FROM THE DIRECTOR

This fall the Colorado Talking Book Library in cooperation with the Library of Congress will be starting a publicity campaign to encourage more people who are eligible to use the talking book program to sign up for services. The library staff of Colorado Talking Book Library will be increasing visits to various communities in the state to help publicize the talking book program.

We would like to invite you to help us in our campaign. As active users of this program, you know first hand, how much the talking book program may have changed your life. It is not unusual for staff to hear of someone going years without being able to read a book or magazine, because no one ever told them about the talking book program. We know that most successful campaigns -political, social, etc. -- start with one person spreading the word. Some of you tell us that you have recommended the services to friends and family, we appreciate your personal endorsement of the service. The Library of Congress estimates that at least 1.4% of the U. S. population is eligible to use the Talking Book program. Colorado's population is estimated to be 4,431,000 which mean that 62,034 people in Colorado are eligible to use the Colorado Talking Book Library. Please be our ambassadors and tell your friends, family, colleagues, and fellow Coloradoans about CTBL. Encourage them to sign up for this free service if they are not able to read regular print because of a handicap. Remember that this service is available in every state, and we can supply you with contact information if your loved ones live outside of Colorado.

If you are interested in helping the Colorado Talking Book Library reach every eligible Coloradan, share our phone number with your friends and family members who wish to sign-up for service.

RC50950 The Amazing Adventures of Kavalier and Clay by Michael Chabon

This Pulitzer Prize-winning book brings a figure from Jewish myth into a post-World War II setting as two young cousins invent a Superhero steeped in legend and magic. The story poses many questions for today, including how escapist fantasies provide refuge from the tragedies of real life. Alternate titles show how the golem legend reoccurs in contemporary literature.

RC44849 Tuesdays with Morrie: An Old Man, A Young Man, and Life's Greatest Lessons by Mitch Albom

If you haven't met Morrie, you really should. Author Albom lost track of his favorite college professor while he pursued a career as a sports writer. Not coincidentally. Albom's own life was going out of control. Albom reunites with Morrie Schwartz as the gifted teacher's own life is coming to an end. But this is not a depressing book, because Morrie shares profound insight on how to make every day of our lives worthwhile. Related books explore intergenerational friendships, and how we can all benefit from the wisdom of elders, something rarely done in our contemporary world. Also available as

by James McBride

Journalist and author McBride grew up in a Brooklyn housing project with his father, a Black minister, and his mother, a white woman who had energetically embraced her husband's ethnic culture and identity. As an adult, McBride learned the secrets of his mother's surprising past and why, in her mind, all races were truly one. RC47006 Welcome to the World, Baby Girl! by Fannie Flagg.

When TV anchor Dena Nordstrom runs away from her New York life, she travels back to her roots in a small Arkansas town where people still know her as "Baby Girl," and also remember the mysteries of her past. Service to Suit Your Needs


How to Get the Books You Want When You Want Them

- 1. **Monthly service:** Books are sent out the first Wednesday of every month. The computer will automatically select from your general reading interests (selected on your application). If you call or mail in a list of books we can add those to your request list, and the computer will send those books if they are available before selecting from your general reading categories.
- 2. Weekly service: Books are sent out each week, and patrons may call in to increase or decrease the number of books or temporarily stop service if they have too many on hand. If you call or mail in a list of books, we can add those to your request file, and the computer will send those books if they are available before selecting from your general reading categories.
- 3. Automatic selection: The computer will automatically send out a book as one is returned. If you call or mail in a list of books we can add those to your request file, and the computer will send those books if they are available before selecting from your general reading categories, but these books are selected primarily from subject categories that you chose when you made application.
- 4. **Nightly list selection**: The computer selects a book from your request list when a book is returned. Selection is made **only from that list**, so it is important that your list has **at least** 50 books on file at all times. Even with that many, if you read primarily westerns, mysteries, or popular authors, the computer may have trouble finding available titles. If the computer finds no titles available, it will not make substitutions.
- 5. *Call in:* Books are sent only when the patron calls and requests them.

Remember: it is very easy to change the type of service you are receiving to meet your needs. You can change or add subject codes for more specific selections as well as add more titles to your request list. Call the library anytime you would like to make changes to your file.

Please Remember:

- Only borrow as many books as you can read in a month & return them promptly
- Do not write on cassette tapes or boxes; mark the mailing card if tape is broken
- Rewind the cassette tapes and descriptive videos before returning them to CTBL

Audio Yellow Pages are now available anywhere in the USA. Voice Access Communications introduces the Audio Yellow Pages; a free voice activated service for the blind and visually impaired.

Now you can gain access to over 10 million businesses in the United States by dialing one toll-free number, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Just dial 888-654-1236 and enter pass code 4544. Follow the easy audio instructions to locate virtually any business in any zip code.

Voice Access uses the newest voice recognition technology to create the Audio Yellow Pages. Never again will you have to pay a telephone directory services to find a business phone number. Unlike other directories, the Audio Yellow Pages locates businesses in your specified zip code, and then expands the search to include listings up to 15 miles away to ensure you get a lot of choices.
