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New Colorado Power Educators Project Holds Promise

CDE has issued the Request for Proposals for the Colorado Power Educators Project, competitive grant programs funded under the Colorado Enhancing Education through Technology grant program. This RFP is issued provisionally, in advance of official approval by the CDE Educational Data Advisory Committee. CDE will fund this grant project with a total of approximately \$650,000. The Intent to Submit a Grant Application is due by April 9, and applications for these grants are due April 30 at 4 pm;

The Colorado Power Educators Project supports student achievement by promoting

collaborative work that produces powerful standards- based learning. Connected to CDE's work with districts on integrated plans for educational technology and information literacy, this project is designed to help teachers, schools, and districts incorporate educational technology and information literacy into their educational missions. The Power Educators Project operates through three grant programs:

- Power Classrooms—support for teams of teachers engaged in collaborative design and implementation of effective curricula and instructional strategies;
- Power Initiatives—support for schools and districts that are engaged in substantial, innovative efforts at improving curriculum, teaching, or community;
- Power Districts—support for district development and implementation of effective plans for educational technology and information literacy.

• At Poor Schools, Time Stops on Library Shelves

At a poor school, the library is often the last priority, reports Michael Winerip of the "New York Times." At many schools libraries have been neglected for decades. Many collections are from the 1950's and 1960's. Children come in asking for Harry Potter, but there is no Harry Potter. Often there is no librarian, no card catalog, no VCR, and no computer. Fahtemah, who is 12, says if you look hard, you can find some good books in the library. "But it needs, like, more new and improved books," she says. EBSCO Databases Up for Renewal at LOWER Costs

It's time to renew your library's subscription to the EBSCO K12 databases that are available through the AIRS Committee's statewide agreement with EBSCO -- new subscribers are welcome, also. Please fill out the renewal form by MAY 1, 2004 at: http://www.bcr.org/reference/ebscoMain.html Some good reasons to renew:

- Subscription costs are 10% LOWER than last year
- EBSCO has added more full text and other content to the databases
- Subscribing to the paper copies of the magazines and journals included in the databases would cost a library over \$58,000 a year

School pricing is based on a per building price by grade level and population, ranging from \$225 to \$585. Public library pricing is based on legal service area population, with a tiered cost based on three different population ranges. The minimum charge is \$200.

Tech Beat Helps Adult Educators Integrate Technology into Instruction

An online service called Tech Beat, http://swadulted.com/techbeat/techbeat.htm, give tips to those educators working with adults on how to integrate technology into instruction. For instance, there's a lesson in creating a simple budget in Excel, web sites targeting teens with problems that are helpful for parents to read, resources for ESL students, etc. These are published monthly by Leecy Wise at the Four Corners Virtual Resource Center. Many are suitable for adolescents, particularly those learning English.

Looking for Money for Student/Children Activities?

The 21st Century Community Learning Centers Grant Program is accepting applications for the coming year. Adams County First Library to Offer Jobview

The Adams County Library District is the first library in the state to offer Jobview, a user friendly job-search tool that puts potential employment at your fingertips. Jobview is an employment kiosk provided by the Denver Newspaper Agency. It lists all the jobs advertised in the "Rocky Mountain News" and the "Denver Post" on a touch screen and is updated daily. Jobview users can easily search employment, print out job listings and send employers job seeker profiles. Anyone sending job seeker profile receives a receipt from the kiosk confirming the application. Kiosks are located at the Northglenn, Commerce City and Brighton branches. The Northglenn branch is showing the highest usage with almost 900 jobs searched in less than a week.

Library Director Mike Sawyer says the kiosks will provide the citizens an alternative to searching for jobs, especially for those who do not own a computer or have difficulty navigating through the internet. In addition, it allows people to search for work opportunities without the stigma of going to an Employment Center. Also, the libraries are open beyond the traditional 8-5 business hours. "We see this as another opportunity for people to utilize the library and hopefully they will then become library users", Sawyer says.

Book Community News Now Online Regularly

An informal coalition of organizations involved with and supporting books and writers, Book Organizations of Colorado, is now publishing a monthly online newsletter. BOOC BookNews, www.coloradobook.org, contains a calendar of events and author appearances, .This is an easy, centralized way to let your patrons know about activities of interest to them.
