# Current Trends in Library Automation from the Info Today National Conference

Not long ago, the web-based online catalog was a novelty in public libraries. Some patrons were reluctant to switch from those familiar text-based terminals to a web-enriched searching environment. Now that the Internet has become almost ubiquitous in libraries, with about 96% of Colorado public libraries alone having some form of access to the Internet, many patrons have grown to expect a web gateway, not only into the library's holdings, but also to full-text articles, digital images, and more.

How have library automation vendors responded to this ever-increasing demand for instantaneous information regardless of format or location? What developments in library automation are on the horizon? What are some current trends in automation that may dictate what we will see in future products and services?

An executive panel of automation vendors and experts in the field discussed current developments and future trends in library automation, including content integration, ASP model, XML, standards, partnerships and convergence. The Readers' Choice Award for Teen Books is announced in celebration of the 50th anniversary of Weekly Reader's <u>*Read* magazine</u>. It is the first national award that involves books nominated and voted on by young people in middle and high school across the nation. The nominated books must be written specifically for the teen market and must have been published in the past five years. Nominations will be taken from May 15 through November 15. Weekly Reader's <u>*Read* magazine</u> began providing quality literature for readers in grades six through ten in 1951.
