A revised form was posted in August that corrects a small error in item 10, the Maintenance of Effort section. If you have an older form from July, be sure to obtain and submit the updated form. Public and academic libraries are not affected by this change.

Please note that school districts apply for the State Funding for Libraries for all libraries in the district. Individual schools within a district should not apply separately.

Online Library Classes Offered

Core certification classes for prospective school library media specialists and school administrators will be offered online beginning fall, 2001. Montana State University-Bozeman has been selected as the lead institution for a national demonstration project in distance education by the U.S. Department of Education. Through collaboration with the University of Nevada-Las Vegas, the University of South Dakota and Northern State University in South Dakota, the core courses required for certification in the two target content areas will be offered during the next two years. Grant Resources for Community Builders

- \$500 Grants for Student Community Projects: Students who want to turn their ideas for community projects into action can get help from the <u>Do Something</u> <u>organization</u>, which has launched a new web site to help teens get informed, get connected, speak out and take action. They will be awarding twenty-five \$500 grants for student-led projects.
- Funding for Campus-Based Literacy Programs: The <u>Student Coalition for</u> <u>Action in Literacy Education</u> has issued a request for proposals from campusbased literacy programs interested in joining the Literacy Action Network. The coalition will award between 10-12 sub-grants of up to \$10,000 to institutions of higher education. Deadline: September 24, 2001.
