A WORD FROM THE DIRECTOR

The library has been in a state of upheaval the past few months and we have not had a chance to put together a newsletter until now. We are going to try and let you know what has been happening here so you can have a better idea of what we will be facing in the future.

In the last legislative session, the Colorado Talking Book Library's budget was cut dramatically. The library was forced to cut two staff positions, all state funds for large print books, cassettes, descriptive videos, and materials to process these items for circulation have been cut. All in all, the CTBL lost around \$125,000 in staff and operating costs from the state general fund.

We have always encouraged our patrons and their families to join the Friends of the CTBL and to make a yearly contribution to this worthwhile organization and thanks to those of you who have supported our Friends group the library's Friends organization has picked up the cost of our operational expenses. Please read the article about the Friends organization in this newsletter and support this very valuable organization. The CTBL could not provide some of the services you request without their help.

Now for some changes:

Because of staffing shortages, the library will answer patron phone calls from 8:00 a.m. until noon then from 1:00 p.m. until 4:30 p.m.

Please remember, MONDAY is usually the busiest phone day for the library, so, if your call can wait until later in the week we would appreciate it.

As we have lost staff in our mailroom, your requests may take more than one day to be filled. Please be patient. (Hint: do <u>not</u> wait until you are out of reading material before calling us for more.)

CAR CRASHES INTO CTBL

August 16, 2003 on or about 10:30 p.m. The Colorado Talking Book Library had an unwelcome visitor enter the library using his automobile. Our visitor made a right turn off Sheridan Blvd careened off of a mailbox on the north side of Second and swerved on to the library parking lot knocking over three iron posts before striking the north west wall of the library. A portion of the vehicle entered the building enough to knock over a shelving unit attached to the wall, that unit hit the next unit which fell and hit the next unit, which fell and so on..... The Director of the Library was notified that the burglar alarm was tripped early Sunday morning. "I couldn't believe the mess when I arrived at the library Sunday morning. I was frightened that someone was buried in the whole mess." Ten units twenty eight feet long were knocked down. We estimated about 36,000 books were knocked off the shelving units. All of the shelves needed to be emptied and reconstructed. The books needed to be placed in numerical order and then placed back on the book shelves.

Q. With staff changes at the CTBL, who should I ask to speak to when I call for books?

Many of you have a special person you like to speak with when you telephone the library.
However, with the loss of a position, we must ask you to speak with any of the three Readers' Advisors who are available when you call. Each Readers' Advisor can help you get the books that you want.

To help us serve you quickly, have your patron number ready, and keep your phone lists to twenty RC numbers or less. Longer lists can be

mailed to us for future use.

Also, be sure to mention if you need a book for school or for a book club, as soon as you call. We will try to expedite your request so that you will meet your deadlines.

You can help us most, at this time of change, by being flexible and wellprepared when you call the library.

BOOKS WITH BITE (FOR KIDS)

Many public libraries in Colorado will be taking part in the State-sponsored program, *Chews to Read*. Here are some CTBL titles that you can sink your teeth into. Find more booklists and activities of the CTBL website, or call to order the following titles. (*There is always high demand for books listed in the newsletter*).

RC054575 Chocolate, by Robert Burleigh.

Traces the history of chocolate from the seeds of the cocoa tree to delicious chocolate bars. Grades 4 to 7.

RC049276 Eat Your Words, by Charlotte Jones.

Ever wonder how dishes get their names, and how phrases like "couch potato" and "spill the beans," came to be? These books are lots of fun and filled with interesting food facts. Grades 4 to 7.

RC046925 It's Disgusting and We Ate It, by James Soheim.

Collection of facts, poems, and information about plants and animals not usually found on American plates. Reminds readers of the strange origins of "normal food." Grades 2 to 4.

RC045368 Orp and the Chop Suey Burgers, by Suzy Kline.

Orville Rudemyer Pygenski dreams of traveling but never goes anywhere. When he hears about a cooking contest that offers a trip to Disneyworld, he invents a winning recipe. Grades 4 to 7.

RC050733 Science Experiments You Can Eat, by Vicki Cobb.

Describes food experiments that demonstrate principles of physics and chemistry that produce edible results. Grades 5 to 8.

RC050733 Strudel Stories, by Joanne Rocklin.

When Lori's grandfather dies, she and her sister carry on a delicious family tradition of making strudel and sharing stories. Grades 3 to 6.

BRAILLE AT THE CTBL

Because of the budget cuts the Colorado Talking Book Library faced a decision was made to provide Braille service through the library here in Colorado. As a result, on July 1, 2003 CTBL began serving our Braille clients through the library here in Denver. The CTBL has become a "sub" regional Braille library, this means that we will carry the most current two years of Braille produced by the Library of Congress. We will be able to interlibrary loan older titles for you if you are interested in reading them.

Because we have limited space for Braille the library will most likely be ordering one copy of each Braille title, unless it is a wildly popular book, i.e. Harry Potter is a good example. We are asking our Braille readers not to keep more than three titles in their possession. The checkout period will be two months and overdue notices will be sent out after that period of time. If you do not return your Braille books in six months, a hold will be placed on your Braille service until all late books are returned. We ask that you are careful with Braille books as we have very limited copies. Please do not damage or mar them in any way. If you lose or damage a volume please let us know so that we can try and acquire the lost or damaged volume.

Almost always, books are processed within 24 hours of return to the library so you will receive replacement books quickly. Braille books will be sent on a turn around basis. We encourage you to have a list of Braille books you may want to read so the computer may have a selection to choose. PLEASE return the books as soon as you have read them. You will be rewarded with a new title and someone who may have been waiting for your returned title will be please to receive it.

We hope that our Braille service will equal the service you received through Utah. We would also like to thank the staff at the Utah library for the smooth transition of service back to Denver.

Library Lending Policy

We have been asked by may patrons "how long am I able to keep out the talking books?" The library policy has always been: you are able to check out as many talking books as you can listen to in one month period. If you find that you have items longer than 30 days, please send them back. You can always reorder the title again when you have the time to listen to it.
