Computer Specs and Updated Standards Provided by Standards and Technology Committee

Are you considering purchasing new computers and would like some guidelines on specs? What are the minimum technology requirements to offer typical services to your patrons such as online databases and web-based catalogs? How can you convince your library board that there is a need to upgrade technology to continue to offer library services to patrons? If any of these questions ring true, or you are just curious, take a look at the recently updated [Technology Standards](#) web site. The standards, which include three levels, are divided into sections: Service & Support, Hardware, and Training. The standards were created to provide libraries with benchmarks for maintaining a level of technology sufficient for providing typical library services.

Top Tech Trends Predicted for 2002 in Schools and Libraries

The December issue of *School Library Journal* reported the top technology trends that we might see in the upcoming year in both schools and libraries.

1. Wireless net access--Wireless networks continue to gain popularity, particularly in school settings. Wireless technology allows cable-free access to networks.
2. E-rate in the eye of the hurricane--CIPA will have a big impact on the number of schools and libraries participating in E-rate and what types of services they apply for.

3. Cyberterrorism--Terrorists may use the Internet as a weapon crippling U.S. corporate and government web sites in addition to computers in schools and libraries
4. Handhelds--When the price comes down and the devices provide more readily access to the Internet, it won't be unlikely for librarians to use these to check the catalog remotely as they browse the stacks.
5. Tablet computers--These devices combine the advantage of laptop screen readability with the greater portability of a handheld. Students can take notes with a stylus and can also view multimedia presentations (assuming this is a broadband wireless network).
6. Less free, more fee--Web sites, such as Britannica.com that used to offer free content to users are starting to charge or sharply reduce what was once free. However, Forrester Research indicates users are unwilling to pay for online content.
7. More Online Students--There is an expected increase in the number of high school students, particularly from rural areas, taking online courses in subject specific areas Broadband in these areas will also need to increase to make this type of distance education possible.
8. The copyright war continues--There is a struggle to maintain the fair use of copyrighted materials for educational purposes in the digital age. Intellectual property owners such as AOL, Time Warner, and Microsoft become more concerned about individuals pirating their goods.
