Free Database Helps Public Libraries Identify Demographics

A new free database called the Public Library Geographic Database (PLGDB) is being developed through funding from the Institute of Museum and Library Services. This map-based database allows you to select a public library and search for census information about the area around the library. It also includes annual library use data collected by the National Center for Educational Statistics.

For example, you can get ethnicity, income, education, race, age of people living within a certain radius of the target library. This will be very helpful for needs assessment information! According to library insiders, the database appears to be a work in progress. You can try it out and send suggestions. Start with the tutorial at http://www.geolib.org/PLGDB.cfm. Libraries Awarded Mini-Grants for Children's Literacy

Eleven libraries have received mini-grants from the Rocky Mountain Antiquarian Booksellers Association through the Colorado Parent & Child Foundation:

- Arriba-Flagler School (Flagler) for elementary fiction books
- DeBeque School Library (DeBeque) for bean bag chairs for the buddy reading program
- Holyoke Junior/Senior High School (Holyoke) for genre signage, a floor lamp, and cushions
- John Mall High School Library (Walsenburg) for non-fiction, biography, and reference books
- Merino Elementary School Library (Merino) for materials for the "Thirteen Colonies" unit
- Mountain View Elementary School Library (Longmont) for "Wish List" books in the biography, technology, lower level learners, and district curriculum areas
- North Park Middle School (Walden) for a student-driven middle school reading circle
- Park County Public Library (Bailey,) for supplies for high school volunteers to paint a mural in the children's section of the library
- Plateau Valley School (Collbran) for "Bookworm Bag Packs"
- Sheridan Branch, Arapahoe Library District (Sheridan) for buttons and stickers for the "See Me Read" initiative
- Wellington Public Library (Wellington) for PBS "Between the Lions" video set

More than 30 libraries applied for the grant in 2003, its first, year. The grants came from proceeds from the annual Rocky Mountain Antiquarian Book Fair. Also supporting the effort were the Colorado Association of Libraries and the Colorado State Library.

The purpose of the grants are to encourage kids to read, promote the visibility of libraries in their communities, and spotlight the role of libraries in learning and education. Statistics on School Computers in U.S. Don't Compute

The United States is among the leaders in the world in providing access to school computers, but it lags behind other countries in frequency of school computer use and Internet availability at school, according to Education Week's seventh annual report on school technology. However, some technology-oriented countries have more than twice the percentage of school computers connected to the Internet than the United States does. "These numbers show that our schools need to move beyond the goal of simply putting computers in classrooms," said Virginia B. Edwards, the editor and publisher of Education Week. This year's report presents an overview of technology in schools around the world, examining developments in Africa, Asia, Australia, Europe, North America, and South America. The special report also includes its annual review of national trends in the use of educational technology and state-by-state snapshots of the steps states have taken to use educational technology more effectively. http://www.edweek.org/sreports/tc04/
