000 for program start-up costs. Library staff members will receive training, program resources and support from Libraries for the Future. Based on the experiences of the grant-winning libraries, LFF expects to expand the model for use in libraries around the country.

Denver Public Library will emphasize the shared cultural heritage of the area's Native American teens, their parents and elders, and its relevance to the entire Denver community. The library will partner with the Denver Indian Center, meeting at both the library and the Indian Center in order to investigate cultural history and to expose participants to the library's extensive resources, including an important collection of photographs about Native American history and culture. In addition to discussions led by librarians, there will be presentations by Native American speakers and Native American storytelling.

Edwin A. Bemis Public Library is located in Littleton, an area with growing Hispanic and Asian populations. The seven-session program, the library's first program to target immigrant groups in the community, will bring together bilingual high school students and their families to explore family and health-related issues that affect them. Local experts will provide input and lead discussions along with library staff on books, films and other media related to the selected health topics. The library will work with community organizations including the Littleton Health and Wellness Clinic and the Colorado Center for the Blind.
