Public Library Election Results – November 2006

Fourteen public libraries in Colorado submitted ballot questions to their communities in November 2006. The issues ranged from asking for exemption from the Taxpayer Bill of Rights (TABOR) funding limits (informally known as De-Brucing) to asking for approval for the formation of a library district. Other ballot issues were mill levy increases, formation of a Capital Facilities District for a new library building, and permission to bond for new or renovated buildings. Ten measures passed. Early Literacy Initiative Impacting Library Services

Three years ago, the Colorado State Library (CSL) launched an early literacy initiative based on the national model called Every Child Ready to Read @your library® (A program of the Public Library Association and the Association for Library Service to Children, American Library Association). The intent was to encourage the state's public libraries to enhance their children's services by gradually incorporating education, modeling, and information about early literacy skills that are the foundation for school reading readiness. ("Early literacy" addresses children from birth to six years of age.)

Three studies released this year confirm that CSL's work in early literacy is helping to create change:

- ➡ "Fast Facts" Training Jumpstarts Early Literacy Services (No. 239 June 8, 2006) summarizes initial thoughts of those taking training several years ago, about HOW their library might adapt services.
- ♣ "Fast Facts" Early Literacy Initiative Impacts Public Library Services for Young Children (No. 237 April 20, 2006) re-contacted some of these participants and determined that public libraries and librarians who attended training have begun earmarking time and material resources toward enhancing early literacy programming and services. (For example, 76% said their library has made changes to existing early literacy services such as story times and outreach to parents and caregivers.) (See www.lrs.org/fastfacts/index.asp?year=2006)
- "Early Literacy Programs and Practices at Colorado Public Libraries," (October 2006) is an extensive, qualitative report based on interviews with the state's library leaders in early literacy. Free Educational DVD on Colorado Trout

The Colorado Trout Unlimited organization has produced a DVD version of their prizewinning video production, "Incredible Journey of the Greenback Cutthroats" (IJGC). They are making free copies available to public libraries. They explain:

"IJGC is the definitive natural history of Colorado's official state fish (made so at our initiative in 1994) and efforts to restore it in the modern era under the Endangered Species Act. It was sponsored not only by TU, but also by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, Forest Service, BLM, and Colorado Division of Wildlife. The production won nine awards at the International Wildlife Film Festival, was broadcast nationally over the PBS satellite, and was nominated for an Emmy by KRMA, which premiered it."

A number of libraries may have received a copy through StateLINC. However, because the group plans to promote availability at libraries through its membership, teachers, and the media, you may wish to check that the DVD is catalogued and available.

Colorado Libraries Move in New Direction

The Colorado Library Advisory Board, established in 2002, voted to dissolve. Board members felt a reallocation of time, energy and resources to other activities will be more effective than the present structure. An ad hoc group will advise Colorado State Library Director Eugene Hainer on flow of communication with library representatives, essential for the state agency to respond to Colorado's needs. Colorado's Public Libraries Identify Areas for Assistance

A recent survey of Colorado's public libraries, conducted by Library People—Friends of Colorado Libraries, identified areas in which libraries believe they could benefit from assistance from volunteers and the community.

Of the libraries responding, nearly 75% have local Friends groups. These organizations are comprised of members who are involved with a library as volunteers and donors. Libraries said they are interested in receiving assistance with their Friends group. More than half identified 'membership development' as a priority. Other needs that were noted included recruiting volunteers (43%) and fund-raising (41%). Respondents also expressed an interest in legislative advocacy, Board training, training volunteers to work in the library, and management of book sales.

As for needs of the library system in general, 41% of respondents identified "improved space" as the highest local concern. Advocacy and marketing also ranked high with 31% of respondents citing advocacy and 28% of respondents citing marketing or community outreach as a need in their districts. Support for computer equipment tied with programming for adults, with nearly 25% of libraries choosing those as areas of interest for assistance.

- ♣ Gene Hainer (CSL Director) attended the 100th anniversary celebration for the Lamar Public Library, read a holiday story for the kids and offered brief remarks on the occasion. Also in early December, he assisted Pitkin County librarians with their group planning process at the Aspen Public Library. On December 9, he attended Emporia library school graduation ceremonies, Golden.

- Diana Reese traveled to Delta and Pueblo to train new correctional library staff.

Find an Author Database Provides Great Leads for Libraries

A report from the Book Organizations of Colorado about the free Find an Author database shows an increase in usage in October and November. This follows promotion at the CAL conference and related to Children's Book Week. There was an upswing in visits to the site in October, along with a spike in activity in mid-November.
