Highlighting The Colorado Collection

As you may know, The Colorado Talking Book Library has an in-house recording studio that enables us to provide this newsletter in audio format for patrons preferring the audio version. We also record books of local interest or by local authors and books that patrons request. Books that are not available in the network and the reader advisors identify as consistently requested by the patrons are also included. It can generally take over a year to get a book through our process. These books become part of the Colorado Collection.

The studio migrated to digital technology three years ago, to the relief of most volunteers since it made the recording process much easier. It was hard to make corrections in the reel-to-reel tape format. We have a team of about 45 volunteers who narrate, monitor or review the books that are recorded.

There are about 156,000 book titles published in the United States every year. The National Library Service provides the network with about 2,000 titles so there are many books that don't make it into the national collection. Many of the network libraries also have local recording studios and have developed local collections. We share

these additional titles through interlibrary loan and overall it helps to grow the total collection.

We have several titles from the Colorado Collection highlighted in this issue. We hope you will explore this collection and enjoy some of the books. We do not have a complete list but the reader advisors can help you find some titles that will match your interests.

A word about our mailing list. We never provide our list of patrons to anyone. Your privacy is of the utmost importance to CTBL. We do, however, get requests from organizations to send out information. This is how that works: if I think the information would be of interest to you, our patrons, then the organization provides the mailing to CTBL. We run mailing labels and put those labels on the material ourselves and mail it out.

CTBL Staff Changes

We welcome Sara Drongesen as our new Reader Advisor. Some of you may have spoken with her already. She comes to us from the Northeast BOCES (Boards of Cooperative Educational Services) and had experience with setting up students with CTBL's services.

Outreach

Please call the library and let us know who you are. Our old applications had no way for you to indicate if you were a veteran and we do need to know. So please call a reader advisor and have them add this to your patron record.

Mail Room News

We would like to thank people for their notes inside the tape boxes. They are shared with the library staff. If you get a bad tape, it would most helpful if you could write on a note which tape and side is bad so it will take us less time to repair.

Reader Advisors

Here it is, the beginning of 2008. Does it seem like last spring when you sent in your broken talking book machine for repair? Did you call us when you sent it in?

It is very important if you are sending in your broken talking book machine for repair that you call one of your reader advisors so we can rush a replacement to your door. If you don't call us many days of enjoyable reading could be lost. Often notes in machine boxes are overlooked, and not every machine sent back needs a replacement. So pick up a phone and let us know so we can replace your broken talking book machine the next day.

Are your books delayed in shipment or you are not receiving your magazine subscription? Now would be a good time to call the library and verify your address and phone number. Sometimes a simple address verification will solve your problems and you will start receiving your books and magazine subscriptions in a timely fashion. So Pick up your phone and give us a call, it will only take a minute!

Braille Instruction

Occasionally we have people requesting where they can learn Braille. The National Braille Press now has a website where you can get this kind of information. 
