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#### AIRS Statewide Databases Renewal Time – Special Half Price Offer for New Subscribers

It's time to renew your subscriptions to the AIRS statewide databases! Through the contribution of LSTA funds by the Colorado State Library and the discounted statewide subscriptions negotiated by the AIRS Committee, libraries can have access to a wealth of online information at prices that are significantly below what they would pay on their own. One set of databases, The OCLC/EBSCO General and Business Full Text databases, offers access to WorldCat and other general databases as well as to the full text of over 60,000 magazines and journals in all subject areas. The second set of databases, EBSCO K12 and Children's database package, is designed to support students in K12 schools as well as children doing research while visiting the public libraries. Higher education institutions with teacher education programs also will find them useful. ## Library Week Celebrated with Storytelling

The Colorado State Library celebrated Library Week with a special presentation on "Raconteurs, Bards, Griots and Other Tellers of Tales:

Storytelling and Its Contributions to Literacy." The free event, held at the Department of Education, reached state employees.

Appearing were Lt. Gov. Barbara O'Brien, director of CSL Gene Hainer, and three storytellers. Many diverse cultures have strong traditions of oral storytelling. Parents and caregivers can capitalize on these entrancing and stimulating activities to reinforce literacy skills in children. Oral storytelling can be encouraged in families and schools to strengthen literacy skills.

The storytellers included Jessica Bordeaux-Vigil, "White Buffalo Calf Woman," a member of the Sicangu Lakota nation and a dancer, cultural presenter, and historical interpreter as well. Also appearing was Renee Fajardo, who tells stories with strong family and food themes and co-author of the *Tummy Tales* series, a collection of multi-cultural family food tales. Last was Rosalyn Kirkel, with stories of Eastern Europe/Jewish culture and the immigrant/pioneer experience.

### Library Directors Receive Scholarships to Participate in Rural Forum at ALA

Representatives from three of Colorado's rural public libraries have been selected to receive scholarships to attend the 2007 American Library Association conference in Washington, D.C. They include:

- Judy Van Acker, Director of the **John C. Freemont Public Library** in Florence
- Patti Chapman, Director of the Park County Public Library in Fairplay
- Sue Keefer, Director of the Las Animas-Bent County Library District in Las Animas

They were selected following their participation in the Colorado State Library's recent Rural Library Sustainability (RLS) Project workshops. Some 70 workshop participants, representing more than 60 rural/small libraries, obtained resources for sustaining technology and advocating for libraries, shared ideas, and developed action plans.

The three representatives are leaders in rural library sustainability. To qualify for the scholarships, the three directors created and posted actions plans on WebJunction, finalized implementation of the first phase of their plans, developed a timeline for two subsequent plans, shared their experiences, actively participated in discussion forums, and submitted essays about how their rural library will benefit from their participation in the ALA annual conference. In Washington, they will meet with other rural sustainability participants during the Rural Forum sponsored by WebJunction and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. The RLS Project, launched in 2005 and funded through a grant by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, is a collaboration between WebJunction, state library agencies, and rural/small libraries' staff in 42 participating states. The program is designed to empower small and rural libraries with information, resources, and connections to help meet their unique challenges and better manage and sustain their public-access computing programs. Areas included are technology maintenance and planning, outreach, funding, training/support, promotion, and collaboration, as well as a forum for rural library staff to connect with one another.

## Associate Director of Library Research Service Named

The Colorado State Library (CSL) announces the appointment of Zeth Lietzau as Associate Director of the Library Research Service (LRS). Lietzau has served as a Research Analyst of LRS since 2003, and has worked as Information Services Librarian at the Belmar Library of Jefferson County Public Library since October 2004.

Lietzau received his Master of Library and Information Science from the University of Denver and his BS in Spanish from Macalester College, St. Paul, MN. He is a member of the American Library Association (ALA) and the Colorado Association of Libraries (CAL).

As an LRS research analyst, Lietzau has been instrumental in transforming the web presence, <u>www.LRS.org</u>, into a dynamic web site that offers interactive statistics, and in the redesign of the CSL's <u>www.LibraryJobline.org</u>. He has also overseen projects such as the annual Colorado School Library Survey and the current Courier Cost Analysis Study, and has been involved in a number of LRS publications.

LRS generates library statistics and research for library and education professionals, public officials, and the media. It reports and analyzes statistics on all types of libraries and conducts studies on major library issues.

## **Resources for Constitution Day**

Colorado's libraries once again are invited to be leaders in Constitution & Citizenship Day. The commemoration occurs September 17 each year, and was mandated by the federal government. While educational institutions that receive federal funding from the Department of Education are required to hold an educational program pertaining to the US Constitution, other libraries can use the event to spotlight the important role libraries play as the foundation for this country's freedoms.

One resource is a group called Liberty Day. They are recruiting volunteers throughout the state to serve as chairs and contacts for cities and towns. Some activities could include presenting programs in schools, working with local elected officials, and fund-raising. The group offers materials like copies of the Constitution and study cards.
