Retirement, Retention, and Recruitment All Are Issues in Colorado

Will the wave of "baby boomer" retirements have a major impact on the career of librarianship in Colorado and on services? A recently released report from the Library Research Service says, "Yes!"

More than 1200 Colorado librarians and other library workers responded to a voluntary statewide survey. Respondents came from every type of library and every corner of the state. Among the findings:

- More than 20% of responding librarians expect to retire within the next five years.
- Of all responding school librarians, about half plan to retire within five years, more than three times the proportion for public librarians and almost five times the proportion for academic librarians.
- Retiring librarians will take with them substantial administrative skills. Three out of four are supervisors.
- Respondents without immediate retirement plans expect their successors to have less education.
- For many library students, librarianship is a second career.
- Responding paraprofessionals say they would be encouraged to pursue an LIS degree or credential if financial aid was available, class times and locations were convenient or online, and work schedules were more flexible.

The report, "A Closer Look at Retirement, Retention, and Recruitment," includes recommendations for action, if Colorado is to avoid a crisis in professional librarianship. The full report can be accessed on the Internet at http://www.lrs.org/closer.asp.

New "Fast Facts" Features Challenged Materials in Colorado Public Libraries

Each year the Library Research Service collects data on formally challenged materials as a part of the Colorado Public Library Annual Survey. In 2003, 20 Colorado libraries reported 63 challenges to books, materials, events and exhibits. Now they have initiated several e-lists as an additional service.

What are the BOOC lists?

BOOC is also now hosting two additional lists: BOOC-chat (for discussing all things writing related) and BOOC-announce (an announce-only list of events for those who don't belong to any group and so don't get notices via the regular BOOC list).
