Shades of Katrina! Online Disaster Planning Tool Available

If you attended ALA in New Orleans or if you recall any of the media coverage of the post-Katrina impacts, you can get a sense of the scope of a disaster. Your library, school, or institution can prepare for any eventuality with "dPlan." "dPlan," a free webbased fill-in-the-blank program for writing institutional disaster plans, was created, tested, and refined by the Northeast Document Conservation Center (NEDCC) and the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners (MBLC), with funding from the Institute of Museum and Library Services. "dPlan" works when you log on to www.dplan.org and enter your institution's information into a template that guides you through the creation of a comprehensive disaster plan. Explore dPlan's features in an introductory demo on the homepage.

dPlan's easy-to-use program automatically supplies language for a final plan. The resulting printable, customized disaster plan contains checklists of all disaster procedures, salvage priorities, preventive maintenance schedules, current contact information for personnel, insurance and IT help, as well as a list of supply sources and emergency services.

IMLS reports 80% of collecting institutions do not have an emergency plan that includes collections with staff trained to carry out the plan. dPlan is designed to help institutions

First Lady Announces Librarian Recruitment and Education Grants

First Lady Laura Bush announced \$20,869,145 in grants from the federal Institute of Museum and Library Services. Thirty-five awards will go to universities, libraries, and library organizations across the country today to recruit and educate librarians. The grants are designed to help offset a current shortage of school library media specialists, library school faculty, and librarians working in underserved communities, as well a looming shortage of library directors and other senior librarians, many of whom are expected to retire in the next 20 years. The grants benefit 26 doctoral, 361 master's, 3,201 continuing education, and 289 preprofessional students across the country. One recipient was the University of Colorado at Boulder Library, with its project "Government Information in the 21st Century." CU will partner with Arizona State Library, Archives & Public Records; New Mexico State Library; Wyoming State Library; and Utah State University Library to create a multistate, multitype library training program that will train reference and public service librarians in the use of electronic federal government information resources.

Another award that will affect Colorado was to Emporia State University School of Library and Information Management - "Emporia Diversity Initiative: Matching Recruitment with Retention Strategies" will lead a project designed to recruit, train, and retain 18 local minority library staff and students for library service in Kansas, Colorado, and Oregon. Candidates will receive full scholarships and earn undergraduate, master's, or doctoral library degrees.
