- March proved to be another busy month for Institutional Library Services. Teresa Allen provided iPage training for Department of Corrections staff in Cañon City and visited library staff at Colorado Territorial, Fremont, Arrowhead, and Four Mile Correctional Facilities. She assessed needs at the State Veterans' Nursing Home in Rifle and consulted with library staff at Grand Mesa Youth Services Center.


Free Space-Science Workshop for Children's and Youth Librarians in Colorado

CDP to Merge into BCR

The Collaborative Digitization Program (CDP) and the Bibliographical Center for Research (BCR) announced their intention for the CDP to merge into BCR, effective April 1. Both organizations provide services to libraries and other cultural heritage organizations throughout a multi-state area focused in the West. The digital services programmatic offerings of the merged organizations will be known as CDP@BCR.

The merger of the CDP – with its nationally recognized digitization expertise – into BCR – a multi-state library cooperative serving more than 1,100 member libraries - will enable BCR to build new service programs in the area of digitization and reach out to cultural heritage organizations in addition to bringing CDP-based training, best practices and guidelines, and consulting services to member libraries.
