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"Fast Facts" Elucidate Jump in Circulation, Other Library Insights

Three new "Fast Facts" contain a wealth of information about libraries and their status. A major finding comes in April 15's issue "[Colorado Public Libraries Outpace National Trend on Circulation Per Capita, 1988-2000.](#)" This report shows that Colorado residents have been checking out books and other items from public libraries at a much higher rate than Americans in general. Our increase has nearly doubled (from about 5 to 9.5) while the US circulation increased modestly (5 to 6.5).

Another "Fast Facts" covers library staff salaries in the mountain west. February 13's issue, "[Earnings of Library Staff in the Mountain West Low Compared to Workers in Similar Jobs.](#)" shows the discrepancy. Both librarians and administrative support staff positions were included in the analysis.

Circulation again is the theme in May 1's "[Book Displays Increase Fiction Circulation over 90%, Non-Fiction Circulation 25%.](#)" includes information from a recent study by the Lafayette Public Library. The study concluded that bookstore-like displays resulted in major increases in circulation for the titles on display.

Statewide Library Projects for 2002-2003 Top \$650,000

Six projects dealing with libraries and their services statewide have received approval for the coming year. The projects address a variety of community outreach activities, as well as increasing accessibility to library resources and services. The total amount available for project awards was \$657,000. Automated Systems Reviewed

Every year Library Journal publishes the "automated system marketplace." This is a review of library automation products and vendors. It provides sales data, systems sold by type of library, mergers, trends and new features in automated system products. The Library Systems Newsletter publishes results of the Information Systems Consultants Inc. (ISCI) Automation survey each year. The March issue focused on vendors and products using UNIX, NT server, Windows 2000 server, and other multi-user operating systems. The April issue provides survey results on vendors of PC and Mac based products that use Windows 95/98/ME/2000 or Mac operating system. Survey Gauges Value of Gates Grant

By the end of 2003, the Bill and Melinda Gates U.S. Library Program will have placed 40,000 computers in close to 10,000 libraries nation wide. The program makes a \$250 million commitment to bring public access computing, digital information, and the Internet access to library patrons in low income communities. Results from a research study on Public Access Computing conducted by the University of Washington indicate that Americans do support paying higher taxes or fees to provide free access to computers and the Internet in public libraries. Those surveyed, however, believed that public library computer services should be funded primarily by government agencies, library fundraising initiatives, or local businesses. Over three quarters of the those surveyed also believed that providing public access to computers and the

Internet will help eliminate the gap between the "have" and "have nots".

Colorado Librarian Attends Opening of New Library of Alexandria

Lorenzo Gurreri, a retired librarian from Colorado, attended the recent opening of the Library of Alexandria (Bibliotheca Alexandrina). The library, destroyed 1600 years ago, was successfully rebuilt and will again offer scholars from over the world a chance to study and learn. The inauguration occurred in late April and was attended by the president of the Arab Republic of Egypt, H., E. Mohammed Hosni Mubarak, and his wife.

Literacy Through School Libraries Grant Information

Literacy Through School Libraries was passed and funded as part of the ESEA Reauthorization bill, H.R. 1, No Child Left Behind. Literacy Through School Libraries is part of Title 1, Part B, Subpart 4, section 1251. Because the funding level was set by appropriators at \$12.5 million, the funds will be distributed through the Department of Education as grants to local education agencies. In Chart 3, scroll down to OESE CFDA No. 84.364 for dates of the application notice, application availability, application deadline, estimated average size and number of awards, and the program contact person. ALA suggests it is critical that as many local education agencies as possible apply for these dollars. The level of need can be measured by how many school districts across the country apply for these funds.
