Better Service to Spanish-Speakers through Free Outreach

Training

The Colorado State Library is offering ten regional Spanish outreach training sessions through a special grant administered by OCLC. The first workshop will be at the Aurora Public Library North Branch at 1298 Peoria Street on December 10, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Nine more will be scheduled around the state after January 1.

This workshop will build on concepts in the first round of Spanish outreach training that the State Library offered a couple of years ago. Participants will learn how to provide better outreach to Spanish-Speakers in their local community, facilitate partnerships with local agencies, and begin developing an action plan for providing library services to Spanish-speakers.

This training is open to ALL staff from ALL types of libraries. As part of the ongoing training, workshop participants will be encouraged to sign up for the Spanish Outreach forum on WebJunction Colorado. Participants will be able to share ideas with colleagues and also ask questions of staff within the state and throughout the country about their expertise in building successful Spanish Outreach programs through their libraries.
