### **State Library Completes Program Audit**

Last year the Governor's Office of State Planning and Budgeting asked the Department of Education to conduct a program of audit of all CDE programs over a three-year time frame. The Colorado State Library conducted its audit in this, the second year, of the program. The State Library engaged Dr. Augusto Diana from the University of Denver to coordinate the audit and write the final report. During the audit, a committee composed of representatives from the State Library, Regional Systems, the Colorado Resource Center at the Denver Public Library, the Colorado Council for Library Development, the Resource Sharing Board, and the Budget Office at the Colorado Department of Education met to oversee the audit. The Audit Committee analyzed each State Library program and conducted a survey of school, public, and academic libraries around the state.

The Audit Report was submitted to the CDE Budget Office in July and was submitted to the Governor's Office with the Department's official budget request on August 1. An

# Bolt Makes Presentation to the State Board of Education on Access to Resources

Assistant Commissioner for Libraries Nancy Bolt made a presentation to the August State Board of Education meeting. The previous month, Eric Feder, Director of Educational Telecommunications, presented four goals to the State Board. Goal 3 is: *all educators and learners will have access to high quality instructional and informational resources regardless of where they live*. Bolt's presentation discussed the benefits of access to online resources in the context of equity, economy, and excellence.

The Colorado State Library is asking for state funds to subscribe to on-line resources to benefit the entire state of Colorado. The subscription would provide **equity:** all schools and libraries would have subscriptions and the resources would be available to everyone in the state, regardless of geography. The subscription would provide **economy:** currently only about half the schools and even fewer public libraries subscribe to this level of resources. For one-third of what is being paid now by only half of the state's schools, the entire state can benefit from these resources. The cost to subscribe to these same resources in print would be \$50,000,000.

The subscription would provide **excellence**: these are resources that are not available on the Internet; they are carefully chosen to be relevant to schools and small public libraries; and they are safe for full access by children and adults. The \$400,000 contract will probably allow subscription to full-text articles in over 500 magazines, over 150 regional newspapers, 35,000 full text biographies and much more.)

Ken Dowlin, Director of Distance Education in Library and Information Science at San Jose State University, will be the speaker at the Central Colorado Library System's annual meeting, September 28, 2001 at the Arvada Center for the Arts and Humanities. He will address issues involved with the education of librarians, distance education programs, and the need for librarians to be in control of the process. Dowlin is a well-known innovator in library technology and services. His previous positions include Director of the San Francisco Public Library; Director of the Pikes Peak Library District in Colorado Springs; Director of the Natrona County Public Library in Casper, Wyoming; and Assistant Director of the Jefferson County Public Library. # Colorado Libraries Receive Over \$1.7 Million in Bill & Melinda Gates Grant Awards

Congratulations to Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation grant recipients! Eighty-eight libraries including regional systems and the State Library received \$1,743,555 in Gates computer grants. Awards included computers, software, and, in many cases, additional funding for network and telecom upgrades. Nine libraries will receive computer labs equipped with 11 workstations, a content server, laser printer, and data projector. Durango Public Library, Rio Grande Library District-Carnegie Branch, La Veta Public Library, Southern Teller Library District, Limon Public Library, Aurora Public Library, Longmont Public Library, Greeley Public Library, and Sterling Public Library were all recipients of Gates computer labs.
