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CDP Makes Western Trails Digitization Grants Available

Do you have primary source materials on the topic of the Santa Fe Trail? On Native American Trails? On rail trails or recreational trails or a Coloradan's experiences on the trails? Are you ready to undertake a digitization project? Are you interested in a Colorado Digitization Project grant for digitizing some of these resources? The Colorado State Library has awarded the Colorado Digitization Project an LSTA grant to fund up to 15 digitization projects on the theme of Western Trails. If you are interested in one of these grants, the CDP will be holding several programs to assist archives, libraries, museums and historical societies to prepare for the upcoming grant application process. CDP staff will be available to answer questions about digitization, as well as answer questions about the grant application form:

The CDP grants are incentive grants, to which the grantee must make additional inkind or cash to fund the project. For institutions that have already received CDP they are eligible for a \$4,000 award. A copy of the grant application form, and overview on the grant, and the LSTA proposal will be available on the CDP web site. First-Ever Survey of Technology Use in Libraries and Museums

An <u>Institute of Museum and Library Services</u> report, surveying more than more than 700 libraries and museums, quantifies, for the first time, the prevalence of computers, software and information sharing technologies in the day-to-day work of museums and libraries. The Colorado Digitization Project is cited as an exemplary project.

Comments Sought on Effectiveness of Filtering

The National Telecommunications & Information Administration is inviting comments about whether current Internet blocking or filtering technology adequately addresses the needs of educational institutions. The NTIA also invites evaluations of the effectiveness of children's Internet safety policies. It will use the comments as a basis for recommendations to Congress on how to foster development of appropriate & effective technology protection measures. White House Conference Features Coloradan on School Libraries

Keith Curry Lance, nationally known researcher on student achievement and school libraries, spoke to a group of nearly 200 education, library, government, and philanthropic leaders from across the country in early June at First Lady Laura Bush's White House Conference on School Libraries. The event featured the latest research and model programs.

Lance, who is director of the Colorado State Library's Library Research Service (Colorado Department of Education), is the author of many landmark library studies. He spoke about his research establishing the link between school libraries and student achievement

Also appearing was Kathleen D. Smith, principal of Cherry Creek High School, Cherry Creek, Colorado, on a panel of practitioners discussing how to put theory to work for children and teachers. Nance Nassar, CSL senior consultant for school libraries was a participant. Free Library Materials for August's National Inventors' Month

Libraries can receive free display materials for National Inventors' Month in August. Banners, posters, bookmarks, a crossword puzzle, a reproducible, 4- page handout for kids and a recommended reading list are some of the materials that will be included. The United Inventors Association of the USA (UIA-USA), The Academy of Applied Science, and Inventors' Digest magazine have joined hands for the fifth year in a row to offer materials for libraries to use during this month long celebration of ingenuity. Materials this year include those designed just for school libraries that can be used any time of the year, along with free invention curricula guides for teachers. OCLC to Design Public Access Computing Portal with CSL

OCLC is the recipient of a \$9 million, three-year grant from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation to build a portal for public libraries and other institutions whose mission includes "open access to authoritative knowledge resources." The Colorado State Library, the Benton Foundation, Isoph, and TechSoup are partner organizations that will help design, develop, and operate the portal. The portal is being developed to meet the ongoing needs of managing hardware and software, deploying advanced services, training staff and patrons, and delivering digital library services. The portal will host various digital services such as online tutorials, training modules, web casting message boards, and expert assistance. The planned release date for the portal is April 2003.
