

Highlighting Free Matter for the Blind and Handicapped

Did you know that Congress appropriates money to the United States Post Office's Budget every year to cover the cost of delivering NLS materials such as books and machines? For fiscal year 2004 that was approximately \$115,500,000.

All books, magazines, catalogs, and equipment are sent to a reader through the U.S. Postal Service as "Free Matter for the Blind" and may be returned the same way. There is no postage fee for returning the materials. Materials sent by a network library come with a removable address card that, when turned over and reinserted, will show the library's name and address for return mailing.

However, some patrons have trouble returning machines. If your mail carrier will not pick up your machine, take it to your local public library and they can courier it to CTBL.

The NLS program is funded annually by Congress. The fiscal year 2004 appropriation is \$50,401,000. NLS estimates that their inventory contribution to CTBL is approximately \$5,852,082 based on current holdings in our collection.

From the Director

In May I will attend the Western and Midlands biennial meeting of NLS network libraries. This will give me an opportunity to meet the directors of other libraries from almost half of the United States. I will report about this trip in our Fall newsletter.

Did you know that next year CTBL will celebrate its 75th anniversary? Planning for a celebration is under way and if you have ideas of what could be included, call the Reader's Advisors and pass them along. I can't guarantee that all ideas can be used, but you never know.

Finally, our annual survey has been mailed out. This year we are using representative sampling, a standard market research method. This means that only some of you will receive the survey each year. Look for the results in our next newsletter.

Reader's Advisors—Questions and Answers

- Q: When I order books online, and the computer says there are copies available, why don't I always receive them?
- A: There are a variety of reasons that you may not be receiving your books:
 - When you add your book to the "Book Basket", you must click the "Rush this item" button. "Rush" means that if the book is available, it will be sent right away. If you don't click the button, then the book will automatically go to your Request list and will not be sent.
 - 2. A password is needed to order books online. If you don't have a password, call the library, and we'll set one up for you.

- 3. If you have a temporary hold on your account, or if the maximum number of books you can have at one time is set too low, that would also prevent books from being sent. Again, call the library and we'll change the way your account is set up.
- Q: I am interested in ordering one of your descriptive videos, but I am not sure what type of machine I need to play it.
- A: You watch and listen to these on a TV and a VCR player. Tapes are in the VHS format. Please call the library for a complete listing of titles or go the web site.

SUMMER OUTDOOR FUN

The Colorado Lions Camp, near Woodland Park, serves blind/visually impaired, deaf, and developmentally disabled youth and adults ages 8 and above. The residential camp provides outdoor recreational experiences designed to meet the needs of each camper, to promote independence, and to have fun. Campers are grouped by age during sessions between early June and mid-August with a ratio of 2-3 campers per staff member. A week long camp session costs \$450 per camper. Some "camperships" are available for campers with financial need.

Tech Talk

As some of you know CTBL was closed for the last day in February and the first day in March as we converted over to an upgraded version of our integrated library software known as KLAS. The transition went quite smoothly. Patrons will not see many changes, but our staff now has more flexibility in how we can serve our patrons. We have refined and updated our subject codes and are working on getting those changes reflected in the catalog records. We hope this results in your receiving books that you really like instead of books that you might like.

For those of you who use the internet, you may have noticed that our web site has changed. Our CDE web support staff did a major overhaul addressing accessibility issues under ADA. Accessibility is our main concern and we were the first site in CDE to get the work done. They took out a lot of bad code that was problematic for screen readers. We have added a navigation bar and changed the background color to make it easier on the eyes. We hope the end result is a user friendly site that is accessible to our patron population.

Mailroom News

During our software conversion the mail was not processed for 3 days. As you can imagine when the computers were back up and running we had lots of mail in backlog. We send our heartfelt

thanks to all the volunteers who came in extra hours to help with the rewinding! We were back to the normal routine within a week.

- Q: I need to send back an un-needed or broken machine, but I don't have the box. What should I do?
- A: If we are sending you a replacement machine, you may send the old machine in the new box, tape the box, flip the address card and send back to CTBL. If you are canceling service and we are not sending you a new machine, we can send you a box with the packing materials in it, OR you may drop it off at your local public library and a courier service will bring it back to CTBL.
