CTBL plans to host a 9Health Fair on April 17th at the library, which will be focused around the needs of the print disabled community. Before we can secure our 9Health Fair date, we need a medical professional to volunteer as our site's Medical Coordinator. This person will assist in maintaining the medical integrity of our site, and will oversee all medical aspects of the fair. Any licensed RN, paramedic, physician assistant and other qualified medical professionals can apply for this position.

In addition, we will have non-medical volunteers that will assist in filling out the forms and movement around the building. We are very excited about this opportunity! We are looking for volunteers, both medical and non-medical, to help us on that day. If you know of someone who might be interested in helping CTBL, please let them know and ask them to call the library and speak with Zena or Terri. We really need a medical professional who would be willing to be our Medical Coordinator!

Look for more details in the spring if you are interested in using our site for a 9Health Fair visit. Also 9Health Fairs are held across the state so you can look for one in your area. If you need help in finding one, you can call the library.

• TRI IT Camp for Women: A Workshop for Blind Athletes and Sighted Guides—April 19-22, 2007 in Glenwood Springs, Colorado

This is a fun 3-day instructional camp aimed at introducing visually impaired women and sighted guides to the sport of triathlon. Participants will be introduced to basic swim, bike, and run/walk skills necessary to complete a sprint triathlon. Sighted guides and blind athletes will learn the fundamentals of swimming together with a bungee cord, riding together on a tandem bicycle, and running together with a tether. We encourage any visually impaired women to recruit and bring their own sighted guides.



New large print books continue to arrive almost daily but no new descriptive video movies have arrived. Here are three new audio books added into the Colorado Collection:

CC 8036** Easy Money

Author: Jenny Siler ** Narrator: Louise Lederhos

Alison Kerry, the daughter of a Florida drug runner, has her own shady past that brings her into contact with murder. Allie has a killer on her trail, and a "hot" computer disk in her pocket, and she's running for her life across the great Northwest, to the heartlands of America where a horrifying truth is buried.

Going Over East: Reflections of a Woman Rancher

Author: Linda Hasselstrom ** Narrator: Marilyn Cheney

Gate by gate, Hasselstrom guides readers through the physical and emotional landscape of going over east to summer pasture. With each stop, she makes a nostalgic foray into the past, discusses the routine demands of her family's cow-calf operation, pays loving tribute to a favorite old horse and celebrates the wildlife and silent dignity of deserted homesteads. In her new epilogue, she offers readers a look at the distance she and the land have traveled since this classic was first published in 1987.

CC 8031** Fire Line: The Summer Battles of the West Author: Michael Thoele **Narrator: Don Bennallack

Thoele looks at the entire world of Western wildfire, with a strong, human-interest focus on the self-described adventurers and adrenaline junkies who go to battle in the West's annual summer war. Both rural and urban in scope, it covers wilderness fires that rage in such places as Alaska and Yellowstone National Park to the "urban interface" fires that sweep out of the mountains and into neighborhoods in such places as Los Angeles and Oakland, California.

Mailroom News

Patrons, please look around your residence and return any books that you are finished reading. Timely return of books and materials means others can read the book without having to wait.

CTBL inspects all of the books mailed back to us. However, you may occasionally receive a damaged or incomplete book. Helping us identify these books ensures the problems will be fixed and not recirculated back to patrons.

If you receive a **defective** book, place a rubber band around any damaged cassette. Place the item on top in the mailing container, turn the mailing card over so the red side shows and the hole punch is in the upper left corner, check the box marked DAMAGED, near the hole punch and return the book.

If you receive an **incomplete** book, place all the tapes and a note in the mailing container, turn the mailing card over so the red side shows and return the book.
